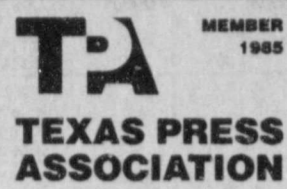


#### BASKETBALL CAMP

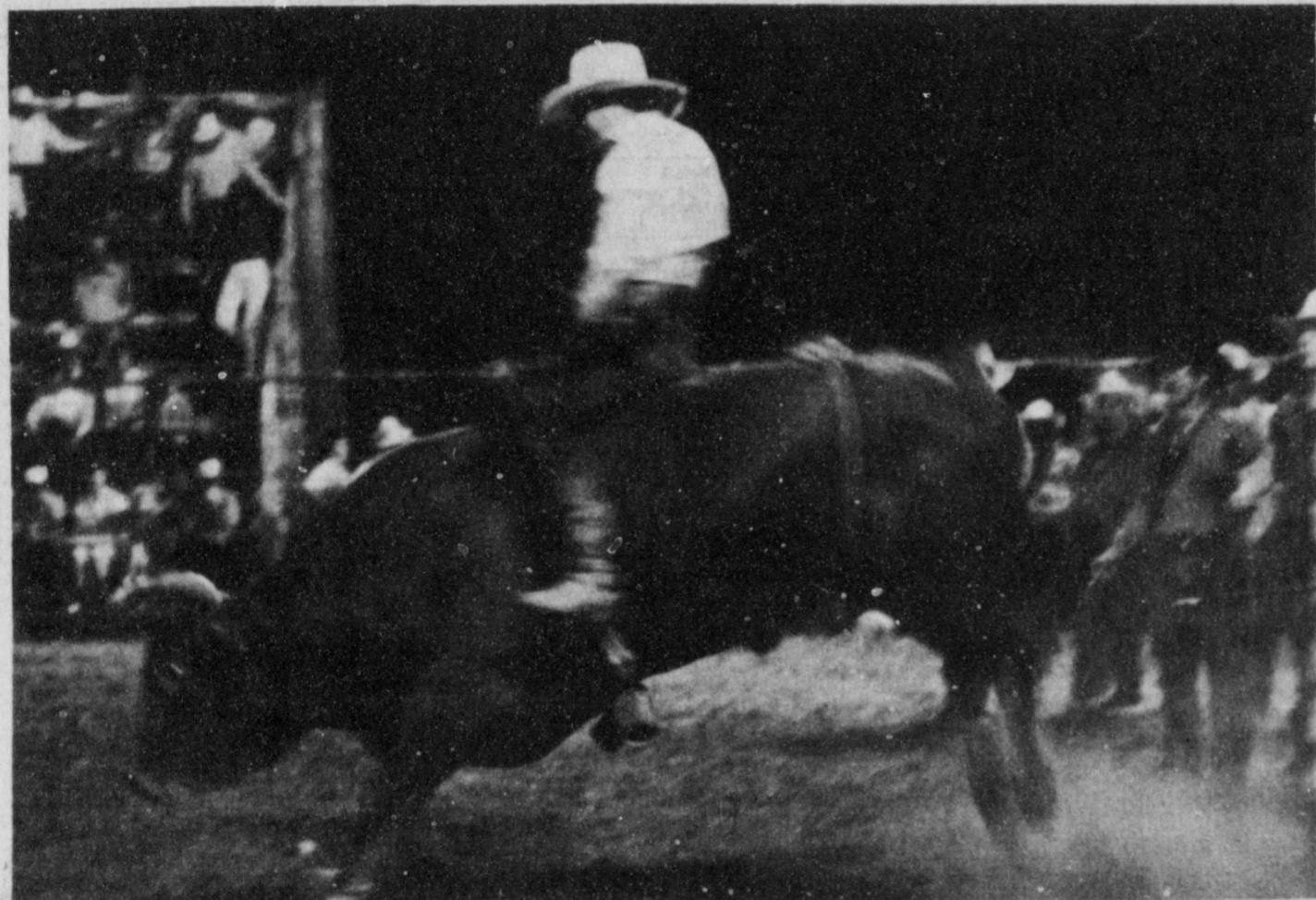

There was a rodeo held in Lockney this past weekend and spectators that attended got to see some fine competition among top ranked cowboys and girls.

