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## Board accepts resignation and hires two teachers

In the regular monthly meeting of the Lockney School Board, members accepted the resignation of Lockney band director James Whitis. They also approved the hiring of two new elementary school teachers, Donetta Keltz and Sharon Redden.

At the present time it is not known at what grade levels the new teachers will be placed, but the need for at least two new teachers was recognized and met by the board hiring the two local women to fill those positions. Both have elementary certification.

In other action the board voted to raise the transfer fee for students outside the Lockney I.S.D. The transfer fee had been \$30.00 per month but due to the rising costs of education the board members expressed the necessity to raise the transfer fee to \$60.00 per month. In addition to approving the increase in the transfer fee, the board also approved the list of 18 students who have requested to transfer into the Lockney I.S.D.

The board also accepted the bid of \$2100.00 from the First Church of the Nazarene in Post for both of the old school buses which have been for sale for the past year. Other bids included \$540.00 from Darrell Dudley for the bus

that is inoperable and a total of \$1350.00 from City Auto for both buses.

The board also discussed the addition of a metal building to the elementary school facilities. The building would be used for P.E. and music and is being discussed due to the need for more classroom space in the elementary school. The board considered a building which would be about 70x100 feet and would house a regulation basketball court and possibly room on one side for fold up bleachers to be installed. The building committee will obtain estimated prices on the building and will present these for discussion at a later meeting.

The date of Monday, May 20 was set to interview school principal applicants for the replacement of Raymond Lusk who has resigned. At the same time bids on a computer system for the superintendent's office will be accepted or rejected; the board was unable to make a decision at the May 14 meeting after some questions arose.

In other action the board approved the use of one of the school buses for the FFA trip to Capitan, New Mexico, approved payment of the current bills and investments, and also approved tax report #8.

## Mothers day out nursery planned

Mothers in the Lockney area are invited to participate in the Mother's Day Out program which has begun at First United Methodist Church of Lockney.

Care for children ages three months through six years will be provided on Wednesdays in the educational building on the north side of the church.

No reservations are necessary. Hours are from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Cost for one child for the entire day is \$7; one-half day cost is \$4 for one child. Fee for two children is \$10 per day or \$7 per half-day. Fee for three children is \$15 per day or \$10 per half-day.

Mothers are asked to provide a sack lunch, pillow and blanket.

Director of the Mother's Day Out program is Teresa Ramirez. She has attended Wayland Baptist University, and has been an aide in both Lockney and Floydada elementary schools. She has worked in a children's day care center and plans to enroll this fall in Amarillo College to complete work on an associate degree in child care assistance.

Miss Ramirez plans both directed and free playtimes, naptime and such learning activities as art.

## Final hearing held on paving grant application

The final hearing for applying for a Texas Department of Community Affairs grant by the city was held last Wednesday at the city hall.

Michelle Magruder, community development planning analyst with South Plains Association of Governments, was on hand to discuss the application with mayor J.D. Copeland, city councilman Jerry Johnson, city secretary Erma Lee Duckworth and four citizens who attended the meeting.

Magruder said the grant application has been filled out and will be submitted to the committee this week. In discussing the application Magruder said that 116 people would benefit with 103 of those being in the low to moderate income bracket. In the application she has stated that by paving the proposed streets, drainage problems would be corrected, health hazards to citizens would be diminished, and these improvements would complement the paving improvement already done in the northeast part of town.

Magruder said that Lockney had a fairly good chance of obtaining the

grant this year. The applications are accessed on a point system, and Lockney has already amassed some extra points through not being funded last year, not applying for the same project as last year, and also because the City of Lockney is willing to pay 5% of the cost of the paving. The city's 5% would amount to about \$13,500.00.

The total amount requested in the application is \$262,545.00. The breakdown of how funds will be disbursed includes: \$216,080.00 for the actual paving work, \$5,000.00 for land and right of way acquisition, \$25,920.00 for engineering fees, and \$15,545.00 for general administration and an audit which will be conducted at the time of the completion of the project.

