Lusk resigns junior high principal's position

For the third year in a row Lockney will be represented by a team of students competing in the Texas Future Problem Solving Bowl in Austin.

The Lockney team was chosen from a field of 1800 teams. The teams submit a possible solution to a problem and are judged on this solution; the top 30 teams are selected to participate in the State Meet.

Board members canvassed the April 6 election results. Board president Eddie Foster administered the oath of office to Eddie Teeter and Jim Bob Martin who were reelected to the board.

The board has set April 16 for a special board meeting to interview three local men for the position of ag teacher for next year.

Randall Robbins, who was appointed to fill the remainder of the

school year after Mike Mowrey left, will be interviewed along with Rick Hayter and Kenneth Broseh.

The board approved calling for two bids: one for a computer system for the superintendent's office and another will be for resurfacing the area just south of the elementary school where the basketball goals are located.

The purchase of a new copy machine for the junior high building and the calling for bids on the two buses that were put up for sale several months ago were approved.

The purchase of a new drivers education car and an ag pickup were also approved.

The car will be a Dodge Diplomat from Maggard Nall at a cost of \$10,868.50 and the pickup will be purchased from Oden Chevrolet Olds at a cost not to exceed \$9500.00.

Before adjourning the meeting the board also approved hiring the lunchroom workers, custodians, bus drivers and the teachers aides (aides are subject to state funding.)

A contract with the Regional 17 Service Center and the Career Ladder Committee and Policies were approved.

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Jerry Johnson sworn in as new city councilman

Jerry Johnson, newly elected Lockney City Councilman, along with incumbents Kenneth Wofford and Mayor J.D. Copeland were sworn into office last Tuesday morning as the council met for its regular monthly meeting.

The election was canvassed and declared legal with a total of 181 ballots cast. Johnson was elected with 100 votes; Wofford and Copeland were reelected with 118 and 141 votes, respectively.

Mayor Copeland suggested that all councilmen retain their same departments. Those include Copeland, the city office; Dub Dipprey, police department; Paul Reece, fire department; Pat Frizzell, water and sewer; Kenneth Wofford, city farm; and Jerry Johnson requested that he be in charge of the street and alley department.

Kenneth Wofford was also selected to act as the mayor pro tem should the need ever arise.

In other action the council approved the budget for fiscal year 1985 which will be in the amount of \$548,823.00.

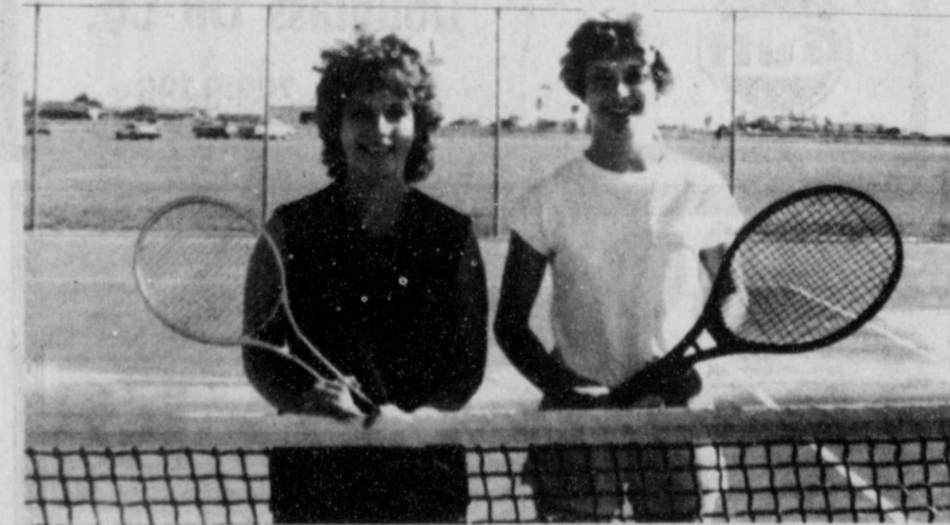
They also elected to appoint David Frizzell to represent the City of Lockney on the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority.

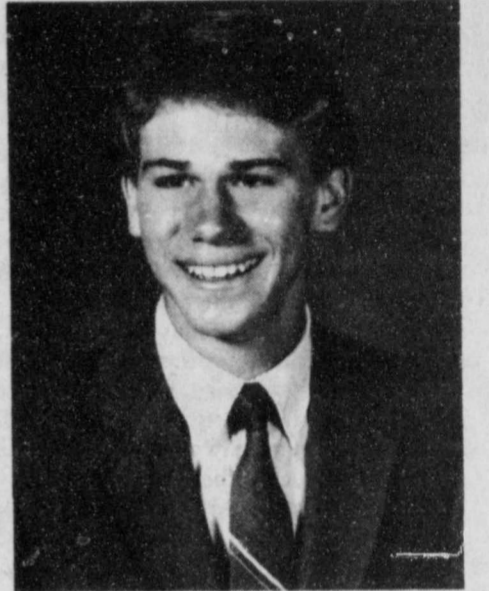

Once, Irkutsk was Russia's last frontier, the gateway to the Klondike of Siberia. Just beyond the city lies the vastness of what Russian author Maxim Gorky called the "land of death and chains," the Siberia of exiled revolutionaries and slave-labor camps.

Irkutsk is no longer a fit place for political prisoners. It is too tame for Moscow. Since World War II when the invading Nazis forced most Soviet industry east of the Ural Mountains, Irkutsk has become civilized.

Gold and salt still are extracted from the nearby mines, but only by modern machinery. The forests still yield millions of pelts of sable, mink, ermine, squirrel, and other fur bearers.

Only the cold has escaped the bureaucrats in Moscow. In winter overnight temperatures routinely fall to 40 below zero. Steel cables become so brittle that they can snap like uncooked spaghetti. Rubber soles split.

On a clear and windless Siberian day one may join a thousand or so spectators who are watching bandy, a game similar to hockey but played on a flooded, frozen soccer field with a ball instead of a puck.

To American eyes is the wonder about the nature of people who sit outside on metal grandstands in 20 below temperatures and think it's good sport.

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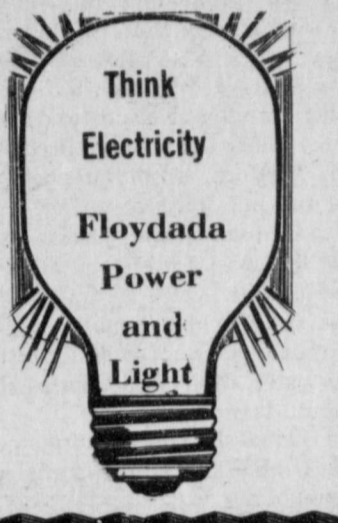


