### Representative Steve Carriker candidate for state senate seat

Third-term State Representative Steve Carriker, a farmer from Roby, announced today that he will seek the recently vacated 30th District Senate seat. The 30th District covers a broad expanse of West Texas and the Red River area, including Carriker's home county of Fisher and seven other counties he currently serves in the Texas House.

Currently serving as the Vice-Chair of the House Democratic Caucus, Carriker stressed in his announcement statement both his life-long residency in the district and his demonstated leadership abilities in the legislature. "I was born, reared, and live in the 30 District," he said, "and I make my living tilling 30th



Carriker serves on the committees on Agriculture, County Affairs, and Interim Joint Committee on Waste Management. He served for four years as a member of the Board for the Senior Texans Employment Program and serves as a member of the Advisory Board for Green Thumb. He has served on numerous agriculture-related boards, is an ex-officio member of the Fisher County Economic Development Commission, is a former scoutmaster, member of the National Rifle Association, and Texas Sheriff's Association. He was also active in the "Super Tuesday" primary with the Committee to Retain Elected Judges.

Representative Carriker, 37, attended Western Texas College in Snyder and received his B.A. from the University of Texas at Austin. He and his wife Kathy have three children, ages 12, 5, and 3. Kathy was the organizer of "Country Crafted Texas" and is a member of the board of Texas Rural Communities, an economic development foundation. Kathy also was a public school teacher for



### Rolling apologizes for past misdeeds

There are success stories!

One is Clark (David) Rolling. Local persons who remember him well probably will not have fond memories. But he has changed.

Following is a letter he submitted to The Beacon, along with an article about his life which appeared in The Orange Leader in his home town of Orange, Tex.:

Dear Sir:

I'm sure you don't know my name, but you may or may not remember after you read this article.

I hurt quite a few people in Floyd County as a whole. My uncle, Roy Rolling, died recently, and my aunt, Bertha Rolling, still lives in Lockney. They are just a part of the family I hurt for 28 years.

I would like to ask a favor of The Lockney Beacon, if that is still the newspaper name. Would you please re-print this story or a similar one so I can inform the people who know me that I have finally changed my life.

This is the only way I know of to right the wrongs I've done in my life. Or you may print this letter as a letter to the editor and just say that I publicly apologize to anyone that I may have harmed or caused harm to.

I am thanking you in advance for your time and I am asking that you respond to this letter so I will be assured my effort has succeeded.

To look at him - the slightly built, unassuming, gentle man sitting quietly at his desk in the Programs for Human Services offices - you'd never imagine

him sticking a knife in a guard's throat. But that was one of the highlights in Clark Rolling's criminal career that spanned 27 of his 33 years, 14 of them in

Rolling talks openly and publicly about his life now — the alcohol, drugs, armed robberies, assaults with deadly weapons and, ultimately, his beginning as a respected family man — for a good reason: "I want to help young people some kid who might be on the edge now - from ending up like I did... I hurt a lot of people and I've got a lot of black marks on the book. I need to get as many white marks as I can."

He works hard for those white marks now, helping the elderly get adequate roofing and insulation, often on his own time, out of his own pocket. He also volunteers his time at elementary schools, talking to students about where alcohol-drug abuse can lead.

It's a path with which Rolling is well acquainted.

Raised in Lockney, he quickly became a loner. After his parents divorced, he lived first with one, then the other. At 6, he sneaked beer and tried to avoid a physically abusive stepfather. At 8, he was smoking cigarettes and drinking a lot, and by the age of 10, he had his own

From there, he progressed to first a boys' ranch, then two jail sentences marked by escape attempts. Finally making the big time — the Eastham Unit of the Texas Department of Corrections — he served five years of a 17-year sentence for yet another attempted escape before being paroled to

Land Manor in Beaumont. By then, Rolling had spent half his life — 14 of 28 years — in jail or prison.

With counseling, he found a job as an

intake clerk in Orange at PHS. "I was taking applications for people who needed assistance - working people, street people, the same kind of people I used to rob - and God got into me. I snapped.'

Within 30 days, he was promoted to PHS programs supervisor, in charge of four programs to provide necessities house "weatherization," utility bill payments, home repair for the elderly and temporary emergency relief for those who qualify.

Sometimes in his job, he meets people for whom the programs alone are not enough. "I put 2,800 volunteer hours in on one house. But the couple that owned it, they were in their 80s, living there with their grandchildren, and they didn't even have hot water."

Rolling is married now, and he and his wife, Vickie, are parents of a 2-year-old child and her 17-year-old twins. He is attending classes at Lamar University in Beaumont to obtain his certification as an alcohol-drug counse-

Under the terms of his parole, Rolling will be under supervision until 1995. But he wants to be more - and contribute more to his family, his church and his community - than most, even exemplary, ex-convicts. And, "one day at a time," according to Rolling, he's succeeding.

"Life is so good, but I have so much to pay back. I just don't want to expire before I've finished.

"Who knows?" he said, and grinned. "I might be a congressman one of these
