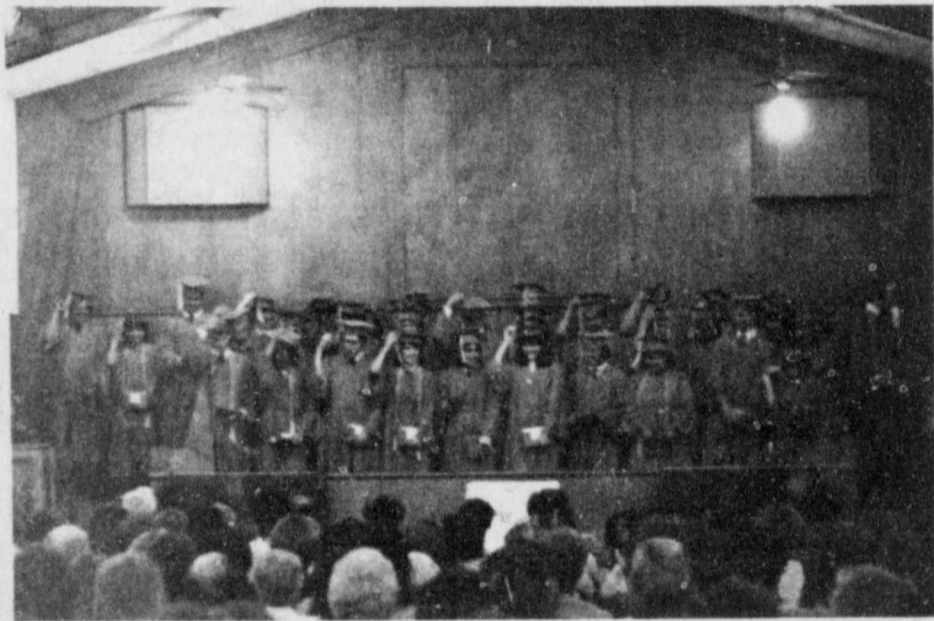


34 seniors graduate from Lockney



1985 GRADUATING CLASS—Thirty-four Lockney High School seniors saw their last days in the Lockney school system last Friday evening as the 1984-85 class participated in graduation exercises.

Filled with friends, family, and other well wishers, the First Baptist Church in Lockney was the scene for the graduation exercises for 34 Lockney seniors last Friday night.

Highlighting the evening were addresses given by salutatorian Betty Kay Cates and valedictorian Brent Hallmark.

In her address Cates used the story of a young man born with no legs and only one arm who went on to graduate from high school and did not let his handicaps keep him from succeeding in his life. She said, "Nothing is too hard to obtain if you are willing to work toward success. Success is right around the corner if we just strive to reach for it. The key is to believe in yourself and in your abilities."

She further broke down the word success and gave each letter a definition: "Success is a sense of direction, understanding, courage, compassion, esteem, self-acceptance, and self confidence." She further thanked the teachers, and all the school faculty, friends, neighbors, and parents for their support through the years.

After some special music provided by Terry Keltz and Ann Race, Brent Hallmark then addressed his classmates and those assembled for the graduation.

Hallmark's address included three challenges to his fellow classmates. The first was "be true to oneself. Never underestimate your worth or ability. Each of us has an important place to fill in life. We must remember that our only limits are those we impose on ourselves."

He also challenged his classmates to "be of service and help your fellowman. We are part of mankind, and the world is constantly changing and creating new and different problems that must be met."

"My third challenge is to always be a good citizen. Our country has given us opportunities that many, many people do not enjoy. Our twelve years of education are a privilege we should appreciate," said Hallmark.

Superintendent W.H. Hallmark then addressed the group of graduates. He commented, "Graduation is one experience in a person's life that will always be remembered, not because of what was said, but because of the accomplishment. The accomplishments of this class are many. Some of these have been exciting for the community, and for that we thank you. We wish you all the best that life has to offer," he said.

Diplomas were then presented to the 34 1985 graduates of Lockney High School by principal James Poole and superintendent Hallmark.

Special music for the evening was provided by Mrs. C.L. Record, Terry Keltz and Ann Race, the invocation was worded by Gracie DeLeon, the benediction by Ritchie Thornton. Marshalls for this year were Stacy Manley and Monica Torrez.

