The trial to determine whether Austin will have to abandon its current system of at-large elections for City Council, in favor of single-member districts, is now under way in Federal Court before Judge James Nowlin.

The opening gun was fired by Mr. David Van Os, Attorney for the NAACP, which, among others, is bringing the suit. Austin has had a black councilman since 1971, and a Hispanic councilman since 1975, but plaintiff's argument runs to the effect that this does not really matter....that what matters is that they have been elected by anglo votes, and this shouldn't happen. The argument goes, from plaintiff's standpoint, that if minority councilmen did not have to worry about anglo votes they could really get their teeth into things of substance. Mr. Van Os said they could then begin fighting for issues like police brutality, unemployment, and housing, rather than nuclear power and the environment, which, he said, are of little real concern to the minority community

The people of Austin, in a recent election, said they would like to keep things as they are. But that matters little in this day and age. If the Federal Courts decide otherwise, it will be

We have written before of the difficulty we had in trying to find someone in the Attorney General's office who knew what the law was in relation to the statutes under which cities operate in Texas, or, for that matter, even where the laws are codified in the statutes. We should have waited a few days.

We see by the papers that former State Representative Foy Salinas of Lubbock has been hired by the AG's office. Salinas, you may remember, was the legislator who lost his bid for reelection to a young black man running as a Republican. Salinas was beaten for a very simple reason. Back when the Mothers Against Drunk Driving began actively calling for stiffer penalties against drunk drivers, Salinas publicly implied that the effort had racial overtones, and was motivated by "honkies" who wanted to penalize his constituents. That tended to make voters in his largely Hispanic Lubbock district somewhat unhappy, and they turned him out of office, in favor, of all things, a black, conservative Republi-

Not to worry, gentle reader. Salinas has now gone to work for Mr. Mattox, our Attorney General, as a "special assistant". A reporter asked Mr. Salinas, who is not a lawyer, what his new duties would entail. His reply was quoted as "anything that they need me to do--mostly explain to members (of the legislature) what the Agency (the attorney general's office) does.'

We can all now sleep better, knowing the office of Attorney General is in such good hands, with Jim Mattox heading it up and Foy Salinas explaining to the Legislature what Mr. Mattox does when he is not in court defending himself.

We see by Mr. Bullock's latest report that the "city sales and use tax allocation" for Floyd County jumped 24 percent over the same period last year, with Floydada up 31 percent and Lockney up eleven percent. This contrasts with Hale County, which increased 2 percent. (Plainview went up only 1.5 percent.) That is not an exact indicator of sales activity within a city, but it is a fair measure, over a period of time, of business activity. Perhaps one thing it does indicate is that more peope are spending their money with hometown merchants now, which is a good

As we have said before, the whole community benefits when people do their shopping here in Floyd County. Not only are they able to shop among some well stocked stores, a portion of the sales taxes they pay in the process comes back home to help support the community, rather than contributing to the growth of surrounding cities.

was set for 1:30 p.m. Monday.



An adequate supply of "D" stamps and other nondenominated items is available at the Lockney post office to help customers make a smooth transition after the February 17 postal rate

Postmaster Meriwether says that the nondenominated "D" stamps in sheet, coil, and booklet formats represent the new 22-cent first-class rate. There are also nondenominated postal cards and plenty of two-cent stamps that, when added to 20-cent stamps, make up the new first-class letter rate.

"Nobody likes to see higher postal rates, but this increase is moderate and justified," Postmaster Meriwether said.

"Since the last increase in November 1981, the cost of living in the United States, as measured by the Consumer Price Index, has gone up almost 13 percent. The 22-cent stamp is only a 120 percent rise.

"The nondenominated items are available because we estimate that stamp inventories in post offices at present will fall short of public demand and, we want to avoid customer inconvenience in Lockney," he said.

Commemorative stamps, beginning with the Jerome Kern stamp, and other 22-cent stamps, are expected to replace the "D" stamps by the end of March, the Postmaster said.



