

City completes fiscal year 'in the black'

City of Lockney ended its 1987-88 fiscal year on March 30 "in the black by \$24,406.30," the council was told Thursday morning during its regular monthly meeting. The 53 percent property tax increase during the year accounted for \$21,000.

The previous fiscal year ended with a \$70,088 deficit.

A \$586,124 budget was adopted for fiscal year 1988-89. This budget is approximately \$6,000 lower than the previous year. Included in the 1988-89 budget is \$12,500 earmarked for a new police department patrol car.

Budget for the approaching year includes a \$884 deficit. This represents the price of a new fire truck radio which was ordered but not received before March 30.

Expenditures incorporated into the budget adopted Thursday by the city governing body include: administration, \$109,579; police department, \$92,994; fire department, \$27,675; street department, \$66,224; dump and sanitation department, \$47,542; park, CC, CF and MC, \$10,090; water and sewer department, \$218,262; bonds and interest, \$11,250; and undetermined capital out-

lay, \$2,518.

SEAL COATING BIDS

City Engineer A.C. Bowden recommended that the city undertake a seal coating project involving several streets and portions of streets. He estimates that 27,000 square yards of seal coating are needed and places the cost at \$16,000 to \$17,000.

The city has \$15,000 budgeted for seal coating.

Sealed bids will be opened at the regular May session, 7 p.m. on the 12th. Stipulations include an Aug. 1 deadline for completion of the project.

Owen Thornton was re-appointed as a Lockney director on the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority board. Directors are named to two-year terms.

A mutual aid agreement between the Lockney and Floydada fire departments was unanimously approved.

The city has been invited to participate in contributing funds for the Floyd County Industrial Development Board to participate in an area study concerning the continued operation of railroad spurs which Santa Fe Railroad desires to sell.

The matter of a donation to the study fund died for lack of a motion. Council members expressed wholehearted support for the continued rail service in Floyd County, but would prefer to have the area fund used for operation of the line rather than a study.

A revised ordinance for the Lockney Community Center was approved.

The matter of closing an alley between the Robert L. Spencer and

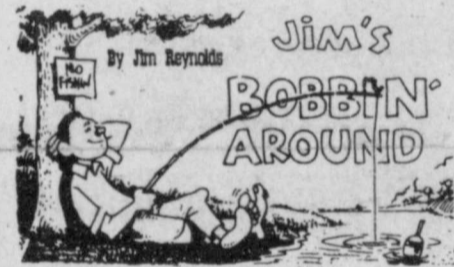
and the third place finisher receives 20 percent.

Highlighting the awards was first place in community service. This pertained to The Beacon's efforts in conjunction with the Lockney Senior Citizens. A scrapbook containing articles and photos about the organization during 1987 was entered.

New Mexico Press Association leaders judged entries.

The Beacon also won first place in

front page layout. Of The Beacon's front page, judges commented: "outstanding all the way around! The excellent layout is consistent, and appealing. The art is generally very attractive. The only suggested changes are minor; try some spot color. Also, instead of bold and bold italic heads, try bold and light heads."

Floyd County Hesperian, which received seven awards, was second in front page layout. Editor Reynolds makes up front pages of both The Beacon and The Hesperian.

In the use of photography category, Floyd County newspapers also placed one-two. The Hesperian was first and The Beacon was second.

