| Continued from Page 8 <br> original trainer left and a new trainer used a reward to entice the goats to exercise, the results were reversed. <br> For animal researchers, understanding animal stress can help minimize trauma to the animals, either by eliminating avoidable stressors such as noise or insensitive handling, or by modifying the animal's perception of the stress. <br> Allowing the animal to feel some control over its environment by giving it a predictable sequence of events, or changing the animal's perception of the stressful procedure by associating it stressful procedure by associating with a pleasant one could help reduce the animal's fear or aversion to experimental procedures. <br> Producers can employ similar techniques to minimize stress in livestock, the authors say.
