Lockney school board approves committee

The Lockney school board approved the textbook committee for the 1985-86 school year in their regular monthly meeting held last Monday night. Serving on that committee will be W.H. Hallmark, LaDora Aufill, Peggy Hallmark, Jeanette Marr, Charlotte Mitchel, Phil Cotham, Karla Josey, Alayne Slover, Bettie Washington, Dorothy Bradley, Bettie Knox, Linda Marr, and Waverly Washington.

The board also approved participation in the in-service program with the Education Service Center for the 1985-86 school year. The board approved 3 days of in-service to be held in Lockney.

They approved participation in a pilot program with Wayland Baptist College in Plainview. The course will be offered in Lockney and is for teachers and administrators. It is a course in evaluating fellow teachers and administrators,

students, and student teachers.

During the superintendent's report
W.H. Hallmark told the board members

that he had been to two different meetings on House Bill 72, one in Plainview and the other in Floydada. He also discussed future needs for the upcoming year. He indicated the school will probably have to add three more teachers in the elementary school, and additional classroom space is also needed. The board has not taken any action on the space problem yet.

Hallmark told the board that a monitoring visit from TEA was planned for Thursday to check out Lockney vocational programs. He also reported that the Lockney athletic budget had \$1011.00 added to it after the playoff games after Lockney's expenses were paid.

The board held an executive session to evaluate Superintendent Hallmark and the report was all marked acceptable. They also approved Tax report #3 which shows Lockney schools are 60.46% collected of the current taxes.

Major Vernon Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Department of Public Safety said, "Based on past holiday experience, we know that numerous persons will lose their lives and hundreds will be injured on Texas streets and highways during the 1985 New Year's Holiday. The Department requests the help and support of the motoring public in reducing this needless waste of human life by observing all traffic laws, especially those regarding speed and alcohol."

Major Cawthon stated, "Possibly the most prevalent accidents occurring this period will be the one car run-off-the-roadway type accident which is directly attributed to driver inattention and/or intoxication."

The Major suggested that adequate travel time be budgeted in holiday planes, stop frequently and rest, reduce speed for road conditions, and above all, don't mix alcohol and driving. If you drink at a party, let a sober friend drive

"Feel free to request needed assistance from any DPS Trooper during your holiday travels. Let's all do our part to reduce to zero all holiday traffic deaths," Major Cawthon added.

The First National Bank held their annual Christmas party on December 12 in Plainview and dedicated the party to June McDonald who celebrated her 40th anniversary with the bank on the same day.

June began with the bank as a bookkeeper and has held the positions of teller, assistant cashier, and presently the head cashier for the bank. When she went to work, Dorsey Baker was the president of the bank and Wanda Baker was the cashier. Including Baker, June has served under seven different bank presidents including Artie Baker, W.A. Waldrop, M.W. Wiley, Charles Duran, Gene Collins, and at the present time Carroll Anderson.

When asked what if any of the major changes in banking stuck in her mind, June said "Almost everything now is done on computers. When I started, we had a manual standup posting machine and all of the ledgers and bookkeeping work was done by hand. Now it's done on automated machines." June also commented that, "It is nice to be a part of the new phase which has come into banking."

Another change June commented on was that in the past "The men did most of the banking business. Now women do as much as the men. Women have taken a more active interest in their husband's businesses."

June has been with the bank through two major changes in the past. When the bank was reorganized in 1948, she commented, there was no great change in the bank itself other than the stock being sold and a new charter issued. The second major change came in 1960 when the bank moved from its old location to its present location. "The

space was a much needed addition. When I went to work for the bank, we had four women and one man working and now we have ten women and five men."

June has also in her 40 years with the bank had the opportunity to serve as many as three generations of a family. "I have made lots of friends and watched families grow up while working here."

June is a near lifelong resident of Lockney having come here when she was a small child to live with an aunt and uncle, Tom and May Cope, coming to Lockney with her sister Mary Ruth and a brother Hollis to live with the Copes. Her younger brother, went to live with another aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. Ross Cope and her four other brothers stayed with her father. Her mother had passed away when she was two years old.