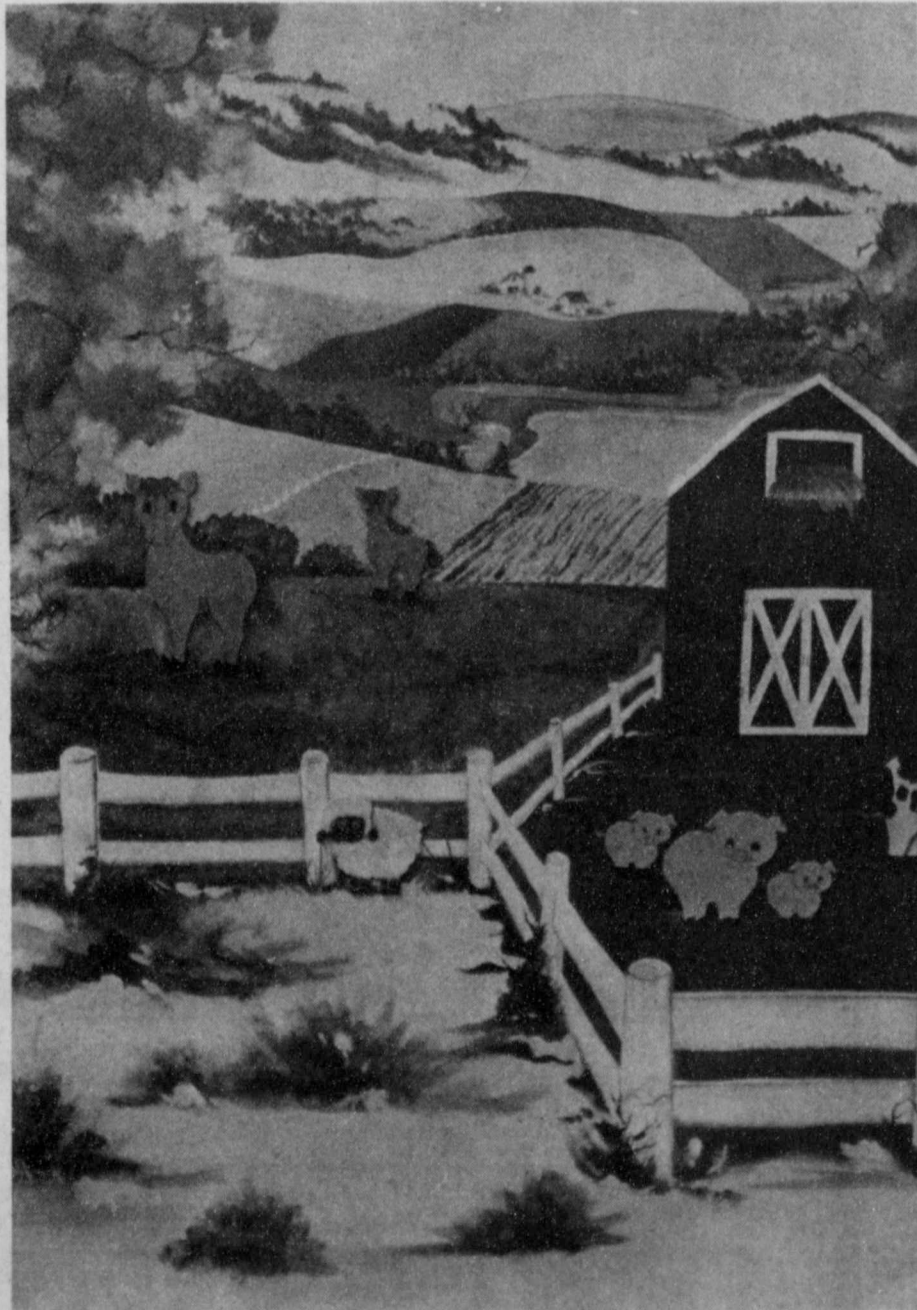
The Lockney newspaper received

It was third in general excellence, which is based on a point system. Castro County News of Dimmitt received first place in general excellence among weeklies and The Floyd County Hesperian was second.

