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Hispanics file civil rights lawsuit

A class action suit was filed December 21 in United States District Court in Lubbock against the City of Floydada. Plaintiffs in the suit, Francisco Morales, Angelita Cortinas, Higinio Villareal, and Alberto Juarez, have also named Mayor Parnell Powell and five city councilmen, Gary Carthel, Don Green, Wayne Russell, Frank Breed, and Leroy Burns as defendants in the suit.

The suit alleges that election of at-large councilmen is unconstitutional under the 14th and 15th amendments and that such elections are a violation of the voting rights act.

The suit asks U.S. District Judge Halbert O. Woodward to order the

replacement of the present at-large system with a single member district. The plaintiffs claim that at-large elections dilute or cancel Mexican-American voting strength.

Morales, Cortinas, and Villareal are referred to in the suit as "Floydada citizens who are registered to vote." The suit seeks to represent all city voters in obtaining a permanent injunction barring any future elections under the at-large system which the suit contends is intentionally discriminatory.

The lawsuit was instigated after members of the Floydada Chapter of the League of United Latin American Citizens appeared at the November 13

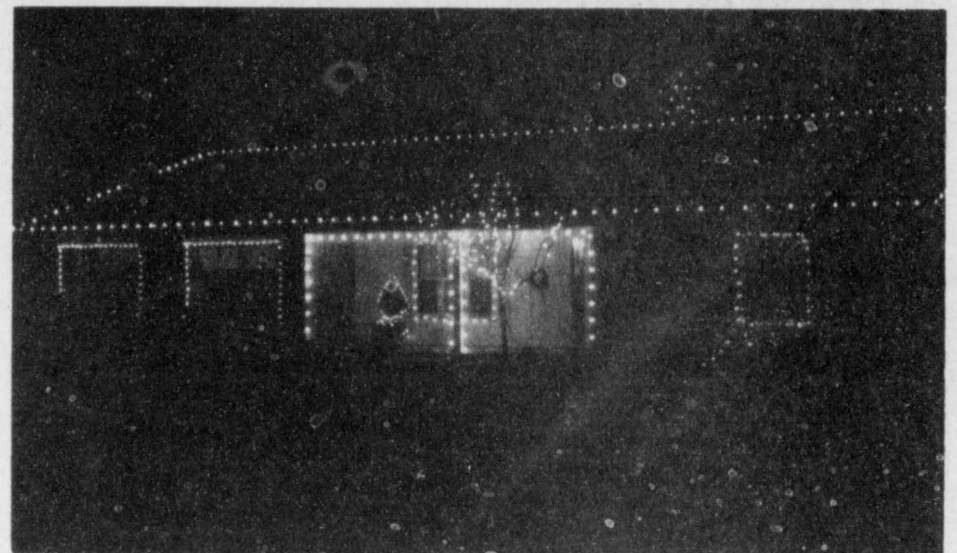
City Council meeting and issued an ultimatum to establish single member districts by November 30 or face a lawsuit.

Floydada city officials requested information from state officials regarding the applicability of federal law in this instance since the city has a population of under 5,000 and is governed by Texas General Law. A response had not been received on November 30, but state authorities notified the city, in a letter received on December 6, that "as a general law city operating under chapters 1-10 with no city charter, there is no state law authorizing implementation of single member districts. Therefore,

you may not have single member districts."

LULAC spokesman Tino Morales requested that LULAC be removed from the agenda of the City Council meeting on December 11; therefore, a certified letter containing this information was sent to Morales on December 12 by Mayor Parnell Powell. Records indicate that the letter was received on December 13.

When asked for a comment on the lawsuit, Powell said, "All I know about it is what I read in the Lubbock paper. We have not been served with legal notice of the suit and will have no comment until we have read it."

Holiday of Lights winners announced in Lockney

The Chamber of Commerce in Lockney again sponsored the Holiday of Lights in which townspeople and those living in the country decorated their homes for the Christmas season. They entered by contacting the Chamber. The occasion was reborn this year after having stopped during the energy crisis a few years ago.

The judging in this year's contest was done last Thursday evening. Winners included first place, the Ricky Mosley home located at 313 West Washington; second place, the Lloyd Widner, Jr. home located at 202 Southwest 8th; and third place went to the home of Cap and Wanda and Shari Carthel located at 201 Northwest 2nd Street. Monetary prizes

were awarded to each of the winners. The prizes included \$15, \$10, and \$5 respectively to first, second, and third places.

There were two honorable mentions in the contest. They included the home of Jerry and Jesse Johnson and the home of Coy and Linda Holley.

Judges for the contest were Merle Mooney, Donnie Meriwether, and Vera Jo Bybee who are all members of the Lockney Chamber of Commerce.

There were only about 10 entries in the contest this year, but the Chamber is planning to make this an annual event in Lockney again and it is hoped that there will be more entries for the judging next year.

Hollums retiring

Justice of the Peace, Walter Hollums, will be resigning his position as of December 31. He has been in office for five years with two years of his present term remaining. Hollums explained his decision to resign as "for reasons of health. My wife is not in the best of health and I think it is time for me to give her my undivided attention. She comes first."