Board hires principal and accepts computer bids

The Lockney school board met for a special meeting on May 20 for the purpose of interviewing prospective junior high principals and also to accept or reject bids on a computer system for the superintendent's office.

The board interviewed two men Ron Cummings of McLean, presently the high school principal there, and Terry Ellison, who is the assistant principal of grades 4 through 8 in Dimmitt. Ellison has accepted the position in Lockney.

The board also accepted the bid of IBM on a System 36 computer for the superintendent's office. The cost of the complete system will be \$40,079.00. Installation is expected to be complete by this summer. The cost of the system includes software from TECS and includes 25 days of training for the staff that will man the computer. Software for the computer system is specially

geared toward helping the school system keep all the necessary state required records.

In addition to the above action the board has also approved calling for bids on an activity building for the elementary school. The board has decided on a metal and brick building that will measure 70 feet by 100 feet, and it will house the physical education and music departments as well as restroom facilities.

The building would house storage areas for P.E. equipment as well as an office for P.E. teacher, Joyce Marks. Deemed necessary because of an increase in the enrollment for kindergarten and first and second grades for the 1985-86 year, the building will also be used for more of the musical and other programs presented for the elementary school students.

Rose retires after 22 years

Thursday, May 23, was marked with the retirement of Lockney I.S.D. bus driver, Delbur Rose. Rose has driven buses in the Lockney school system continually for the past 22 years.

Rose began driving in April, 1961, part time through 1962; then in 1963 he was hired full time. From 1965 through 1984 Rose drove the Route 1 circuit which runs south of town. Rose said, "The kids on that route are like family. I have driven the kids of the children that were on some of the first runs I ever made. I have also driven my own grandchildren to school and home."

Superintendent Hallmark said, "Rose has driven continually for the past 22 years without a wreck. He has the safety of the kids uppermost in his mind when he is driving the buses. If everything in the school system went as smooth as our bus operation we would be in great shape."

Both Rose and bus superintendent,

C.L. Record, said, "Lockney is the only town around here that continually stands behind its bus drivers. We have talked to drivers from a lot of schools, and the Lockney administration gives its drivers its wholehearted support." They both agreed, "The reason for the bus operation and the entire school system running so smoothly is due to Mr. Hallmark. Through his administration the children and employees receive the best education and materials. Without him Lockney schools would not be where they are today."

Rose received a plaque, presented by Hallmark, that read "From the Lockney I.S.D. in appreciation for the love and dedication to the youth of the Lockney public schools. For loyalty, punctuality, and concern for safety. 1963-1985, 22 years of service."

Hallmark commented that Rose would still be driving part-time when needed in Lockney.

Junior high awards and graduation exercise held

Appetizers were served at the home of Ruth and Audie Noland. Helping there were Sherry Race and Brenda

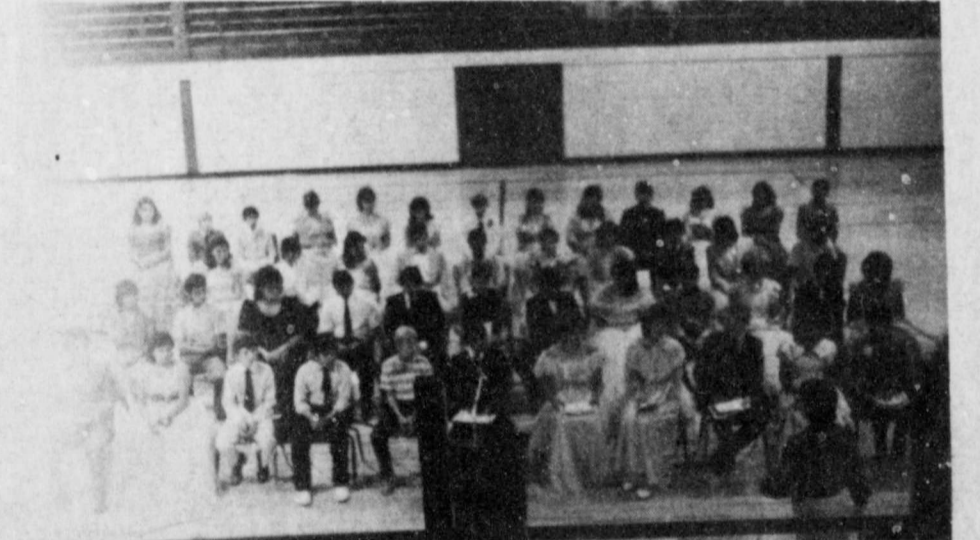
Elam.

