


Property owners, council discuss dilapidated structures in Lockney

Tempers flare during public hearing

Lockney City Council rarely has guests for its sessions. The reverse was true last Tuesday night when dozens of individuals filed into the Community Center for a public hearing to "consider whether or not certain buildings/structures are vacant and dangerous as defined in the City of Lockney's Ordinance No. 213, 'Model Dilapidated Structure Removal Ordinance."

Forty-eight parcels were originally listed for discussion during the hearing,

but some owners made arrangements with the city governing body to clear away dilapidated structures prior to Tuesday night.

Tempers occasionally flared in verbal exchanges between property owners and city officials.

Owners or representatives of 23 properties due discussion appeared before the council. No representative was present for the remaining nine plots in question.

Mayor Dan Smith, Aldermen Ronnie Aston, J.D. Copeland, Jerry Johnson, Gary Marr and Kenneth Wofford, Attorney Paul Lyle and City Secretary Erma Lee Duckworth represented the city at the 7 p.m. hearing.

Following are situations reviewed and decisions developed during the lengthy session about the 22 properties which had owners or representatives present: *Raymond Ortegon, owner of the east 45 feet of Lot 1, Block 4, Original Town, said he was using the structure in question for storage and agreed to make some necessary repair. Johnson made a motion to accept this condition as compliance with the ordinance and Marr seconded. Votes in this and all other motions during the evening were unanimous.

*Lionel Gonzales, owner of lots 18-20, Block 2, Hadley Addition, told the council that members of his family had come from Denver City to make repairs

process of tearing down the house. The governing body allowed him 30 days to finish the project.

*Jose Moncivais said that he would like to repair his building - located on Lot 6, Block E, N.B. Davis - and use it for storage. He was alloted three months to complete the repairs.

*Mrs. Guinn Bailey and two sons requested time to tear down the structures in question. They own 72.5 feet of Lot 12 and the east 37.5 feet of Lot 11, Block A, N.B. Davis. They will be allowed three months.

*Mrs. Frank Amador, owner of .2 acres in the W.M. Johnson Survey, was represented by Pete Gonzales. He

agreed that the old structure would be torn down, and was given three months. *Anatalio Sales, owner of Lot 5, Block

1. Tuttle Addition, was told that his violation came under the building code. He was advised to contact building inspector Richard McCarty to find what he should do to bring his property under compliance.

*Mariana Arevalo, owner of Lots 1-4 and part of Lot 5, Block C, D.F. Davis Addition, was represented by Ramon Arevalo, who told the council that he would repair the barn and sheds. Two months will be allowed for the repairs. *Noe Blanco Sr., owner of Lot 13 and




'Country Jubilee' selected as theme for fair

OTHER BUSINESS

In other action, board members approved booth space for United Blood Services of Lubbock to conduct a blood drive on Saturday, August 20, during the fair. Blood Services has agreed to bring its air conditioned mobile unit for the drive, and the fair board will donate the space needed for the motor home to set up.

Blood Services official Cheryl Keefer has informed The Beacon that they are planning to give free T-shirts to those who donate at the fair drive.

They will set up on the fairgrounds about 10:00 a.m. and will be ready to begin taking donations just as soon as the parade is over that Saturday morning. At the present time, they are planning to stay until about 4:30 p.m., however the time will be lengthened if necessary.

During the meeting, Laura Johnson, partner in Floydada Ford-Mercury, presented a new idea to board members. She will try to arrange with several new car dealers to have a new car show during the fair. This will be further discussed at the next meeting.

Board members also approved a new by-law during the meeting whereby no one may keep livestock on the fairgrounds without prior approval of the board.

RODEO ARENA

Board members also discussed the condition of the wooden structures and walkways at the rodeo arena.

"All of the wood is rotten and is a serious safety hazard, especially with so many children on the grounds during the fair," stated one board member.

Directors agreed to ask for public assistance. "If there is anyone who would like to fix up the wooden structures, they are free to do so. However if no one is interested in fixing

these areas, they will be torn down. We Fraze, DarLee Foster, Ethelyn Vernon, have a responsibility to the children who visit the grounds during the fair. These wooden structures could cause serious injury if they are not fixed up or removed," stated the board member.

Anyone who is interested in repairing fences, gates, and elevated walkways should contact Reeda Cay Smith before the next board meeting set for Monday, May 9.

