Lockney's own Earl Broseh, who wrote, recorded and distributed the song "No Pass, No Play," may appear on national television soon.

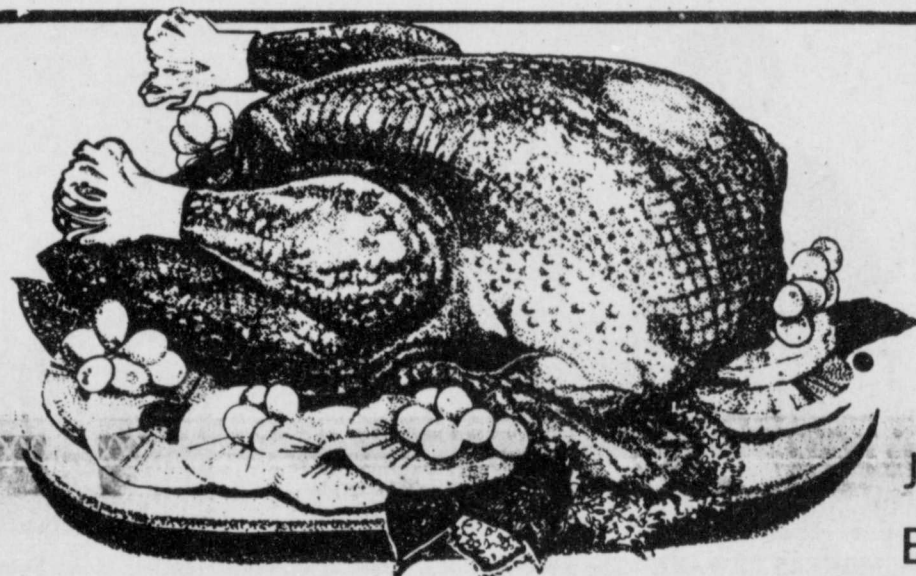

## In times like these... By Mary Jo Fielding

The iron rule of President Ferdinand Marcos is under growing pressure, in the Philippines. Washington is moving openly to preserve its most precious military asset in the Pacific.

In the past, the administration has remained publicly calm about Marcos' prospects. However, it dropped the facade when President Reagan in mid-October sent a personal envoy, Senator Paul Laxalt (R-Nev.) to give Marcos a warning that his government was in danger of being overthrown.

The stakes for the U.S. are high. Most important is the security of Clark Air Base and Subic Bay Naval Base, the two biggest U.S. military installations outside the mainland. Both represent U.S. strategic power, nuclear and non-nuclear, in the western Pacific. They are a counter-weight to the Soviet presence in Vietnam and essential to the peace of mind of American friends throughout a vast region.

Marcos' popularity has been up and down for years. The most dangerous threat to Marcos comes from the New People's Army, a Communist guerrilla organization attracting more and more peasants. The NPA is growing steadily in ability as well as strength, and its bold forays now reach into the capital, Manila.

Bishop Antonio Fortich in Negros province says that as many as 400,000 people in his region have been displaced by the decline of the monopolized sugar industry. Too, Washington has repeatedly urged Marcos to break up sugar and coconut monopolies run by friends. In June the Reagan administration withheld 40 million dollars in food aid until Marcos agreed to end the state-run monopoly on wheat and flour imports.

If the Marcos government should fall, the U.S. must decide how far it is prepared to go to retain its strategic position in the Philippines.

# School district performance...

In junior high the course offerings meet state requirements and contained in the junior high building are a complete computer lab for the computer literacy classes as well as for math and migrant classes. Students are also offered homemaking and art in junior high.

The high school offers 42 different courses. If students are interested in correspondence classes, they are offered through Texas Tech in Lubbock. High school students also have access to computer classes and will be offered a foreign language when the necessary teacher can be found. Each school facility is also furnished with a complete library facility.

**Extra-Curricular Student Activities**  
The Lockney I.S.D. offers several extra-curricular activities for students.

The junior high students have the opportunity to participate in band, football, basketball, track and they also have a Gifted and Talented Program. Junior high students in the athletic program have won district competitions in the past. The Gifted and Talented Program students have participated in State competition as a team for the past two years in the problem solving contest.

In high school, students may choose from band, football, basketball, track and UIL Literary events for extra-curricular activities. The band is consistently bringing home awards for their efforts, and the football team has been district champions for the past two years. Also the cross country teams have received recognition for their efforts in the past three years including a State championship this year.

Also offered in high school are the vocational agriculture and homemaking programs.

**Staff**

The staff of the Lockney Independent School District includes 40 teachers with bachelor degrees and 14 with masters degrees. All four of the administrators have masters degrees to their credit.

The teaching staff has a combined total of 643 years of experience with those ranging from one year of experience to 43 years of experience.

**Facilities**

The Lockney Independent School District consists of two major sights. The elementary school is located on West Eighth Street. The high school, junior high, band, agriculture, and administrative buildings are located on West Second, Third and Fourth Streets between Poplar and Willow.

The elementary school is the newest of the buildings. It was completed in 1964 and will house 400 students. Also added to the building last year was a new music and physical education facility.

The two story high school building, completed in 1929 will house 350

students. Over the past two years the building has had a complete facelift. A new roof was installed, the outside of the building was cleaned and repaired and a large portion of the windows have been enclosed. Classroom renovation of the high school is planned for this year.

The junior high facility was completed in 1957 and consists of classrooms, a gym, band hall and lunchroom, which is no longer in use. Like the high school the building has had a new facelift in the past two years. A new roof was installed, the outside was cleaned, and windows were closed in. Again upgrading the classrooms is planned for this year.

In each of the building facilities, central heating and cooling are used.

In order to keep the best possible facilities for students, the school board has approved expenditures from \$40,000 to \$150,000 each summer for a major improvement on the educational buildings.

**Financial Condition**

The Lockney school system is in very sound financial condition. Over the past three years State aide has increased and the bonded indebtedness of the school has been paid off.

The school board operates under the consensus that if possible at least two months operating expenses be kept in reserve at all times. Over the past three years the school has ended the year with a surplus balance. In 1982-83 the surplus was \$492,000 in 1983-84 it was \$498,000. This year the surplus was \$729,000, which was due to the increase in State aide.

The surplus amounts, over and above the two months operating expenses kept in reserve, are used each summer for renovations to the facilities, staff pay increases, and career ladder moves.

Due to the careful planning of the board, the school system has only once had to borrow money, about four years ago, to start the school year.

**Other Information**

Other miscellaneous information contained in the report include the fact that there are now 54 teachers on the career ladder. Of the 54 teachers, 15 women are on level two of the ladder, as are 15 men.

Attendance ratios for the past year are also included. Elementary school had an attendance ratio of 96.75%, junior high a ratio of 97%, and high school 97.73%.

The dropout rate in Lockney last year was low with only two students dropping out of junior high and 11 leaving high school.

All in all the report shows that Lockney is meeting the State mandated regulations of House Bill 72. The full report is available for inspection in the superintendent's office during regular business hours. Anyone wishing to see the report may do so.
