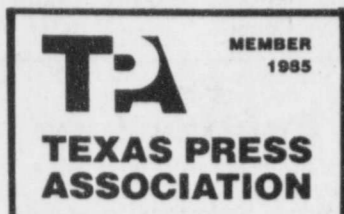

Outstanding Citizens of 1984 announced at banquet



HONORED CITIZENS—Carroll Anderson was named Man of the Year and Jeanette Marr was the recipient of the Woman of the Year award at the Chamber of Commerce banquet last Friday night.

With over 190 friends, relatives, and neighbors on hand Carroll Anderson, Jeanette Marr, and the Bob Pursers received the Outstanding Citizens Awards for 1984.

Speaker for the evening was Dr. Virgil Trout of Oklahoma City. He encouraged creative thinking about the future, not only in making plans for Lockney's future, but also the future of our country. He portrayed thinking constructively with an example of a certain French military man in 1915 said the airplane was a toy and would never have a use in the military. "If the world had listened to that statement where would we be now?" Trout stressed thinking creatively about people in his humorous and interesting program. "Don't always look for the faults; look for positive traits in others."

At the 30th annual Chamber of Commerce sponsored event those attending enjoyed a meal of enchiladas, Spanish rice, pinto beans, tossed salad, sopapillas, peach cobbler and tea.

Woman of the Year

Receiving the award for Woman of the Year for 1984 was Jeanette Marr. The award was presented by the preceding award winner, Juanita Broseh.

Marr has an active interest in her community, school and church. She has been a teacher at Lockney High School for the past 13 years, teaching Biology I and II. Her deep interest in the students and making learning an enjoyable experience for them is evidenced in the many field trips planned for her students. Many of the trips have required much of her personal time which she freely gives to her students.

Interested in the students extra curricular time, she has served as a class sponsor for all of the classes at different times during her teaching career. She is a dedicated student council sponsor. She devotes much of her time to helping to plan the Junior-Senior banquets, Mr. and Miss LHS assembly, and also in attending summer workshops and conventions with the LHS Student Council officers. She has been called upon on numerous occasions, and willing serves, as a counselor for high school students.

She is a graduate of Wayland Baptist University, receiving her masters degree from West Texas University. She is a member of the Texas State Teachers Association.

In her church Jeanette has served in many areas including the Director of the Women's Missionary Union, a nursery coordinator, planning and teaching in vacation Bible school, and being active in Sunday school and church training. She was also the past director of the Adult I Sunday school department and is presently teaching a Sunday school class of young married couples.

In addition to her involvement in many church and school activities, she is also a member of the El Progreso Study Club through which she contributes to many community projects.

Despite her involvement in the various area, she still finds quality time for her family and friends. She takes time to take food to the ill and bereaved and attends closely to the needs of her mother and mother-in-law.

Man of the Year

Named as the Outstanding Man of the Year for 1984 was Carroll Anderson. His award was presented by Kenneth Broseh, winner of the award last year.

Nominated for the many community services he has performed in the short five plus years he has lived in Lockney, Anderson is a deserving recipient of the Man of the Year award.

Since coming to Lockney Anderson was instrumental in helping the City Council implement its Community Development Block Grant program. He also serves as the Chairman of the Neighborhood Committee which sets guidelines and reviews applications for housing rehabilitation grants. He is the first chairman of the Board of Commissioners of the Housing Authority of the City of Lockney, which was set up as an agency in 1981 by the City Council to implement the councils assisted housing goals under the Community Deve-

lopment Block Grant program. Under his leadership the Housing Authority was successful in obtaining funding for 20 low rent housing units now under construction and also 20 rent subsidy units.

Anderson is an active member of the Rotary Club, having served as the immediate past president and having also held the offices of vice president and secretary-treasurer. He is currently on the Board of Directors of the club and is the Chairman of the Boy Scout Committee. Through his work with the Boy Scouts he has been awarded a lifetime membership.

