active in UIL events.

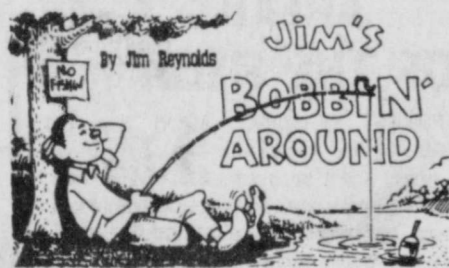
She has competed in number sense two years and the one act play for one year. She is also a member of the 4-H Club.

The annual awards assembly for Lockney High School seniors was held at 11:00 a.m. Friday, May 23, and many of the seniors received medals, plaques and certificates for their accomplishments in high school.

In addition to the awards, several scholarship recipients were also announced. These included the Elvin Lyon Scholarship, in the amount of \$100.00, which was presented to Tony Saucedo by Clar Schacht.

The Elaine Hardy Memorial Scholarship was presented by Dr. Wayne Cooper to Karen Ford and Coy Holley in the amount of \$150.00 each.

Stacy Manley was presented the VFW Scholarship in the amount of \$200.00 by O.C. Allison. Stacy will also receive a one year scholarship to a State of Texas school and a one year scholarship to a church related school in addition to a \$100 per semester scholarship to West Texas State University.

The state and church school scholarships are presented to the Valedictorian of the class each year and the West Texas State endowments are presented to the National Honor Society members.

Also receiving \$100.00 per semester scholarships to West Texas are Daniel Ramirez, Heather Holt, Monica Torres, Jessie Castro, Linda Stephan, Coy Holley, Ronnie Ford, Shandra Bybee and Rachelle Ford. 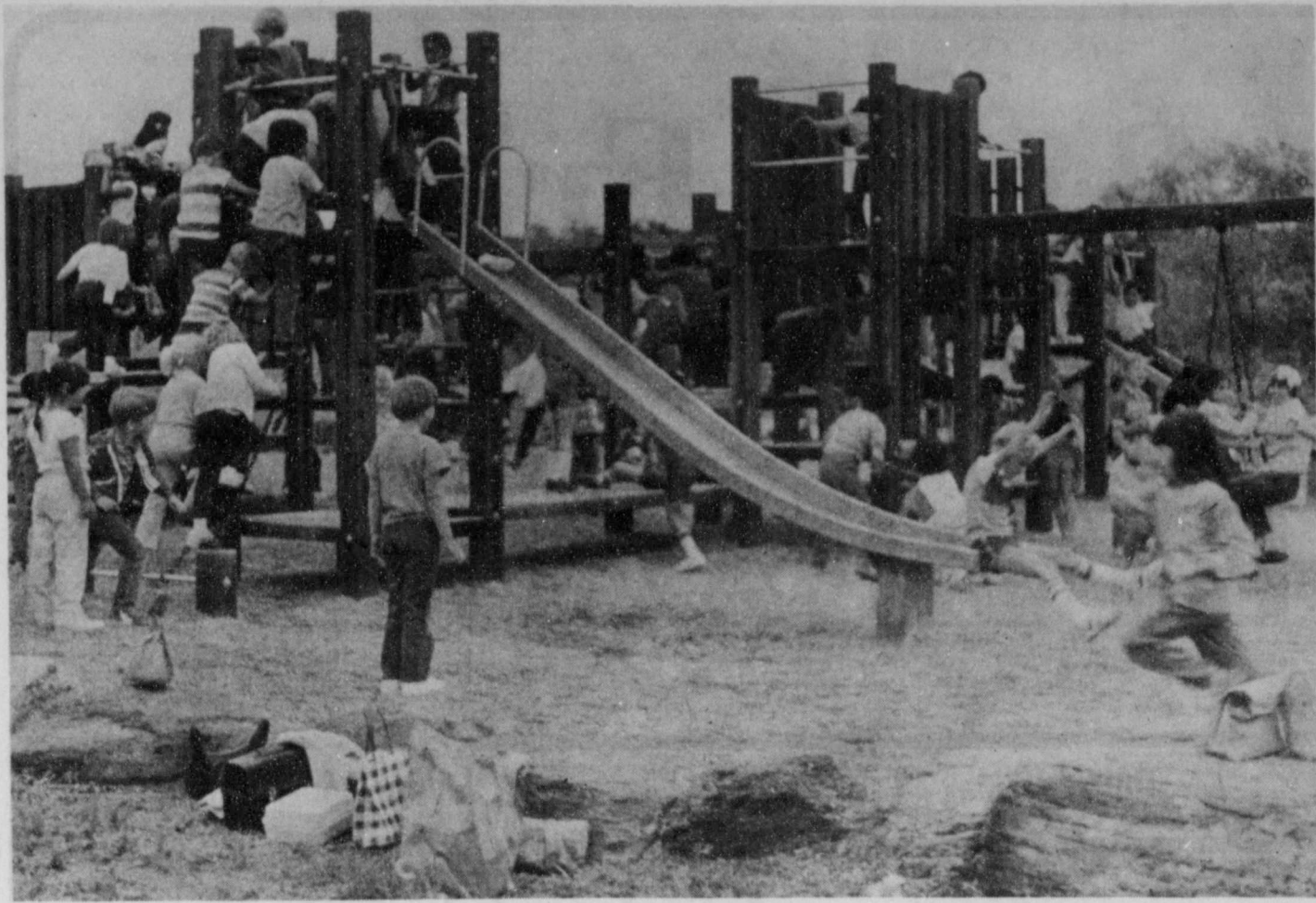