June graduated from Lockney High School in 1941 and married Wayne Bybee in 1942. They lived in Flomot for one year and other than that year June has been a Lockney resident. Wayne was killed in an auto accident in 1958.

Last year June married Robert Mc-Donald and they continue to reside in Lockney. June has a son who lives in Odessa and a daughter in Midland. Robert has three sons who live in Lockney, Lubbock, and Amarillo. The McDonalds are looking forward to a Christmas celebration with their children and four grandchildren.

Of her 40 years with the bank, June said, "It really doesn't seem like it has been that long. It has been great to work here and I have started on my next forty years."

Area gins exceed 55,000 bales thus far in 1984

As of Thursday, December 13 Lockney area gins had produced 55,166 ginned bales of cotton. This count includes Lockney Coop and South Plains, Evans, D and J, Lockney Gin, Sterley Gin, Crume, Barwise, and Marble Brothers gins.

This year's harvesting has been slowed down considerably by the wet weather which has plagued the area. The last of these wet spells hit the Lockney area on Thursday of last week. On Friday the wet weather continued with freezing rain having fallen Thursday night. This will put off harvesting the reamaining cotton for a minimum of two weeks.

In 1983 this paper surveyed area gins. In December, 1983, a total bale count of 21,609 was reported. This count was made with an estimated two thirds of the cotton stripped. The total bale count for 1983 was only 32,839. The 1984

cotton crop has already exceeded this amount with approximately one quarter of the cotton left to be harvested and ginned.

The main problem facing farmers now is that the cotton market is slow and prices are down from last year. In 1983 prices ranged from 62 to 65 cents. This year the price is around 50 cents per pound. In past years many farmers paid for their ginning costs with the money raised from selling the cotton seed, but this year seed prices are also depressed.

The grades and staples on the 1984 cotton crop are good, but the micronaire is bad on much of the cotton and the bad mic makes the cotton hard to sell.

We can hope, for the farmers that the market improves and that the weather will clear so that farmers can finish their harvesting.

Smith appointed to chair Texas Young Farmers

A Lockney man, Dan Smith, 30, has been appointed as chairman of the Texas Farm Bureau Young Farmers and Ranchers Advisory Committee. The appointment was made by state president S.M. True Jr. of Plainview.

Smith will be chairman of the committee for one year. The committee makes recommendations to the Texas Farm Bureau board on policies concerning young farmers and ranchers. The committee also aids the younger members in becoming aware of Farm Bureau programs. The advisory committee is composed of a representative from each of the Texas Farm Bureau's 13 districts.

As chairman of the committee, Smith will represent Texas at the American Farm Bureau convention to be held in January in Hawaii, and at the American Farm Bureau Young Farmers and Ranchers National Conference to be held in February in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Smith will preside at the Texas Farm Bureau leadership conference in January in Austin; at Texas Farm Bureau Young Farmers and Ranchers Summer Conference in August in Lubbock, and at the Texas Farm Bureau Young Farmers and Ranchers Tour in October. He also will meet with the Texas FB board of directors in Waco twice during 1985, and will attend the state convention next November. He will be accompanied on his trips by his wife, Reeda Cay.

Smith is in his second year as a member of the advisory committee. During 1984, he and his wife attended National Young Farmers and Ranchers conference in Arlington, Virginia; the

Texas Young Farmers and Ranchers Summer Meeting in McAllen and the Texas State Convention in San Antonio.

Dan Smith's farming operation includes the raising of cotton, grain sorghum and wheat at locations in the Lone Star and Sterley communities. He was a 1972 graduate of Lockney High School and a 1976 graduate of Texas

Tech University with a degree in agriculture economics. He has been on the Floyd County Farm Bureau board for seven years, having served as secretary-treasurer and as president. He also has been on the Floyd County Fair board of directors.

