Old timers football game organizational meeting set

Ten men file to run in local April 5 elections

Wednesday, February 19 was the deadline for signing up for the city council election to be held on April 5. At that time five men had signed up to run in the election.

Dan Smith, Ronnie Aston, Lloyd Wofford, Kim King, and Leslie Cox signed up for the three seats on the Lockney City Council. Those three seats are presently held by Paul Reece, Dub Dipprey, and Pat Frizzell.

The city council election will be held at the city hall on election day. The judge for the election will be Willis Reynolds and acting as clerks for the city election will be Kay Martin, Pat Gonzales, and Jim Bob Martin.

The school board will also be holding an election on April 5 for three seats on the board. The seats are presently held by Clar Schacht, Bill Race, and Eddie Joe Foster. The deadline for signing up for the election is March 5.

As of Monday, February 24 Schacht had signed up to run for reelection to

his chair on the board and Paul Glasson and Dickie Lambert had also signed up for the election.

Acting as the judge for the school board election will be G.B. Johnston, and assisting him as clerks will be Retha and Kenneth Wofford, and Maria Arellano. Jackie Lou Holt has been appointed as the absentee ballot clerk for the election.

In the hospital board election to be held the same day, two seats on the board, presently held by Hubert Frizzell and Chester Carthel are up for election.

Both incumbents have indicated that they would seek reelection to their posts on the board. As of Monday no other citizens had signed up to run in the hospital board election.

Clerks and the judge for the hospital board election have not yet been appointed. Anyone wishing to run in the hospital board election will have until March 12 to turn in their petitions.

Albert Scheele attends Sorghum conference

Albert Scheele recently attended the grain sorghum conference in Dallas, Texas February 17 and 18 at the Lincoln Hotel.

While there, Scheele reported that plans for the formation of a Grain Sorghum Promotion Federation had been formulated in cooperation with the Kansas Grain Sorghum Commission and the Nebraska Grain Sorghum Development Utilization and Marketing Board, and the Texas Sorghum Producers Board.

This federation will be to promote the improvement, acceptance, utilization, and efficient production of grain sorghum. Funds for the project will come from the checkoff funds of the various boards.

The federation will also promote the development of effective research, ag-

gressive marketing programs, and educational programs aimed at both the producer and the consumer of grain sorghum.

The federation will not engage in any lobbying action or activities.

In addition to meeting with other sorghum producers and promoters, Scheele was appointed to a competition task force that will evaluate competition in export markets from other countries and also in other products.

This task force will also develop plans for meeting competition with competitive quality, prices, and with information and trade services. They will also implement plans and follow up on any action taken.

Scheele is the past president and is presently a member of the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board.

Over 100 compete in Lockney power lifting

The Lockney High School Athletic Department hosted its second sanctioned power lifting meet this past weekend with over 100 high school boys participating in the event.

Lockney had six entries in the meet and overall the Lockney team placed sixth in the meet.

Lockney participants included Michael DeLeon in the first class of those weighing up to 114 pounds. DeLeon lifted a total of 570 pounds in three events including the bench, squat, and dead lifts.

Allen Stallings, in the 123 pound weight group, lifted 710 pounds and tied for first place with three other entrants in his class. Stallings ultimately placed third due to the weigh-in which broke the tie.

Johnny Silva lifted in the 165 pound group and placed fifth with a total weight of 980 pounds in his three lifts.

George Basaldua lifted 840 pounds total, in the 181 pound division and Lupe Coronado lifted 915 total in the 198 pound class. Randy Race lifted 1180 pounds in his three lifts in the 242 pound class.

The Lockney team will be participating in one more power lifting meet before the regional qualifiers are announced. The next meet will be held in Ralls on March 22 and the Lockney team is working very hard to prepare for this meet.

Team totals for those teams who attended the Lockney meet included Sweetwater 41, Levelland 35, Post 14, Ralls 13, Petersburg 12, Lockney 11, Littlefield and Sweetwater B. 9 each, Lorenzo 8, Roosevelt 7, Abilene Wylie 6, Sundown 2, and Crosbyton 1. Paducah also participated but received no points.

Stock show closes with banquet

The 42nd Annual Floyd County Junior Livestock Show drew to a close last Tuesday night in Lockney, with the awards banquet.

Over 225 attend the banquet and enjoyed a Mexican dinner, compliments of the Floyd County Farm Bureau. In addition to enjoying a meal the trophies for the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion animals as well as trophies for the Breed and Reserve Breed winners and the Herdsman, Showmanship, and Judging Awards were presented.

Lockney students receiving trophies included Wesley Teeter with the Sheep Herdsman Award, Max Green the Junior Showmanship and Robert Wofford the Senior Showmanship in the barrow division.

Results of the judging contest, which was held on Monday, February 17 were also announced at the banquet.

In the sheep division Jeff Webb came out the first place winner with 135 points, followed by Clay Adrian with 133, and Matt Mitchell with 131.

Tony Banda emerged in first place in the barrow judging contest with 145 points and Matt Mitchell came out as the third high overall individual with 382 points.

All the first place winners in the judging contest were awarded trophies.

Warren Mitchell, superintendent of the judging contest also announced at the banquet the three highest scoring adults that participated in the contest. First place was Ricky Kellison with 372 points, followed by Mark Nutt with 362, and Kenneth Holt with 351 points.

There is no East Asian equivalent of NATO. Instead the United States is committed to mutual-defense treaties, none as binding as the NATO treaty, with Japan, South Korea and the Philippines. In addition, the Shanghai communique of 1972, directed against growing Soviet influence pledged the U.S. and China to oppose "hegemony" in the area. Soviet pressure on American interests in Japan and South Korea flows out of bases in Vladivostok and elsewhere in the South Far East. To the south, the trade and oil routes upon which Japan and South Korea depend are menaced by the Soviet base at Cam Ranh Bay in Vietnam.

The most obvious direct challenge to U.S. interests in the region would be a Soviet-supported attack by North Korea against South Korea. The U.S. Second Infantry Division now stationed in South Korea would meet the initial assault, along with South Korea's 21 combat

divisions. They would be supported by combat aircraft of the U.S. Fifth Air Force from its bases in Japan and Korea and by combat elements of the U.S. Seventh Fleet now home-ported in Japan. Initial reinforcements would come from 111 Marine Amphibious Force now stationed on Okinawa, from the U.S. 25th Infantry Division in Hawaii and from the U.S. 13th Air Force in the Philippines.

A less violent, but difficult, strategic test in the area is already underway in the Communist guerrilla war in the Philippines. It could lead ultimately to the loss of U.S. air and naval bases at Clark and Subic Bay. That could severely weaken American ability to project power in the region. Here, crucial political decisions that will determine the U.S. course, how to treat the present government, whether to contemplate the use of American power, are still pending.
