The Lamplighter

I tend to think that voters sell themselves short. It is very easy for us to look at the record and come to the conclusion that nothing ever changes... that the politicians go their merry way no matter what the voters think, or say at the ballot box.

But, really, when we examine the matter more closely, we see that our votes do indeed count. They do indeed get the message. Sometimes it is slow in getting through to them, and sometimes it takes strong action, like hitting the mule with a two-by-four to get his attention before the training period starts, but eventually it does seem to make an impression on their thinking.

Proof of that is now seen in Austin, where just a short time ago our Governor was crowing about his achievement in slapping a massive new tax on Texans. And a Legislature that had gone to Austin determined to look at spending, suddenly turned soft under the browbeating of the Governor, the Lt. Governor and the Speaker, and gave our leaders the tax they wanted. Those few legislators who wanted to examine the state's budget for possible savings, in order that the new tax might not have to be so large, were effectively silenced by White, and Hobby, and Lewis.

But look at the situation as they meet this time. They are talking about holding the line on spending, not on raising still more revenue via taxation. What brought about this change? While many of our political leaders seem to have difficulty in reading numbers in the budget, they have no trouble at all in reading the election returns.

The message delivered by voters was loud and clear, all across the state, at the local, state, and national levels. Governor White, who seemed convinced after his defeat of Clements that catering to special interests was the way of the future, now is sounding much more reasonable. Bill Hobby, who led the charge in registering voters in South Texas so they could counter the expected conservative outpouring of votes in West Texas is now taking a much more balanced view of things, even acting like he really means it this time when he says he will support efforts aimed at a decent water bill. Gib Lewis, who surprised many by his sudden conversion to taxation last session, has reverted to a more normal posture, for him, and is telling his fellow legislators to hold the line.

This is good news, and Texas voters deserve the credit. So while the message to our leaders was plain, the message to our voters should be equally plain. Our leaders have it in their capacity to give us what we most want...decent government. And we have it within our capacity to give them what they must have to survive...our votes.

Our advice, for what it is worth, is do not be discouraged. In the long run, the voter has the winning hand.

We spent a pleasant interlude Saturday morning, in Washington, in company with newly-elected Congressman Larry Combest and his wife Sharon. Combest is replacing Hance as Representative for the 19th Congressional District. It was, to tell the truth, about the only pleasant aspect of the three-day stay in our nation's Capitol. It snowed there, just as it did here, but the wind had a raw, bitter bite. It was, as it always is, a good place to get away from.

Our association with, and friendship for, Combest goes back many years. Regardless of that, I do believe he will make a good Congressman for the folks over in the 19th District. He is bright and hardworking, with a feel for his District. And he tells me our own Congressman, Beau Boulter, will measure up right well. Time will tell, but at any rate it was encouraging news.

Board extends Hallmark's contract and hears report on student failures

During the regular monthly meeting of the Lockney School Board the board members approved the extension of superintendent W.H. Hallmark's contract with the school through 1988.

The date for the upcoming school board election was set for April 6. It will be held at the high school. Jackie Lou Holt was approved as the absentee voting clerk. The dates for the earliest and the final dates to file to run in the election will be announced at a later date.

The board also approved an amendment for the seizure of personal property for the collection of delinquent personal taxes.

During the superintendent's report Hallmark requested that the board consider approving the installation of a computer in the superintendent's office. He said the paperwork has increased to the point that a computer will be necessary sometime in the future.

Hallmark had each building principals report to the board on the failures of subjects this year. They reported that the number of subject failures in each building had been cut in half in comparison to last year's failures for the first half of the year.

Hallmark commented that he felt that part of the reason for the decrease was due to House Bill 72. "Teaching the essential elements is more important, and if the students are not learning them, the teachers are reteaching them until the students master the elements. Also part of this could be the increased pressure on students. If you tell them they must master these elements, and they know there is no other way they will advance to the next grade level, they will make the necessary grades."

As a comparison for our readers the following are the failure charts for the 1983-84 and 1984-85 school years in Elementary, Junior High, and High School. These are the mid-term failures for each school. In comparing these lists keep in mind that the 83-84 kids have advanced one grade, as in grade 1 for 83-84 is grade 2 in 84-85.