In times like these... By Mary Jo Fielding

The following is a resume of a column, written by Theo Sommer, a columnist, and editor of Die Zeit, a German newspaper.

In the final days of World War II there were tens of thousands of German soldiers who surrendered to the U.S. Army, only to be handed over to the Russians. Then the inevitable happened. As the Germans grapple with the problems of feeding themselves and rebuilding cities from rubble, they slowly emerged from the comatose state into which their defeat had plunged them. They began to understand that the collapse of Hitler's Reich gave them a chance to rebuild their country in decency and to revive the democratic virtues and traditions of their history that the Nazis had so brutally suppressed.

The sad fact is that the resurrection of liberty in Germany remains limited to the western part of the nation. All of a sudden West Germany was promoted to

a kind of guest victor. Its support was sought, its youngsters were wanted as soldiers again, its industrial prowess was needed in the emerging struggle with the Soviet bloc. The West Germans were lucky. It was the East Germans who paid the full price of Hitler's war. They found themselves locked behind the Iron Curtain and are still without basic freedoms today.

Germans have come to realize that reunification is at best a vague historical promise and most likely an elusive dream. Deutschlandpolitick, often suspected to be a German effort to go off on a nationalist tangent, is quite the opposite. It aims to alleviate the lot of the people, to facilitate contacts, to permeate borders while recognizing them.

"If this is patriotism, it is patriotism of a people whose national realm has traditionally transcended frontiers, constitutions, and ideologies.

Local men among directors of marketing firm

actual implementation of hedge positions.

Brett Gill, owner of Gill Farms, Inc., received a BBA in accounting from West Texas State and has several years experience in public accounting.

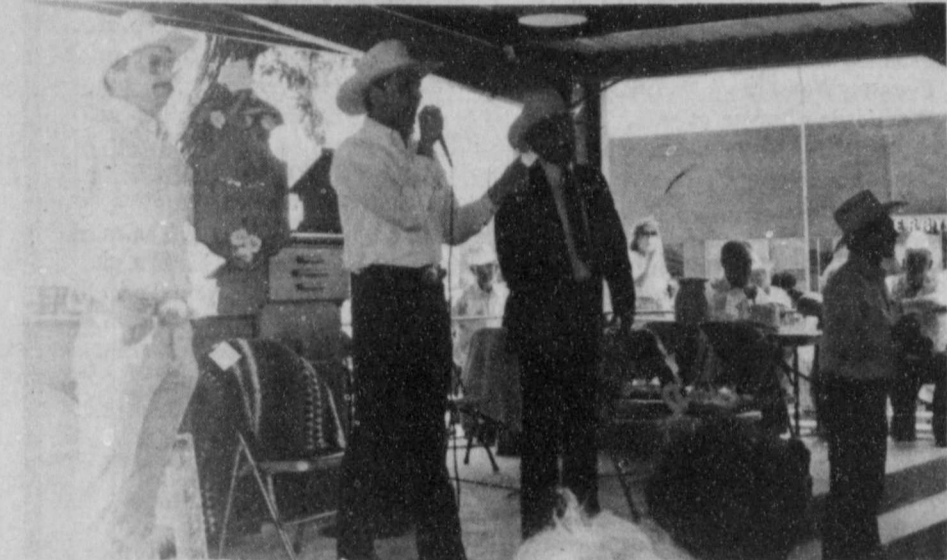



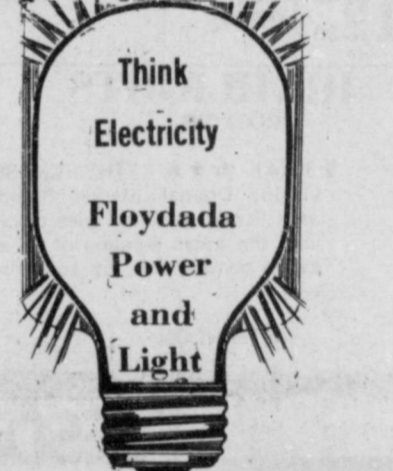