Magruder said the results of the application evaluation should be announced in September.

The streets targeted for paving are all in southeast Lockney and include 2nd from Shurbet to Spruce, 4th from Shurbet to Poplar, 6th from Locust to Shurbet and Willow from 4th to 6th Street.

## In times like these... By Mary Jo Fielding

The Reagan Administration seems to have become less gun-sly over Indo-China. Just recently two representatives from Cambodia, Son Sann and Narodom Ranaredeh, arrived in Washington to seek help against Vietnam. They met with Secretary of State George Shultz, and later Son Sann said, "The pipeline has been opened."

The administration hinted that the noncommunist guerrillas might get more weapons if necessary, but not from the United States. The more likely sources were Thailand and Singapore. U.S. planners fear that direct military support might jeopardize progress between Hanoi and Washington over American MIA's in Indochina.

Still, the Administration did not want to turn its back on the guerrillas. "The Vietnamese by their own actions -- the attacks on the border resistance camps in an attempt to go for a military solution -- have changed the character of the game," said Assistant Defense Secretary Richard Armitage.

Son Sann insisted that his men were prepared to leave their families on the Thai border and fight harder within Cambodia, adding that to do the job he will need mines, explosives, and anti-tank guns.

To succeed the guerrillas will need military help, but to get it, they will have to show that they can put up the kind of fight that would merit stronger backing.

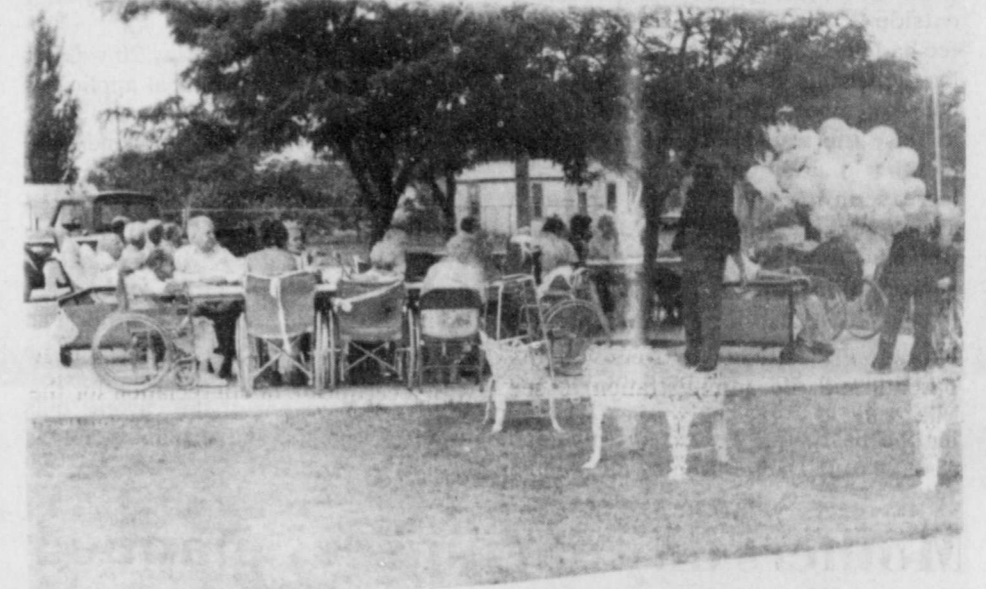

# Brigadier General Joe Rigby visits hometown

A very special former Lockneyite was in town last Friday, as 1958 Lockney High School graduate and present Brigadier General Joe W. Rigby visited Lockney from Washington, D.C. to present the Army reserve award to graduating Lockney seniors Brent Hallmark and Betty Kay Cates. The award was presented for achieving excellence in both athletic and academic endeavors.

When asked if the presentation was his idea Rigby said, "When I found out Lockney had two award winners to be given the award, I asked to come here and present them and also to be able to see my old hometown. I have only been back four or five times since I graduated, but it is still a special thrill to be able to come home."

