## The Lamplighter

In a few days many of us, indeed we hope all of us, will pause for a while and contemplate the significance of the date.

No doubt every day is the anniversary of some important event in the long annals of history. But December 7, 1941 has to rank up near the top among events that have shaped the world we live in. It was on that date that the Japanese launched their attack on Pearl Harbor and the Philippines. It was at Pearl Harbor that they inflicted the most devastation of course, since that was where our fleet lay at anchor. The attack plunged America into the war, a war that would consume the energies of the Republic for more than three long years, and cost the lives of millions around the globe.

It was also an event that was to lay the groundwork for the eventual dissolution of the British Empire, and the rise of the Russian Empire. Entire countries would be absorbed by the Soviet Union. Latvia, Estonia, Lithuania would disappear entirely, and a whole host of countries would continue to exist in name only, with the Soviet Union running their government through puppets, setting their foreign policy, their domestic policy, their trading partners in accordance with decisions made in Moscow. And it was a war that would ultimately thrust America into the unaccustomed role of the free world's leader and defender.

All that was not foreseen on that day when the Japanese launched their attack. To America then it was mostly a matter of rallying around the flag, of building a defense that should have already been built, and of winning the war that had been thrust upon us. In the end we were successful, but I do not believe there are many who will argue that we would not have been better off if we had been better prepared.

There is currently an argument going on about whether we should attempt to devise a system that would help defend America against incoming missiles. Opponents argue that we cannot devise a system that will destroy all the missiles, that some would get through, and therefore we ought to abandon the effort.

As one who has left friends scattered across Asia, some buried, some burned, some dumped in the sea, my own opinion is that any political leader, or any military leader, who has the opportunity to add to the defense of our country, or who turns his back on the possibility of saving millions of American lives simply because we can't save all of them, ought to be hanged by his neck until he is dead, dead, dead.

On this December 7 anniversary we will be down in Houston to attend a function honoring former Senator John Tower, now an Ambassador and one of the three-man team negotiating arms-reduction talks with the Soviets at Geneva. Our relations with him go back to the early sixties, as chief of his staff in Washington. In a way it has been a somewhat strange relationship. Sometimes tranquil, sometimes stormy, but always respectful and friendly to my way of thinking. By and large I believe he made a good Senator for Texas, and for America. We occasionally differed, even quarrelled, over certain things, but I never doubted, nor had any reason to doubt, his dedication to his state and nation. It will be good to see him again, even though we don't relish the long drive from Floyd County to Houston.

## Flo Barnes retires after 26 years as the director of nursing at Lockney General

Flo Barnes, director of nursing at Lockney General Hospital for the past 26 years, will be retiring Friday, December 6.

Barnes, a 1945 graduate of nursing school in Pennsylvania has been in the nursing profession for the past 40 years, 26 of which has been in Lockney serving the area residents. She came to Lockney as the director of nursing in September of 1959.

Barnes commented, "I have really enjoyed my work in Lockney. Serving the citizens of Lockney and all of the patients that have been through the hospital has been a joy, but there comes a time when one must put work aside and take life a little easier."

When asked what changes had occurred in her years of nursing Barnes said, "Because of Medicare lots of

things have changed. There is more bookwork involved now. One of the best changes is that there are more licensed nurses in the field. Medicine in general has changed and become more advanced in the 40 years I have been a nurse." Another change which she noted is that now more things are disposable.

Barnes said she has agreed to help out at the hospital on a part time basis. "I will be filling in when they need me and I will also be helping out in

surgery," she said.

When asked what she would be doing in her spare time Barnes said, "I will be visiting with my family and spending more time with my six grandchildren. I also like to fish and will find time to go fishing more, since I haven't been in three years."

Flo and husband, Alton will continue to live in Lockney where Alton farms. Their youngest daughter Arleen lives here in Lockney and their oldest, Cindy lives in Waco.

## Lisa Terrell wins National 4-H award and scholarship

A 16-year-old Texas student, who led other young people in 360 4-H activities over seven years, has been named one of nine national winners in the 4-H achievement program.

Discussing her personal development, she added, "It also has turned a shy little 9-year-old into a teen leader."

Lisa Terrell of Lockney, received a \$1,000 scholarship from the Ford Motor Company Fund, the program sponsor.