Winning the businessman's calf dressing contest was the team of Tommy Billington, Ronnie Field, and Louis Luna. The second place team consisted of David Workman, Marlon McDonald,

and Rick Hayter. Hayter commented that he is retiring from the calf dressing contest due to a broken nose he received in Saturday night's performance of the rodeo.

The various winners in the rodeo included Todd Bebbbs with a score of 75 in the bareback riding, Kyle Rowland with a time of 8.25 in the calf roping, Jow Dean Weatherby with a 71 in the saddle bronc riding, and Donna Curtis with a 4.29 in the breakaway roping.

Winning the steer wrestling was Kenneth Smith with a 4.5. The bull riding was won by Ernie Messer with a

score of 86. Leslie Barrett placed second in the bull riding with a score of 80.

In the barrel racing event Pepper Billington lead off both nights on her horse Tequila, as she set the pattern for the barrel racers. Belynda Billington ran the barrels on her horse Kip and had a time of 17.751.

### Crime prevention program outlined to local residents

Two weeks ago two Lubbock police officers met in Lockney with citizens to present a brief program on crime prevention and the Neighborhood Watch Program.

Several neighborhoods in Lockney have established watch programs, and those who have not enacted a program but wish to do so should contact Justice of the Peace, Mike Mooney, at his office at 119 North Main in Lockney. Mooney has the necessary forms to start a watch program.

One of the officers present for the meeting said that in small communities everyone trusts their neighbors, and this trusting habit can follow them to large communities. "Adults need to be made aware that crime can happen to them," said officer Royce Williams.

Neighborhood Watch Programs are established to help prevent crime before it strikes. They can help prevent crime by watching each other's property. In the programs one or two neighbors that are home during the daytime hours, when others are working, watch the neighborhood. If they see anything suspicious they then contact the local law enforcement officers.

One of the most important things to remember is that if a suspicious vehicle is seen in the neighborhood, get the license plate number and a description,

if possible.

One way to further protect your property is to engrave your Texas drivers license number on your property, especially on TV's, stereos, VCR machines, and any other items that are easily picked up and transported out of the home. To help citizens with the engraving Lockney now has four engraving tools available through Mike Mooney's office.

It is also necessary to keep a record of serial numbers of these items on hand. Also make a record of the serial numbers of all firearms in the home. The officers that came for the meeting reported that they had recovered over one half million dollars worth of stolen merchandise but were unable to return 4/5 of the merchandise, because owners could not provide proof of ownership. If you have a record of the serial numbers of the items in your home, if something happens you will be able to provide the law enforcement officers with the information they need to return your property.

Again, if you are interested in establishing a Neighborhood Watch Program in your area, contact Mike Mooney at the Justice of the Peace office on Main Street. And also contact him if you wish to use the engraving tool to mark your property.

## In times like these... By Mary Jo Fielding

Graduate student Brian Small was searching for fossils in the rose-colored clay of Arizona's Painted Desert when he came across a few scattered bones. What the young paleontologist had found were the remarkably well preserved skeletal remains of an early dinosaur that walked the earth some 225 million years ago. "As far as we know, this is the oldest dinosaur ever discovered," says Robert Long, 38, the University of California, Berkeley, research paleontologist who led the fossil expedition.

The animal (about the size of a German shepherd, but with a long neck and tail) was probably a plant-eating ancestor of the giant brontosaurus, some of which weighed more than a 100 tons and were seven stories tall.

Long says the most exciting aspect of the find is that it offers a window into a nearly unimaginable past, before dinosaurs dominated the earth and when mammals and birds did not even exist. "The dawn of the dinosaurs was a totally alien world," says Long. "There were no flowers, no butterflies, no colors, only green and brown. The first mammals were 10 millions years off."

Helen, we'll miss you!