Copeland named outstanding pioneer man

J.D. Copeland, 1986 Floyd County Pioneer Man of the Year, was born 1/4 mile South of Lockney in October of 1908. When he was a young boy in 1918 he sat looking out of the old two story brick building on East 3rd street when he should have been studying, and watched workmen erect the present water tower which was moved to Lockney from Sweetwater.

Copeland started first grade in the old Lockney Christian College where his father, Frank Copeland, taught voice and music. The college was discontinued in 1916. He went to school at Lone Star and had his four high school years at Gunter College at Gunter, Texas in Grayson County where his father was teaching music. He took an accounting course by correspondence from the International Accounting Society.

His first job was "busting flats" at Consumers Fuel. He then was clerk for two years and was manager for ten

years. He became business manager for the hospital in 1947, when Dr. D.R. Foster came to Lockney. In 1948, he helped to organize the Lockney General Hospital that was located above the Greer Drug Store and he was the general manager. He was instrumental in obtaining the buildings that are currently being used as the hospital and was on the committee that hired Dr. W.J. Mangold.

He farmed from 1952 until 1956 when he opened an office on Main and began an insurance business and an Income Tax Service. He still maintains an office in that location.

He has been a Rotary member since 1945 and has served in all offices of that club. In December of 1979 he was awarded the prestigious PAUL HARRIS FELLOW award. He has been song leader for the Rotary Club for as long as he has been a member.

He has been a member of the

Chamber of Commerce since 1941 and has acted as treasurer and bookkeeper for 28 years. He was selected as Chamber of Commerce MAN OF THE YEAR in 1970. He has assisted in hanging the Christmas Decorations for the Chamber since that project was begun.

He has been on the Lockney City Council for 26 years. He was serving on the council when 100 city blocks were paved. He is currently serving his second term as Mayor. He is serving on the board of the South Plains Association of Governments.

Mr. Copeland is a member of the Executive Board of the Floyd County Museum and is a member of the Floyd County Historical Commission. He has been an active supporter of the Pioneer Day Celebration in Floyd County for many years.

He is serving as president of the

Lockney Cemetery Association. A position he assumed in 1977.

He was ordained as an Elder of the Church of Christ in 1967 and has served as treasurer of the congregation since 1950. He has been a song leader in the church for as long as any member can recall.

He was honored by the Odd Fellows with the "Good Citizenship Award" in February of 1979.

J.D. and Arla Wheeler were married in 1934. Their marriage was blessed with three children; Bob, who was killed in a tragic auto accident in 1961, Celia and Frances who both reside in Lubbock. They have six grandchildren and one great-grandson.

His good nature, faithful leadership, and Christian life has been a blessing to all who have come in contact with him during his lifetime.

Scarcely a day passes on the West Bank without a fresh episode of violence, a bomb blast, a Molotouf cocktail hurled at an Israeli patrol, a volley of stones rained on passing Israeli cars.