Hollums was born in Collin County, Texas. He moved to a farm in Floyd County in 1919 at the age of 13 with his family. After moving into Floydada in 1929, Hollums worked as a cook and a baker in grocery stores until he became a deputy in 1937. During World War II, he was a sergeant on the police force at the Pantex Plant near Amarillo. Hollums returned to Floyd County and farming after the war.

The next venture into law enforcement for Hollums came when he became a deputy under Earl Cooper in 1954. In 1956, Hollums ran for election as sheriff and won. He held the post for 16 years until his retirement in 1972. The justice of the peace appointment came to him after the death of Judge H.E. Porter in 1979.

Hollums classes himself as "lucky to never have been hurt or gotten shot. Sometimes the jobs have not been pleasant, but I have never had to hurt anyone either. I have always just tried to treat everyone like I would like to be treated in the same circumstances."

Hollums and his wife, the former Lela Gertrude Bartlett, celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary on December 19. Hollums said, "It doesn't seem like it could have been that long. We have

been very happy and still are. She has always been a wonderful wife to me."

The couple have three sons. Melvin, a retired Marine, lives in California. Gene lives in Missouri and Don lives in Michigan. Melvin's son Mike, was raised by his grandparents after his mother's death when he was a baby. Mike lives in Petersburg. The couple have nine other grandchildren and ten great-grandchildren.

Hollums expressed only praise for those he has worked closely with, saying, "I have always had good highway patrolmen to work with. I really appreciate them and the people in the courthouse and sheriff's department. I like them all and consider them my friends."

Hollums voiced his appreciation of the people of the county who kept him in office when he ran for re-election and said, "It is a good job, and I have enjoyed it. My family has to come first now, or I would not resign."

Comptroller issues checks

Early in December, State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent out checks totaling \$57.4 million in local tax payments. The 997 cities receiving the checks levy the one-percent local sales tax. This month's checks are the first to reflect receipts on taxes for goods and services which became taxable on October 2.

Houston was the recipient of the largest check, \$10 million which gives that city a total of \$144.9 million, a 4.9% increase over collections last year at this time. Dallas received a check for \$7.1 million, bringing their total for 1984 up to \$99.2 million, a 15.8% increase over 1983.

San Antonio has received a total of \$49.4 million this year with the December check totaling \$3.2 million. This reflects a 16% increase over last year. Austin received a \$2.8 million to bring their total up to \$37.2 million, an increase of 30% above 1983 at this time. Fort Worth received \$2.1 million, making their total for 1984 \$30.5, an increase of 15 percent. El Paso received \$1.3 million for an overall total of \$18.2 million, an increase over 1983 of 14.7%.

In the local area, Floydada received a check for \$6430.30 bringing the current total to \$90,834.97 which is about \$400 behind collections at this time last year.

Lockney received \$2726.37, bringing the year to date total to \$40,389.26. This is about \$2000 more than was received at this time in 1983.

Crosbyton received a check for \$2256.37. This addition makes the total this year \$45,709.46, over \$4400 more than was collected to date in 1983. A check for \$3275.02 was sent to Abernathy. This makes their total \$50,822.01, an increase of \$4000 over the total at this time in 1983.

Petersburg now has a total of \$19,852.72 with the addition of the \$1,783.63 received this month. This is an increase of \$1400 over last year. Plainview received \$66,549.53 bringing the 1984 total up to \$1,034,056.27, an increase of \$81,250 over collections at this time in 1983.

Lubbock has netted an increase of \$889,130 over 1983 with the addition of the \$899,253.34 received this month. This brings the total collections for that city to \$12,450,682.24. Matador received \$1,139.84 this month, bringing the total collections for 1984 to \$20,278.87, an increase of \$250 over 1983.

December checks represent taxes collected on sales made in October and reported to the comptroller by November 20.

Bell watercolor print still available at WBU

Several copies of a limited edition print of an original watercolor painting by the late Ted Bell of Floydada are still available at Wayland Baptist University.

Titled "Spring In The Canyon," the painting is number 70 in the Bell collection, and 250 prints were issued originally.

The prints are \$25 each and are available through the WBU Office of

Public Services in Gates Hall. Each is numbered and comes with a certificate of authenticity.

Buffalo to arrive

Floyd County may soon be the home of some unusual shaggy creatures. Leroy Burns recently introduced eight buffalo, one bull, and seven cows, to his ranch near Matador. He plans to bring them to property nearer Floydada "when they are more used to us and us to them."

The herd originated in Oklahoma where Burns purchased them. He had to obtain permits to bring them from Oklahoma into Texas. They were tested and inoculated to assure they were disease free and would not contaminate or be contaminated by other animals.

Burns says, "The once nearly extinct animals are pretty to look at and are pretty tame. Once they get used to you and your pickup, they will come right up to you."

