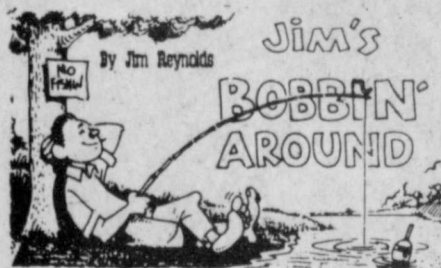

The new Lockney vo-ag instructor

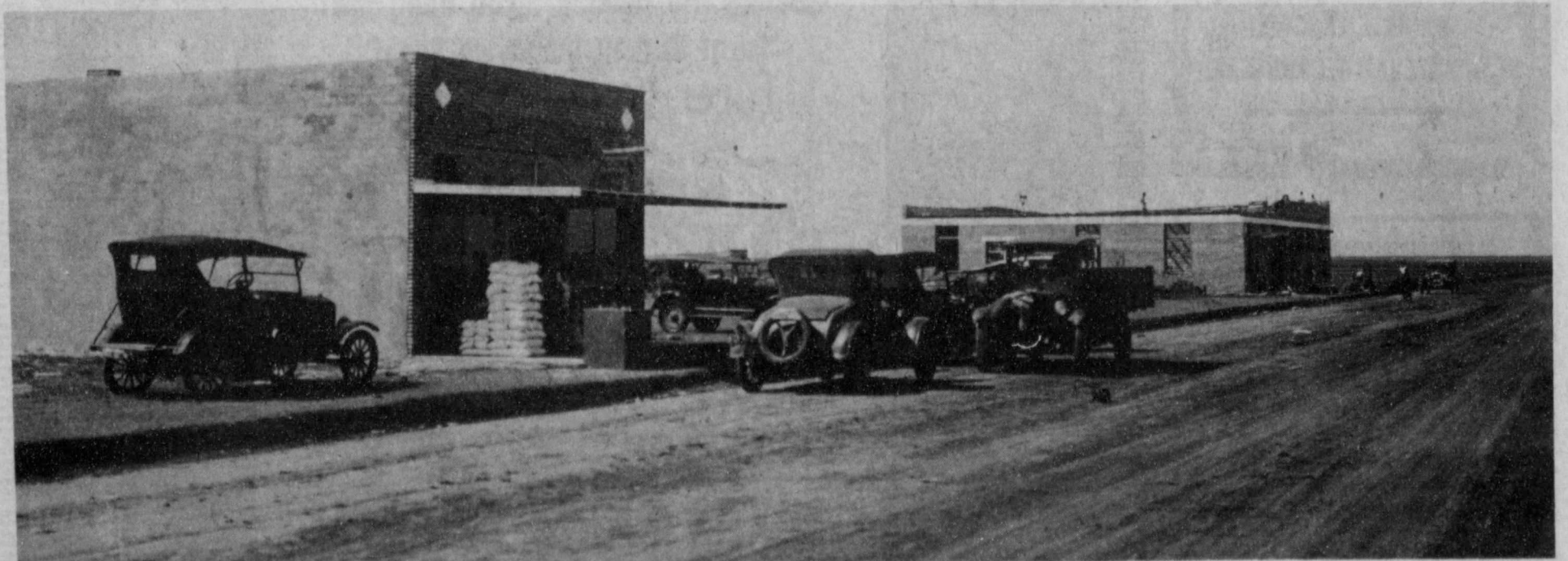
has raised show pigs for sale during the past eight years, and has raised show calves for sale during the past 10 years.

Giant reunion Sunday afternoon at South Plains School

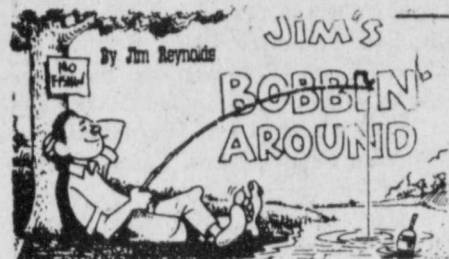

Members of the Lockney High School Class of 1988 were honored Friday, May 20, with the annual awards assembly. Scholarships were announced and several honors were presented to students.