Also a strong supporter of the 4-H and FFA programs, he was named as a permanent member of the FFA. His work with both of these organizations has included helping to organize the local and county stock shows and helping in any way asked. He was also a supportive buyer through the First National Bank of Lockney at the county livestock sale.

Also a member of the Chamber of Commerce for the past two years Anderson helped to organize the Neighborhood Watch program in Lockney. He helped organize the Old Fashioned Saturday Night and arranged for downtown Christmas decorations. He served as the vice president of the Chamber in 1984.

A supporter of activities for the youth, Anderson has been active in recruiting and umpiring in the Little League and Pee Wee League baseball programs. He also coached for two years and has helped with the field maintenance. He also helped promote the women's softball league and the field maintenance.

He is a past member of the Floyd County Fair Board and is a very active member of the West College and Third Church of Christ.

Anderson has taught at the American Institute of Banking classes for the past four years in Plainview and has encouraged bank employees to further their educations in the banking field. He has addressed classes at Lockney High School on such subjects as budgeting, interest rates, and other financial information that could be helpful to the students.

Always available to help with any community project, Anderson is a valued member of the Lockney community.

Family of the Year

Receiving the second annual Family of the Year award was the Bob Purser Family. Mrs. Lucille Frizzell was spokesman for her and her husband, the Family of the Year winners for 1984.

Both Bob and Patti are active members of the First United Methodist Church of Lockney. He is a member of the Methodist Men and is currently the president of the young adult Sunday school class. Patti teaches the kindergarten Sunday school class and is actively engaged in the vacation Bible school classes in the summer as a teacher. Bob is also a member of the Lion's Club and the Masons; Patti is a member of the El Penseroso Study Club.

Both are active with the youth of the community through their coaching endeavors. Bob serves as the athletic director and the head football coach having led the Longhorn varsity football team in the past season to the Floyd County Championship, the District 4-2A Championship, and the 2A Bi-District Championship. He was selected by both the Lubbock Avalanche Journal and the KAMC South Plains Wrap-Up show as the Coach of the Year.

Patti serves as the Cross Country and Varsity girls track coach. For the past two years Patti has qualified the boys Cross Country team and two girls for the State Cross Country Meet. Last year she also had three girls off the varsity track team to qualify for competition in the regional track meet in Odessa.

Both are active sponsors of youth activities. Together they sponsor the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. Bob is a senior class sponsor and Patti has been the varsity cheerleader sponsor for the past three years.

Five Lockneyites place in Houston Livestock Show

Of the twelve Lockney students traveling to Houston for the Houston Livestock Show and Sale, five placed in their respective divisions and made the sale.

In the barrow show Troy Bigham placed 12th with his mediumweight Cross. His barrow brought \$1.50 per pound. He was up against 77 other students in his division.

Clay Adrian and Robert Wofford made the sift at Brenham but did not place in their classes. Boyd Jackson and Scott Howard did not make the Brenham sift.

In the lamb show, Jennifer Fortenberry placed 7th out of 220 other lambs in the lightweight Cross class. Her lamb sold for \$15.00 a pound. Lisa Terrell,

who also showed a lamb, did not place.

In the steer and heifer divisions, Lockney had three entries that placed. Colt Golden placed 1st in the lightweight Cross division, with his steer bringing \$8.00 a pound. Ricky Key showed a registered Angus heifer, purchased from JK Angus in Lockney. She placed 3rd in her class of 15 Angus heifers. Key purchased JK Queen with money he had won in last year's calf scramble at the Houston show.

Matt Williams, who showed in the Junior Angus Heifer Show, won 1st place in his class.

Other Lockneyites, who showed steers but did not place, included Chad Golden and Lisa Terrell.

Three electons slated for Saturday, April 6, 1985

Deadline for signing up to run in any of the three elections scheduled for April 6, 1985 was Wednesday, March 6.

As of Monday, incumbents Jim Bob Martin and Eddie Teeter were the only persons who had signed up for the school board election. Both, seeking reelection to their seats, will be running for three year terms.

