to do is to get in tuoch with a Scial Security office. Yet, there are many
people who ask where to go and what to statement of their earnings record, apply for hospital insurance protection
or medical insurance, lump-sum death payment, food stamps, etc.
These services. as well as full information abour indiviual and famiy
rights and obligations under the Social
Security law, are provided free of Security law, are provided free of
charge in any Social Security office. Moreover, for people who live far
from the city or town where the office is
located, there are contact stations where they can go. A schedule of when
these stations arae open may be obtained
by calling the nearest Social office, or by asking a friend living close
to the Social Security office to get that If you are confined to your home
because of illiness or disabilily, you can
call your local office and call your local office and a Social
Security representative will visit you in
your home your home.
Following i a brief list of services you
can get from any Social Security office and of documents you may have to
submit when applying for a Social Security number or benefits.
SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER You have to fill out a Form SS-5, which
you can get from any Social Security
office as well as many post offices and banks. Together with Form SS-S, yo
must submit evidence of age, identity
and Uus. Social Security representatives can tell