Principal James Poole made several of the announcements. Representatives of several local clubs and organizations were on hand to present awards to students.

Two new scholarships were added to those awarded each year. They were the Russell McAnally Memorial Scholarship and the Charles Ball Memorial Scholarship.

The Russell McAnally Memorial Scholarship, which was presented to Missy Anderson, is given through memorials for the Rev. McAnally, who pastored several churches, including Lockney, in his many years as a Methodist minister. Miss Anderson will receive \$400, \$200 per semester, for her freshman year in college.

The Charles Ball Memorial Scholarship, which was presented to Salvador Martinez Jr., was presented by Eddie Teeter and will be presented each year to a student planning to enter a technical school or vocational nursing training. The scholarship funds will be raised yearly through the annual Charles Ball Memorial Fishing Tournament. (See related article.)

PUBLIC NOTICES

ORDINANCE NO. 256

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING RENTAL AND USE OF THE COMMUNITY CENTER ON SOUTHEAST 8TH STREET IN LOCKNEY, TEXAS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOCKNEY, TEXAS THAT:

SECTION 1. Ordinance No. 217 is hereby repealed.

SECTION 2. Use of the Lockney Community Center ("the Center") located on Southeast 8th Street in Lockney, Texas, shall be controlled by this ordinance and by any additional rules and regulation that may be adopted by the City Council.

SECTION 3. The Center is owned and maintained for the use of residents of the City of Lockney area only. Individuals, firms, corporations, clubs, or associations may lease the Center and shall be responsible for any damage to the structure or the contents thereof during the time of the lease. Improper use, damage or failure to observe the rules and regulations will result in the payment for all damages and cause for refusal of future rental/lease privileges.

SECTION 4. The City Secretary, or his/her designee, shall be responsible for the administration of the rules, regulations and policies covering the Center. Any decision of the City Secretary regarding interpretation of the rules, regulations and policies of the Center may be appealed to the City Council by filing a written notice of the appeal with the City Secretary. Appeals must be filed within fifteen (15) days after the decision; otherwise, the decision shall be final.

SECTION 5. Reservations for use of the Center shall be made through the City Secretary's office at City Hall in Lockney, Texas, during normal business hours. Verbal or tentative reservations shall not be valid, and no commitment by the City shall exist until a written contract is completed and all charges required are satisfied. Reservations shall be on a first-come-first-serve basis and will not be accepted for more than six (6) months in advance, unless authorized by the City Secretary. Refund on rental and deposit payments will be made if written notice of cancellation is received at least forty-eight (48) hours in advance of scheduled use. No refund will be made on rental payments if cancellations are made with less than forty-eight (48) hours advance notice.

SECTION 6. Use of the Center shall be and is hereby restricted to residents of the City of Lockney, Texas area.

SECTION 7. No lease of the Center shall be made to anyone who is under eighteen (18) years of age. A drivers license or other means of formal identification, such as a social security card, a voting registration or other governmental issued identification card, must be furnished by each Lessee to verify age and residence. If the identification shows a Lockney address, it will be assumed that the person is a Lockney resident. The driver's license or other identification number along with the person's name and address shall be included on the lease agreement.

SECTION 8. Use by the City for official purposes or city sponsored events shall have priority over all other uses, and shall include the right to pre-empt other uses, even though committed by the City, upon fifteen (15) days written notice by the City to the lessee.

SECTION 9. All payments, including the lease fee and the clean up deposit fee will be paid when written contract is completed. The deposit fee will be returned to the leasing individual upon the acceptance of the facility by the City Secretary or her/his designated representative. The fee returnable will not be available before 10:00 a.m., on the first working day following the use of the facility.

SECTION 10. The Center may be used from 8:00 a.m., until midnight on the day specified in the contract of lease. The building may remain in use until 1:00 a.m., for cleanup purposes only. All facilities must be cleaned, closed and secured as of 1:00 a.m., with all lights turned out. Any and all use beyond the established time of 1:00 a.m., must have the written approval of the City Secretary in advance of the action.

SECTION 11. Use of the Center does not entitle the lessee to extend electrical lines or water service outside the building.