Rigby arrived in Lockney on Thursday evening and stayed in the home of former classmates Jerry and Kay Williams. Also that evening two other former classmates, John Paul Schacht and Cliff Hardy called on Rigby at the Williams home for visiting and reminiscing.

Rigby also got the chance to visit with other classmates and friends on Friday morning during a reception held in the Home Economics building at Lockney High School. These friends included Felicia and Goree Applewhite. Mrs. Applewhite was Rigby's English teacher in high school.

Rigby left Lockney shortly after his graduation in 1958 to report to the

United State Military Academy at West Point, reporting as a cadet. Rigby received his appointment to the academy through former Representative George Mahon. "Dorsey Baker wrote Mahon and through Baker's letters and the Mahon recommendation I got an appointment to the Academy."

When asked what, if any, background he had for wanting to go into the military, Rigby said, "I just always wanted to be in the army. I don't remember wanting to do anything else. I used to talk to Dorsey Lynn Baker when he was home on leave from the academy and that just made me want to go into the service more than ever."

Jerry Williams, classmate and childhood friend of Rigby's said, "When we were young, all Joe ever wanted to do was play army, and I couldn't see him doing anything else. He wanted to go into the army."

At West Point he continued the tradition of maintaining high academic standards he had set while in Lockney; he was the salutatorian of the 1958 graduating class. At West Point he was on the dean's list and was also a cadet officer and vice president of the debate council. At the same time he was a member of the triathlon team and lettered in soccer.

After graduating from West Point, Rigby entered Infantry Officers Basic Training and Parachute School and later entered Ranger training and Jumpmas-

ter training. He was again an honor student in each of these training schools. In 1964 he took training at the U.S. Special Warfare Course (Green Berets) and was an honor graduate.

In 1964 he received his first overseas tour in the Republic of Vietnam where he received his first Purple Heart. He was reassigned to Vietnam in 1968 and was wounded again.

He has also seen active duty tours in Hawaii and Korea. In his numerous years in the service Rigby has commanded several infantry, battalions, and divisions.

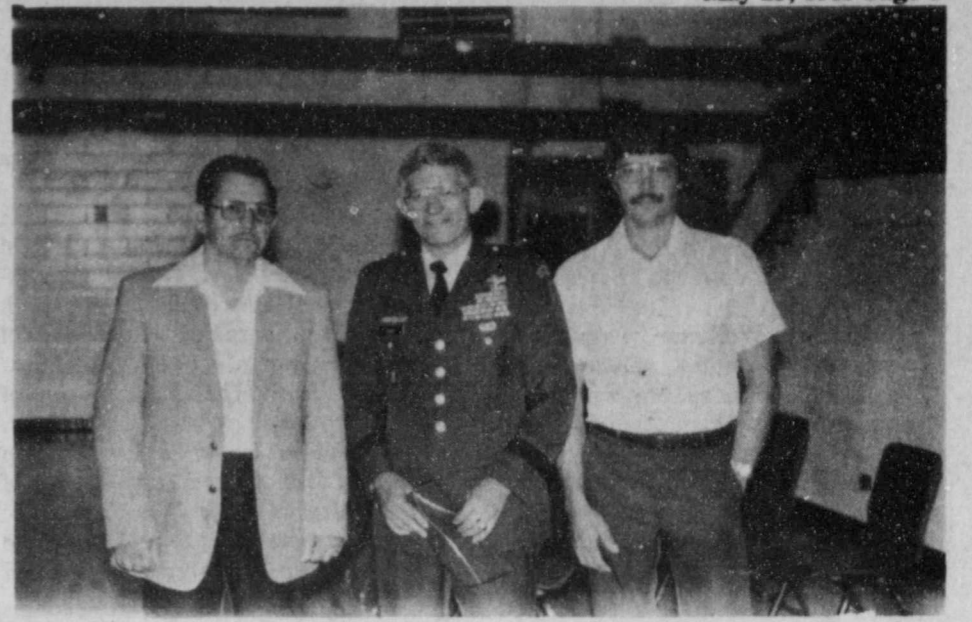
At the present time Rigby is assigned to the Pentagon, serving as the Deputy Director of Material Plans and Programs Directorate, Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Research, Development, and Acquisition. At the present time he is planning the defense budget to be presented to Congress and the President. Rigby commented, "It has been nice to get away from Washington for a few days and have a rest from that budget planning."

