Highlighting the annual FFA banquet in Lockney last Thursday night were the naming of the Star Greenhand and the Star Chapter Farmer. The Star Greenhand was Matt Williams and the Star Chapter Farmer was Wymon Rexrode.

Following a Mexican style meal prepared by the Lockney Elementary School Cafeteria staff, FFA members, parents, and guests enjoyed a motivational speech by Danny Hunter, the ambassador of Texas Tech's Agriculture Department.

Three main points were brought up by Hunter as he spoke. The first is being able to adjust to the changes in the ag industry. He commented that a few months ago he was called to address a group in southwest Texas. He stayed with a family who lived only a few yards from the point of entry on the Texas/Mexico border. He said that just 200 yards apart were a farmer on the Texas side plowing with a modern

tractor and on the Mexico side was a man plowing with a mule. "These changes occurring in the industry are necessary and one must be able to adapt to the new ideas, and the young people in the ag programs will be making changes in the ag industry in the future," Hunter said.

His second point was communication. "Saying what you mean is all important in today's world." Lastly he challenged the boys to be "different by being willing to work together."

Following Hunter's address, Lockney ag teacher, Randall Robbins, presented several awards, including both the Star Greenhand and Star Chapter Farmer.

Meriwethers chosen as Rotary business

The Lockney Rotary Club has selected the Lockney post office as the Business of the Month for the month of May and the honored guests for May are Postmaster Doug Meriwether and his wife, Donnie.

Doug has served as the Lockney Postmaster since February 28, 1967. He began working in October of 1955 as a part time clerk under acting postmaster, Imogene Holt.

Doug was born and raised in Lockney. Born January 1, 1934 in his grandmother's home, which is now the Hilburn Casey home, he is the oldest son of Zerah and the late Raymond Meriwether. He has one brother, Morris, who is the supervisor of window clerks in Hobbs, New Mexico.

Doug attended Lockney schools and graduated from Lockney High School in May, 1952. He attended Watson's Business College in Plainview, graduating with honors upon completing courses in typing, shorthand, bookkeeping, court reporting, and general business and was considering a position as a court reporter in Albuquerque, New Mexico, when his orders came for reporting for induction in the U.S. Army on January 4, 1954, during the Korean conflict. Doug served in the Military Intelligence section from 1954 through October, 1955, at post headquarters at Fort Sill, Oklahoma.

He returned to Lockney in 1955 to begin his work for the post office. In addition to his duties as the Lockney Postmaster, Doug is also a Certified Trainer Postmaster and has trained 40 other postmasters and Officers in Charge of area post offices. He also performs duties for the Lubbock MSC office such as staffing studies, rural route surveys, audits, and others when requested.

He served three years as commissioner of the Little League program which was sponsored in the past by the Lions Club. He is a past member of the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department having served for 20 years with the department, and he was a service officer of the American Legion, dispensing hospital beds and wheelchairs where needed in the community. He also served five years as the secretary of

the Lockney Chamber of Commerce.

Donnie is also a lifelong resident of Floyd County having been born six miles north of South Plains just inside the county line. She was the ninth of ten children born to Ola and the late R.E. Young.

She graduated from Floydada High School in May of 1957. She is a charter member of the Athena Study Club and has served in many capacities. In the past she served on the Lockney newcomers club, on the Satellite School Board, and as a member of the hospital auxiliary, and she is presently serving as the secretary of the Lockney Chamber of Commerce.

Donnie was appointed by postmaster Jeffie M. Griffith, as a temporary sub-clerk on November 11, 1960. She was to work as a Christmas assistant until after the Christmas rush but was later converted to a career clerk and has had continuous service since that time.

The Meriwethers have one son, Monty, who lives with his wife Christy in Lubbock. Monty is a shop foreman for Whites, Inc. of Shallowater, and Christy is a certified teacher of secondary education in social studies and history. She is also a certified Beauty Control consultant.

The Lockney post office was established in 1890 with William R. Davis serving as the first postmaster. Other postmasters include the following with the dates they were appointed: James B. Baker, April 17, 1894; Robert B. Paynor, July 27, 1901; Homer Howard, September 6, 1905; Cora D. Fowler, August 1, 1913; Homer Howard, March 23, 1922; Charley J. McCollum, September 1, 1934; Henry B. Machen, August 24, 1948; Jeffie M. Griffith, December 31, 1955; and Doug Meriwether, February 28, 1967.