SECTION 12. The Center shall be cleaned by the lessee immediately after use. This shall include sweeping and mopping of floors, cleaning of restrooms and kitchen, placing all furniture in proper storage area, etc. Trash cans shall be emptied, the building shall be left clean and all windows and doors shall be locked and lights shall be turned off. If the Center is found by the lessee to be in an unsanitary or unclean condition, then the lessee (or applicant) agrees to report such condition to the City Secretary before using the Center. This action is required at all times and days, including weekends and holidays. This action is to be accomplished by calling City Hall or the Water Superintendent. If City Hall is closed, the Water Superintendent will then personally inspect the facility before it is used to verify the condition. If the lessee neglects to report such a condition, he thereby assumes responsibility of accepting the premises as being clean. The lessee shall be responsible for all damage done to the facility during its use. The lessee shall

return the keys to City Hall in Lockney by 10:00 a.m., the first working day following the use of the Center. The deposit shall be held until the Center is accepted by City officials. In the event the building does not meet prescribed standards of cleanliness or if damage is found or any of the rules are violated, the appropriate amount up to the entire deposit will be subject to forfeiture as determined by City Secretary.

SECTION 13. It shall be the responsibility of the Lessee to provide adequate supervision over all activities. The City Secretary, at his/her discretion, may require the use of security guards, which must be off-duty Lockney policemen or Floyd County deputies. The lessee will be responsible for paying for the service of said security personnel. Disturbances will not be permitted, and if a disturbance does occur, the Lockney Police Department may order the Center closed, and all fees shall be forfeited.

SECTION 14. The City may require the lessee to provide insurance before the building is used.

SECTION 15. No use of the Center shall be exclusive of the right officials, including police, to enter the premises and building at any time, without notice or cause, to determine whether the terms of this ordinance and any lease and rules and regulations adopted pursuant hereto are being complied with.

SECTION 16. The consumption of alcoholic beverages in the Center or on the City property surrounding same, including beer and wine, is not permitted. If during inspection of the premises any evidence of the consumption of alcoholic beverages, including beer and wine, are found, it shall be the responsibility of the lessee, and all deposits will be forfeited, in addition to prosecution under the law.

SECTION 17. The following classifications of use, and no other, shall be the categories of lessees who may use the Center:

(a) **Official use.** Use by the City for official purposes or city-sponsored events;

(b) **Youth Organizational Activities.** Use by non-profit organized youth organizations, such as boy scouts, girl scouts, public school-sponsored groups, and similar organizations. Such organizations must be certified as non-profit and have a local mailing address with proper title.

(c) **Parties.** Use by individuals or groups for private or public parties, including weddings, dances, parties, and social gatherings, sponsored by individuals, groups or organizations, whether attendance is by invitation only or open to the public.

(d) **Public, Civic, Charity & Cultural Use.** Use for activities of general public interest by public, civic, and charitable, and cultural organizations and other uses not included in the foregoing categories. This includes use by organizations exempt under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

SECTION 18. The Center may be used for religious purposes but not for regularly scheduled church services for more than a four-week period, it being the intention of the City to avoid the establishment or maintenance or protection of any religion.

SECTION 19. The premises shall not be used by any lessee for lewd, obscene, indecent or illegal purposes.

SECTION 20. The minimum actual cost of operating the Center for any and all events or attractions, except official use, shall be determined and no free use thereof shall be permitted, extended or granted to any individual, organization or group.

SECTION 21. Once a contract has been signed and necessary payments have been made, it is the total responsibility of the lessee to pick up the proper keys to the Center. The failure to obtain the keys before 5:00 p.m., on the appropriate day will require the payment of a service call fee of \$20.00 in the event the lessee requests after-hour services in the issue of the subject key. This \$20.00 fee will be in addition to the regular user fee charges and must be paid at the time the keys are issued after normal business hours.

SECTION 22. The usage fee for the Center is \$35.00 per day and the cleanup deposit is \$50.00. Additional changes in said amounts may be made by simple vote of the City Council without ordinance or amendment of this ordinance.

SECTION 23. The attorney for the City is hereby directed to prepare a lease contract and other documents necessary or deemed by him advisable to implement the terms and provisions of this ordinance.
