# Jim Clark selected new athletic director-coach

Three days after Bob Purser's resignation became effective as athletic director-head football coach of the Lockney school system, his successor had been named.

J.A. (Jim) Clark is the new AD-head coach. The school board made the decision Monday night.

"I'm tickled to death with the selection and excited that he accepted," Supt. W.H. (Dub) Hallmark told The Beacon on Tuesday morning. With the "target date" for Clark's arrival placed at next Monday, May 11, Hallmark remarks that "it will be a big plus for him to come in before school is out. It's important that he be with the kids before school is out." This timing is expected to "set the trend for the kids during the summer" as they individually prepare for the '87 football season.

Supt. Hallmark is "certainly pleased with the smooth transition

and make assignments" after arriving in Lockney, according to the superintendent. Coach Clark will "bring in one or more coaches." Both Clark and his wife, Judy,

are Claude natives. His coaching career began during the 1973-74 school year as head junior high (seventh grade) boys coach in all sports at Quanah. The following year he joined the Bishop system, serving during 1974-75 as varsity linebacker coach, head junior varsity football, junior varsity basketball, head girls track and

off-season program coach. He had various assignments at Bishop, including varsity secondary coach for the District 30-AA champions (8-1-1 record) in 1977. Clark was promoted to varsity defensive coordinator, head junior varsity football, head boys track and offseason program coach in 1978-79. The following year, he was named

and Lockney is AA, Clark "doesn't view the move here as a demotion." He has informed Lockney school officials that "the A's (classification) don't mean a lot; some of the better coaches in the state" are in smaller systems.

Since both Coach and Mrs. Clark are Claude natives, they invision the move to Lockney as an opportunity to move closer to "home." His mother resides in the area.

Judy Clark, presently a secretary at Celanese Engineering Resins, Inc., will be seeking secretarial employment.

The couple are parents of two sons, Jimmy Aron Clark Jr., 18, a senior at Bishop High School who plans to enroll in college, and Jason Lee Clark, 9.

The 41-year-old coach was graduated from Claude High School, attended Clarendon Junior College and received a B.S. degree with majors in both physical education

Mrs. Latimer, 52, was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Frank Lockman.

The victim's husband, Royce Latimer, was claimed by death on January,

A standout athlete in three sports - football, basketball and track — in high school, Clark was a four-year letterman in track at Wayland, competing in one-, twoand three-mile runs. 
to 23 rabbits is \$1.50 and 25 or over \$1.25. Late fee is \$2.00.



### PLAYOFF YEARS

Coach Purser's Longhorn football teams have posted a 28-19-7 record, including two playoff years. The district champions of 1984 advance to the area level and the '85 co-champs played in bi-district.

Purser and his family moved to Lockney in the spring of 1982 from Big Spring, where he served as offensive line coach. The Pursers immediately became popular in the community, as well as with the younger set, and were named "Family of the Year" two years ago at the Chamber of Commerce United Methodist Church.

Explaining his future home, Coach Purser says "about 11 miles of houses" lie between Midland and the suburb of Greenwood, which has its own school district although it is not an incorporated town.

For many years, the school involved only kindergarten through eighth grade. Basketball was introduced at the school "about 20 years ago," and the Rangers have been successful in both basketball and track.

Greenwood's football program has yet to reach that plateau. The gridiron sport was launched only eight years ago.

The school has been elevated from Class A to AA and then to AAA (last year) in the short span of "six or seven years." Present high school enrollment of "around 300" is projected to reach 400 "in a couple of years."

## Thomas, Garza qualify for state track trials

Second place finishes in the Region I track meet have kept alive the season for Lady Horn Ron Thomas and Longhorn Eddie Garza, who have earned trips to Austin for the "big show."

The Lockney athletes are among five from this district who have qualified for the state trials.

Thomas threw the discus 107'4" to place second behind Pettit of Clarendon, who had a toss of 110'2". The Lady Horn star bettered third place finisher Waluski of McCamey by three inches.


He immediately headed "home" and "came back to work for Southwestern Bell," which bridged his military service to his telephone career and started him back to work in Lockney.



### Why Did This Happen To Me?

### **By Pastor Travis Curry**

"Verily, verily, I say unto you, Except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die, it abideth alone: but if it die, it bringeth forth much fruit." - John 12:24.

Jesus is giving us the reason that He had to die on Mount Calvary. He was explaining His death to His disciples as He often did in order to prepare them for that dreadful event. He was saying, "When it happens, this is WHY this happened to me." Jesus was telling them, "I'm like a grain of wheat that has to be planted in the earth and die in order to produce many grains of wheat."

One question that often comes to man is this: Why did this happen to me? We often ask, "Why do I have to go through this?" This question is one that is raised time and time again. "Why did I have to get cancer?" "Why did my child die?" "Why does my son have an incurable disease?"

There are at least three Biblical reasons that seemingly bad things happen to men. We will deal briefly with the first two and concentrate mostly on the third.