In the city council race, incumbents Kenneth Wofford and Mayor J.D. Copeland will both seek reelection, along with Jerry Johnson and Dan Smith. There are three seats to be filled on the city council. These include the two presently held by Wofford and Copeland and the seat vacated by Gail

Kring. The hospital election will be seeking to fill three seats on the board. These are presently held by Kenneth Tate, Rusty Bacuss, and Larry Golden. Golden along with Jack Covington, L.B. (Buddy) Brandes and Claude Brown will be seeking election in this race. Neither Tate nor Bacuss will seek reelection.

The city council election will be held at the city hall building in the council chambers. The school board election and the hospital board elections will both be held at the main entrance of the high school building. In upcoming editions of the paper we will feature each of the candidates in each race.

Social Security News

Although Social Security learns about deaths of people getting Social Security benefits in a timely fashion, in most cases from relatives, friends and funeral home directors, in a few cases they are not reported.

If a death is reported but checks continue to arrive, it means Social Security's system has not yet been corrected. The person who made the initial report should simply write the word "Deceased" on the envelope of the check and give it to the postman or drop it in the mailbox. When the check is returned to the Treasury Department, Social Security will automatically be notified of the death.

Sometimes the failure to report is intentional because someone is trying to defraud the Social Security Administration. However, Social Security is making an intense effort to prevent this

from happening.

To assure that checks are stopped after a person has died, Social Security has been matching its records against those of other Federal agencies in an effort to identify those on the rolls who have died.

In addition, Social Security is in the process of arranging to match its records against State death-certificate computer records. Despite any measures Social Security takes, the quickest way Social Security can be notified of a death is to call a Social Security office or to write "Deceased" on the envelope of the check and give it to the postman.

Junior and Martha Taylor visited his sister, Mattie Davis and Louise Dunn in Plainview Wednesday.

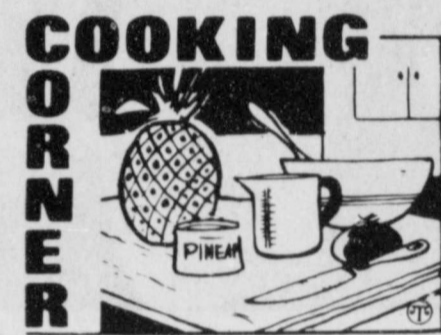
Terry and Mychelle Harris visited their grandparents, Mr. and Mrs.

PINEAPPLE CHEESEPIE

- 1 can (8 oz.) Dole Crushed Pineapple in Juice
- 12 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 1 egg
- 3/4 cup plain yogurt
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- Macadamia Crust

Drain pineapple well, pressing out excess juice with back of spoon. Combine remaining filling ingredients. Spread pineapple over Macadamia Crust, reserving 2 tablespoons for garnish. Pour filling over pineapple. Bake in 350°F oven 20 minutes. Cool, refrigerate at least 2 hours. Before serving, garnish with reserved pineapple. Makes 6 servings.