Smith and his wife, the former Reeda Cay Lawson, have two daughters: Tikka, 6 years old, and Michelle, 3 years

In times like these... By Mary Jo Fielding

William Casey has been compared to a cat with nine lives. For the third time since President Reagan appointed him in charge of the Central Intelligence Agency, lawmakers are demanding that William Casey quit or be fired. There was a clamor that erupted upon word that the CIA had prepared a kidnap and assassination manual for anti-Communist guerrillas in Nicaragua. However, according to aides, the 71-year-old lawyer never read or ever heard of the manual before it hit the headlines.

Casey came to Washington in 1971 to head Richard Nixon's Securities and Exchange Commission. Since then he has been under secretary of state, head of the Export-Import Bank, and now

chief of the CIA. Much of the bickering involved the fortune - last estimated as up to 14 million dollars - that Casey made as an investor and author of make-money books.

Last spring Casey had his toughest test - a messy dispute over CIA mining of Nicaraguan harbors. That operation was aborted under fire from Congress.

Casey's exploits as a coordinator of spy operations against Nazi Germany in World War II gave him a lifelong respect for the usefulness of covert actions, and he eagerly rejuvenated the CIA operations. So although the hounds of controversy are laying at his heels, his job as America's spymaster is as





Energas files complaint with commission

Energas Company (OTC) has announced that it has filed a complaint with the Railroad Commission of Texas against Cabot Corporation and its newly acquired transmission operation, Westar Transmission Company.

In the complaint filed December 18, Energas alleges that Cabot and Westar may have transferred certain utility property and gas supply contracts from Westar to a non-utility affiliate and that Cabot and Westar have failed or refused to provide information required to substantiate the accuracy and appropriateness of the October gas bill issued

Also alleged in the Energas complaint is that the utility has reason to believe that higher priced gas purchased from affiliated producers or suppliers of Cabot or Westar was delivered to the utility company instead of lower priced gas supplies that may have been available. If that did occur, utility customers were burdened with unnec-

Charles K. Vaughan, chairman and chief executive officer of Energas, said the company "considers the complaint to be a most serious matter, particularly at this time because of the larger winter volumes now being used by gas customers at a cost for which we have been unable to get a satisfactory explanation from Cabot and Westar representatives.

"If the concerns of Energas are verified by the Railroad Commission, we are confident that the Commission will order a refund from Cabot for any excess charges resulting from their actions, and will establish a proper mechanism for future billings by Cabot. Any refunds received by Energas will be passed on to our customers," said

The current pricing mechanism was established in 1979 by the Railroad Commission when Energas and Westar were one company under the former

name of Pioneer Natural Gas Company. Since that time, the predecessor company was split to form the Westar Transmission Company and Energas Company. Energas Company was separated from the parent Pioneer Corporation in October of 1983 and became an independent publicly held company. Just two and a half months ago, Pioneer sold Westar to Cabot.

Because all former affiliated relationships have changed and all company ownerships have changed, Vaughan said he felt it was in the best interest of Energas and the company's customers to have the Railroad Commission investigate prior charges by Cabot on the West Texas system and establish a proper pricing mechanism for the

"At the time we became an independent company some 13 months ago, the new Energas management pledged its best business effort to provide adequate supplies, efficient service and a reasonable and accountable gas cost to Energas customers," said Vaughan.

"Energas is absolutely committed as a business and as a utility to conduct our operations in that manner for our customers, employees and shareholders. Because of the current and regrettable situation, Energas management felt it necessary to take this action to clarify our future business procedures and regulatory requirements."

The gas costs paid by Energas to

Westar are passed on to some 210,000 gas customers in 63 incorporated communities and other rural areas on Energas' West Texas System. Also affected, but to a lesser degree, are over 59,000 customers on the utility's Amarillo system where Energas uses gas from Westar to supplement its other major supply for that city.

