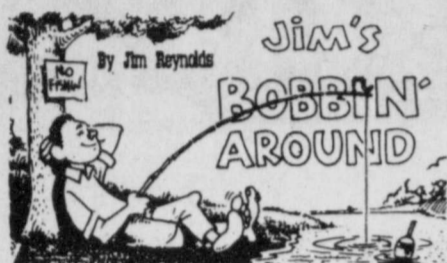

BOOSTING A 'NEW CROP'

With its agriculture economy sick, Briscoe County is turning to a new source of income . . . recreation. The Briscoe County Extension Livestock Committee is promoting "the abundance of aoudad sheep, quail, wild turkey, dove hunting and other forms of recreation."

We have to tip our hat to our Briscoe neighbors for their foresight and efforts. Recreational opportunities have been available in certain eastern South Plains-Panhandle counties all along but they have been mainly unexplored and unpromoted.

Mackenzie Lake is a new recreational source in recent years. It draws fishermen, water skiers and campers from throughout the area as well as affording the same opportunities for citizens of Lockney, Floydada, Silvertown and Tulia, who are a part of the water authority.

The amphitheatre in northern Crosby County will be opening in August. Already, reservations have been received from as far away as Austin.

According to The Tulia Herald, "Donald Adams is about to break into a new tourist attraction at the Adams Ranch, east of Tulia . . . cowboy breakfasts. He served one Saturday morning for several Tulia civic leaders and he'll serve another during the Tulia Lake Jamboree."

"With a lot of promotion and publicity, Donald could very well entice a lot of people through this way . . . tourists spend money . . . all of this could increase 'people and cash flow' right through the streets of Tulia.

"Both Swisher and Briscoe farmers-ranchers know pheasant hunting pays off."

Obviously, sources for new money are limited in this area, but we admire the individuals and communities who are TRYING. We wish them luck in their endeavors . . . and suggest that people in Floyd County do some similar looking.

Fishermen score

H. R. Fulton of Canyon and E. L. Liedtke of Amarillo brought in two strippers weighing eight pounds each and one walleye weighing seven and one-quarter pounds from Mackenzie Lake. The fish were caught in deep water on doll flies.

Brent Watts of Lubbock caught a four and one-half pound bass, using plastic worms, up Cope Creek in the brush.

John DeWald and Red Jennings of Amarillo landed three bass, all weighing two and one-half pounds each, on rapala and one channel cat weighing four and one-half pounds on cut bait, up Tule Creek.

"Several nice crappie are still being caught in the late evening hours, catfish are improving, bass are excellent and a lot of nice two and one-half pound to four and one-half pound fish are being caught on buzz bait and plastic worms," according to lake officials.

Walleye fishing is "good", with one seven and one-half pounder caught. Two eight pound strippers were caught in the late afternoon by trollers.

"Catfish fishing is improving using cut bait, and crappie fishing is good."

the 1986-87 school year.

It is projected that the enrollment for Lockney Independent School District for next year will begin at about 683 students. This breaks down into 390 in elementary school, 139 in junior high and 161 in high school.

Breakdowns by grades include: early childhood 20, kindergarten, 65, first grade 73, second grade 61, third grade 65, fourth grade 50 and fifth grade 56. This enrollment is up for elementary school by 34 students over the 1985-86 year. The figures for elementary school include six failures in the first grade.

For junior high the enrollment breakdown includes 46 students entering sixth grade, 45 entering seventh grade and 48 entering the eighth grade. It also includes four failures from the sixth grade four from the seventh grade and one from the eighth grade.

The high school enrollment breakdown includes: 36 students classified as freshmen, 40 sophomores, 49 juniors, and 41 seniors. Seven students in high school will be repeating one grade.

Also discussed at the meeting were the results of the TEAMS tests taken by the third, fifth, seventh and ninth

grades.

Results from the third grade were very good with 50 students taking the test.

Only one student failed to master all the math skills, three failed to master all the reading skills and 13 had problems with the writing skills.

The fifth grade also showed very good results as 100 percent of the 42 students mastered math and reading and only six had problems with writing skills.

Seventh grade students also mastered most of the test. Only three of the 55 did not master all the math skills, only 10 failed to master all the reading skills and 10 also had some problems with the writing skills on the test.