"These Are My People," which

"Dedicated to

the God-fearing unquenchable spirit of the Texas pioneers who--with their sweat and blood--laid the foundations of the Lone Star State.'

When Marshall Formby died in Plainview in late December, I thumbed through his fine book "These Are My People" and its above dedication caught my eye.

Although born in Hopkins county, near Dallas, Marshall Formby became one of the most true-blue West Texans the region every produced. Had he been from a more populous part of the state, Formby probably would have become Governor of Texas. He did receive 139,094 votes in the Democratic primary for Governor in 1962--carrying West Texas. John Connally won the office against Formby and such well-known candidates as Price Daniel. Will Wilson. Gen. Edwin A. Walker and Don Yarborough, a Houston lawyer who was runner-up.

Marshall would have made a great governor for all the people, not just in his beloved West Texas. He served as state senator, highway commission member, on Texas Tech's governing board, and the Coordinating Board for Higher Education.

All these were high honors, but Formby was just as proud of his service as County Judge in Dickens County. Never did he let anyone forget that he grew up in McAdoo, Dickens county, and that his youth was spent in the ranch country below the Caprock.

Formby became a very successful businessman, mainly in broadcasting. Once he was co-owner of KFLD-Floydada. Formby also became a lawyer, but most of his time, was spent in public service, including the Corps of Engineers in World War II.

When Formby appeared in military uniform in Austin during the war, in his capacity as senator from the Lubbock district, I thought he presented a rather unlikely appearance. Basically, Formby was a comfortable, country-boy type, full of humor and disarmingly smart. He knew people and how to deal with them.

While on the Highway Commission, and later, he maintained a long-distance conversation with Dewitt Greer, the Aggie engineer who did more than anyone else to build the state's marvelous highway system. Jokes were common between the two. When Jackie Sherrill became head coach of the A&M football team, Greer received a frantic card signed "Jackie." Its message was "Send money!"

Greer knew instantly that Formby was the writer. Sherrill had been receiving enormous publicity, much of it negative, because A&M officials had agreed to pay him more than \$200,000 a year, plus other benefits, to coach its

Some people may still maintain a misconception of the FFA program in the public schools. The program is no longer geared strictly toward those students who plan a future career in the agriculture industry. The program now offers a diverse teaching of many things that can benefit students from the city and the country.

Many of the subjects taught in FFA now include those which offer practical, on hand experience useful to students whether they choose an ag related field or another field to enter in the future. Now they are taught, not only the raising, breeding, and care for animals and crop related information such as weed control, insect control, soil content and what crops are best in certain types of soil. They are also instructed in various woodworking projects, welding, minor automobile repairs, and even some electrical wiring is taught. These subjects present a wide variety of fields in which the students of FFA learn from on hands experience and may be influenced by something in the FFA program as their future career interest.

Examples of the meeting of "city" and "country" in the FFA program are two boys enrolled in the Lockney FFA program. Ricky Patterson and Matt Williams, both freshman, enrolled in FFA for different reasons.

Ricky, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Patterson of Plainview, transferred to Lockney this year. The family is planning to move here soon. Ricky was raised in the "city" though he has spent a short amount of time on the farm. This helped in making his decision to join FFA. Patterson commented, "I thought I'd try it and see if I liked it and I do. I will probably take it for another year." Patterson said this was the first time he had worked with animals, but is enjoying it. He chose to raise and show

a pig in the stock shows this year. In the local show his pig, a Spotted Poland China, received 5th place and in the county show it placed 4th. He is also planning to attend the Houston Show, along with 19 other Lockney FFA students to show his pig.

When asked if he was learning much from the program, Patterson said yes and also added that "I probably could not learn many of the things I have without the program."

Matt Williams, son of Jerry and Kay Williams, commented that he took FFA for a different reason, "I am planning to go into some agriculture related field, ranching or farming, maybe both and there is no where else for me to learn the things this program teaches me in those areas."