"Buffalo are harder than cattle and

weather doesn't bother them like it does cows. They live longer than cattle, they don't eat as much as cows, and they hardly ever lose a calf." He added, "The meat from a buffalo is very lean and very low in cholesterol. It tastes very much like lean beef. That is what first interested me in them."

A buffalo bred with a cow produces a beafalo. This cross breed is "larger than cattle and still has the lean meat of the buffalo," according to Burns. "If all this works out, I hope to raise and sell buffalo," says Burns.

Burns went into the purchase even though buffalo are most costly than cattle to buy, "because they are less costly to keep in the long run." He liked the idea of owning buffalo because "of the kids," he said. "They really love them."

In times like these...

In mid-November two men who had deserted the Red Army in Afghanistan left London on a Soviet airliner for Moscow. Consular employees often locate defectors to deliver letters from families left behind in Russia. Igor Rykhov, 22, one of the two soldiers who came back, was hooked on drugs and jobless when he received an emotional appeal from home. With the letter was a photo of a 3 year-old on a tricycle his daughter whom he had never seen.

Returning home a week earlier was Josef Stalin's daughter, Svetlana Allibuyeva. She had denounced Communism and defected to the U.S. 17 years ago. Svetlana said she longed to see the son and daughter she left behind in 1967 and her two grandchildren.



The return of a defector often is hailed in the Soviet press as proof of the superiority of Marxism. However, he or she is never trusted again. The repatriates are denied good jobs, Communist membership and, especially, permission to visit another country.

The two former soldiers might do even worse. Most deserters from the Soviet military are shot.



'Tis the giving season and the Internal Revenue Service is trying to give 4194 taxpayers in the North Texas area the refunds it has been unable to deliver to them. "The total owed in this year's undelivered refund program is \$1,913,913," said Pam Whittenburg, Chief of the Dallas IRS Taxpayer Service Division. "That's an average refund of \$456.35, although the range goes all the way from \$1 to \$22,416!"

Ms. Whittenburg said that the most common reason for IRS' inability to deliver the refunds is attributable to taxpayers' moving after they've filed

their returns and neglecting to notify IRS and the post office of their new address. "Even moving from one apartment to another in the same complex could be the reason for the snafu," she explained.

Marble Bros. and Crume Gins given recognition

New resident director of research named

A new resident director of research at Lubbock and Halfway has been named by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Dr. John R. Abernathy will assume the post Jan. 1, it was announced today by Dr. Neville P. Clarke, TAES director.

Abernathy has served since 1973 as professor and project leader of weed research at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Lubbock. He becomes the tenth resident director at the center since it was established 75 years ago.

He replaces Dr. Bill Ott, who has been resident director since 1975. Ott has been named coordinator of farming systems research for TAES, effective Jan. 1, Clarke announced. Ott will continue to reside and be headquartered at Lubbock.

"We are extremely fortunate and pleased to have a scientist of Abernathy's caliber and experience, who is so intimately familiar with the agricultural needs of the High Plains," Clark said. "His knowledge and long working relationship with the producers and agribusiness organizations of the area will enable us to continue in full stride with the outstanding research program the Lubbock center has maintained under Ott's guidance."

Abernathy, 40, is a native of Altus, Oklahoma, where he grew up on an irrigated farm. He received the B.S. and M.S. degrees in agronomy from Oklahoma State University in 1967 and 1969. His training in weed science began at OSU and continued at the University of Illinois, where he received a Ph.D. in 1972.

From 1972-73, Abernathy was Midwest regional research manager for Velsicol Chemical Corp.

With TAES, his research and knowledge of weeds and herbicides has received international recognition. In 1980 he was the first recipient of the Outstanding Young Weed Scientist Award from the Southern Weed Science Society. He also has been honored by the West Texas Agricultural Chemicals

Institute for outstanding contributions to agriculture.

He works closely with High Plains growers on their weed problems and is frequently requested for presentations to farm groups and agricultural chemical industry seminars throughout the U.S. and Europe.

Abernathy has been an invited participant at several meetings and hearings in Washington. Among these were the conferences on industrial, biomedical and environmental perspectives of arsenic (1981); future agricultural technology and resource conservation as affected by the Rural Conservation Act (1982); and changing agricultural production systems and the fate of agricultural chemicals (1984). For the past three years he has given special lectures at the herbicide action course at Purdue University.

He is on the board of directors and has served as chairman and member of several committees of the Weeds Science Society of America. He was chairman of its agronomic crops section and an occasional reviewer for "Weed Science." He served three years as secretary-treasurer and on numerous committees of the Southern Weed Science Society.

Abernathy also has served as chairman of the Cotton Weed Science Research Conference and the Beltwide Cotton Conference, and as chairman and editor for two regional technical committees. He is on the task force on generic engineering for the Council of Agricultural Science and Technology.

Abernathy holds graduate faculty appointments at both Texas A&M and Texas Tech Universities. His publications include 21 technical articles or book chapters, 105 abstracts and numerous popular articles.

He is married to the former Cindy Canady of Tulsa, Oklahoma. They have two daughters.
