Lockney native honored in Crosbyton

Outgoing president of Crosbyton Chamber of Commerce, Brice Allen was recognized as the Man of the Year in the awards presentation at the annual banquet. Allen was out of town in St. Louis, Missouri, following the birth of a granddaughter, Kari Andrews. The award was accepted for her father by daughter, Susan Gowens of Crosbyton.

Allen is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J.B. Allen of Lockney. Reading the life history of Brice revealed his growing up years in the Lockney area. Born July 25, 1915 in Childress, Texas, he moved with his parents to the Roseland Community near Lockney in 1917. His dad taught school in Lockney and Lone Star with the Allen family living in Lockney during high school days for Brice, a 1933 graduate of L.H.S. Allen was a member of the class of 1941 at Texas A&M and entered the Army Engineers as a 2nd Lt. in June of that year. He was married to Connie

McClure in December 1941 and was shipped overseas in January 1942 to serve World War II time in the Pacific Theatre for 27 months. This time as Motor Transport Officer for an Engineer Regiment was served in Australia and New Guinea. Upon completion of overseas service he and wife, Connie were stationed near Washington, D.C., where Brice was an instructor of Officer Candidates in the engineer school. After discharge from the army as a Captain the Allen family that now included a daughter, Judy, started farming with father-in-law, C.A. McClure, near Crosbyton in 1946. In the farming years the Allen's other children were daughters, Nancy, Janie and Susan. The farming years found Allen recognized as Outstanding Conservation Farmer in 1959. He served 31 years on the Crosby County Farm Bureau Board of Directors and three terms as president of this organization, finding

Three newcomers and five incumbants elected

Saturday's elections in Lockney were uneventful with no more than 200 ballots cast in any of the three elections. In the city election there were 181 ballots cast and in 1984 there were 580 cast. In Saturday's hospital board election there were 200 votes cast and in 1984 there were 348 cast. Ballots cast in the school board election were also down from last year with a total of 186 being cast on Saturday in contrast to 353 votes cast in 1984.

The school board election was the only election that incumbents names were the only ones on the ballot. Eddie Teeter was reelected to the board with 185 votes and Jim Bob Martin was reelected with 176. There were two absentee ballots cast. Teeter, a farmer in the Pleasant Valley Community, will be serving his third term on the school board. Martin, owner of J and K Insurance and Martin Spraying, will be serving his second term. School board members include Teeter, Martin, Eddie Foster, Keith Jackson, Kelton Shaw, Bill Race, and Clar Schacht.

In the City of Lockney elections incumbent Mayor J.D. Copeland was reelected to his third term as mayor with 141 votes and alderman Kenneth

Wofford was reelected to his third term as an alderman.

Three newcomers to the city council race had filed for the seat which had been vacated since Gail Kring moved to Lubbock last August. Candidates were Jerry Johnson, Dan Smith, and Harold "Buck" Ford. Johnson was elected to the alderman's post with 100 votes. Smith received 73 votes, and Ford had received 61 in the election.

The city council will now be comprised of Mayor Copeland, and aldermen, Wofford, Johnson, Pat Frizzell, Dub Dipprey, and Paul Reece.

In the hospital board election incumbent Larry Golden was reelected to serve a second term on the board with 172 votes. Elected to fill the seats of Rusty Baccus and Kenneth Tate, retirees from the board, were Claude Brown with 150 votes and Jack Covington with 125 votes.

Also running for the two seats on the board were L.B. (Buddy) Brandes who received 101 votes and Ofelia Ortegon with 35 votes. In addition to Golden, Brown, and Covington the hospital board is comprised of Hubert Frizzell and Chester Carthel.

