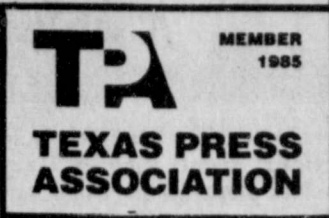

Kim King appointed president of FNB

Fifteen 4-H'ers participate in County Fashion Show

Fifteen Floyd County 4-H members participated in the Floyd County Dress Revue held in the Lockney Elementary School Saturday.

This year's theme was "Through the Looking Glass" and entrants in the revue modeled on the stage which was decorated with a trunk with fabric draped over it, a large standing mirror, a rocking chair, and a large pot of hanging ivy.

Serving as judges for the event were Denise Blanchard, Brenda Mangold, and Joyce Williams. Sue Crow and Rosemary Paty were the pianists. Sharon Smith and Loretta Turner announced each participant's entry.

Entrants were judged in seven different divisions. Winners in the Pee Wee category included Josh Gregory and Jamie Crow. Both won first place for their efforts. Josh had constructed a pair of white baseball pants with an elastic waist and green piping down the legs. Jamie wore a white romper with an elastic waist and yellow ties at the shoulders.

In the Junior I active sportswear division Carolyn Turner received first place for her short set. The top was a blue print and the poplin shorts were accented with ties at the legs. Her brother David Turner received second place in the same category for his bright red sweatshirt style top and shorts.

Jennifer Crow was the first place winner in the Junior I daytime non-tailored wear category. She wore a candy striped jumpsuit with cropped length legs and accented with patch pockets. Angie Hooten took second place for her short suit made from a cotton/polyester navy material with a crayola print.

The winner of the Junior 2 active sportswear division was Mindy Matsler. She wore hiking shorts and a matching pullover top, spending only \$12.00 to construct her entire outfit. Rodeo slated for this weekend in Lockney

There will be a rodeo in Lockney Friday and Saturday nights starting at 8:00 p.m. both nights.

The stock for the rodeo is being provided by the C Bar T Rodeo Company of Lubbock. Gate tickets will be \$3.50 for adults and \$1.50 for children 6 and over. All children under six will be admitted free.

A full slate of rodeo events is planned including bareback riding, calf roping, team roping, bull riding, and barrel racing.

Highlighting the rodeo on both nights will be a businessman's calf dressing contest. They will be competing for a \$50.00 jackpot and at press time there were at least four teams signed up for the event. Kenneth Holt and Gary Cawley will both have teams. Two other teams include Arcenio Martinez, Andy Perelaz, and Roy Guerrero and the team consisting of Tommy Billington, Ronnie Field, and Louis Luna. To see these local men dress a calf in a t-shirt and boxer shorts is an event in itself and well worth the time.

There will be a concession stand open during both nights of the rodeo with food and drinks for sale.

A dance will follow the Saturday night performance of the rodeo and Crystle Creek from Lubbock will be playing, a seven piece band that includes a fiddle player. The admission price for the dance was not known as press time.

Lockney bike-a-thon riders raise over \$1000.00

Twenty-five Lockney youths participated in the Athena Study Club sponsored bike-a-thon to raise money for the Lubbock Ronald McDonald House. The event was held on May 24 and the 25 riders, ages 6 to 11, raised \$1014.00 during the event.

They will include Randy Davis on bareback, Randy Ogden in calf roping, and Kenneth McKee in the bull riding event. All three of these men are ranked first place in their respective events in the TCRA. Also expected are Keith Burkenfield and Kenneth Smith, who are ranked first and second in the bull dogging in the TCRA.

Barrell racing should also prove interesting at the rodeo as a mother and daughter will be competing against each other. Jan Davidson was the 1983 West Texas Barrell racing Association champion, and her daughter Shawna was the 1984 Junior Champion. At the present time mother, Jan, is ranked first place and Shawna is ranked second in the TCRA.

During the two day event in Lockney spectators will be seeing top ranked cowboys and girls compete for top prize money and improving their rankings in hopes of going to the TCRA finals and on to the North American finals in Denver later this year.

In addition to the above mentioned cowboys and girls Tommy and Belynda Billington of Lockney, Lisa Luna and Clare Blankenship of Plainview, and Kelvin Sharp, the roping coach at Clarendon College, will be entered.

There were police boats blockading the Rhine; helicopters clattered overhead, their crews scanning streets and buildings with binoculars. Guards peered under cars and into sewers and bolted the covers on every manhole.

That and much more made up what West German police intended to be the tightest security ever for an economic summit. Of the seven world leaders at the meeting, President Reagan received the heaviest protection. A moat incircled the President's temporary residence near Bonn, Gymnick Castle, as did

state used cars furnished by their hosts, but Reagan traveled in a bulletproof limousine flown in from the U.S.

Guards stood shoulder to shoulder in two rows around the home of West German's President Kohl as the Reagans dropped in for coffee.

Even reporters with full sets of special credentials issued by the U.S. and the West German governments had to show their passports, and two American journalists were briefly taken in custody when they went jogging

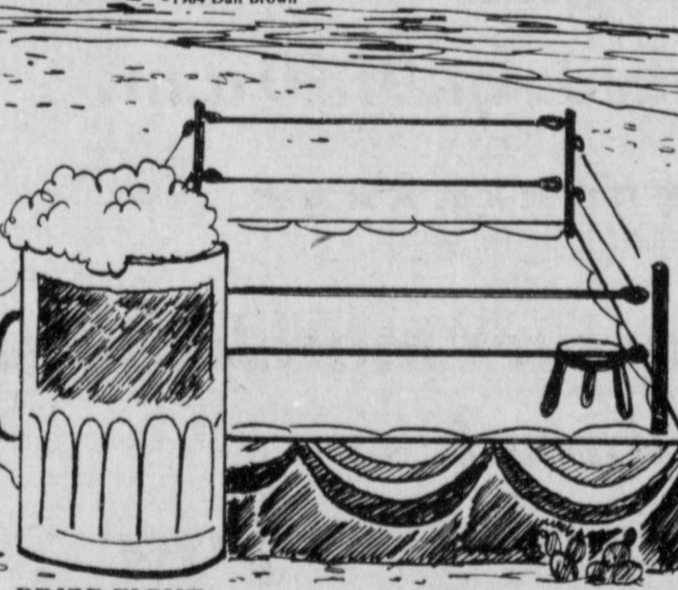
