

1987 residential permits show significant gain

Twenty-seven building permits issued during 1987 by City of Lockney represented the second highest total in the past six years. Permits amounted to \$252,245.

The only higher figure in the six-year period came in 1984 when the permits, including \$667,789 for the housing project, totaled \$962,382.

The city issued 28 permits in 1986 which totaled \$188,445.

Three houses and two mobile homes were major endeavors during 1987. These totaled \$215,500.

Most of the 1987 permits were for such projects as storage, garages, carports, back porch, bedroom, patio, hallway and restroom additions to existing residences.

Only one of the 27 was for commercial purposes. This was for removing the top story of the former hotel-restaurant building in downtown Lockney.

The \$252,245 in '87 permits represented an increase of \$63,800 — 25.2 percent — over the \$188,445 in permits issued during 1986.

Hospital - clinic lobby due facelifting project

Lobby of Lockney General Hospital-Cogdell Clinic will take on a new appearance in the near future, thanks to Il Penseroso Study Club and Athena Study Club. The organizations are making the lobby refurbishing a joint project.

Saturday, Jan. 23, has been designated as a "work day" by the two clubs to launch the venture. They will provide wallpaper, floor covering, paint and other decorative accessories.

Community organizations, clubs and individuals are being invited to assist with the project by providing financing for furniture.

The planning committee, comprised of members of the two clubs, says 36 individual chairs are needed. The discounted cost will be approximately \$100 each, including tax.

Area clubs and organizations have received letters which ask their financial

assistance. A special account has been opened at First National Bank to accept contributions.

Leaders suggest that clubs, families or individuals may choose to make donations in the form of memorials. Acknowledgements will be forwarded to families of individuals in whose name memorials are given.

A plaque is to be placed in the hospital-clinic lobby bearing names of all donors.

Furniture will need to be ordered by the end of January.

Jan. 23 will be "our kick-off day to get the project started." Sponsors hope to have the renovation project completed "by the end of February."

If sufficient funds are received, conventional or multi-person seating will be ordered for the middle of the lobby.

Garbage collection rate increases by \$1 monthly

During the January 7 meeting of Lockney City Council, members approved a \$1 increase in the monthly collection rate to offset the increase awarded to Paul Mangum.

Currently, Mangum has a contract with the city to pick up garbage and dispose of it at the city dump grounds. Due to increased insurance costs on trucks, which will also affect Mangum's vehicles, Mangum requested that the city increase his monthly contract amount to cover these costs.

After discussing the matter, city members voted to increase the monthly amount by \$400 and at the same time to increase garbage collection fees by \$1 per month. Fees will increase to \$6 per month, effective February 1, 1988.

Council members point out that the garbage collection area of the city operation is only a break-even department. The city charges customers only

what it costs them to contract collection and maintain the dump grounds.

In other action, the council members approved calling for bids on the demolition and clearance of the L.V. Harris property located in the southeastern part of town. Bids will be opened during the February meeting of the council.

Though no action was taken at the January meeting, council members considered purchasing radios for the city hall office, the two vehicles used by Archie Jones and Dickie McCarty. Council members asked the mayor to look into the costs of equipping the city with radios. The mayor will report the cost estimates to the full council at the next meeting.

Present for the January session were Mayor Smith, Aldermen Aston, Wolford, Marr, Copeland, Johnson and City Secretary Erma Lee Duckworth.

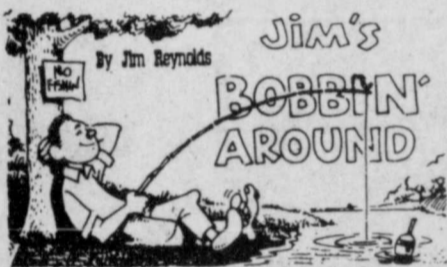

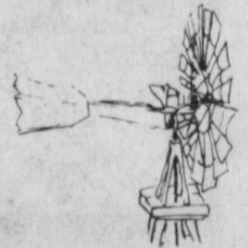

Cargill offers \$1,000 scholarships for 150 youths in rural America

One hundred and fifty high school seniors from farm families throughout the United States will be awarded \$1,000 college scholarships this spring by the Cargill Scholarship Program for Rural America.