"We are unable at this time to determine any specific level of refund or price reduction that may be appropriate," said Vaughan. "As the detail required to make such a determination becomes available, we will present our evidence to the Railroad Commission and request that appropriate action be





Conservation tillage: A change in practice

"You can't just wake up one morning out your equipment just working the and decide you are going to do all conservation tillage. It takes a lot of nerve to sit there and know that the field done anything to it," says Royce McFadden who uses conservation tillage practices on his land near Olton, Texas. "It is just a way of life to get out there and plow it, work it, and cultivate it to the point of planting. It is real hard to just let it lay there. I like to compare it to some of these new women's hairdos. You don't have to do anything to it, just leave it straggly. It's hard to do."

No-till technology offers agricultural producers one of the best ways to maintain income and yield while cutting costs. The cost of irrigation can be cut by as much as 55 to 100%, depending on the ability of the soil to retain moisture and the contour of the field and the harvest residue on the land.

Flat land is easier to work with and exposes less soil to the drying sun and wind. It requires a little more management to control weeds with no-till, but no-till is basically the same as regular tillage in the fact that if it is done properly, you will have few or no weeds.

One of the drawbacks to conservation tillage according to McFadden is "It's hard to keep my government allotments together and still get my rotations going like I want them to." He feels that the set-aside is the problem. "They change the program, and you don't have enough wheat stubble to put corn back in," he says.

No-till and minimum tillage tools are designed to avoid trouble getting through the stubble from harvest in order to plant the next crop. It does not plug up with straw and cause shut

downs to delay operations. The biggest drawback in McFadden's opinion has been "spending \$25 to \$30 per acre on chemicals when I could have done it for \$6 an acre with Atrazine." He went on to say, "Some of the newer chemicals are more selective. They don't work on as broad a spectrum of weeds or crops, but they let you do anything you want with your rotation

Larry Hill, a farmer practicing conservation tillage south of Springlake, says, "We were shooting at cutting down the cost of pumping water as well as saving water. We changed to conservation tillage for one thing, it is cheaper. We still produce the same, certainly no less with our minimum tillage. You save time, and you don't work the ground all the time and wear

ground."

Hill says, "It's cut my water use. I have low pressure, drop sprinklers, and has to be planted and that you haven't I think it has cut my water use almost in

Hill does not see any real disadvantage with conservation tillage systems. "It cuts down on labor. You don't have to go out there and hit the ground but maybe once or twice a year. It costs me \$5 or \$6 an acre just to run a tractor across it pulling something. The more I can keep from running that tractor, the better I like it. It just costs too much,"

There are advantages and disadvantages to conservation tillage, and like any other system, it won't work on every field. Farmers will have to make the final decision, but it is a possibility worth looking into, depending on their own fields and situation.

Its funding problems are compounded by a limitation on using revenue from license sales or excise taxes on hunting and fishing gear for projects to protect endangered species. Nongame stamps and decals are available now by mail order from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, 78744, or from any of the department's district offices and 59 state parks located throughout Texas. Any outlet selling hunting and fishing licenses can also offer the nongame stamps and decals.

Collectors Covey will pay the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department \$40.50 for each print sold and \$20 for each medallion series sold. The bid contract specifies that Collectors Covey will pay a guaranteed minimum royalty of \$250,000 which will go to the Texas Nongame and Endangered Species Conservation Fund. Individuals and corporations can also make private donations to the fund.

This unique new program is fostered by the kind of cooperation and creative thinking that Texas needs to tackle difficult environmental issues. It has the support of the National Audubon Society, Sierra Club, Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas, Nature Conservancy, and the Texas chapter of the Wildlife Society.

I have every hope that the new Texas nongame stamp will experience the same success as the state's "duck stamp" which has raised more than \$2.8 million to protect waterfowl.

To publicize this ongoing effort, I have signed an official proclamation designating 1985 as Texas Nongame

Nitrate poisoning, grass tetany and bloat are three major problems that afflict cattle grazing on small grain pastures.

Nitrate poisoning occurs mainly during cloudy, overcast conditions. Under such conditions, nitrates accumulate in plants instead of converted to protein. Plant stems contain more nitrate than leaves, so nitrate poisoning is more of a problem on heavily grazed pastures.

