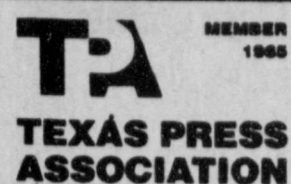

the community in recognition for their time and effort and for outstanding service to the Lockney community.

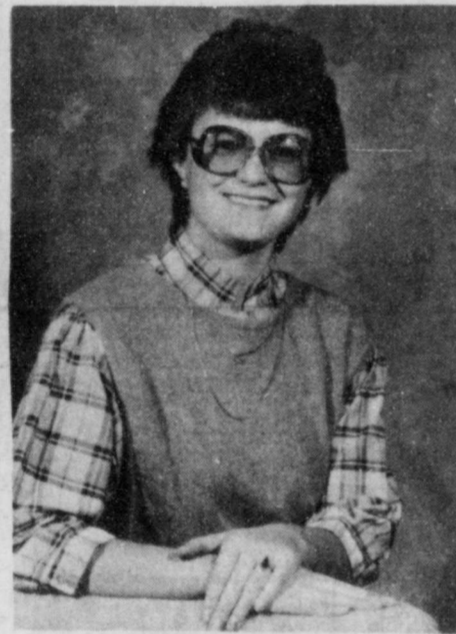
Nominations may be for outstanding service in the past year or for their continual service to the community.

Wayland Baptist University's famed International Choir will be featured in concert next Sunday, February 2, at the First Baptist Church of Lockney.

The choir will have the entire Sunday evening worship service at the church, presenting a one-hour concert. The performance is open to all interested persons.

Under the direction of W. Duane Harris, assistant professor of music at

## Financial aide counselor to be at Lockney High School

Eddie Anaya, a counselor with Learn Educational Talent Search will be at Lockney High School on February 3 to discuss financial aid with students that may need assistance in continuing their educations following graduation.

Educational Talent Search (LEARN) is a community based, federally funded project designed to motivate and encourage students to continue their education.

This continued education may be enrollment or re-enrollment in a four year college or university, a two year college, a vocational or technical college or in an adult education program.

The program may also be of assistance to adults who for whatever reason have had to leave college. The agency is designed to help those people continue in a secondary education program. They offer a wide range of financial aid services that may be of assistance to many students.

Services include counseling with stu-

dents on vocational, academic, and career choices, obtaining information on schools and available education programs, and aiding students in applications for various schools and financial aid programs.

LEARN also offered services that help students to get the kind of financial help they need, including grants, and various loans. These include Pell

Grants, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants, College Work-Study programs, National Direct Student Loans, and Guaranteed Student Loans.

There are a number of ways in which this non-profit, federally funded program can aid students and Mr. Anaya urges all students and parents to make an appointment to see him while he is in Lockney on February 3. He will be at Lockney High School all day on that date and will be available for students and any parents who would like to learn more about the program.

All money raised from the auction is used for the benefit of the county 4-H members. It is used to help pay the cost of the county 4-H members going to workshops around the state, to leader-

ship conferences and for county projects. It also helps those students who are able to go to the National and State conventions pay the costs they incur.

The 4-H organization is a worthwhile youth organization that offers numerous opportunities to the youth who join. With the help of area farmers this year's auction should make our county organization stronger.

Just a few of the items that will be up for sale at the auction are chemicals Atrazine, 2-4D, Banvel, Roundup, Dual, Prowl, Treflan and Tordon. 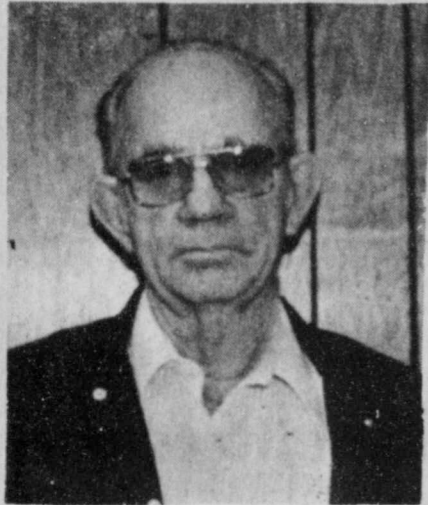