The first reason that "bad" things happen to us is this: the judgment of God. The angel of the Lord smote Herod the King because he gave not God the glory, and he was eaten of worms, and he died. In Acts Chapter 13 Elymas the sorcerer was blinded and went about seeking someone to lead him by the hand. Hebrews 12:6 tells us, "For whom the Lord loveth he chasteneth, and scourgeth every son whom he receiveth." The judgment of God is one of the reasons that people have problems.

A second reason that "bad" things come our way is this: God is trying to test your faith. Read James 1:2 and James 1:12. II Peter 1:6-7 also tells us something about this testing business: "Wherein ye greatly rejoice, though for a season, if need be, ye are in heaviness through manifold temptations (or testings): that the TRIAL of your FAITH, being much more PRECIOUS than of GOLD that perisheth, though it be TRIED BY FIRE, might be found unto the praise and honor and glory at the appearing of Jesus Christ." A special crown and a special reward is reserved for those who endure testing successfully.

There is yet a third reason that "bad" things happen or a third answer to the question, "Why do I have to go through this?" Why did Jesus have to die? It was so He could bring forth MUCH FRUIT. In John 15:2 Jesus said, "Every branch in me that beareth not fruit he taketh away: and every branch that beareth fruit, he purgeth it (or pruneth it), that it may bring forth MORE FRUIT." Why did this happen to me? Who do I have to go through this? The answer is that we must be pruned, we must be broken, before we can be used. Why did this happen to me? It may be that God is getting ready to use you as He has never used you before.

child of God. He stole from his brother; he deceived his poor old blind father; and he doubts that God can take care of him as he goes to meet his brother Esau. In Genesis 32 God had to break Jacob before He could bless him. He had to push Jacob's thigh out of joint before Jacob could become Israel, a Prince of God.

Let me say this: if there is no breaking, there is no blessing. Saul could not become Paul without a breaking on the road to Damascus. Peter could not be greatly used of God until he went out and wept bitterly. Adoriam Judson was broken on the mission field before God used him. David Livingston was broken in Africa before he was a great blessing. Some of the most precious hymns that we have came from a broken vessel. Many of the greatest preachers of today have had a precious child taken in death. They have children born deaf or blind. They have suffered much heartache and sorrow and pain.

Now in closing I want to leave just a few more thoughts. First of all, nobody enjoys suffering and pain, but it is far better to be broken than not to be used. Secondly, the harder we get, the harder it will be for God to break us and the harder it is to break us, the more pain we will feel. Therefore, if we are wise, we will resist being hardened by sin. A third thought is this: don't rebel against the breaking. The more God wants to use you the more He has to break you. And finally, breaking does not force the release of the spiritual man, but it DOES make his release possible. After a period of breaking then is the very best time to attempt great things for God.

There are three Bible answers to the question, "Why did this happen to me?" It is God's judgment, or you are being tested, or God is breaking you so that He can use you.







# State's farm receipts down but cash income steady

### By James R. Supak

**Extension Agronomist-Cotton** Cotton planting seed supplies on the Texas High Plains will be limited in 1987. It appears there is adequate seed of acceptable quality for the first planting but supplies of certain varieties are already in short supply.

Some growers may have to change varieties or accept seed from lots with standard germination below 80 percent or Cool-Warm Vigor Index (CWVI) values of 120 or less.

Should the need for above normal replanting be encountered, growers are likely to experience difficulties in obtaining quality planting seed, especially of the faster maturing varieties.

As always, it is important to get an acceptable stand from the first planting. There isn't much that can be done about hail, washing rains and sandstorms that take out the first stand. However, some precautions can be taken to avoid poor stands or replanting due to factors. related to seed quality, planting dates and planting techniques.

Establishing planting seed quality is the first step toward getting an early, uniform stand of cotton. Good quality, high vigor seed provide better germination and emergence under stress conditions such as cool, wet weather, planting too deep, crusting, etc. The resulting seedlings are less likely to encounter seedling disease problems and are more tolerant to later environmental stresses.

On the other hand, seed that was produced under poor growing conditions, that germinates less than 75-80 percent in standard germination tests and has CWVI values below 120 will require near optimum conditions to develop an acceptable stand and normal production.

The importance of seed quality and its influce on stand establishment and yield is illustrated in the results of a research test conducted by USDA Ag Engineers at Lubbock. In this study, the engineers used "good" (85 percent germination) and "poor" (65 percent germination) quality seed. The seed was planted at three different depths in a moist soil in mid-May. The results are presented in Table 1.

Their findings show that under ideal conditions (two-inch planting depth), the good quality seed produced 10 percent more lint that the poor seed. When both seed lots were planted three-inches deep to induce a moderate stress condition, the good quality seed still produced top yields whereas yields from the weaker seed fell another 10 percent.

Finally, at the four-inch planting depth, (heavy stress condition) yields of the higher quality seed were reduced 15 percent while those from the lower quality seed fell an additional 12 percent (or some 30 percent below that of the good seed planted at the optimum ture at which the planting of good depth).

The lesson here is clear: Use the best quality seed available and when forced best seed available, allowing the 10-day

to use lower quality seed make every possible effort to avoid or reduce stress conditions.

In most recent years, growers will plant two or more lots of seed that differ in quality. As a rule, wait to begin planting until the 10-day average soil temperature at the eight-inch depth reaches 60 degrees Fahrenheit. Remember that is the minimum temperaquality seed is recommended.