Gregg selected as head auctioneer at San Antonio

Kenneth Gregg of Plainview has been selected as head auctioneer for the February 15 sale which will conclude the San Antonio Livestock Exposition.

The auction sale committee has asked Gregg to sell the grand champion steer and to coordinate auctioneer assignments for the other animals.

Last year was Gregg's first time to serve as one of the auctioneers at the San Antonio show sale, but for years he has donated his services to the county junior livestock shows in Plainview, Anson, Hereford and Floydada, and other towns. Most recently, January 12, he was auctioneer at the Bexar County Show in San Antonio.

As a youth, Gregg began his association with the junior livestock shows where 4-H and FFA members parade their animals. In 1947, he exhibited the grand champion lamb at the Houston show. Later, three of his children, Monte, Lucretia and Kevin, showed at Houston and brought home awards for two grand champion lambs, two grand champion pigs, and a reserve champion pig. Because of Gregg and the children's success, a Texas Monthly magazine article in 1972 called him "undoubtedly the all-time Grand Champion Father of the Houston show." The article on junior stock shows suggested that Gregg had passed his secrets (animal selection and feeding, grooming, and showmanship) to his children.

An auctioneer of nearly 20 years experience, Gregg conducts sales all over the United States. Since 1976, he has operated an auctioneering school out of his home in Plainview. Graduates

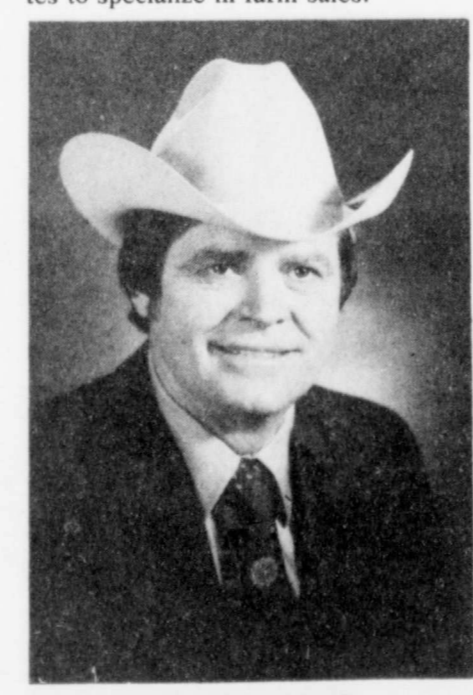

As one can readily see above, last year there were a total of 69 junior high failures in the 1983-84 year compared to this year's with only 28.

total 219 persons who have come from all over the United States. Each year Gregg conducts two eight-day sessions, one in July and one immediately after Christmas. The school is certified by the Texas Education Agency. Students must spend 92 hours in auctioneering studies during the eight-day school. He has just concluded his 16th school session. His smallest group has been six students and the largest, 25. The last group was the only one with all the students being from Texas.