In her recreation project, she began by leading simple games and songs. Her role expanded until this year, when as a teen leader and junior leader, she directed 29 recreational activities for almost 800 members.

Selected by the Cooperative Extension Service, winners were presented with their awards during the 64th National 4-H Congress in Chicago, December 1-5. Awards are arranged by National 4-H Council.

She organized a women's softball team this year because the team she was on last year was disbanded and other teams were full. "So I got 13 players, coaches, sponsors, uniforms and equipment," she said.

Terrell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Buster Terrell, is a high school junior and plans to become a county Extension Service agent. She is a seven-year 4-H'er.

Her other projects have included public speaking, sheep, beef, citizenship, clothing, photography, health and electric energy.

The Floyd County student's principal 4-H projects have been food-nutrition and recreation. "I've always loved cooking, and eating, and all kinds of recreation," she said.

The 4-H'er said her foods projects "made me a selective eater and a comparison shopper," who learned how to compare products and prices to obtain the best buys. She expanded her interest into food preservation and estimates she has saved her family \$3,576 on food costs.

She said her food-nutrition project has grown from "learning how to set the table to discovering how calcium prevents osteoporosis," a brittleness of the bones that often strikes elderly women.

She began a recipe file and studied the nutritional needs of senior citizens.

## Former principal dies

**Editor's Note: This memorial of Forrest M. Smith was printed in the Farmersville Times and was submitted to the Beacon by Mrs. J.A. Noland of Blue Ridge, Texas.**

### In Memory of FORREST M. SMITH

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p.m. November 4 in the Fielder-Baker Chapel for Forrest M. Smith, 81, retired school teacher who died November 3 in the Hinton Home.

The rites were conducted by the Revs. James Simpson and Ben Read, and interment was in the IOOF Cemetery.

Pallbearers were Phineas Holmes, Sheldon Smith, Shannon Smith, Rodney Smith, Kerry Bradford and Lee R. Michie.

Mr. Smith was born at Josephine March 23, 1904, the son of John F. and Nora Rone Smith. He was married to the former Jimmie C. Buck December 23, 1923, at Nevada. He taught for many years at Lockney, and was a member of Masonic Lodge No. 867 in that city. He was a member of the Meadow Lake Baptist Church at Arlington.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Jimmie Smith of Farmersville; a daughter, Mrs. Jimmie D. Whitlock of Lockney; two sons, Forrest Don Smith of Houston and Walter B. (Buck) Smith of Grand Prairie; eight grandchildren and two great grandchildren, and one sister, Miss Ella Smith of Josephine.

His wife is the daughter of the late Walter and Settie Canup Buck.

Mr. Smith graduated from Draughon's Business College in Dallas in 1922. He graduated from North Texas State College at Denton in 1931. He taught in schools in Collin County for 16 years,

serving as superintendent in several of the schools. The Smith family left Collin County in 1946 after Mr. Smith's doctor told him that a change of climate might help his hay fever. Mr. Smith was in administration at Crosbyton in 1947, at New Deal in 1948, then moved to Lockney in 1949 where he served as high school principal for 21 years. He received his Master's degree from West Texas State at Canyon in 1957. He retired in 1969 and was named "Man of the Year" at Lockney the same year. Mr. and Mrs. Smith returned to Collin County and have lived in Farmersville for the past 15 years.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith are Past Matron and Past Patron, Lockney Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star of Texas and Grand Cross Members. Mr. Smith was a Master Mason. He became a Mason in 1951. Mrs. Smith served as Mother Advisor of Rainbow for Girls for nine years.

The couple celebrated their golden anniversary in 1973 and had been married 62 years at the time of his death.

Their three children are Jimmie Dee Whitlock of Lockney, Forrest Don Smith of Houston and Walter (Buck) Smith of

Grand Prairie. Their grandchildren are Phineas Dee Holmes, Rhonda D. Holmes Hardin, Tonjua Whitlock, Shelton Smith, Shannon Smith, Shonda Smith, Alecia and Rhodney Smith. They have two great-great grandchildren.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith are members of the First Baptist Church.