The culprits often are Arab youths who had not yet been born when Israel seized East Jerusalem, West Bank and Gaza territories during the 1967 Six-Day War. "They know no other reality but Israeli occupation and they are more determined than any other generation to fight Israel," says Tama Prat, a Tel Aviv University terrorism expert.

The present campaign has made life hard for many Palestinians. But even more troubling to the 1.3 million of them who live on the West Bank and in Gaza is the belief that Israel is

squeezing them off their land.

The Arab complaints are reinforced by a private Israeli study, conducted by the respected West Bank Data Project, which shows that Israel has seized 52 percent of all land in occupied territories. Behind that statistic are Arabs who have lost land they have tilled for generations. On a desolate hilltop northwest of the West Bank the Israel Nature Authority recently ripped up 6,000 olive and almond trees from terraced orchards. The Israelis say the land is theirs. However, Amina Mustafa, 60, insisted the trees had been in his family since antiquity.

The problem is that self-determination to most Arabs means a separate state. To Israel it means local autonomy only.

Sales tax rebates down

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks on Friday, May 9, to the 1,015 Texas cities that levy the one percent city sales tax. The checks mailed out on Friday totaled \$108.1 million dollars. May checks represent taxes collected on sales made in March and reported to the comptroller by April 20.

Floydada received a rebate check for \$12,541.22 this month as compared to a rebate of \$12,364.17 in May of last year. This brings the total payments for 1986 to \$43,344.52. Payments in 1985 totaled \$45,960.61 at this time. The current total represents a decrease of 5.69% from last year.

Lockney's rebate totaled \$6,032.68 this month. The rebate for the same


period in 1985 was \$7,186.53. Total rebates for 1986 now stand at \$19,610.63. Rebates at this time in 1985 totaled \$21,764.12. This represents a decrease of 9.89% from last year.

Combined totals from Floydada and Lockney add up to an over-all decrease of 7.04% on a county wide basis. Two of the surrounding counties also posted decreases. Crosby County rebates are down 13.76% and Swisher is down 1.07%.

Other counties in the area noted increases. Motley County is up by 6.25%, Lubbock County is up by 0.95%, Hale County is up 5.42%, and Briscoe County is up by 0.41%.

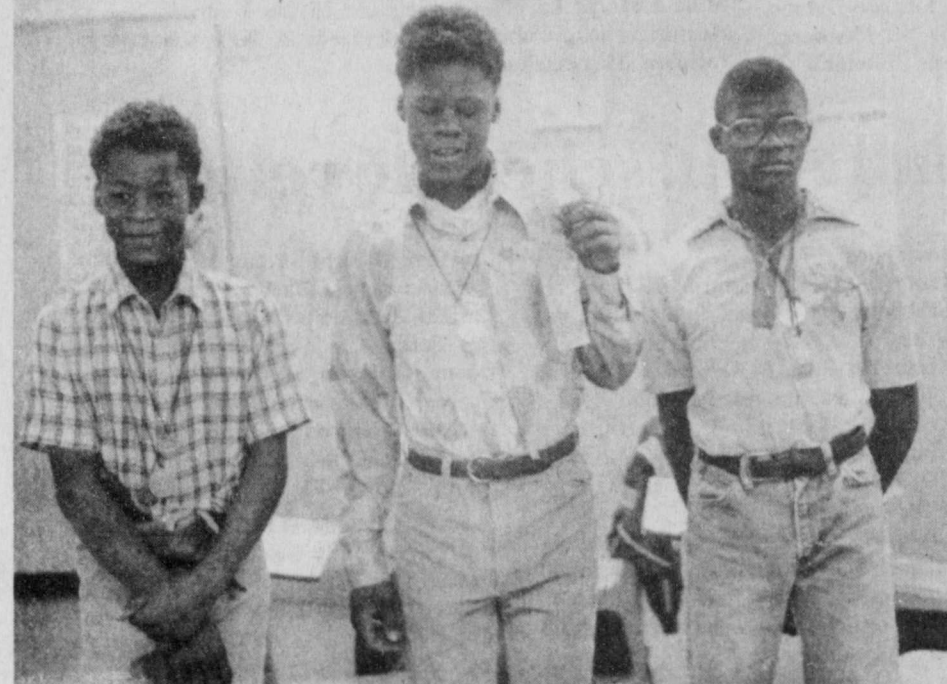