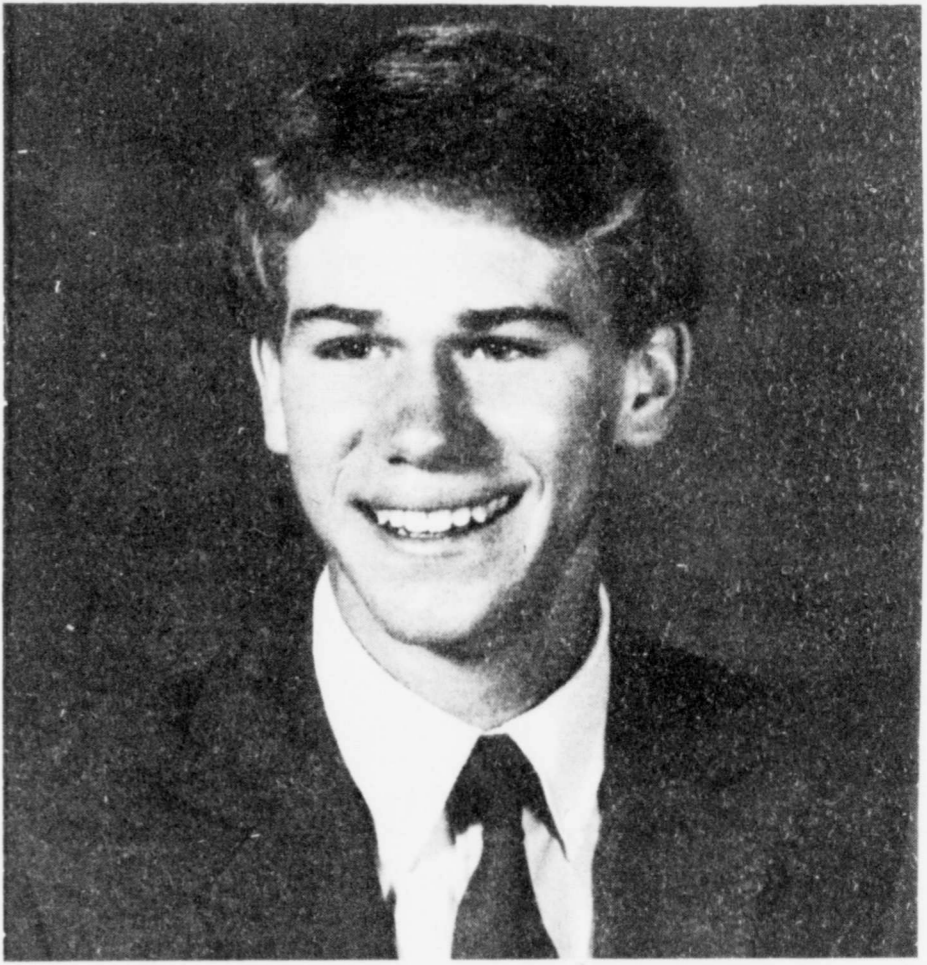
Il Penseroso bridge tourney and luncheon

Hallmark honored

Lockney senior Brent Hallmark was honored Sunday in Amarillo as the 1985 winner of the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame's at the 24th Annual Dee Henry Memorial Award.

Hallmark won the award after overcoming two injuries and leading the Lockney Longhorns to both district and bi-district championships this year.

Hallmark's first injury came in the eighth grade. After lunch some of the boys were playing in the school yard outside of the superintendent's office. Hallmark was watching when one of the boys collided with him and another fell on top of them both. The large bone in Hallmark's thigh, the femur, was broken in three places. He was taken to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock where he spent 29 days in traction before being allowed to come home. At home he spent ten weeks in a body cast.

He kept up with his school work. Twice a week his classes were held in the Hallmark home.

He was not involved in sports his freshman year but worked to rebuild his injured leg. He returned to sports during his sophomore year when he was asked to quarterback the junior varsity team after Monty Teeter, the quarterback of the JV team, broke a bone in his hand.

During his junior year Hallmark suffered another injury which was to keep him out of football for all but four games of the 1983 season when he broke a bone in his right hand.

However Hallmark was back in top form this year with no injuries and lead the Longhorn varsity to an 8-1-1 regular season, and a bi-district win against Hale Center. The Horns lost the area game against White Deer by a score of 6 to 7.

This year Hallmark also received another special honor, having been named to the Texas Schoolboy Record Book after the November 2 game against Lorenzo when he threw six complete touchdown passes in one game. Hallmark was placed in a three-way tie in the State of Texas for the number of complete passes thrown in a single game.

Hallmark has also been named the DAR Citizenship winner in Lockney for this year and will be honored by the DAR in February in Plainview.

Presently Hallmark is the president of the student council, president of the National Honor Society, is a nominee for Mr. LHS, and has been a class officer each year in high school.

The Dee Henry Memorial Award is named for a former Amarillo teacher and coach who died of cancer. This award spotlights unusual courage in athletic endeavors.

Hallmark was presented a plaque which is in the high school trophy case and will remain there until the end of school and then will be in the Hallmark home.

Helmut Kohl has been Chancellor of West Germany since 1982 and a staunch conservative ally of President Reagan. However, his opponents have dubbed him as Germany's "Do-Nothing Chancellor" and argue that his most conspicuous talent is refusing to make decisions. He has been accused of a lack of intellectual substance. However, few who know the unflappable Kohl think that sarcasm worries him much. An aide explains, "He likes to be underestimated. Actually, he is tough and decided in his intentions."