"This program, now in its third year, is designed to recognize and encourage academic achievement, accomplishments and talents of young people from U.S. farm families and to help them get started with their post-secondary educations," said Calvin Anderson, executive director of the sponsoring Cargill Foundation. The foundation is a philanthropic arm of Cargill, a Minneapolis-based agribusiness company.

To qualify, students must have plans for full-time enrollment this year at an

accredited two or four-year college, university or vocational-technical school. An independent national scholarship service organization manages the selection process, which is based on several criteria including academic records, leadership and extra-curricular accomplishments.

Scholarships are limited to two per community. Local high schools and Cargill offices have further information and application forms. Children of Cargill employees are not eligible.

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Social Security News

It is generally understood that to apply for a Social Security number or Social Security benefits, the first thing to do is to get in touch with a Social Security office. Yet, there are many people who ask where to go and what to do to apply for benefits, request a statement of their earnings record, apply for hospital insurance protection or medical insurance, lump-sum death payment, food stamps, etc.

These services, as well as full information about individual and family rights and obligations under the Social Security law, are provided free of charge in any Social Security office. Moreover, for people who live far from the city or town where the office is located, there are contact stations where they can go. A schedule of when these stations are open may be obtained by calling the nearest Social Security office, or by asking a friend living close to the Social Security office to get that information for you.

If you are confined to your home because of illness or disability, you can call your local office and a Social Security representative will visit you in your home.

Following is a brief list of services you can get from any Social Security office and of documents you may have to submit when applying for a Social Security number or benefits.

SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER — You have to fill out a Form SS-5, which you can get from any Social Security office as well as many post offices and banks. Together with Form SS-5, you must submit evidence of age, identity, and U.S. citizenship or alien status. Social Security representatives can tell you the kind of documents that are acceptable. Individuals 18 or over and those foreign born, must apply for their Social Security numbers.

DUPLICATE OF SOCIAL SECURITY CARD — If you have lost your Social Security card, you can apply for a duplicate by filling out another Form

SS-5 and giving the same information shown on the original application for a Social Security number. The new card will have the same number as the one that was lost. Evidence of identity must be presented when requesting the replacement card.

CHANGE OF NAME — A change of name (for example, upon marriage) must be reported, and proof must be shown of both the old and new names. If the individual is foreign born, evidence of current citizenship or alien status is also required.

CHECKING YOUR OWN SOCIAL SECURITY EARNINGS RECORD — A request for Statement of Earnings (Form SSA-7004-PC) is available at any Social Security office. You should fill it out, mail it, and in a few weeks, you will receive by mail a statement of the total wages or self-employment income credited to your earnings record. If some earnings have not been credited or the amounts in the statement don't match your own record, you should get in touch with a Social Security office as soon as possible in order to have your earnings record corrected.

SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS, SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY INCOME AND MEDICARE — To claim any of these benefits, you may make applications at any Social Security office or by telephone. You will be supplied with the application and enrollment forms. The employees can help you to fill them out.

Every person is responsible for submitting the necessary evidence to support a claim. If a claimant is dissatisfied with any action taken on his or her right to monthly benefits, a lump-sum death payment, or entitlement to hospital or medical insurance protection, the Social Security office will assist in appealing the decision.

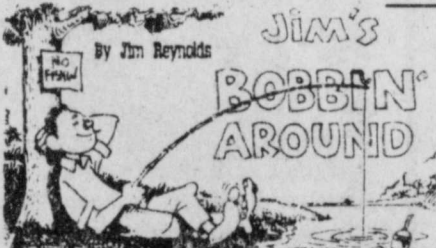