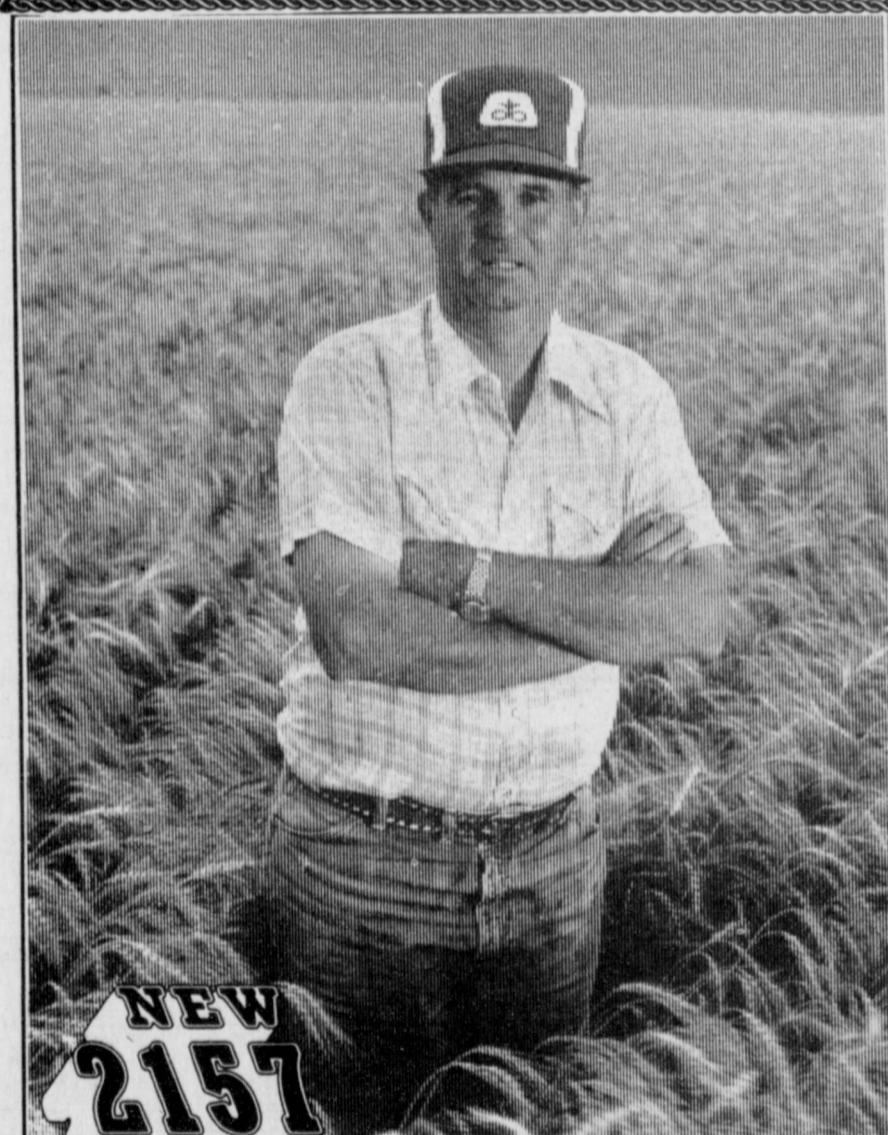

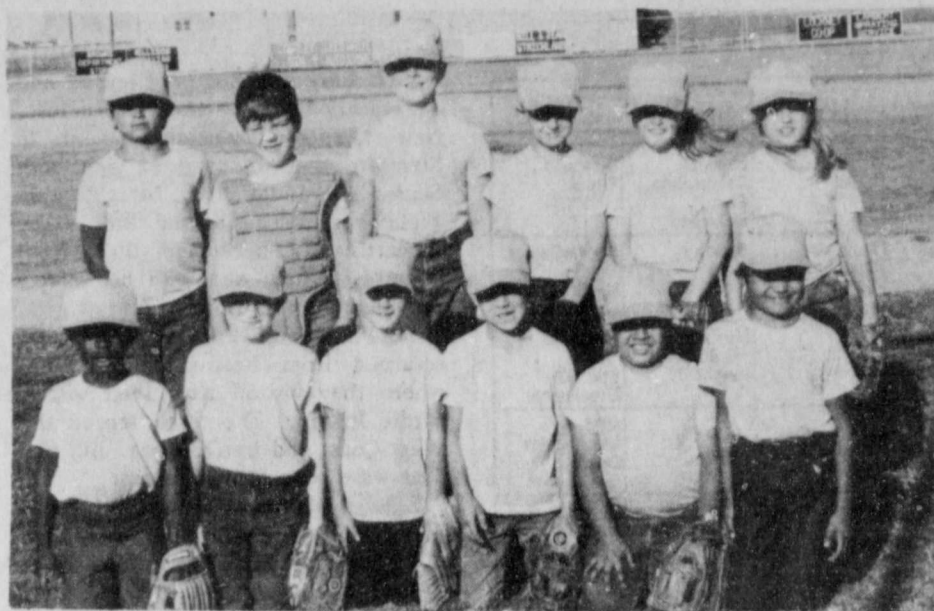
