### Vernon nominated as Outstanding Volunteer

Lockneyite Don Vernon has been nominated to the 7 Who Care volunteer recognition program, sponsored by KVII-TV and the Volunteer Action Center of the United Way in Amarillo. Vernon is one of 274 volunteers nominated this year. The seven top volunteers will be announced at a televised dinner on April 23 at 7:00 p.m. in Amarillo.

Vernon has spent several years volunteering his time to various community oriented organizations including the Salvation Army, to which he has been a volunteer for 15 years. He has collected goods and money for the organization. In 1984 he was appointed chairman for Lockney and continues to serve in this capacity. This past year he has collected goods and held garage sales to raise money for the organization. He is responsible for issuing food, gas, and room vouchers for transients and local people who seek help and he makes himself available night or day to those in need.

Another organization to which Vernon gives of his time is the Floyd County Child Welfare Board. He has just completed a three year term on the board and in 1984 was chairman of the board. He continues as a non-voting member of the board and continues learning more in the child welfare field by attending meetings and seminars to increase his knowledge and ability for better service.

For many years he has been active in the needs of the Buckner Baptist Childrens Home in Lubbock. He and wife, Ethelyn encourage a drive in the First Baptist Church of Lockney to meet a specific need at the home each year.

Vernon has served on the Benevolence Committee of his church in various capacities for the past 17 years. Presently he is chairman of the committee and is responsible for obtaining help for church members, local citizens and transients in need.

He has been a member of the Lockney Independent Order of Odd Fellows for the past 25 years. Through the Helping Hand Project of the Odd Fellows Lodge in Lockney, Vernon sees to it that those in the community are aware that the project loans wheelchairs, walkers and crutches on a short term basis to those who need them. He also participates in all fund raising projects of the lodge. He has helped to get five children from Lockney into the Odd Fellows children's home in Corsicana. In 1974 Vernon was named the Outstanding Odd Fellow of the Lockney District which is comprised of four other lodges in addition to the Lockney lodge.

Vernon has been a lifelong resident of Lockney and gives freely of his time to assist the residents of Lockney in any way he can. He actively visits the Lockney, Plainview and Lubbock hospitals to see Lockneyites in these facilities. He also makes regular visits to the Lockney Care Center to visit with the residents and to help them in any way he can. He sees to transportation to and from the Care Centers and private homes for those needing to go to the doctor and at times he uses the Lockney ambulance to transfer patients when they can't go by car. He also made several trips to Houston with a local cancer patient.

He often spends time with shut in

men so that their wives may keep beauty shop appointments or play bridge.

He has lived in Lockney all of his 48 years. The Vernons have three children, Donna, 15; Robert, 12; and Tami, 11. They are very active members of the First Baptist Church of Lockney. He is one of the youngest men ordained as a deacon in the church and has held several offices in the deacon body. Presently he is serving as the Lords Supper Chairman. He is in his tenth year as Church Training Director. He is also on the Mission Committee and sees to the needs of the Spanish mission supported by the church. Also in 1974

he was named the Outstanding Citizen for his church and volunteer work.

A comment taken from the letter nominating him as one of the 7 Who Care said, "Don Vernon cares about people, loves them and does all he can to meet their needs, oftentimes at his own personal expense. Though he suffers from a severe physical disability, a victim of neurofibromatosis, yet he does more than most who have no physical limitations."

And of Don's volunteer work, wife Ethelyn commented, "Don does all of these things because he wants to and he enjoys working with the people of our community."

### Proclamation

Over 2.5 million Texans are 55 years of age or older. They have worked hard and have made important contributions to our state and nation. They continue to represent an era of talent and experience which should be acknowledged.

I urge all state and local officials and citizens to join me in this effort to increase public awareness of the employment needs and concerns of older workers and to assist those persons in finding meaningful and gainful employment opportunities in our communities.

### Council holds public hearing

The Lockney City Council held public hearings on the city's proposed 1985-86 operating budget on March 7 before approximately 10 interested citizens. Final action on the budget is expected to come at the next regular meeting of the Council.

The Council again approved a platt for the Cunningham addition of Lockney. Council had previously approved the platt, but on advice of attorney Ben Ayres, the action was repeated in the form of an ordinance, styled number 237.