As in years past the ninth grade scores were the lowest on the test. Of those, 54 students taking the test 20 did not master the math, 17 did not master the reading and of the 75 students tested in handwriting, 47 failed to master the basics.

These test results were very good for the third, fifth and seventh grades and the ninth grade scores showed the same pattern as in years past by dropping in the test scores.



RAIN, RAIN, GO AWAY—Will the highway department ever be able to close these signs? Rains fell again Monday afternoon making farmers wonder if they will ever get caught up on plowing and field work. Mondays rains fell much like those in south Texas, in different spots and in different amounts. Cedar Hill, South Plains, and Sterley all got rains on Monday. Also on Highway 378 north of Lockney the rains started about the Lockney Feedyard and continued north to within two miles of Lone Star. Lockney received a very light rain from the cloud.

Area wheat harvest nears finish

In a check with Lockney area grain elevators on Monday, June 23, it was reported that the 1986 wheat harvest is between 5% and 35% complete, depending on location.

Delton Stone reported from the Lockney Coop, South Plains and Sterley areas that they are about 85% complete with the harvest. However, he did comment, "We may not get all of that in. The rain last week had made the weed problem so bad that some of the wheat was unharvestable and now with the rains over the weekend it will just make the remaining wheat tough to cut." When asked if the farmers were satisfied with the yields of their crops Stone said, "They are more surprised than anything. The yields are down from last year but the wheat is making better than it looked."

Herman Graham of Muncy Elevator said that the farmers he has spoken with seem to be disappointed with their yields and Joe Nance of Providence reported the same thing of the farmers

in his area.

Graham reported that the farmers in his area are about 75% complete and Nance reported that the farmers in Providence are about 90% complete.

Herbert Dudley of Patterson Grain and the Lone Star Grain Company reported that the farmers that use their elevators are over 95% complete. "We have three or four farmers that have not harvested all of their wheat," said Dudley.

Barwise Elevator reports that they are about two thirds complete. "But if the rain doesn't stop we may never get

all the wheat in."

Lockney area farmers have harvested about 41,899,920 pounds of wheat total, which equals 698,332 bushels of the 1986 crop.

If the rains continue all of the crops may never get harvested as the weeds make it difficult to run the combines in fields, farmers report. Rain chances have been forecast for the remainder of the week and farmers may have to wait a while before even planning to get into the fields to harvest the remainder of the crop.

'Aiken Farmer' opening

The Aiken Farmer, vegetable stand and gasoline station will be opening Tuesday, July 1, in Aiken, just west of the post office building.

Owner Russell McAnally invites everyone to drop by Tuesday for free coffee, soft drinks and cookies. McAnally, a retired United Methodist minister, and his wife, Elsie moved to Lockney one year ago. They are parents of three sons and a daughter, Mrs. D.K.

Jackson, also of Lockney.

McAnally says that the vegetables currently available from his truck garden are squash, green beans (both pinto and stringless) and onions, but tomatoes will be ready soon.

The Aiken Farmer also will carry fresh country eggs, soft drinks, snacks and bags of ice. Hours will be 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Saturday.

Come and hear "Reborn" at the Aiken Baptist Church Sunday, June 29, at 6:00 p.m. at the fifth Sunday night singing.