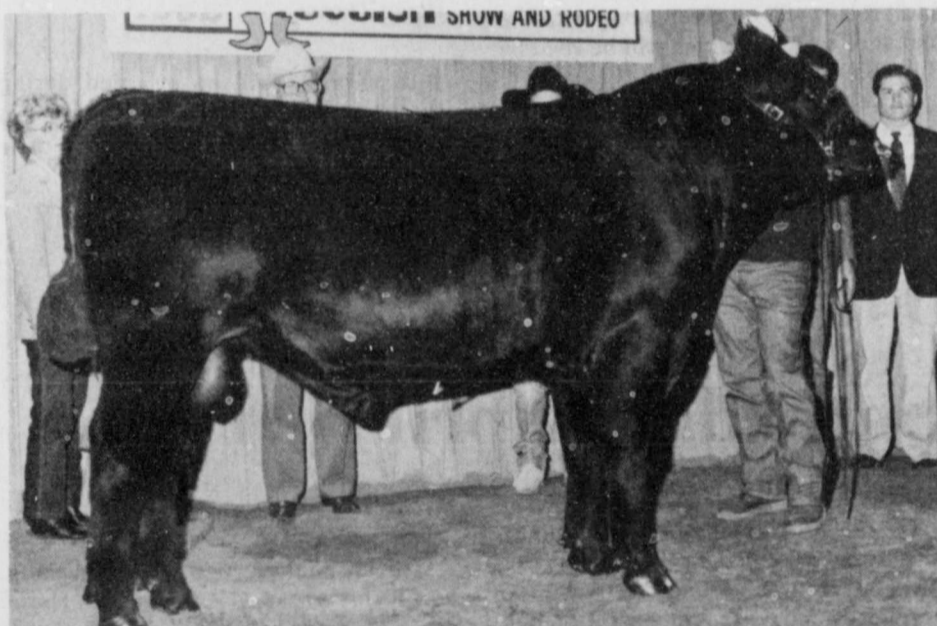
Macadamia Crust: Combine 1 cup chopped macadamia nuts, 3/4 cup graham cracker crumbs, 6 tablespoons melted butter and 2 tablespoons sugar. Press into 8-inch pie pan to cover bottom and sides.

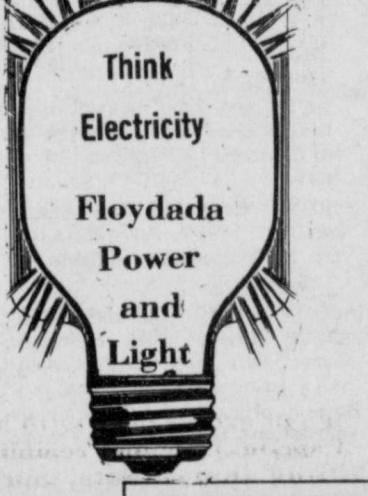

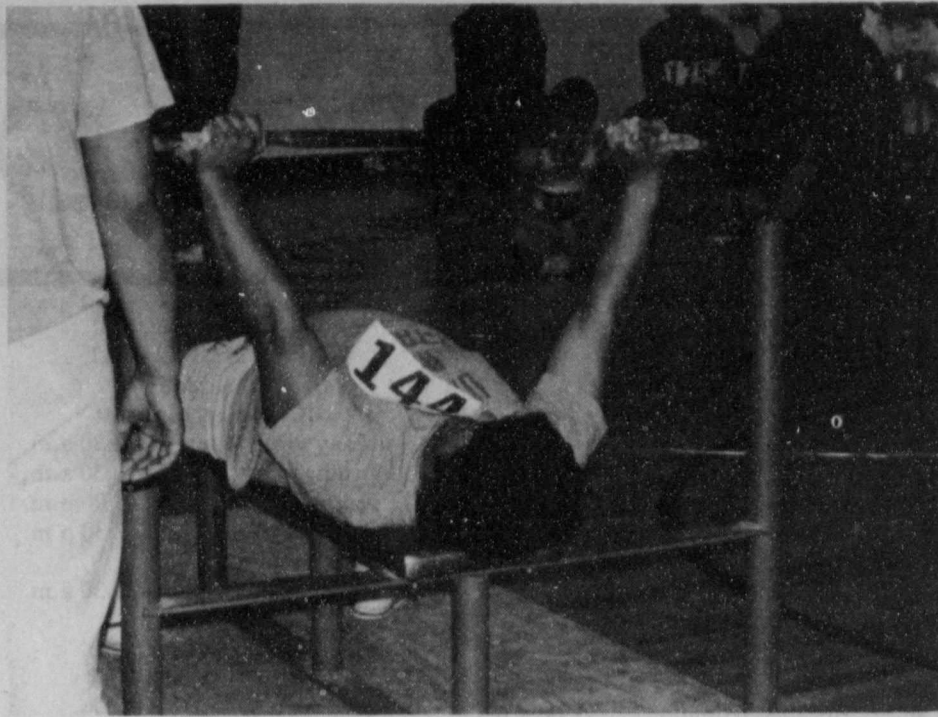
