## Teacher nominees are sought

Dimmitt's 2001 Teacher of the Year will be honored at the 54th annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet on Jan. 19, 2002, and nominations for the award are being sought now.

Nomination forms are available at the Chamber of Commerce office at 115 W. Bedford St. in Dimmitt and should be completed and returned to the Chamber by Jan. 3, 2002, for consideration.

Nominations may be made by letter, if one wishes, but should address the selection criteria specified on the nomination


Nominations are held three years for consideration, if a nominee is not selected.

The selection committee will consider four general areas in choosing the teacher to be honored: teaching awareness (involvement and performance), professional recognition (endeavors and/or growth), community pride (civic and church involvement) and ways in which the teacher makes a difference in students' lives.

"The nomination can be made rather easily, but it does take a few minutes," said Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Bill Sava.

Sava suggested that nominations be made by any adults or students and their parents.

With dashed hopes of a new farm policy this year, farmers now go into the next crop year with the lowest safety net in decades, Texas Farmer's Union (TFU) said.

"Farmers and Ranchers and their lenders had united in asking the Senate to move forward with a farm bill so they might have certainty as they planned for their next round of crops", said TFU President Wes Sims. "Unfortunately, a minority of senators turned a deaf ear to the pleas from the countryside and voted against enacting a farm bill this year."

Immediate Senate action on the bill would have meant a \$775 million increase in much needed assistance for Texas agricultural producers each of the next five years.

"We commend Senators Daschle and Harkin as well as Representatives Combest and Stenholm for their steadfast efforts to restore a safety net to rural America," Sims said. "We are extremely disappointed that a minority of senators did not share their same sense of Falling six votes short of the urgency to restore the rural economy which has been in a depressed state for five years."





## Steps may help protect against winter illnesses

First and foremost, she advises people to "wash your hands. That's a key thing because it will "We really need to be keep you from sharing germs."

In fact, for prevention of all kinds of infectious diseases, "hand-washing is the No. 1 issue," she said.

Washing hands will drastically reduce the number of germs shared by individuals.

Make sure and have a ready supply of paper tissues to catch those sneezes and coughs, and then be thrown away. Rice said cloth handkerchiefs do not provide the same safety that paper tissues do because handkerchiefs are kept close at hand after being used-which can spread germs and illness too.

Besides, a ready supply of paper tissues can help prevent children from wiping their noses on their sleeves, which is another way germs get passed

Children often have germs to pass around. Rice quoted a pediatrician who once told her: "The only people who get sick

more often than toddlers are their mothers."

That's why teachers, day care workers and others who spend large amounts of time with small children are among those recommended to get flu shots first. Flu shots can help anyone stay healthy, but they are especially recommended for those older than 65, people with conditions such as diabetes, heart disease or other chronic illnesses.

Another way to protect against disease is to keep the immune system functioning at its best, Rice said. "Remember, our bodies have very powerful immune systems to protect us from infections; unfortunately, we do many things to keep that system from working to its greatest level of effectiveness."

To stay as healthy as possible, Rice advised:

- ◆ Don't smoke or use other tobacco products.
- ♦ If you must smoke, don't do it around others-especially children.
- ♦ Exercise for at least 30 minutes, five times a week.
- ◆ Eat at least five servings of fruits and vegetables each day.
- Get a full eight hours of sleep each night.
- ♦ Don't drink more than two alcoholic drinks per day.
- ◆ Control stress. Stay current on





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## Thornberry pleased with Congress' accomplishments

Mac Thornberry (TX-13) is pleased with some of the accomplishments made by Washington this past year.

This has been a fairly productive year in Washington," Thornberry said. "Some of the things I have been pushing for several years were passed in the House this year-things like tax relief, a comprehensive energy

plan and a new farm bill". "We've made a good start on the war against terrorism, but there is a lot of work left to do". Congress has taken action on:

- Protect Transportation Security - This plan establishes strict guidelines for airport security and gives the president the flexibility to implement the plan.
- Enhance Domestic Security - strengthens control of our borders, improve law enforcement information gathering, enhance foreign intelligence tools, increase penalties for terrorism, broaden the definition of terrorist acts and protect against abuse of new police powers.
- Protest Public Health Security - Three days after the attacks, the House responded with authorization for force against those responsible. The Defense Authorization Act ensures

that the military's needs are met while providing \$45.2 million for construction at Sheppard Air Force Base and an additional \$40 million for the infrastructure improvements, stockpile stewardship and security at the Pantex Plant.

Congress has also worked on the following national priorities:

- Tax Relief The President has signed legislation that provides a permanent reduction of individual tax rates. This relief repeals the marriage and death taxes, doubles the child tax credit to \$1,000 and increases IRA contribution limits to \$5,000.
- · Provide a Balanced Energy Plan - The House passed the SAFE Act, which decreases our dependence on foreign oil, promotes conservation and provides clean, affordable and available energy to America.
- A New Farm Bill The House passed the Farm Security Act, a measure designed to strengthen the safety net for the American farmer while continuing to provide the flexibility to plant what they want.
- Strengthen Education -Passed the No Child Left

Behind Act, which would improve accountability, expand choices for parents, give state and local school districts less federal constraints and protect school prayer.