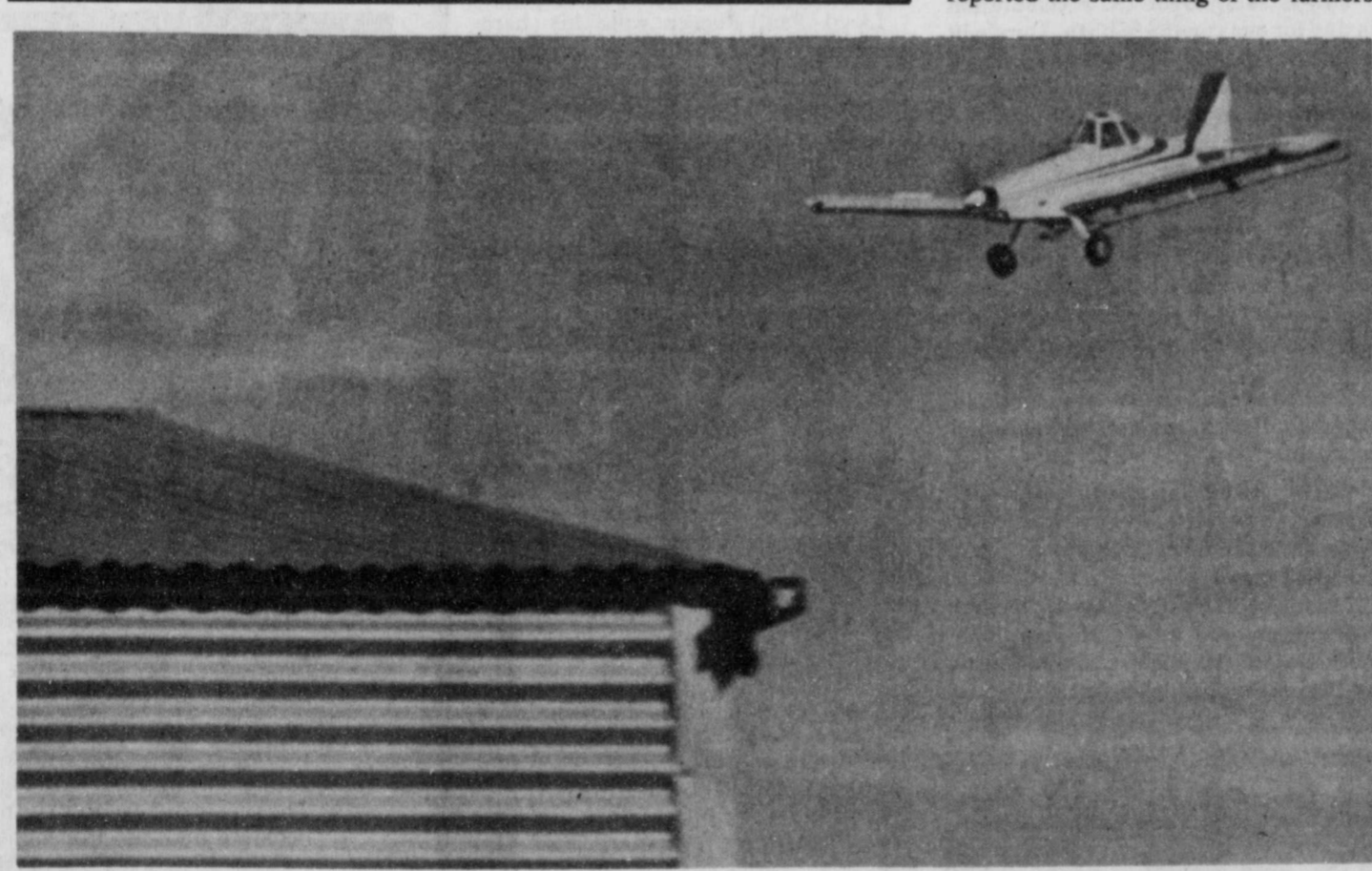

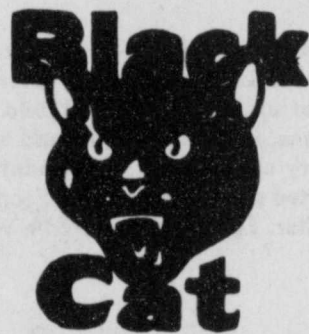

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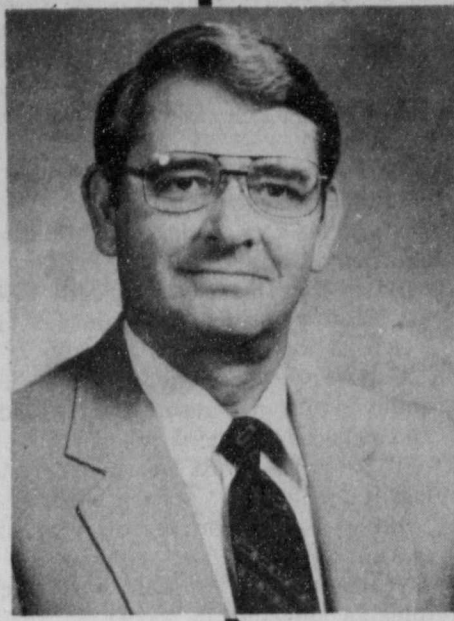
