



SORTING OUT FACTS

It may strike some of us as unusual that a group of people should stage a rally in Amarillo to protest how the Amarillo Globe-News does its job while nothing of the sort ever happened regarding how many of the Amarillo television stations do their job.

The Globe-News has been accused of "negative reporting". Yet on the very week of the protest meeting KVII-TV in Amarillo aired an investigative reporting segment by Chris Bell charging Iowa Beef Packers, one of Amarillo's largest employers, of violating numerous safety standards. The television station relied upon testimony of one IBP employee, admitted that no other IBP employee would back him up, and ignored the IBP response that a recent OSHA inspection had given the company a clean bill of health.

Surely here was an opportunity for Paul Engels and Boone Pickens to mount a protest rally against the television station for doing a hatchet job on Iowa Beef Packers, a large employer whose payroll and tax values mean a great deal to Amarillo and its future.

Yet these people are strangely silent. The broadcast media toot their own horn constantly telling the world how important they are. Yet in the final analysis it is the print media, primarily the newspapers of this country, which provide most of the solid information this nation needs to govern itself.

Houston Rodeo calf scramble

Astrodome. The calf scramble is a part of Houston rodeo action, featuring The Statler Brothers as part of that evening performance's activities.

Williams, the son of Mary Williams, will compete for one of the 252 calf purchase certificates to be awarded at the 1988 Rodeo. Additionally, as many as two youngsters from each of the 18 rodeo performances are awarded "hard luck" certificates for their hearty efforts in attempting to catch a calf, resulting in 36 more certificates actually given.

Known as an entertaining event with an educational purpose, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo funds agricultural scholarships and research projects all over Texas through its annual net proceeds.

The calf scramble, a yearlong activity, also is one of the show's major programs benefiting Texas youth. Beginning with athletic competition in the Astrodome, the program ends with top-notch competition in the Astrohall

The event itself involves 28 energetic youngsters who are turned loose with half as many wild calves in the Astrodome arena. Those who manage to capture a calf, halter it and drag it across the finish line receive a \$600 calf purchase certificate.

The certificate, donated by a sponsoring firm or individual, is used to purchase a purebred registered beef or dairy heifer.

The calf is raised by the winner for special showring competition in the Astrohall at the following year's show. Each project is closely supervised by a vocational agriculture teacher or county Extension agent.

Additionally, the winners are required to submit to the calf scramble office accurate financial records, essays, photographs and a scrapbook detailing the progress of the venture.

farm management

Good records can help farmers and ranchers to manage their operations more effectively and to recognize opportunities for increasing profitability.

"The benefits of keeping and using records are many," points out Richard Patterson Jr., an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "The first big payoff to good record keeping is planning. With records from past years, a farmer or rancher can prepare a financial picture (cash flow) for the upcoming year or years."

This will enable him to see the timing of expenses and receipts month by month and just exactly when and how much operating money he needs to borrow— all before he spends a dime on his operation, notes the economist.

Using the cash flow statement, a producer may be able to make adjustments to reduce interest expense by borrowing later or to consider production or marketing alternatives which may enhance the "bottom line."

"Records also can help the farmer or rancher know his current financial position," says Patterson. "Relying on good records and the cash flow statement prepared at the beginning of the year, he can compare actual receipts and expenses to his budgeted estimates. Any adjustments that need to be made can then be planned for rather than coming as a surprise to him and possibly his lender."

Keeping records will provide the

mation to prepare his tax return and avoid making mistakes. Common problems include failing to include all deductions on Schedule F and overreporting taxable income due to bank deposits which do not show the source of funds.

If the farmer or rancher faces a year of high taxable income, then good records will allow him to consider making additional purchases before year-end to reduce his tax liability, and

vice-versa. Evidence abounds that shows the benefits of good farm and ranch records, notes Patterson. Research from Illionis indicates that farmers who keep records only for tax reporting purposes are generally in the lower one-third of profitable businesses while those that keep and use records to plan and manage their operations represent the upper one-third of profitable business-

"The high one-third profitable farms do a better job of marketing, pay closer attention to production and economic efficiency, and make better use of their input dollars. They are able to do these things only because they keep a good set of farm records which allows them to make better management and marketing decisions," Patterson emphasizes.

The economist offers two approaches to record keeping for a farmer or rancher. One is to keep records on his farmer or rancher the necessary infor- own, using either a system he designs phone: 915-336-7542.

for his particular operation, a manual record keeping book provided by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. or a commercially available record keeping system (manual or computer-

An alternative is for the farmer or rancher to keep records as a member of a farm business management association. In return for an annual fee, the farmer or rancher receives assistance in keeping records as well as management assistance from an agricultural economist hired by the association.

"A major benefit of participating in such an association is that the farmer can compare his operation to the average of all farms within the association," says Patterson. "He can note differences and make changes and improvements where necessary. Of course, all individual farmer or ranchers records and conversations remain con-

Farm business management associations operate successfully in 11 states today, notes the economist.




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