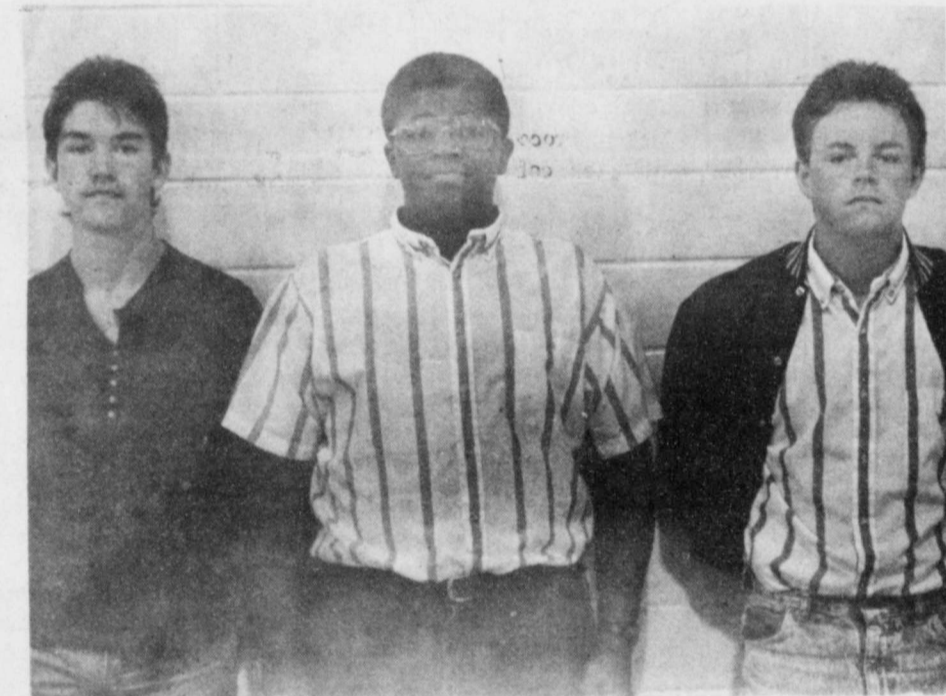

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Walser celebrates 100

Hereford and Deaf Smith County pioneer, C.R. (Charlie) Walser, celebrated his 100th birthday on March 27 in Hereford. He was honored with a family luncheon and friends were then invited to a birthday party at the American Legion Hall that afternoon.

Among his 98 descendants, 82 were in attendance for the celebrations.

Attending from Lockney were granddaughter Betty Hayes, great-grandson and great-granddaughter Cody Hayes and Devra Arjona, and great-great-grandchildren, Holly and Ty Arjona. Also attending from Lockney were Cleatis Hayes and Johnny Arjona.

Walser, born in Montague County, Texas, on March 26, 1888, was the ninth of 13 children born to Samuel Lafayette and Matt Ingram Walser. He moved to Deaf Smith County in March 1917 with his wife Della Lance and his brother and his wife, S.L. Walser and Laura (Lance). The girls were sisters and married the Walser brothers.

Both brothers bought land northwest of Summerfield and began farming.

While living on the farm, Charlie had a thrashing machine which was steam powered and later purchased

the first combine sold in Deaf Smith County.

Walser served as a deacon in the Summerfield Baptist Church and instigated the first rebuilding of the original church. He also served several terms as a Summerfield School trustee. He remains a charter member of Consumers Fuel Association.

In 1954, Walser leased his farm out and moved into Hereford.

He took his first plane ride in 1987 when his sons, Guy and W.H. flew with him to the Lithotripter Center in Dallas. He still enjoys an active life and likes to watch sporting events on television and likes to have coffee at the Summerfield cafe once or twice a day.

Hosting the celebrations were his children Guy Walser of Summerfield, D.C. and W.H. Walser, and Leatrus Clark, all of Hereford, and their spouses. Assisting with the preparations were his grandchildren and great-grandchildren and their spouses. All but three of his 18 grandchildren were expected for the event.

This past week was the time for Unicare's Skills Olympics. Employees of Lockney Care Center competed in their skills in nursing and dietary.