The couple are parents of a daughter, Torie, who is two.


"We hate to leave Lockney and our friends here," Josey told The Beacon. He adds that "Other than

building in question was used for storing building material, which the family intends to use to remodel the house. A grace period of three months was allowed to complete the remodeling.

*The owner of the east one-half of Block A, D.F. Davis Addition, Mary Lou Bollman stated that she intended to have the property repaired, but did not know how long it would require. The council voted to give her one year to complete the task.

*Manuel DeLeon, owner of two acres in the W.M. Johnson Survey, stated that it had been in his plans to tear down a building in question. He was allowed a one-year extension.

*Odilia Gonzales was given four months to repair her house. Her property is located on the south one-half of east one-half of Block 4, W.E. Brogdon Survey.

*Roman Guerrero, owner of Lots 8-10, Block 6, Brewster-3, was represented by his wife, who stated that the family needed time to repair a garage. A three-month period was granted.

*Three months were also granted to Louis Riddley to repair buildings on Lots 4-5, Block 28, Original Town.

*Brett Marble, owner of Lot 3, part of Lots 3-5 and 11-12 and all of Lots 14-16, Block 15, Guest and Ramsey Addition, was represented by Don Marble. He stated that repair of the garage and sheds was planned. A three-month extension was granted.

*The Myrtle Burke house was represented by Keith Stansell. It is located on Lots 3-4, Block 2, Day Addition. Stansell told the council that he was attempting to get the house torn down for the lumber, but if he couldn't, he would make other arrangements. Three months will be given to complete the demolition/clearance.

*George M. Howard agreed to repair his property if given time. He received three months to make the repairs on his property, which is the west one-fourth of Block A, D.F. Davis Addition.

*The O.J. Huggins Estate — west parts of Lots 1-10, 11-12 and 14-16, Block 1, Brewster-3 Addition — was represented by John Huggins. After discussion, the council decided that "the buildings can stay as they are."

*Thomas A. Hutton Jr., owner of one acre in the J.C. McFarland Survey, was represented by Tommy Hutton. He was given three months to complete the demolition. *D.V. (Jack) Whitfill discussed with the city governing body his property which is TRE 1, Block E, J.D. Burleson Survey. He said some repairs have been made and that he would tear down the old boxcar. He was given a three-month period to complete the work.

ed by Paul Wilson. Four months were granted to complete the work.

*B.D. Jones, owner of Lots 1-2, Block 4, W.E. Brogdon Survey, was unable to attend the hearing but he was represented by a granddaughter, Brenda Poole. The council voted to allow four months for a garage to be removed.

OWNERS NOT PRESENT

Owners of nine other parcels on which the city deemed removal or renovation of structures was necessary did not attend the hearing.

Disposition of those properties includes:

*Thirty days were given for Angel B. Araujo to tear down a garage and shed on the north 70 feet of Lot 2, Block 3, Moore Addition.

*Angela Arjona was not present and the council voted to grant the owner 30 days to clear property, which is Lots 1-2, Block 2, Brewster-2 Addition.

*Thirty days are being allowed to clear the C.E. Childers Estate property, Lots 7-10, Block 12, Livesay Addition.

*W.G. Hayes, owner of Lots 24-25, Block 1, Moore-2 Addition, was not represented at the hearing. The council approved a motion to give him 60 days to complete the demolition/clearance.

*A 30-day period was extended to Robert Lopez to complete demolition on his property, Lots 1-3, 14-16, Block 4, Potts Addition.

*Red Arrow Freight Lines, owner of the north 107 feet of Lots 14-16, Block 36, Original Town, had no representative present. However, the firm had sent a message to the council that the property has been listed with realtor R.D. Baccus for sale. If it isn't sold, the company agreed to have the building torn down.

*Henry Rowell was granted 30 days extension to tear down a structure on Lot 12, Block 1, East Annex.

*Thirty days were also allowed for Juan Sanchez to "tear down his dilapidated buildings" on Lots 1-8, Block 7, Moore Addition.

*Nadine Sanders was given 30 days to tear down a livestock shed and pens from Lot 1, Block F, N.B. Davis Survey. Alderman Copeland offered a motion to pass Ordinance No. 257, "providing that the east-west portion of the alley in Block 2, Potts Annex Addition to the town of Lockney be vacated, abandoned and closed; providing for the reversion of the fee in said land; repealing all ordinances in conflict herewith; and




