
Leaf growth of cotton can be easily and economically removed (defoliated) by dusting the plants with a chemical containing Calcium Cyanamid (Aero defoliant).

Chemical defoliation does not make more cotton but it often makes it possible to save more of the crop. Earlier harvesting results in significantly higher grades of lint and better quality of fiber and seed.

# Washington

The membership of the House Committee on Agriculture was called back to Washington last week to resume hearings on a long range agricultural program.

A large number of witnesses were heard last week and still more are scheduled to appear as the hearings run into November. The information and recommendations provided by these witnesses have been valuable and helpful, but it is my desire to call upon the farmers and ranchers of my own District to find out what they themselves think. The purpose of this release therefore is to request all farmers and ranchers, whether renters or owners, to provide me with any ideas or suggestions

which they might have. No legislation of greater importance to the farmers and ranchers and business interests of our part of the country will be considered by the next session of Congress. The Texas Panhandle has been blest with many valuable natural resources which we hope will last forever. But after our oil and gas reserves have disappeared, we must still rely on topsoil for food, fiber, and prosperity. Unless our farmers and ranchers can secue a fair price for what they produce, they will have little or no purchasing power and be unable to patronize merchants and other businesses in our communitis and towns. If agriculture hits the skids after this war like it did not too many years ago then the good times which we all want will not be realized. I think all of us remember nickel cotton, six-bit wheat, five cent beef, breadlines, soup kitchens, etc., and it all started with the collapse of farm prices. Congress is trying its best to avoid a repetition of those conditions, and one of the first steps to take is to avoid an-

In a democracy people tell their Representative what they want him to know. And what they think, is of the utmost importance to him in the discharge of his duties.

other collapse of farm prices.

I am therefore requesting that you, whether a businessman, tenant farmer, rancher, or your own operator, let me know what you think should go into a long range agricultural program which will conserve our soil, and bring about a strong and stable agricultural economy with a minimum of governmental supervision. It is useless to hope for a high standard of living unless our agriculture is sound. A postcard or letter addressed to me in Washington expressing your ideas and suggestions will ge most welcome.







For sheer feather-bedding, this mock work proposal takes the cake. But it is only one of 44 "rules" demands filed by the leaders of the operating unions. If all these demands were granted, they would cost the railroads an added BILLION DOLLARS A YEAR.

### Increased Wages, Too

On top of these "rules" changes, the leaders of the operating unions have filed an additional demand for a wage increase of over 30 per cent. If granted, this would be an added cost to the railroads of \$400,000,000 a year.

### \$468,000,000 To Non-Operating Employes

In addition to this, an Arbitration Board has just granted a wage increase of 151/2 cents an hour to the million employes represented by the 17 non-operating unions. This will cost the railroads \$468,000,000 a year.

Where Will The Money Come From?

Where will all the money come from to pay these increases? They total several times as much as the railroads made in 1946 or will make in 1947.

In July, the railroads filed an application for increased freight rates to close the gap which then existed between wage and material costs, and railroad revenues. Since then it has been necessary, because of further increases in wages and material costs, to supplement that petition and to ask for an additional freight rate increase. No other course is open. 

HOUSECLEAN HEATING EQUIPMENT

It's always a good idea to start fall cleaning with the heating eqaipment. This cleaning should be done before snappy fall days call

Check all fireplaces, flues and chimneys to be sure they are sound and in good repair. Roof fires are usually caused by sparks leaking out through cracks in the chimney. Mortar can dry out and crumble so that in time bricks may loosen, so cement all these cracks when you check.

Make sure your stoves and other heating equipment are in good condition to operate safely. Stove pipes should be checked for rust holes and worn spots. All joints should fit snugly. If your roof needs repair, tend to it now and if it needs replacing, make the new one fire resistant.

Many disastrous winter fires would be avoided if home owners checked, cleanel and repaired heating equipment carefully in the fall and if chimneys, flues and roofs were cleaned and freed from trash, leaves, bird nests and other fire hazards.