Harvey enters final week of production preparation

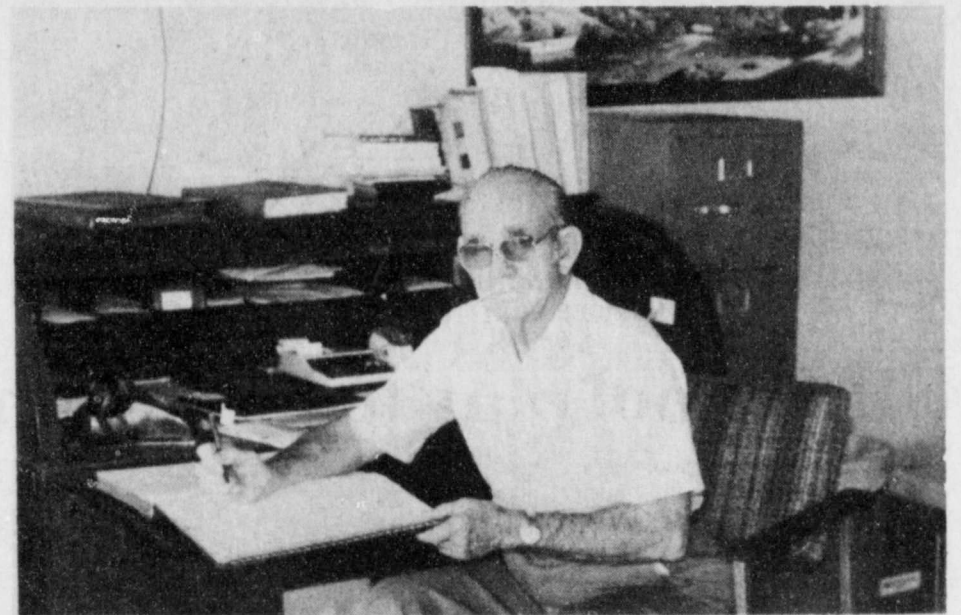

C.L. Mooney sworn in as Justice of the Peace

C.L. "Mike" Mooney was sworn in April 1 as Floyd County Justice of the Peace, precincts two and three (the northern half of the county.)

Mooney is filling the unexpired term of R.H. "Raz" Ford whose resignation was effective March 31. Mooney was appointed by the county commissioners. An election to fill the position will be in the fall of 1986.

The new justice of the peace is a native of Coryell County. He was born and reared in Oglesby where he completed high school. He served with the U.S. Air Force from 1941-45 and saw duty in Europe during World War II. Mooney purchased land in the Prairie Chapel community of Floyd County in 1948. He retired recently from farming.

Since 1952, Mooney has helped with elections, and has been an election judge for Democratic primaries, school and hospital district and general elections.

His community services include being on the boards of Lockney Independent School District, Floyd County Fair Association, Lone Prairie Gas Association, First United Methodist Church, and the old Sterley Community Center.

Mooney and his wife, Merle have been married since 1975. Their children are Mrs. Wyatt (Dianne) Phillips, a teacher in Childress; Mrs. Dave (Debbie) Goodrich, a teacher in Carrollton; Pat Mooney, a biological researcher for a pharmaceutical company in Indianapolis, Indiana; Robert C. 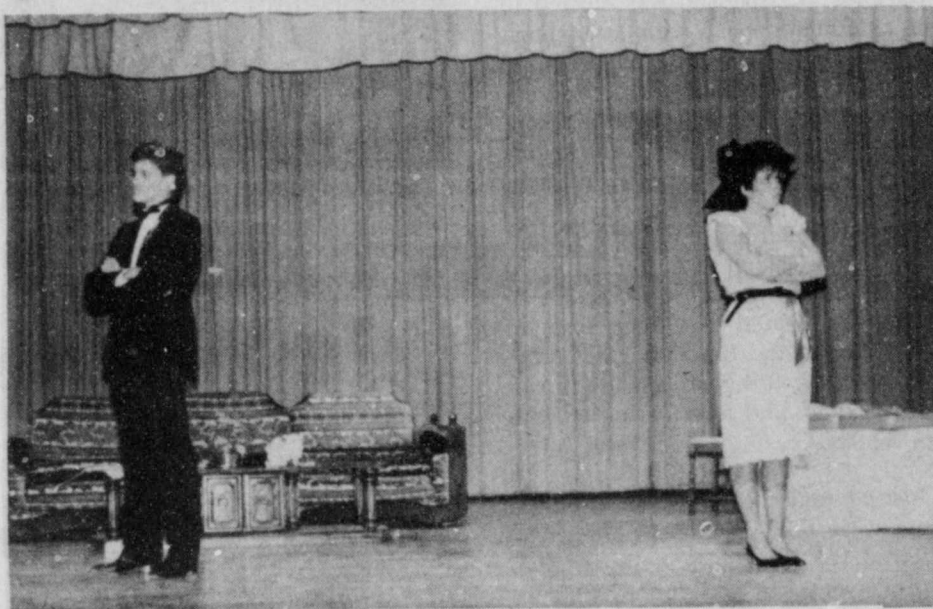

47 five-year-olds pre-enrolled for kindergarten

In the annual Il Penseroso Study Club sponsored pre-enrollment for kindergarten age children, 47 youngsters were enrolled for the upcoming school year. This number is up from the pre-enrollment in 1984 when about 32 youngsters were enrolled.