Matt was raised on the farm and has been very active in helping his parents on the farm and in raising the registered Angus cattle in the JK Angus operation. He drives a tractor and is active in the breeding of the cattle for which the farm is famous. Matt also commented, "I need the experience and the things this program has to offer for my future and that's why I took it."

Both Matt and Ricky commented that they would not have the opportunity to learn the things FFA has taught them if it were not for the program.

On the subject of the problems FFA is facing in being funded and even being totally eliminated from the public school program, Matt said "They better not stop the program. It offers many things that many of the students could not learn anywhere else."

Not only is the FFA program good for boys but there are three girls enrolled in the FFA program in Lockney. These three girls, Lori Smith, Terri Bailey, and Renee Curry, will be interviewed in next week's edition.

USDA accepts bids for African countries

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation today announced the successful bidders in the sale of \$66.7 million worth of wheat, corn and rough rice to private exporters for resale to African countries hard-hit by severe drought.

Alan T. Tracy, Acting Under Secretary of Agriculture, said the Kansas City, Mo., commodity office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service made the following contract awards on January 18:

Farmers have until March 1 to participate

Faced with plentiful supplies of wheat and feed grains, farmers need to give careful consideration to participating in the 1985 farm program.

Farmers have until March 1 to decide whether or not they want to participate in the government farm program, which mainly offers some income and price protection for those agreeing to cut base crop acreage by 10 percent in the case of feed grains and 30 percent for wheat.

"Due to increasing surpluses of wheat, corn and grain sorghum, farmers can expect average prices for their 1985 crops to be at or near the national loan rate," says Dr. Ed Smith, grain marketing economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

For instance, the United States is boasting a 1.4 billion bushel carryover of wheat, enough to satisfy about 55 percent of the market needs during the 1985-86 marketing year, even if not a single bushel was produced this year.

While stocks of corn and grain sorghum are less than wheat--about a 21 percent carryover is projected--feed grain producers also face average prices for their 1985 crop that will be near

support price levels, believes Smith.

"Confronted by less than glowing market prices, producers participating in the farm program may receive near maximum deficiency payments (the difference between target prices and loan rates)," Smith notes. "This makes the program fairly attractive and worthy of farmer consideration. Extension Service studies have shown that added returns from farm program participation in Texas would range from \$8 to \$24 per acre for dryland production and \$33 to \$41 per acre in irrigated areas.

"The decision, as always, revolves around the cost and benefits of the choices and the level of risk one is willing to take," says the economist. "It all boils down to whether or not the benefits and risk reduction associated with the acreage reduction program outweigh lost net revenue from the idled acres."

The Extension Service has budgets and worksheets available to aid producers in making farm program decisions, adds Smith. Interested producers should contact their county Extension office for more information.

The sales, made under the second invitation for offers issued Nov. 30, were made to private exporters on a competitive bid basis. The commodities were sold instore at the warehouse location, and the exporters will pay all processing costs plus the cost of transportation to the important country, Tracy said.

"These food sales will go toward relieving hunger in some of the most severely affected countries of Africa," Tracy said.

CCC received bids for 279,504 metric tons of wheat, 245,000 metric tons of corn and 867,647 metric tons of rough rice. The contract awards totaled \$2,066,986 in wheat, \$14,327,995 in corn and \$50,323,890 in rice, based on CCC's acquisition cost.

Tracy said procedures have been established which will ensure the

The commodities must be used in the destination country and cannot be reexported. Fifty percent of the total quantity of commodities sold under this program will be shipped on U.S. flag vessels, according to Tracy.

The quantities shown for rice are the milled rice equivalent of the rough rice sold by CCC. The Kansas City commodity office will announce the lots that were awarded and the total contract

commodities are not transplated to other countries and that the exports will not displace commercial and aid commitments. The government of each eligible country must agree that purchases under this program will be in addition to normal commercial purchases and existing food aid commit-









