

# No races develop for trio of elections slated May 7




On April 9, members of the cast and crew will be presenting their play in area competition in White Deer, which is approximately 45 miles northeast of Amarillo.

### **Remember** to move timepieces forward one hour Sunday

Date for the return of Daylight Saving Time is easy to remember. It happens on Easter Sunday.

Timepieces officially advance at 2 a.m. on April 3.

The time "springs forward" one hour in the spring and "falls back" an hour late each fall.

Technically, Sunday will be a 23-hour day.

# **4-H Chemical Auction due tonight**

Lockney Community Center will be the site tonight (Thursday) for the annual Floyd County 4-H Chemicals Auction. It is scheduled for 7 p.m.

A free fish and chicken dinner will be served prior to the auction. A variety of farm chemicals, seed, animal feed and "much more" are to be auctioned.

According to Mary True, county Extension agent-HE, "Some of the chemicals to be included are: Roundup, Treflan, Tordon, Banvel, 2-4D, Fusilade, Atrazine, Caprole, Arsenal, Dual, Glean, Lasso, Lorsband, Milogard, Prep, Prowl, Weedone 638, PIX, hybrid grain sorghum, hybrid cotton, range cubes, mineral blocks, some household chemicals for home gardens and lawns and many, many more."

Profits realized from the auction are used to support the county 4-H program. This includes a variety of educational 4-H projects such as shooting sports-rifle and archery, foods and nutrition, public speaking, clothing, recreation and many others.

"The money also helps pay the costs of trips and activities such as state and district workshops, leadership conferences and county camp and activities, as well as community service projects,' Mrs. True says.

A scholarship program has been initiated by Floyd County 4-H. Five hundred dollar scholarships are being given to two 4-H youths annually. A portion of the chemical auction funds are placed in this special scholarship fund.

"This program is open to everyone," the agent says. Door prizes will be given.

Joe Luna, also of the Lockney power


lifting team, competed in the same weight class. His total was 670 pounds, and he placed fifth overall.

### announces increase

Lockney Postmaster Doug Meriwether announced that a decision has been reached by the Board of Governors concerning the proposed increase in postage rates.

Effective April 3, 1988, the new rate for first class postage will be 25 cents. This is the first increase in postage costs in three years. Although no one welcomes an increase in postage, it should be placed in perspective. For example, in 1932, a first class postage stamp cost 3 cents. With adjustments for inflation, that same stamp would cost 25.5 cents.

The new "E" stamp, which will cost 25 cents, will go on sale March 23. The Post Office will also have an ample supply of 3 cent stamps and other postage to meet your mailing needs.


Seniors interested in making application for the scholarship should write a letter and give it to principal James Poole by Friday, April 1.