In other action the Council approved the purchase of a tractor for the city. The tractor was being sold at an auction south of Lockney Meat Co. on the day of the Council meeting and Kenneth Wofford was appointed by the Council

to bid on the tractor. However the tractor was not purchased as it sold for more than the city wanted to pay. The council had set approximately \$4000.00 for the purchase.

City secretary Erma Lee Duckworth discussed with the Council the possibility of purchasing the phone system used by the city, fire, and water departments which would save money for the city in not having to pay a rental fee from now on on this equipment. The Council had favorable comments on this point and they will be looking at various proposals on different types of systems before any final decision is made.

Present for the meeting were mayor J.D. Copeland, aldermen Dub Dipprey, Pat Frizzell, and Kenneth Wofford, and the city secretary.

### Court accepts resignation

A two day split session of the Floyd County Commissioners' Court dealt with routine matters with the exception of the acceptance of the resignation of Justice of the Peace R.H. Ford. Ford, who serves Precincts 2 and 3, tendered his resignation as of March 31. The court accepted the resignation and will appoint a replacement on April 1. Preliminary interviews will be conducted on March 18. County Judge Choise Smith noted that nine applications had been received as of March 11.

Other matters handled during the March 8 session included the routine payment of monthly bills and hearing the financial reports of County Auditor Bobbie Hamilton and County Treasurer Glenna Orman. Both officials reported the county budget to be operating virtually as scheduled at this time.

Landfill contracts were signed with the City of Floydada and the City of Lockney. The county agreed to pay \$2,000.00 and excavate pits as necessary in return for the use of the landfill by county residents outside the city limits.

The agreement with Blue Cross-Blue Shield Insurance covering county employees was renewed. The rates for health care insurance will remain the same, although premiums for life insurance will drop by \$0.07 per thousand. The newly approved coverage will provide maternity benefits only for county employees and their dependent spouse.

Judge Smith reported that Justice of the Peace for Precincts 1 and 3, Lowell Bilbrey, has completed the required 40

hours of training under the supervision of the Texas Justice Training Center.

Completion of this training makes Bilbrey a qualified Justice of the Peace in the State of Texas.

Fifteen contracts for farmwork were approved. They were: clean out a drainage ditch for Gerald Vinson, four miles south and nine miles west of Floydada; drag ranch road and fill washes for Hannah K. Overstreet, 20 miles northeast of Floydada; clean out tank for Jakey Younger, three miles southwest of Dougherty; build up turnrows for Weldon Becker, eight miles south and one mile west of Floydada; dig pit for lake pump for Watson Jones, six miles south of Dougherty; fill washes for Roger Hammonds, 18 miles east and three miles north of Floydada; fill pit for C.A. Guffie (requested by Kate Crabtree), 15 miles northeast of Floydada; rebuild turnrows for Connie Bearden, two miles west of Floydada; clean ditch for James Cage, 13 miles east and three miles north of Floydada; clean drainage ditch and tailwater pit for R.C. Mitchell, one mile northeast of Muncy; clean tailwater pit for Herman Hamlin (requested by Macon Ulmer), two miles west and two miles north of Lockney; clean out pit and drainage ditches for Ray Gant, one mile south of Aiken; drag road and level ground for S.C. Burleson, 20 miles northeast of Floydada; rebuild turnrows for Lon Davis, five miles southwest of Floydada; and dig a pit for Kent Covington, three miles south of Dougherty.

### Twelve sign up for elections

April 6 should prove interesting for Lockney as three elections are scheduled for that day. At least two of those races should be of great interest.

In the city council election three seats on the council are up for reelection. These are presently held by Mayor J.D. Copeland and Kenneth Wofford, who will both seek reelection, and the seat vacated last August by Gail Kring will also be on the ballot. In addition to the two incumbents, Dan Smith, Jerry Johnson, and Harold (Buck) Ford have also signed up to run in the council race.

In the race for three seats on the hospital board, in addition to one incumbent, three others have signed up and will be on the ballot. Larry Golden will seek reelection to the post he currently holds and Jack Covington, L.B. (Buddy) Brandes, Claude Brown, and Ofelia Ortegon have also signed up for the election. The latter four who have signed up will be running for

election to the two seats presently held by Kenneth Tate and Rusty Baccus who have declined to seek reelection to the board.