This annual event is sponsored, at no cost to the parents or the school by the study club.

At this year's clinic Dr. Gary and Dr. W.J. Mangold were on hand to give the children a physical checkup. Dr. O.R. McIntosh of Floydada checked the children for vision problems. Also on hand was new Lockney dentist, Dr. Ricky Cross, who gave the children dental checkups.

Children were also tested by speech therapist Karen Quebe, and a nurse from South Plains Health Provider was present to give booster shots to those who needed them.

In early March Communist Vietnam's offensive against rebel forces in Kampuchea led to bloody clashes with neighboring Thailand. It also provoked counter measures from both Washington and Peking.

When Thailand warned that it was facing the gravest threat in the six years that Vietnamese troops have occupied Kampuchea, formerly known as Cambodia, the U.S. ordered speedy deliveries of ammunition, artillery, and armored vehicles.

"The Thais asked for help and we are sending it," said a Pentagon official. We are prepared to take any additional steps necessary to assure Thailand's security." China, too, helps to arm and finance the Kampuchean resistance. Recently they boosted pressure on the Vietnamese by increasing artillery attacks on the Vietnam-China frontier.

Recently, to outflank the Thais, some 6,000 Vietnamese regulars with artillery support seized three hills in inside Thailand. The Thai Army attacked and

the Vietnamese pulled back from the immediate area with 300 dead. The Thais, on the other hand, lost 10 dead and 34 wounded in the bloodiest Thai-Vietnamese fighting yet.

So it goes when Hanoi tangles with a U.S. ally, in this case, Thailand.

Housing assistance available for veterans

According to Margaret A. Herrera, Veterans Service Officer for Floyd County, a large number of veterans have used the State Housing Assistance Program to purchase a home. This program was established by the Texas Legislature in 1983, and went into effect February 1, 1984. Since that date, some 15,000 veterans have applied for the financial assistance provided through the State of Texas.

Eligible to participate in this program are veterans who were legal residents of Texas at the time of entering into active military service, and were honorably discharged after serving 90 days or more at any time since September 16, 1940. Also eligible are veterans who entered service from other states, but who have resided in Texas for five years or more.

Under this program, the eligible

veteran locates the home he wishes to purchase, completes a purchase contract through a private mortgage company, and makes application to the State Veterans Land Board. The application papers are processed by the mortgage company for submission to the Veterans Land Board in Austin, Texas. When the veterans is shown to be entitled, the Land Board will advance \$20,000 to the mortgage company, representing a down payment on the veteran's loan, and usually in a lesser interest rate than would be applied to the loan without a down payment or a smaller down payment.

Veterans desiring to take advantage of this home loan assistance program may contact a local mortgage company, who will process all of the paper work that is necessary.

The junior judging team from Floyd County placed 7th overall in the contest. Tate Harris was the 5th high individual in cattle judging.

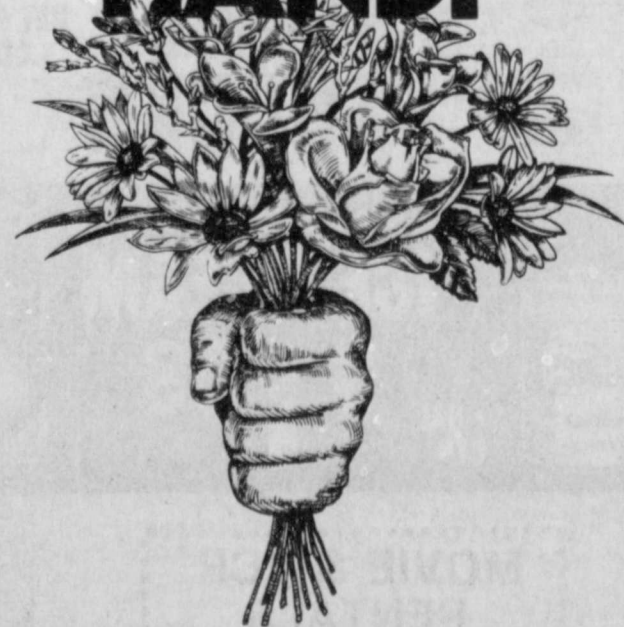
Both the junior and senior teams will be at Texas Tech University on April 20 for the district contest.
