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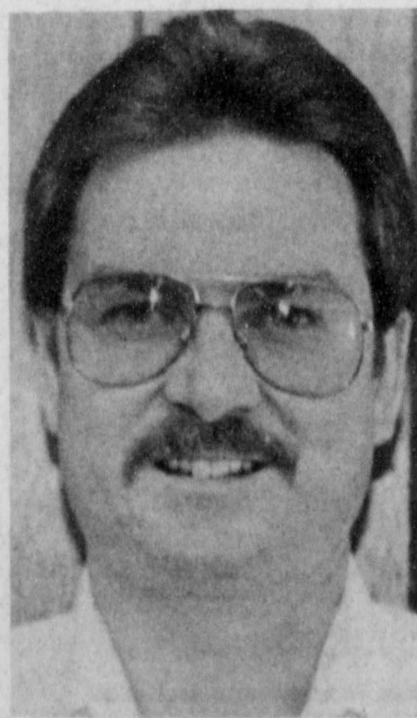
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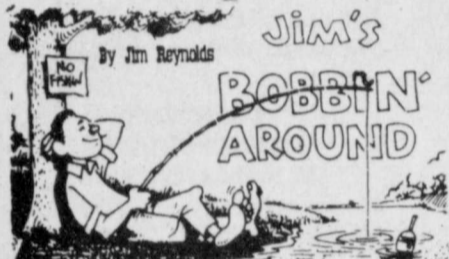
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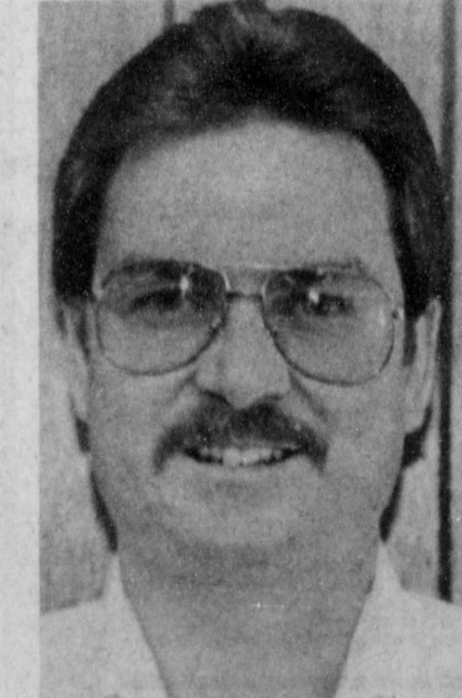
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Women's softball league organizes for '88 season

Lee Harris and the same resolution was passed.

Council members also discussed two structures which are on city property, which they consider no longer needed and possibly unsafe. These include the city jail and the house located near the city shop. All council members agreed that these structures should be removed and voted to allow Mayor Dan Smith to negotiate with Vernon Wickware for the removal of the jail building.

The house near the city shop belongs to Pat Stansell, and council members agreed to write a letter to Stansell and ask that he have the house removed within 15 days or the city would see to the removal of the structure.

In other action, council members voted to table a loading zone request from Lawson Rowell. After discussion,

council members agreed that they will need more information before granting Rowell's request that the area south of his store be designated a loading zone.

Also tabled was the matter of the floodlight on the top of the water tower. The matter will be discussed when more complete cost information is available.

The council also granted the mayor permission to negotiate with Wickware on the bids he submitted for the final clearance of three lots. These lots still have concrete which owners, who have removed the houses, were unable to remove.

Present for the March 8 session were Mayor Dan Smith, Aldermen Jerry Johnson, Ronnie Aston, Gary Marr, J.D. Copeland, Attorney Paul Lyle, and City Secretary Erma Lee Duckworth, as well as Street and Water Superintendent Dickie McCarty and the Beacon reporter.

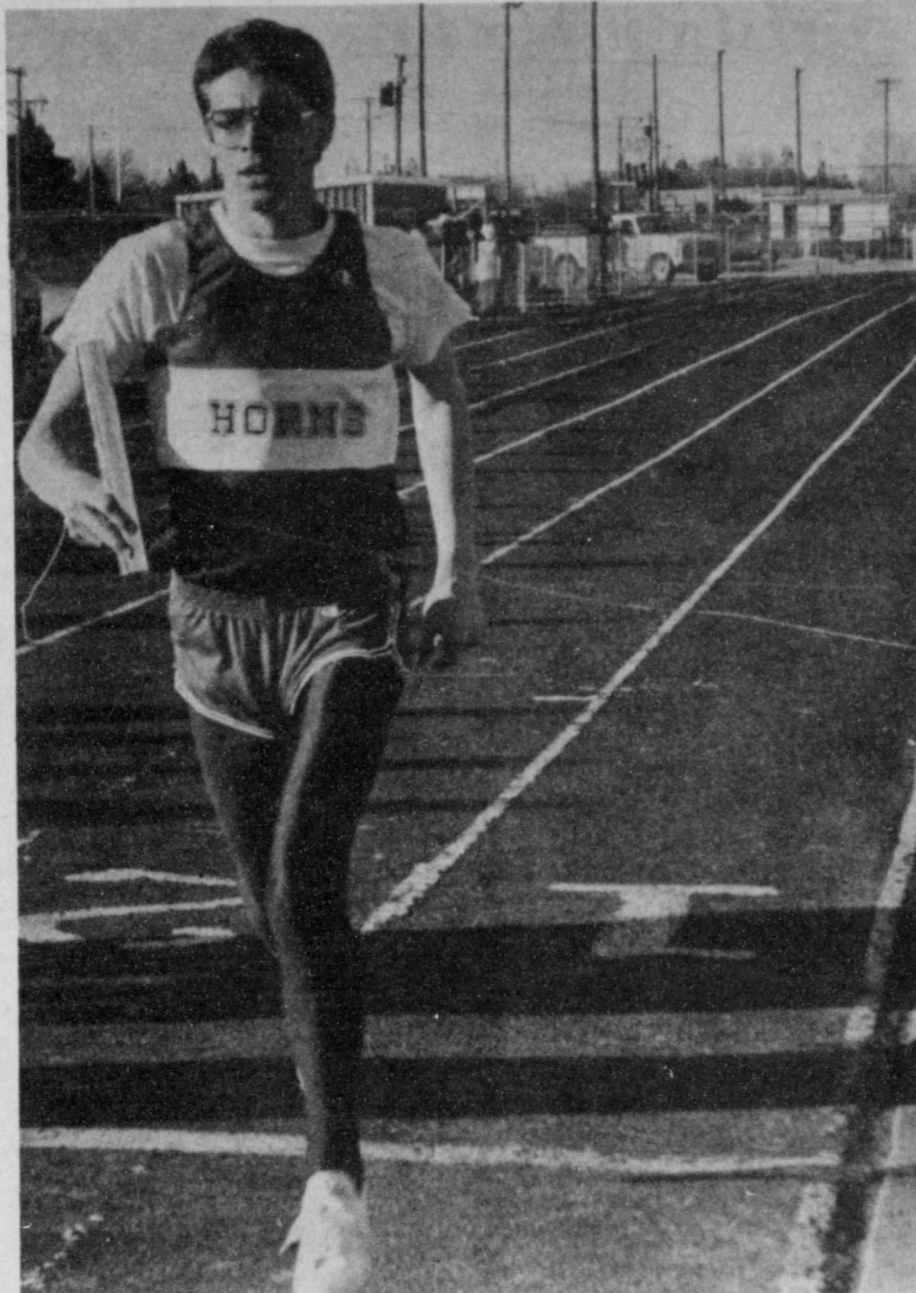
