

Brenda Mangold, Terry Keltz, Martins elite citizens

Awards given at CofC Banquet

On Saturday, March 5, 139 Lockney residents and guests gathered in the Lockney Elementary School Cafetorium for the annual Lockney Chamber of Commerce Banquet to hear the names of the 1987 outstanding citizens.

Lisa Mosley, named as outstanding woman of the year for 1986, introduced her successor and friend Brenda Mangold as the 1987 woman of the year and presented her with the traveling trophy.

Transplanted Lockneyite Terry Keltz was named Man of the Year for 1987 by Kenneth Holt, the honoree for 1986.

Dr. and Mrs. W.J. Mangold named Jim Bob and Kay Martin and their children as the outstanding Family of the Year for 1987. This is the fifth year for the family of the year to be awarded.

Each of the 1986 winners was presented with a small plaque to keep in their homes which designated them as winners for 1986.

Those attending the banquet were treated to a chicken fried steak meal prepared by the lunchroom staff and served by members and instructors of the Lockney FHA and homemaking department.

Entertainment for the banquet departed from the usual speaker. This year the Chamber brought Mark and Jenny Lynn Hodges of Plainview to Lockney and they performed several contemporary country music selections, which included music by Marie Osmond, Dan Seal, Lee Greenwood and Kenny Rogers among others. The duo were well received by the crowd.

WOMAN OF THE YEAR - BRENDA MANGOLD

"Talented, creative, kind, gentle, genuine, loyal, cooperative, loving, congenial, honest, encouraging, motivating, and inspiring" were words quoted from the letter of nomination and used to describe the 1987 Woman of the Year, Brenda Mangold.

She is the wife of Dr. Gary Mangold and they have two children, Allison and Lauren. She is a 1969 graduate of Lockney High School and graduated from Lubbock Christian University with a degree in elementary education. She and Gary returned to Lockney in 1979 when Gary went into practice with his father at Lockney General Hospital.

"Since that time she has been a true asset to our community", quoted the nomination letter.

Mrs. Mangold is very active in volunteer work in Lockney. She helped organize the Lockney General Hospital Auxiliary and, along with this project,

she organized the gift shop and taught workshops to auxiliary members.

Brenda has also been very active in the Penserose Junior Study Club since 1980. She has served as club president and was Club Woman of the Year in 1983. She has served as the chairwoman on numerous committees and has always volunteered her many talents to various projects. This year she chaired the committee for the redecoration of the hospital lobby and spent endless hours on the project.

She is also an active member of the Main Street Church of Christ. She has always helped with Vacation Bible School, sings for funerals, helps with banquets and parties, substitute teaches Bible classes, and started a "singing practice" for the children in the summer of 1987. She was also instrumental in bringing the "Turn Your Heart Toward Home" film series to Lockney.

The Whirlers will have a business meeting Thursday (tonight) after lessons. Lessons will begin as usual at 7:30 p.m. Everyone please try to attend.

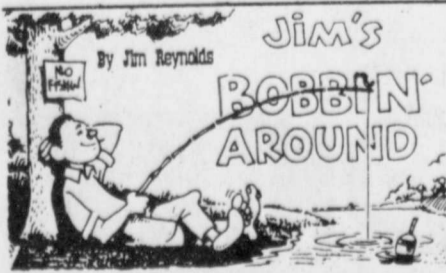
Williams' Angus heifer stands as champion of Houston show