Nationwide the U.S. Postal Service handled over 131 billion pieces of mail in fiscal 1984, which just ended and the Lockney post office contributed to this volume by processing both incoming and outgoing volumes of some 8,000 pieces of mail daily through its operation. In one Lebanese city there is still rivalry. While the rest of Lebanon sinks into chaos under the weight of bombings and killings, there is this seaside city that is enjoying the carefree, opulent life-style that once graced the capital of Beirut 10 miles away. Old Beirut is a city of terror. The new Beirut, Juniyah, once a sleepy little fishing village, has grown into a thriving, bustling city.

Juniyah is as garish and free-wheeling as the capital was in its heyday. At night it is a blaze of neon lights. Nightclubs pack in revelers seeking to escape the vigors of war. There is imported talent, flamenco dancers and

pop singers from France. Crowded restaurants serve the best of French wines and delicacies.

The biggest supermarket stocks 12 brands of Camembert cheese, plus frog legs, snails and french Cagnac. On weekends huge throngs from Beirut come in search of fun and peace. On Sundays people ride cable cars up to Our Lady of Lebanon, a mountaintop Maronite Church. The peace here is the work of the Lebanese Forces, the Christian militia that ruthlessly put down rival factions. Some units have revolted against President Amin Gemayel, posing a new threat to his regime.

Latest dental innovations explained by Ricky Cross

New Lockney dentist, Ricky Cross, was the guest speaker for the Lockney Rotary Club last Friday, and he presented a program on new dental innovations.

The first new development Cross discussed was the Maryland bridge. This is a bonded bridge to replace teeth that must be removed. Cross said this bridge is less expensive than the conventional ones, and the new method of putting this bridge in puts less strain on the patient. In using this bridge the patient does not have to have teeth next to the replaced tooth ground down or have the enamel removed from the adjoining teeth. The adjoining teeth are coated with a composite resin and are thus prepared to be fitted with the bridge. Since there is no grinding on the adjoining teeth, no sensitivity to hot and cold develops, and the patient is much more comfortable when the dental work is complete. Cross also said it takes about 1/3 the time to put this new bridge in.

Another innovation is using composite resin to fill teeth. This is used especially in filling front teeth or teeth that are very visible. This new resin lasts as long as the conventional metal filling with none of the sensitivity to hot and cold. Cross also said that this resin can be used to coat stained teeth and give them a better appearance.

The third development is geared toward children. It is a pit/fisher sealant that is used to seal a hairline

crack in teeth. Cross said there are cracks in the enamel on the teeth on the crown. These cracks are so small that they are smaller than the standard toothbrush bristle and are therefore nearly impossible to clean. With the new sealant the cracks are filled and will most likely not give problems in the future. He said that he recommends this sealant for all children as a preventive measure after either the six or 10 year molars have come in.

Cross is in Lockney on Tuesday and Wednesday from 8 to 5 and the other three days of the week he is associated with Dr. Gary Abercrombie in Plainview.

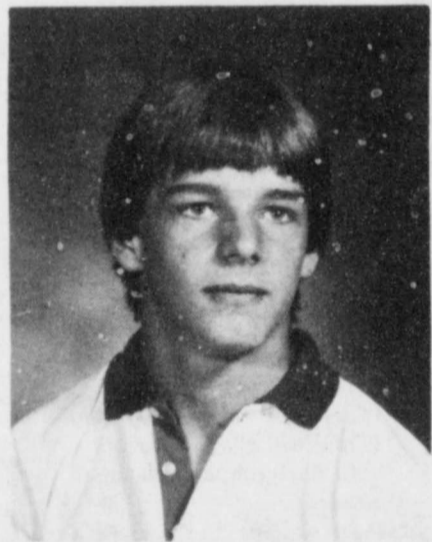

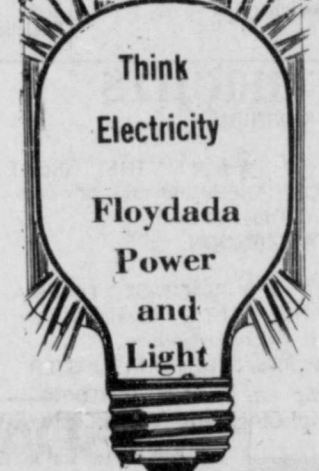