Hay or grain supplements enable cattle to tolerate higher levels of nitrate than those on pasture only. Splitting nitrogen fertilizer applications may also help prevent nitrate poisoning on small grain pastures. But the safest way to protect animals is to remove them from problem pastures until plants resume normal growth.

Grass tetany or hypomagnesemia is more of a problem in older cows during early stages of lactation. The condition is associated with low blood magnesium. The high levels of protein and potassium that are common in small grain pastures may either depress an animal's digestion or magnesium or increase its excretion of magnesium, resulting in inadequate blood magnesium levels.


Grass tetany occurs more frequently on heavy, high potassium soils, so producers should avoid applying excessive amounts of nitrogen and potassium fertilizer. Fertilizing with magnesium to increase the magnesium content in plants is not practical. The most practical step to prevent grass tetany is to supply a palatable mineral containing six to 14 percent magnesium.

The third problem bloat, occurs when an animal cannot rid itself of gas produced in the rumen during normal digestive processes. Normally, bloat is not as much of a problem on grass pastures as it is on legume forages such as alfalfa. However, young, fast growing grasses high in protein and low in fiber can also cause bloat.

The chemical agent poloxalene provides effective control of bloat if animals eat it in adequate amounts--1.5 to two grams per 100 pounds of body weight. Whatever supplement is used should contain no nonprotein nitrogen such as urea and little natural protein. This will only aggravate the bloat

One effective way to deal with bloat is to remove cattle from bloat producing pastures and to feed hay or a combination of hay and grain until pastures can grow and become more mature.




Heart Attack Warning Signals

During a heart attack, your body usually sends out warning signals that your heart is starving for oxygen. An uncomfortable pressure, fullness, squeezing or pain in the center of your chest for more than two minutes is one signal. Chest pain that spreads to your shoulders, neck or arms is another. Dizziness, fainting, sweating, nausea or shortness of breath may also occur. Sometimes the signals may subside, only to return later.

Help your heart! Learn to recognize these signals and take fast action. Remember that each year 350,000 Americans die from heart attacks before reaching the hospital. So don't ignore the warning signals.

Act immediately. If you are having chest discomfort that lasts for two minutes or more, call the emergency rescue service. If you can get to a hospital faster by car, have someone drive you. Find out which hospitals in your area offer 24-hour emergency cardiac care. Select in advance the facility nearest your home and office and tell your family and friends so they will know what to do. Keep a list of emergency numbers next to your telephone and in a prominent place in your pocket, wallet or purse.

If you are with someone who is experiencing the warning signals, and if they last for two minutes or longer, insist on taking prompt









action. Expect the person to deny the possibility of anything as serious as a heart attack. Call the emergency rescue service, or get to the nearest hospital emergency room with 24-hour cardiac care. Give mouthto-mouth breathing and chest compression (CPR) if it is necessary and







The John Bickley Farm — A Reminiscent Story

Editor's Note: This article was shared with us by Mary Lou Bollman about the John Bickley farm.

We moved to Floyd county July 10th, 1890, and stayed in Floydada the first night. There were only three houses and a few camps at that place then. The next day we moved on our home section one and one-half miles northwest of the present Lockney. Mr. McGehee had filed on this land in Feb. 1890. There was nothing on our place to show there had ever been any one on it, only a half load of wood—not a very inviting home. We lived in camps until we could get a dug out with a shingle roof which was considered doing very well in those days. I remember well the first night. I slept in the dug out. It had rained and we moved in and put our beds on the floor. I was awakened the next morning by a water dog crawling over my face. If the Indians had been there I would not have screamed any louder. The worst of it was I did not see only the one waterdog but a dozen or more on the children's beds. I did not sleep in that

dug out any more. While I do not think there is any harm in a waterdog I do not like to come in contact with them in such

Our supplies were all hauled from Childress or Amarillo. It was three months before we had a house. Our nearest doctors were Dr. R.C. Andrews and son of Floydada. Our post office was Della Plains, a distance of nine miles. The first sermon preached was in a dug out one mile east of the present Lockney. The first man buried in our cemetery was killed. Two men fell in love with the same girl, consequently the killing. There were only two windmills in sight. We hauled water three miles but some had a well and windmill. We would visit ten or twelve miles. There were only a few that had buggies so the young people rode horse back, some times the young people would go in wagons to a party. We had a Christmas tree in 1890 at the school house and it was as well attended as one of today. We had Sunday School and preaching most every Sunday. We would prepare our dinner on Saturday, have preaching on Sunday at 11 a.m. and at 3 p.m., often in warm weather we would all stay and have preaching at night. We all enjoyed it. Those good old times are gone never to return, but the recollection is pleasant.