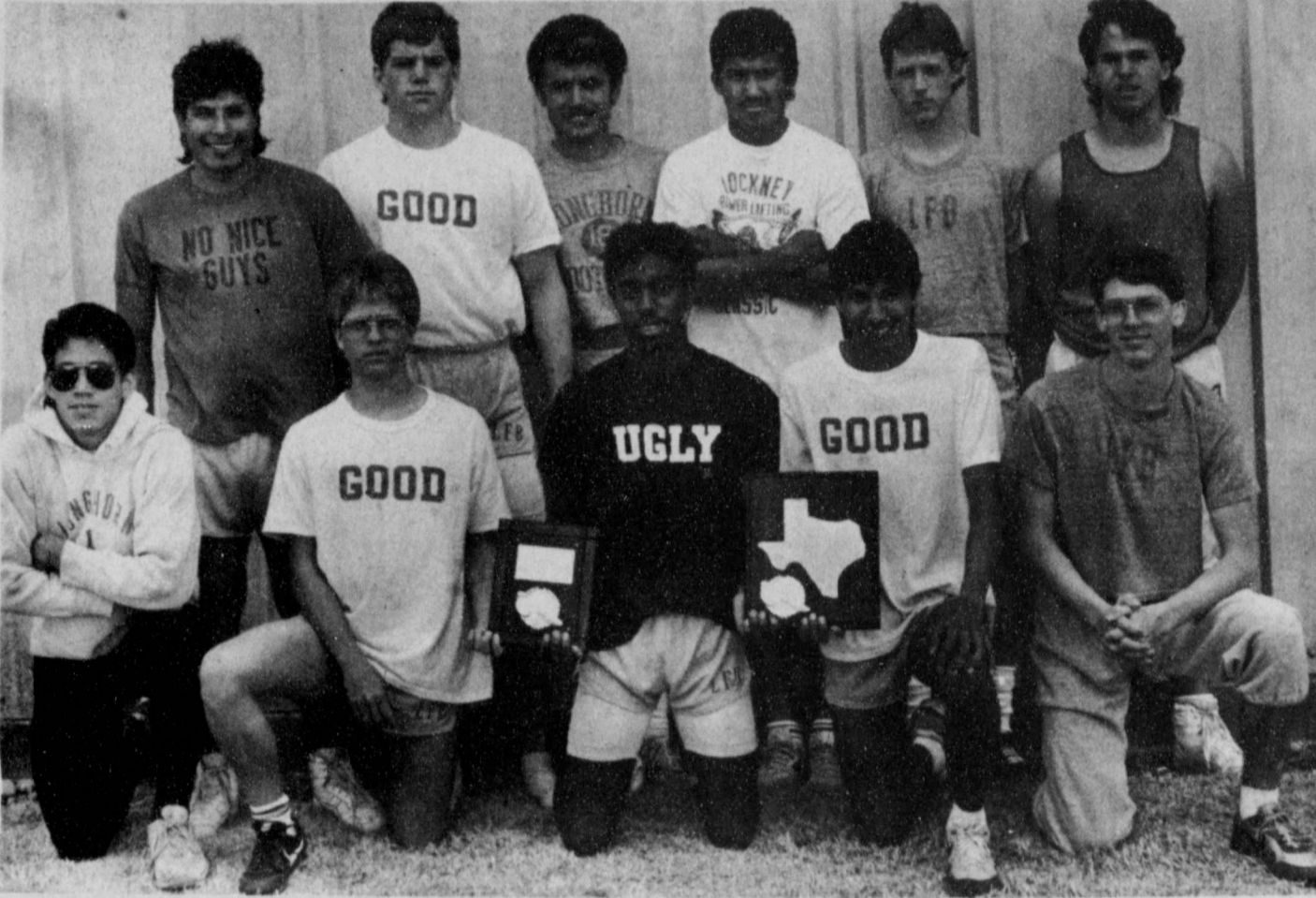

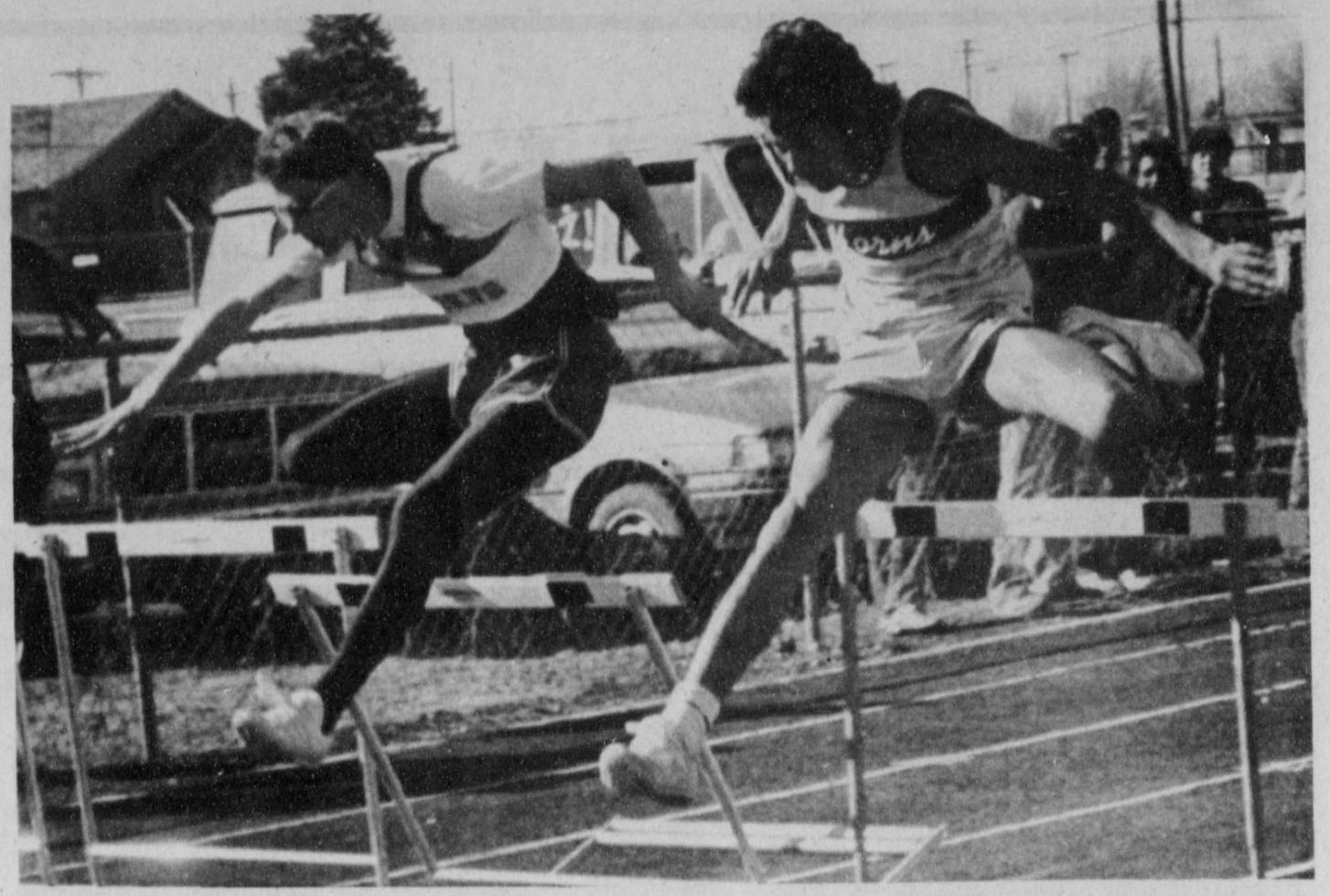

Few seats remain for senior citizens' South Texas bus trip

The Lockneyites are to leave Monday, April 11, and return Friday, the 15th.

"The five-day trip will take us through the Bluebonnet Country to the state capitol, LBJ Country and the many sights and wonders of San Marcos, San Antonio and Old Fort Concho," according to the Lubbock tour agency arranging the trip.

Leaving Lockney at 8 a.m. on the 11th, the group is to lunch in Abilene and continue on to Austin for the first night. Tuesday's agenda includes a tour of the capitol building and a drive to San Marcos to the Aquarena for lunch, visit the submarine underground theater, ride a glass-bottomed boat, ride the skyride to the hanging gardens, drive to

Wonderworld for a short train ride to one of the largest earthquake-formed caves in the U.S.

After a ride through a wildlife park, the group will be off to San Antonio to spend Tuesday night in the historic Menger Hotel, which overlooks the Alamo. The evening meal will be aboard a boat for a riverboat ride through downtown San Antonio.

A bus tour is planned for the third day. The Lockneyites will again spend the night at the Menger Hotel.

Thursday's agenda includes a ride to Johnson City, where the group will visit the LBJ Library and the LBJ State Historical Park. They will see buffalo and Texas Longhorn cattle. For lunch they will journey to Fredericksburg for a German food meal. That night will be spent at the Benchmark Hotel in San Angelo.

A tour of the Fort Concho Museum in San Angelo precedes the return trip home on the 15th.

Spring foliage is another treat in store for the group.

Cost is \$350 per person for double occupancy and \$450 a person for single occupancy rooms.

Brenda was also instrumental in organizing the Lockney Girl Scouts in 1985 for girls of this community. She currently serves as the Service Unit chairman and has been a troop leader for the past three years.

She was also behind the founding of the Lockney Parent-Teacher (PTA) organization. Currently, she is the vice president of PTA and has served as projects chairman in the past.