If there is a question about even the

average soil temperature to reach 65 degrees Fahrenheit greatly increases the probability of getting a stand and cuts down the chances of seedling disease problems.

Always start planting with the best seed. The time it takes to plant the first lot of seed may allow the soil to warm another one or two degrees and the passage of a wind storm or other weather hazard before planting.

Crusting is a frequent problem in this area. Low vigor seed may lack the energy reserves needed to break

through the crust. Rotary hoeing or other tillage operations will be required to aid emergence.

One way to increase the probability of getting a stand from lower quality seed is to increase the seedling rate. Seed technologists and seedsmen generally agree that if the seedling rate needs to be increased more than 25 percent above the usual rate, to get a stand of another source of seed should be considered.

Excessive planting rates (above 25 to 30 pounds per acre) frequently result in accelerated stand losses due to increased populations of seedling disease organisms within the drill row. The weak or dead seed serve as a food source for disease organisms and stimulate their development.

Acceptable yields can be attained from a crop that started with fairly low quality seed. Regardless of the quality of available seed, it is always a good idea to take reasonable precautions that minimize the amount of stress germinating seed and young seedlings are subjected to.

## **Control energy costs** to boost net returns

Because the cost of energy is a major item on today's mechanized farms, steps to reduce energy use can improve net returns.

"In some cases, energy use can be reduced by adopting simple, low-cost but effective energy-saving practices," says Wayne Keese, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Other energy-saving practices may require a capital investment which will be repaid through lower energy bills.

"Select and use energy-saving hints applicable to your operation," suggests Keese. "good management in all farm operations, coupled with routine maintenance, can produce worthwhile dividends in reduced energy bills."

The agricultural engineer offers these energy-saving tips:

--Reduce the number of trips across fields by combining operations.

-Use minimum or no-till management practices and techniques.

--Use tractor weights and duals properly for optimum wheel slippage. --Avoid excessive engine idling and warm-up time.

--Combine errands and reduce the number of trips as much as possible. --Practice a routine maintenance sch-

edule, including tune-up, to ensure that all engines operate at maximum effic-

iency

Operate harvesters and silage blowers at their rated speed.



Getting a stand of cotton

Texas' estimated 1986 farm receipts assets, have dropped from \$98 billion from marketings tumbled slightly to a projected \$9.3 billion. That includes the agriculturally related activities of hunting and fishing leases, horses for recreation, and land-based outdoor recreation. This figure compared with about \$9.9 billion in 1985.

But lower production costs and large government payments helped support the cash income situation, according to Dr. Carl Anderson, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.


two years ago to about \$74 billion. The state has 160,000 farms averaging 838 acres with a value of land and buildings averaging \$552 per acre, he added. There were 187,000 farms in 1984.

Estimated 1986 cash receipts from livestock include: beef cattle, \$4.1 billion; poultry, \$652 million; dairy, \$565 million; sheep, \$88 million; hogs, \$80 million; wool and mohair, \$51 million; goats, \$23 million.

Estimated cash receipts from crops included: cotton, \$772 million; wholereceipts, \$146 million; peanuts, \$106 million: horses, \$102 million; fruit and nut crops, \$59 million; soybeans, \$24 million; sunflowers and other oil seed plants, \$3 million.



## **Farm News**



Cotton producers in the 25-county High Plains area represented by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., have enrolled 95.9 percent of their effective cotton bases in the 1987 acreage reduction program.

A preliminary report from the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service at College Station shows an aggregate effective base of 4,367,043 acres for the 25 counties, of which 4,188,422 acres have been signed into the program.

"Effective base" is a new term in this year's program, ASCS explains, used to indicate net acreage eligible for annual program participation, as opposed to "total base" which includes bases entered into the 10-year conservation reserve program. Total base for the Plains comes to about 4,708,759 acres, 341,716 acres greater than the effective base. An inexact total base for the area results from the state office not having a total base figure for Yoakum County. The absence of that figure made it necessary for PCG to use as an estimate the county's total base reported for 1986.

Also, county-by-county figures on effective base and acres enrolled make it obvious that some small revisions of the preliminary report will be required in the final version. Five counties, for example, show more acres enrolled than were eligible for program participation.

Presumably this could occur when producers signed into the annual program early, then put some or all the enrolled acres into the 10-year conservation reserve during the February CRP bidding period.

Thus the CRP acres would be deducted from a county's effective base but would still show as enrolled acres. However, PCG points out that revisions probably won't affect the final program participation figure for the area by more than a few thousand acres.

Producers signing into the program agree to plant no more than 75 percent of their effective bases in return for program benefits. Therefore if producers plant the maximum allowable. planted acreage on all participating farms would come to 3,141,317. However, current law permits producers to plant as little as 50 percent of deficiency payments. How many producers will go the 50-92 route and the percentage level of their plantings, PCG says, is anybody's guess.

Pushed for PCG's estimate of 1987 planted acres, executive officer Donald. Johnson reveals that "for lack of a better figure, we're using three million, plus or minus 100,000."

The drop in land prices already appears to have slowed.