While in Lockney Rigby also addressed the Lockney Rotary Club. He presented the same film that has been shown to Congress to emphasize the necessity of maintaining a strong defense budget. The film showed military helicopters that, according to Rigby, would "blow Blue Thunder and Air Wolf away." The film also included tanks and land vehicles that are superior to those that the Soviet Union has at its disposal.

Rigby said that he has been in Washington for about 1 1/2 years and will probably be there at least one more year before receiving a new assignment.

Rigby and wife, Lovetta are living in Alexandria, Virginia. They have two daughters, Lisa, who is a senior, and Lesley, who is a junior, both are at the University of Texas at Austin. Rigby had attended UT in 1972 to get his masters degree. He said that both of the girls liked Austin and chose to attend UT.

Rigby's two brothers, Rodney of Shallowater and Buddy of Midland, also attended the awards assembly.

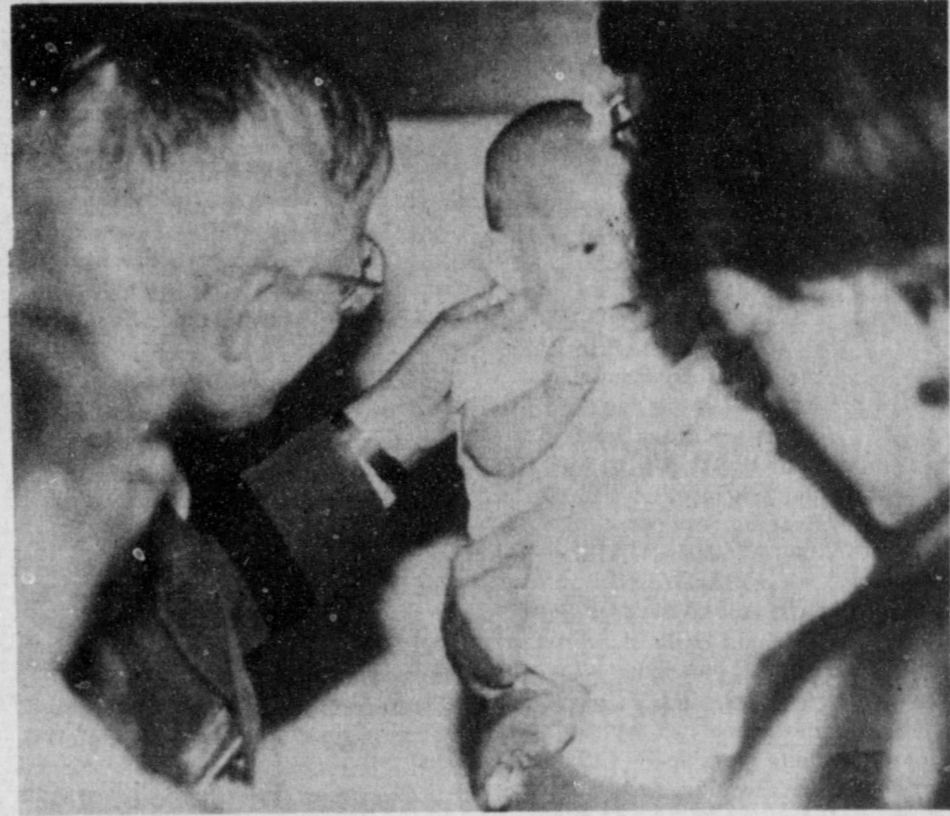

He also commented on the students that have been effected by the no pass/no play rule. He said most of the students effected have failed the courses due to not doing their homework. He stressed that the parents should make sure that the students are doing the required homework.