Nuncio appears before council

The Lockney City Council met in its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, January 10, at the city hall.

Pablo Nuncio appeared before the council on a zoning ordinance dispute at its regular monthly meeting Thursday, January 10, at city hall. Nuncio's original application called for a permit to build a two car garage on the property at 515 Northeast 6th Street in Lockney. After building the garage, he started a paint and body shop business which is in opposition to zoning ordinances for that area.

City attorney Paul Lyle was present at the meeting and he suggested that Nuncio apply for a variance in the zoning. No further action will be taken until the proper variance papers are filed.

The council approved a contract agreement with Parkhill, Smith, and Cooper to complete the necessary work on the HUD funded paving projects in Lockney.

They also approved one permit for a local man to sell Watkins products in Lockney.

The large, genial Kohl, 54, has always been dogged. It took him eleven years and almost 2,000 letters to persuade his wife Hannelore to marry him. Similarly, he was snubbed by his party in 1980 before finally becoming Chancellor in 1982.

The son of a customs official, he was too young to fight in World War II. He gained a degree from Heidelberg University, and moved directly into full-time politics. At age 29, he won election to the State Legislature of Rhineland-Palatinate. Fourteen years later he was head of the Christian Democratic Party.

The political contacts such a political position provides are among Kohl's key assets, and may yet save his career.

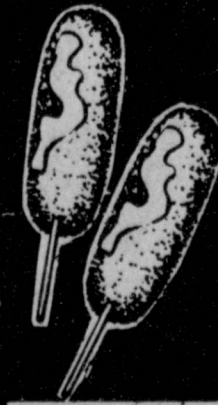

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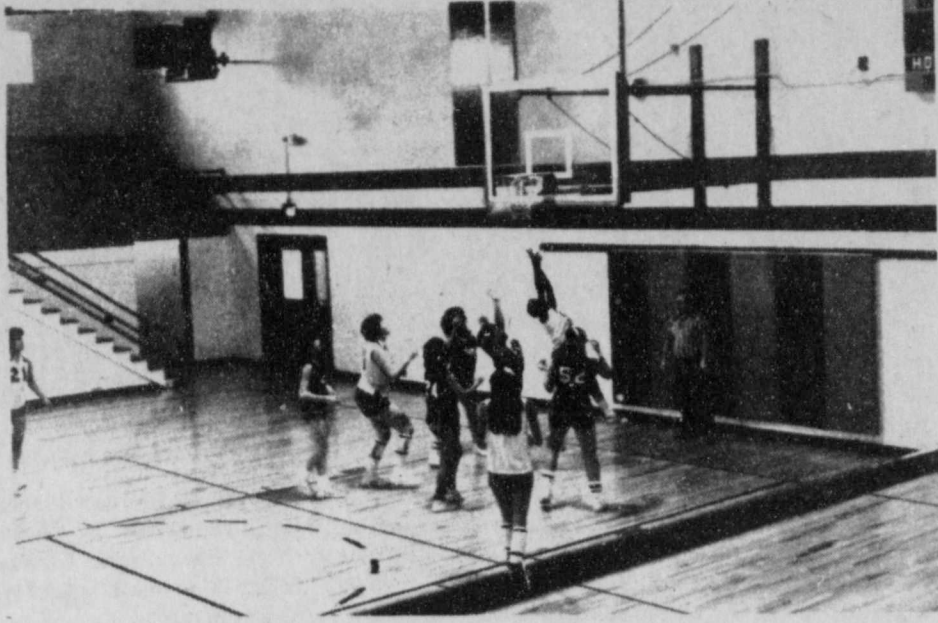
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Seventh graders maintain perfect BB record

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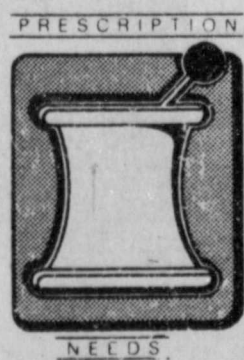
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