The prairie was beautiful, and lakes all full of water and wild duck plentiful, you could not look in any direction without seeing antelope. They cut and put up lake grass for winter feed. In 1891 most every one had a small field and raised feed for stock. In the year 1893 people planted oats and other crops, and they were growing nicely when the grasshoppers came and ate up everything green in the fields and gardens. Fortunately they left in time

for feed stuffs to be planted and plenty made to do. I remember we had a good late garden. The year following we had a severe drouth, then come our trying times. A great many left the country never to return, others acted wisely and stayed. Those that could leave home went off and worked. Our land then was all taken up under the \$2 act so it took money to pay our taxes and the state the interest. Most every one had cattle enough that when they sold the yearlings in the spring they had money enough to make out on. We had no credit system then. We all lived at home, raised good gardens and some had orchards bearing, until we had fruit at home we would go to the brakes and get wild grapes and plums which were very good to preserve for winter use.

In the fall of 1890, it was reported that the Commanche Indians had left their reservations and were going to Mexico.

There were some here expecting trouble as the Indians went through the country. A lady near Memphis on the Fort Worth & Denver Ry., saw some man killing a beef, she went to town as fast as her horse could carry her and reported that the Indians had killed a man. It was wired up and down the railroad. By the time the news reached us the brakes were full of Indians. A neighbor came to our house late one evening very much excited and said that some one had just returned from the brakes and saw campfires and several Indians. I wanted to go for the night where some sod had been broken and hide. I thought they would not be so apt to find us there. Mr. McGehee was away from home and Willie tried to act very brave and said he was not afriad, (I will always believe he was). There was a sixteen year old girl visiting us, and he tried to make an impression. We

darkened the house and spoke in whispers. I did not sleep and thought I heard guns firing often. A blacksmith of old Lockney fortified the sod blacksmith shop, sat up all night and moulded bullets. We were kept in suspense for three days, and some were so badly frightened they packed up and left the

Now we have our churches, schools and railroad. We should not complain but be thankful, and try and beautify our homes by planting trees and improving and developing the country. Those that have come here of late years can profit by the experience of the earlier settlers. Ours was mostly exper-

This beautiful prairie should be to us what the land of Canaan was to the Israelites.



"The First Christmas Tree"

Editor's Note: The following was taken from the Briscoe County History Book, dated 1876 to 1976.

The first Christmas tree celebration was held in the school house, Christmas Eve, 1891. This was soon after the first school had stopped.

Christmas Eve had been a fine day and everybody in the new community had come to see each other and get a little better acquainted with their new

neighbors. While the presents were being distributed a cold norther came in with a fury born of the polar regions. The wind blew and whistled around the corners of the house and it was biting cold in a

Our family lived 4 miles northwest. We were there in our wagon and we braved the storm reaching home almost frozen. Many stayed in the house all

very few minutes.

night. The more grown-ups that had recently come among us had a party. Some one writing of this said the people went to places in town. There were few places and rooms were scarce.

The second Christmas celebration was in the courthouse, Christmas Eve, 1892. The courthouse was just finished or nearly so and the county officers had not yet moved into it. The court room upstairs was jammed with people. Presents had to be handed over their heads. Where these presents came from has always been a mystery. Most of them must have been brought from home as the two little stores we had could not have had them in stock. There were boots, shirts, ties, bridles, one saddle and everything one could imagine. I have never seen a Christmas celebration I believe that matched this one in monetary value.