 Secure the Economy - The House passed an economy security bill aimed at creating jobs and keeping the recession as brief and shallow as possible by, among other things, providing health care tax credits and unemployment assistance to displaced workers and relief from the Alternative Minimum Tax.

## Training will begin in January

Texas Cooperative Extension's popular Master Marketer education program will be returning to the Texas Panhandle in January.

The Amarillo session will focus on the principle commodities of the area: wheat, feed grains and cattle. Surveys of the first five classes suggests that participants use their new knowledge to increase their gross revenues from roughly 3% to 10% (or over \$30,000) on average, annually.

Statewide demand for the program continues to grow. The winter program slated for Amarillo will be held at the Texas Agricultural Research and Extension Center. The first two-day session will begin on Jan. 16-17, 2002, with the following sessions slated for Jan, 30-31, Feb. 13-14 and Feb. 27-28.

Registration fee is \$250. Participants must maintain a commitment to work with their county agent to try and start or revitalize an existing marketing club.

Program costs primarily are met by grants from sponsors including the Texas Corn Producers Board, Texas Wheat Producers Association, Texas Farm Bureau, Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and the Cotton State Support Commit-

"We're looking for a few good marketers who wish to update their own skills, and individuals who will help their neighbors do the same," said Dr. Steve Amosson, Extension farm management economist.

Nationally recognized, the Texas marketing training is an in-depth, intensive risk management education program. Instructors teach participants how to develop marketing plans, evaluate marketing alternatives, manage production and price risk in addition to the skills and discipline necessary to execute the plan.

The 64-hour curriculum is offered as four, two-day sessions held every two weeks. It is considered the most intensive marketing and risk management training provided by Extension anywhere in the United States.

The instructors are top professionals from industry and universities around the country. A wide range of topics are covered to enhance marketing and risk management skills.

"We use case study examples and simulation exercises whenever possible," said Amosson.

Students gain experience using real tools that they will put into action on their own farm and ranch operations.

Children believe what their parents tell them. Especially, if they hear things repeated over and over again. If you stop and listen to what you say to your child, especially when you are angry, you may not believe your ears. Children are easy targets when we let pressure build up in our lives.

The next time you feel so pressured that you are about to say something to a child (or an adult) that you will regret, STOP! Try some of the following alternatives:

1. Put your hands over your mouth. Count to 20. Say the alphabet our loud.

2. Stop in your tracks. Press your lips together and breathe deeply.

3. Phone a friend.

4. If someone can watch the child, go outside for a leisurely

walk. 5. Take a hot bath or splash cold water on your face.

6. Write down your thought and feelings.

7. Close your eyes and imagine your hearing what your child hears.

These simple things may help both you and your child feel better about themselves. You gain confidence in your selfcontrol and your child does not question his or her personal


If these steps do not help, it could be a sign of other stuff that you may need to seek a professional who can work with



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## TDH urges public to be alert for hantavirus pulmonary syndrome

The death fast month of an Oklahoma girl due to hantavirus pulmonary syndrome serves as a reminder to residents of the Texas Panhandle and South Plains region to take precautions when dealing with rodent droppings and nests.

At this time of year, people may become at risk for exposure as they remove decorations from storage or when the items are returned to storage after the holidays.

Supplemental feeding of livestock during the winter may also increase the risk of exposure for livestock owners who have to load hay to feed that has been stored where rodents can have access.

Humans are usually infected when they inhale dust contaminated by saliva, urine, or feces of infected rodents. Humans may also be infected by rodent bites, and when material contaminated with rodent urine and feces is introduced into broken skin. Anytime evidence of rodent droppings is seen, or rodent 'nests are encountered, critical steps should be taken before any clean-up is attempted or the area is disturbed.

Self-protection is critical, so the use of rubber gloves, eye protection and a good quality mask are recommended. Prior to initiating the cleaning process,

open any windows and doors in areas and materials by clearing the room to allow the air to circulate through the room.

Spray the area with a solution of one part bleach in nine parts of water, or another disinfectant that will kill viruses. If rodent carcasses or nest materials are in barns. found, spray them down with the disinfectant, too. Allow the disinfectant to remain on the surfaces for at least 30 minutes.

To keep the amount of dust at a minimum, spray the disinfectant a second time just prior to beginning the cleaning process and before removing any nesting materials or careasses.

If a person develops flu-like symptoms after cleaning a rodent-infested area, a physician should be contacted and the possibility of hantavirus pulmonary syndrome should be evaluated.

Preventing hantavirus pulmonary syndrome also involves controlling rodent activity in and outside of the home or storage buildings by implementing the following procedures:

- \* Keep kitchen and food preparation areas clean and store food and trash in containers with tight lids.
- ♦ Plug potential entry points in the exterior of the structure
- with steel wool or caulk.

- ♦ Keep garbage cans and wood piles off the ground and away from buildings.
- ◆ Elevate hay and feed stacks
- ♦ Store pet food in closed containers and avoid leaving pet

food out overnight.
