Other bidders for the job included High Plains Pavers, \$20,565.00; Kerr Construction, \$18,810.00; and Appian Corp., \$21,600.00. High Plains had asked for a completion date of September 1 while all others agreed to the bid specification date of August 1. Jarnigan also agreed to complete the work in 60 days. All bidders also had a one-year warranty on their work.

Council members also reviewed bids from three companies for repainting the water tower. Those companies included Professional Sand Blasting in the amount of \$14,312.00, Water Containment Service Company in the amount of \$9,400.00 and D and S Tank Service in the amount of \$5,500.00.

In the past, Water Containment Service Co. has done the work on the water tower. However, the firm's bid is \$3,900.00 higher than the lowest bidder. Council members agreed to check out the references of D and S Tank Service and will make a final decision on this project in a special called meeting this week.

ed amount, by cutting out one and Pool. Among the items brought up were a covering around the pool, painting of the buildings and either repairing or replacing the fence.

Indoor carpeting for the entire pool area will cost \$4,053.00. This purchase alone would take up most of the money in the swimming pool account, and council members have discussed the possibility of carpeting only half of the area, from the north entrance to the five-foot mark in the pool, which is the area in which most of the falls occur because this is where most of the younger kids swim and play. Cost of carpeting this portion would be approximately \$2,500.00. Action on the carpeting was tabled until the called meeting

Also discussed and approved by the council was the painting of the pumice block structures at the swimming pool. The cost of this project will be about

The fence situation was also tabled until the called meeting. Council members are considering the possibility of either repairing the present fence or replacing it with another chain link fence or possibly a cedar fence. The final decision will be made this week.

The council entered executive session to interview applicants to run the Lockney Swimming Pool for the 1988 summer. Applicants included Debby McCarty, Vonda McLaughlin and Violet Cooper. Following the interviews, council members came out of executive session and approved the hiring of Violet Cooper to run the pool.

Council members then expressed its views to Mrs. Cooper on some new policies for the pool. There will be only certified lifeguards used at the pool and council members wish to approve all lifeguards. There must be a lifeguard on duty during all private parties and there will be at least one lifeguard on duty at all times when the pool is open. Only employees will be allowed behind the gate at the desk area.

Anyone wishing to use a basket will have to do so at the gate. A new set of rules is being drawn up and a sign is being painted to hang in the pool area. All rules will be observed by those wishing to use the pool and discipline will be stressed at the pool. Also the pool will be open longer hours this summer to facilitate its use by more of the community.

New hours, opening date and prices will be forthcoming in next week's Beacon.

In other action, council members approved purchasing scramblers for the police department radios. This request was made to enable members of the Lockney Police Department to communicate with each other when the need arises without their transmissions being monitored by private citizens with

Council members also approved the replacement of some water and sewer lines at an estimated cost of \$6,000, which is budgeted.





> We are closely monitoring the development of the 1988 TCDP competition and will let you know more details when they are finalized by the Texas Department of Commerce. As presently proposed, paving projects will not be a high priority for 1988 TCDP funding. We need to be thinking about water and wastewater projects. Under the proposed 1988 TCDP "final statement," projects with Citywide benefit will be more competitive if it can be proven that the low/moderate income benefit for a project is at least 60 percent.



If you work in Social Security covered employment or self-employment, you should occasionally check to see that your earnings have been credited under your name and Social Security number.

At the Social Security Administration, we keep individual records of earnings for life, and we can provide everybody who asks for it with a statement of his or her earnings.

People, especially those who change jobs often, should check their records about every 3 years. This is the best way to be sure that the employers have reported their employees' earnings

It is very easy to get a Statement of Earnings. All you have to do is to ask for a Form 7004PC (Request for Statement of Earnings) at any Social Security office. After you complete this form and mail it back to Social Security, you will receive a summary statement of earnings. It takes a few weeks to receive the statement, and the service is free of charge.

If you request the number of quarters of coverage you have and a benefit estimate, it will be shown in the

If your earnings statement shows retirement, depend on it.

touch with the nearest Social Security office, and the people there will help to correct your record.

Under the law, an earnings record can be corrected within 3 years, 3 months, and 15 days after the year in which the wages were paid or selfemployment income was earned. For instance, the time to correct the earnings record for the calendar year 1985 is 1/1/86 through 4/15/89.

After the time limit has passed, the record can be corrected only if certain exceptions apply: For example, to correct an entry established through fraud; to correct a mechanical, clerical, or other obvious errors; and to correct errors that caused earnings to be credited to the wrong person or the wrong period. The time limit is suspended while a person is in the active military service.

If you want more information about the exceptions for these time limits, call or visit any Social Security office.

But, remember that it is very important to review your earnings record every 3 years and to have it corrected if it is not accurate. Your eligibility for monthly benefits and Medicare, as well as the amount of benefits you will receive at




## Ty Williams will exhibit angus cattle at new show