Highlights of Mr. Smith's life were his trips with the senior classes of Lockney to Florida, New Orleans, Galveston and Houston, and receiving Man of the Year honors in 1969. Other special times were when he received a standing ovation at graduation exercises and the reception after graduation. Receiving a plaque for 21 years of faithful service to the Lockney Longhorns and his return trip to Lockney to award the Man of the Year award to the 1970 recipient. Mr. Smith missed only four and one-half days of teaching in 41 years, and he felt that this was proof that West Texas climate was beneficial to his hay fever condition. Mr. Smith once commented on his 21 years at Lockney saying they were the happiest years of his teaching career. The 1968 Lockney High School annual was dedicated to Mr. Smith in appreciation of his service and contributions to the Lockney schools.

## Social Security checks to have new look

Starting with the Social Security check delivered December 3, people in the local area will get a new style check in multiple colors.

People will no longer get the familiar green punchcard check. The new check, however, is as good as the old and is just as easy to cash.

In addition to being many-colored, the new checks show a full-length replica of the Statue of Liberty on the left side. A muted close-up of her head and torch is in the background near the right side.

The new check contains features that discourage alterations, forgeries, and counterfeiting. The new lightweight paper stock is less expensive and takes less space to store. Use of the new check is expected to result in a savings to taxpayers of about \$6 million a year.

## In times like these... By Mary Jo Fielding

Only two weeks after the Achille Lauro hijacking, Israel and the United States did what was necessary, trying once again to revive Mideast negotiations. Hoping to exploit world revulsion over the role of the PLO in the hijacking, Israel's Prime Minister Shimon Peres proposed talks with Jordan's King Hussein or a joint Jordanian-Palestinian delegation - in an international setting. He said that Israel would not meet with the PLO.

In his speech at the United Nations Peres said the state of war between Israel and Jordan should be "terminated immediately." Hussein's reaction was mostly positive. In an interview with the New York Times, he said Peres's speech showed "a determination to contribute toward the achievement of peace in our times." Reagan administration officials welcomed the Peres proposals as "statesmanlike, thoughtful and forward looking."

Meanwhile, the Reagan administra-

tion also moved quickly to limit damage from the Achille Lauro affair, and to put new momentum behind the peace efforts. Deputy Secretary of State John Whitehead was rushed to Italy, Egypt and Tunisia. His job, at least partially successful, was to placate governments infuriated by the U.S. interception of an Egyptian airliner on October 10.

Also on the move was Richard Murphy, assistant secretary of state for Near East affairs, who made a secret trip to Amman for talks with Hussein. The trip reinforced a White House announcement of plans to supply Jordan with up to 1.9 billion dollars worth of war planes and other military equipment.

One of the most important realities is the mixture of weakness, ambition, and suspicion that exists among key Arab leaders in the region. With the exception of Egypt's Mubarak and perhaps Jordan's Hussein, none is ready to make peace with Israel.

Dear Editor:

I would like to address some opinions about NBC's treatment of the issue of Texas education reforms during the November 30th telecast of *American Almanac*.

While I was watching this show, some questions came to mind on how their reporters covered the effects of House Bill 72. Even though the bill has reaped some good results, it also has many drawbacks that have taken away the incentive that extracurricular activities can provide for a student to either stay or do well in school. Here are two big questions to dwell on.

1) Why didn't the song "No Pass, No Play" [written by Earl Brose] get the amount of coverage it deserved? Even though these reporters had to conserve time by cutting some necessary footage, they should have allowed a decent portion of the song to be aired. I have known Mr. Broseh personally for some time, and feel with great conviction that he did not write the song just to make a "fast buck." Instead, he has been in activities like 4-H and band, and knows what he is talking about. And guess how much of "No Pass, No Play" was heard? Only a couple of seconds, at most. Lockney's pride in itself was at stake, and all we got was a slap in the face! Because of this, all citizens need to be outraged over this abusiveness of one of our native sons!

2) Did *American Almanac* really set forth the effort to cover all sides of the issue at hand by disregarding "No

Pass, No Play" as just another run of the-mill complaint song? The students (the ones most affected by House Bill 72) and most parents weren't even asked to express their opinions on the reforms forced upon us by Governor Mark White and Mr. H. Ross Perot. Earl's composition would have made the voice of the parent who supports any extracurricular activity heard in a very loud fashion! By NBC's neglect, an important side of the educational reforms issue was literally thrown out the window!