In addition she is a member of the Floyd County Arts Association and has hosted a membership drive and quilt show in her home. She also has helped with Ladies Day at the fair.

"Brenda is best known for her kindness and optimistic attitude. She accepts all responsibilities with enthusiasm and dedication," quotes the nominating letter.

MAN OF THE YEAR - TERRY KELTZ

Though a transplanted Lockneyite, Terry Keltz has been very active in this community since he and his wife Donetta moved with their two children to Lockney in August of 1980.

Keltz has served as the administrator of Lockney General Hospital since August 1984, with the exception of a six month absence when he was a vice president of First National Bank in Lockney.

"Terry could well be one of the really vital citizens of Lockney. Without his administration, the Lockney hospital facility could become a thing of the past and this would be disastrous for our community. If the hospital were not in such capable hands and being run so efficiently, it would not qualify for the generous donations which keep it going and provide such a great service, not only to Lockney, but to surrounding area patients which frequent the facility," quoted the letters of nomination.

Keltz was also instrumental in bringing Dr. W.E. Prater, the much needed third doctor, to the hospital.

He was born "under the hill" in Matador and was graduated from Matador High School in 1968. He served in the U.S. Army as a sergeant in the 720th Military Police Battalion, South Vietnam and was an M.P. investigator until receiving his honorable discharge in April 1971.

He holds a Bachelor of Science degree in biology and a Master of Science in Management, both from Wayland Baptist University. From September of 1972 until he moved to Lockney in August 1980, Terry worked in and served as either a supervisor or manager of three different laboratory facilities in Plainview.

He has served youth in three different communities through his work as a minister of music in Plainview, Kress and Lockney.

Keltz has served as the president of the Lockney Chamber of Commerce, and has served as a director of several
