Council endorses wind energy proposals

Managing Editor The Dimmitt City Council on Monday canceled two of the four city elections and approved two resolutions dealing with alternative energy sources.

The council unanimously approved canceling the elections in Place 2, where incumbent Gloria Hernandez is running unopposed and in Place 3, where Bill Potts, also an incumbent, is unopposed.

This means that only Place 1 and Place 4 will have elections. Neither of those positions have an incumbent seeking re-election.

In Place 1, Josh Arguijo, Amos Quintero and Jamie Bugarin are vying for that spot. And in Place 4, Carla Miller and Salvador Ortiz will face off against each other after the third candidate. Chris Bradford withdrew, the ballot.

Early voting will be from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m., May 1-9 at City Hall, with the election set for May 13.

For extended hours of early voting, City Hall will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. two days, May 3 and May 4.

In other business, the council passed two resolutions, both dealing with wind power. In the first, the city supports a resolution designating competitive renewable energy zones for the Panhandle.

In the second, the city endorsed a wind energy project by Eurus Energy America

Corporation.

Mayor Wayne Collins sees these two measures although it was too late to get his name off as positive moves for the development of alternative energy sources in this area.

"Passing these resolutions, I feel, is an opportunity for Castro County to get much more involved in wind energy," Collins said.

"It will allow for the construction of a transmission line from the Panhandle to the urban areas where the energy is needed.

"It solves another problem involved with wind energy and it's a good opportunity for us to expand our wind energy potential up here."

Also, City Manager David Denman told the council that Cebridge had installed a digital receiver and a bigger dish, which the company believes will make reception better.

Both the Democrats and Republicans have runoff races with the election set for April 11, at the Castro County Courthouse in Courtroom 109, combining all precincts for the runoff.

And this year, Democrats and Republicans can vote in the same location.

On the Republican ticket, there is only one race, Judge Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 8: Charles Holcomb and Terry Keel.

On the Democratic side, there are two runoff races.

In the first, Barbara Ann Radnofsky and Gene Kelly are on the ballot for U.S. Senator. And in the race for Lieutenant Governor, Benjamin Z. Grant and Maria Luisa Alvarado are in a runoff.

You must vote in the primary in which you first voted. However, if you failed to vote in the initial election, and are a registered voter, you may vote in either election.

CC Emergency Management group to meet

"We've had some situations recently where we could have used See EMERGENCY, Page 4





HISD Superintendent Houston ISD is diving off

a cliff into unknown waters with the launching of the in the United States. The district is basing rewards to teachers on how well their students score on standardized tests and administrators on how well their schools improve.

Neglect is the most frequent form of child administrators. Money has abuse. Yes, children die simply because they're put in situations where they are not supervised.