Only two names will appear on the ballot of the Lockney Independent School Board of Trustees. Both Jim Bob Martin and Eddie Teeter will be seeking reelection and will be running unopposed.

The elections will all be held on April 6, 1985. The city council election will take place at the Lockney City Hall in the council chambers, and both the school board and hospital board elections will be held at the main entrance of Lockney High School with one using the library and the other using the teachers lounge.

Candidates in each of the races will be featured in upcoming editions of the Beacon. We will also print the times the polls will open and close on election day.

For the upcoming April 6 election of two school board members the board accepted Maria Arellano, Alice Mitchell, and Retha Wofford as clerks to assist Kenneth Wofford, the school board election judge. Incumbents Jim Bob Martin and Eddie Teeter are running unopposed for reelection.

Craig Howard of N.C.R. was present at the meeting to discuss the computer distributed by his company. The board has approved calling for bids on a computer for the superintendent's office. The specifications on this computer system will be available at the superintendent's office.

Coach Bob Purser discussed the athletic program with the Board, and R.L. Knox presented the textbooks committee recommendations which the board approved. Raymond Lusk presented the five year evaluation plan for the school system which is required by the State and it was also approved by the board.

### School board extends contracts

In the regular monthly meeting of the Lockney Independent School District Board of Directors last Thursday evening, the board approved the extension of contracts for R.L. Knox, Raymond Lusk and James Poole through June of 1987.

The board also approved the hiring of 57 teachers, secretaries, the school nurse, bus superintendent, and the Plan A and Chapter 1 teachers. Two teachers were undecided as to whether they will continue to teach here and rehiring them was tabled. The board accepted the resignations of Mindy Crowe and Yvonne Rhoderick.

The board has also changed the date of an upcoming comp day from Tuesday, March 26 to Wednesday, March 27.

Bids on new band uniforms were called for. These will be opened on March 26 at 7:30 p.m. in the superintendent's office. The board also called for bids on a new drivers education car and a new pickup for the ag department. Bids on these two vehicles have been called for both separately and together



## In times like these... By Mary Jo Fielding

A group of influential lawmakers is preparing to battle the armed forces over an expected request for nearly 150 million dollars to run the musical programs of the Army, Navy, Air Force, and Marine Corps in the fiscal year that starts in October. Pentagon officials say that the bands, which employ 5,400 servicemen and women, are necessary for morale, public relations, and recruiting, especially at a time of all-volunteer forces.

A typical group, such as the 40-member Army band at Fort Lewis, Washington, performs more than 500 times a year. Two thirds of these appearances are off the post. A larger organization, the Air Force Academy of Colorado Springs, Colorado, has six separate units ranging from a full

marching group of 89 members to a jazz ensemble and a woodwind quintet carved from the main body. In the 12 months ended in September the band played 916 engagements before 1.5 million people.

In the Washington, D.C. area, the military services operate showcase bands that often play at the White House and federal agencies for both intimate services and large functions. In addition the Pentagon maintains bands on overseas assignments.

Bands in recent years have been favorably treated by lawmakers as part of a campaign to upgrade all aspects of the armed forces. Too, they have been a part of the armed forces since the days when musicians marched into battle playing patriotic tunes as inspiration for the fighting men.

## Block grant hearings to be conducted

The Texas Department of Health will be holding public hearings on March 21, 1985, from 9:00 a.m. to 12 noon, at its Regional Headquarters, 4709 66th Street, in Lubbock. The purpose of the hearing will be to receive public comment on the Department's annual application for Preventive Health and Health Services and Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grants for Federal Fiscal Year 1986.

The Texas Board of Health on February 12, 1985, approved the method of allocation for block grant funds for

Federal Fiscal Year 1986. That method is for each program within a block grant to receive a pro rata basis of previous categorical grants with adjustments for needs identified by program managers, public transportation, and Legislative input. From Federal Fiscal Year 1982 to 1985 the emphasis of any changes has been toward the more comprehensive programs.

Public comment pertaining to the block grants will be accepted at the meetings as well as written comments.

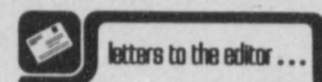