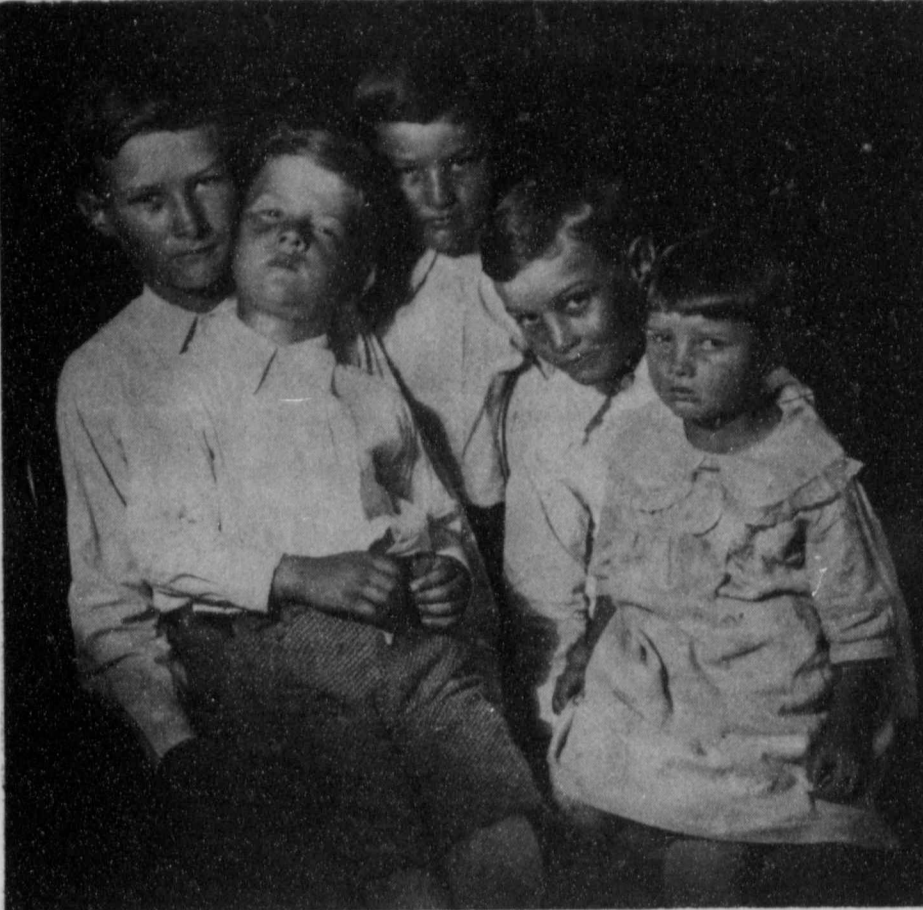

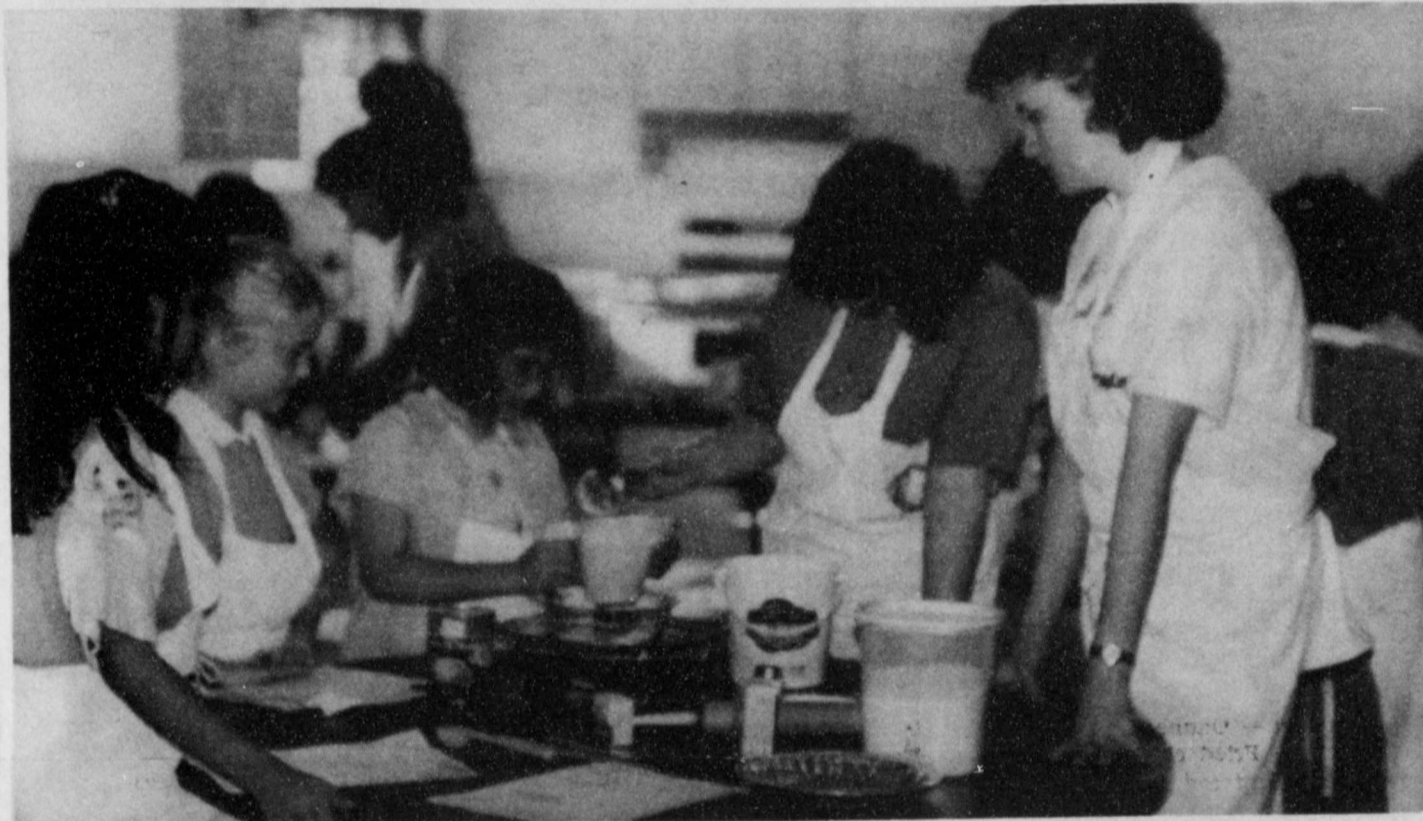

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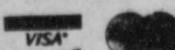
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Pfc. Martha Reyes earns State Guard distinction