In conclusion, I would like those who are angered by this indiscretion of NBC to join me in a letter-writing campaign to the National Broadcasting Corporation protesting their coverage on Texas education and calling for these three things.

1) An apology to the citizens of Lockney on a future show.

2) A proper broadcast of "No Pass, No Play" in its entirety.

3) Report on the opinions of those most affected by House Bill 72 - the students and the parents.

The one thing that keeps a town together is its pride in itself; and if an outsider wants to tear down this important aspect of the life of a community, he should be told that he will have to pay the consequences if he so chooses. This is the most important fact of all that NBC will have to recognize; sooner or later. I thank you for your time and attention.

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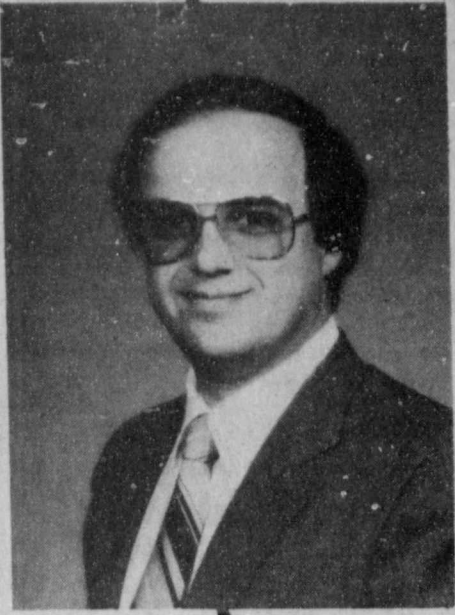

### Everlasting Father...The Fatherhood of God Luke 2:1-7

Much is said in the Old Testament about God's majesty, power, might and awesomeness. But little is said about His Fatherhood. The most vivid picture of God is that of the Great Jehovah, Ruler of the nation Israel. He is the God who speaks in lightning, earthquakes, and fire. He is seemingly a God who is unapproachable except by a few. The relationship of the people of the Old Testament is based on salvation through law, covenant, and sacrifice. It is more of a doing religion rather than a believing faith. This is not to say that God is different now than He was then. Rather our approach to Him is based on a covenant relationship with His Son, Jesus Christ. Isaiah tells of the coming Messiah and states that His name shall be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. Even though God is rarely referred to as Father in the Old Testament, this is still something the Hebrew people could relate to. They were very much family oriented even on the edge of clanship. The women at the well asked Jesus if He was greater than their father Jacob, hundreds of years before her time. But Isaiah called Jesus; the Everlasting Father. The Son is also the Everlasting Father. It seems impossible, yet it is true. It is another of the wonderful mysteries of the good news about Jesus Christ. Jesus declared that He and the Father are one. The Son is also the Father. Christ is the child born, yet He is also the Everlasting Father.

What form of man would the Christ child become? Was He a King? Yes, Christ is the King of Kings. He was born of the royal lineage and had claim to the throne of David.

Was He a Priest? Yes, the Bible often speaks of the ministry of Jesus in the temple before the altar.

Was He a Prophet? Yes, but this was not an essential to His basic nature. People may listen to prophets, but they do not necessarily love them.

Did Jesus come as a Father? Yes, and He came to represent and reveal the Father in heaven to the people of this earth. Everywhere in our world, even the heathen places, a father is the ideal of that which is good. A father loves, protects, and provides for his children. Some of our most noble thoughts and dearest memories are associated with the word father.

What does fatherhood mean in the Scriptures? It means family relationship. It means that the heavenly Father's care and provision for His children is constant and particular. It means love. It means that He gives us His home.

If God is my Father, how do I become His child? Jesus answered this question in a very straight forward manner. He stated that we must be born again. Unless we are born again we cannot see the Kingdom of God. When we accept the Christ child as Lord and Savior, only then, are we born spiritually into the Kingdom of God and into His family.

Are you a child of the King? Are you able to approach God and say "My Father" and hear the word returned, yes my son/daughter?

Fathers, we have a tremendous responsibility to our families. Father is the name Jesus most often used to describe what God is like.