There are a total of 132 students: 74 in elementary, 31 in junior high, and 27 in high school for the 1984-85 year. There are also 103 5-year migrants in the program which means that Lockney has a total of 237 migrants in the three Lockney schools.

One parent asked why there were no Anglo parents that attended the meeting, and it was explained that there is only one Anglo migrant family in Lockney at this time. ## Farmers still battling rust

Most wheat farmers throughout the Panhandle, South Plains and Rolling Plains have missed their opportunity to use fungicide to combat the worst outbreak of leaf rust to strike the region in many years, says a plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

But a few may still be able to obtain some advantage from treating their crop, said Dr. Robert Berry, who sounded the alarm for area producers two months ago.

County Extension agents in the northern tier of Panhandle counties echoed the view that producers need to take a very close look at their crop to decide if it is economically feasible to apply fungicide. "This is especially true from Interstate 40 north," said Fred Smith, Hutchinson County agent.

"Most producers made their decision a month ago," with many feeling the rust wasn't serious enough to justify the treatment, Berry said. But changing weather conditions have provided warmth and moisture which have aggravated the situation.

Producers who have wheat already blooming, or in later stages of development, with rust already evident on the flag leaves will find it is too late to expect satisfactory results from fungicide application, the Extension specialist said.

"Those plants will continue to decline and results of fungicide application will probably be disappointing, although there might be some yield enhancement," Berry said.

Fields which are in the flag stage or early heading, but without rust damage to the upper leaves, can still be treated with an expectation of good results, the pathologist said.

Berry described the Rolling Plains wheat crop as a "complete disaster" from the rust. "Many early fields are in the milk stage with absolutely no green leaves to fill the grain," he said. He said late fields are blooming and many have good color, but rust infestation is heavy and will probably kill the leaves before the grain is filled.

Berry said some fields in the Rolling Plains which were probably treated with fungicide are now showing rust. But he said it appears the two weeks of protection provided by the fungicide may be enough to yield a fair crop in these fields.

## Basic tractor safety outlined

Tractor safety is a serious matter, for violation of some basic operating rules could mean injury or even death.

All farm workers should be instructed in tractor safety when they first begin work and at least annually thereafter, says Dr. Gary S. Nelson, safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Nelson offers these guidelines for tractor safety:

- Securely fasten seatbelts if the

tractor has a roll-over protective structure.

- Where possible, avoid operating the tractor near ditches, embankments and holes.

- Reduce speed when turning and crossing slopes and on rough, slippery or muddy surfaces.

- Stay off slopes too steep for safe operation.

- Watch for dangers or obstacles, especially at row ends, on roads and around trees.

- Allow no extra riders.

- Operate the tractor smoothly--no jerky turns, starts or stops.

- Hitch equipment only to the drawbar and hitch point recommended by the tractor manufacturer.

- When the tractor is stopped, set brakes securely and use the park lock if available.

With farm activity in full swing across Texas, now is a good time for farm workers to be instructed in basic tractor safety, says Nelson.

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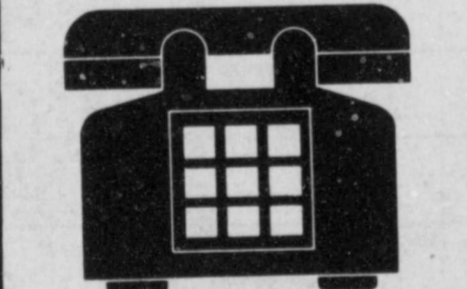

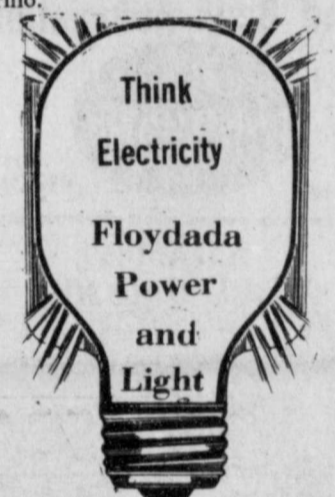
