Herman and Helen Huffman were revealed Saturday as the honored pioneer couple at the 1988 version of the Floyd County Pioneer Day, Hubert E. Frizzell was cited as the Pioneer Man, and the Pioneer Woman was Ruth Pitts Battey. Tribute was also paid to the late Frank Brown.

A framed certificate was presented to each.

Frizzell was named president of the association to plan and execute the '89 Old Settlers reunion. Travis Jones was named vice president, Gayle Reay of Lockney was re-elected as secretary and Norman Muncy is the new treasurer.

Mr. and Mrs. Huffman and Frizzell are Lockney community residents, as was Brown.

Lon Davis Jr. introduced the honored pioneers.

farm in Floyd County, Prairie Chapel Community, seven miles north of Lockney, where his father settled in the early 1900s. Herman and Helen still reside on this property.

"Herman first went to school at the Bobbitt School, by walking, riding horseback or an occasional buggy ride. He later attended Prairie Chapel School, closer to home.

"As a young man he met Helen Walker, a young miss from Hale Center who came to Lone Star Community to teach in 1927. Some of the Lone Star students are still residents of Floyd County and still lovingly call her "Miss Helen."

"After her marriage, Helen became a homemaker and began her work as homemaker and volunteer to help others. Herman continued to farm, having started out using a team. The work was hard and tedious, later leading to the purchase of his first tractor. A tractor lightened the load.

"The age of irrigation came and has nearly passed in these few years.

Herman drilled his first irrigation well in 1934. He has farmed the usual crops that have made the cycles of the years. Sorghum was a strong leader, being harvested by heading with a knife to the ultra-modern combines. With irrigation, cotton became a crop along with alfalfa, wheat, cane and soybeans.

"There were always a few cows, chickens, pigs and a big truck patch of vegetables needed to supplement the home-grown meats with. They are still tending a garden and there's still a few old cows and baby calves to watch as the days go by.

"Herman and Helen's marriage of 57 years in Floyd County survived the depression and they have shared interests in many church and community affairs. They are now active as a couple in Lockney First United Methodist Church, Eastern Star and Senior Citizens.

"Herman carries on a family tradition in belonging to the Masonic Lodge and has served as worshipful master of the Lockney Lodge.

"Helen was a charter member of the Lone Star LaVentana Study Club, has been a member of Extension Homemakers over 50 years and is a member of UMW Circle, Pink Ladies and the Tops Club. Helen has given many loving hours of volunteer work visiting the sick and bereaved in the past. She now is an avid "42" player, playing once a week with the ladies.

"To this marriage three children were born: Janet, Joe and Charles. There are five grandchildren and six great-grandchildren."

Sen. Gramm will tour Tye Co. on Saturday

Economic development visit

The Tye Co. in Lockney will be the focal point Saturday of an economic development visit from Sen. Phil Gramm. The senator has been on a "work tour" while attempting to promote economic development across the state.

Meeting the senator at Floydada Municipal Airport "about 1 o'clock" will be County Judge Bill Hardin, mayors Dan Smith of Lockney and Parnell Powell of Floydada and Bill Hale, president of the Floydada Development Co.

The four men are to accompany Sen. Gramm to the Tye Co., where he will be met by John Tye, president of the company. As the group advances to the firm's "break room," Sen. Gramm will be introduced to "15 to 20" persons from each of the county towns.

Being invited to meet with the senator are county and city governing bodies, chambers of commerce and development company personnel and "a few leading agri-business people."

Tye will brief the group about the company's history, past expansions, innovative designs, competitive edge, economic impact on Floyd County and a description of the manufacturing process.

The ensuing tour is to include a walk-through of the company's sheet metal process, the drill press area, a large welding room, warehousing facilities and the final assembly area. Here, several completed pieces of equipment will be on display for the senator to observe and be briefed on their design.

In the final assembly room, Tye will ask the senator to address the group, followed by a reception time.

Sen. Gramm will then be accompanied back to the Floydada airport.

The senator's non-partisan tours across the state are for the purpose of economic development, The Beacon was told.

Lost class ring returned

Dropped in lake 'at least 20 years ago'

Stanley Watson is grateful to "a young man" but he doesn't know who he is.

"At least 20 years ago" while Watson — a 1966 graduate of Lockney High School — was studying at Texas Tech University, he and friends were riding a raft on a stream or small lake which feeds into Buffalo Springs Lake, near Lubbock.

The Lockney native had his hand in the water when he felt his class ring slip from his finger and into the murky waters. Watson and his friends searched diligently for the missing ring, but their efforts were fruitless.

Watson had no doubt that his class ring was gone forever.

During a phone conversation with his mother, Mrs. Raymond (Leona) Watson asked her son "Where's your class ring?"

After a brief pause, he answered "in Buffalo Springs Lake!"

PLEASANT SURPRISE

He was pleasantly — and totally — surprised when his mom explained that she had the ring in her possession.

She had received a phone call a few days earlier from Dorothy Jarrett, the Lockney High School secretary, who revealed that "There was a young man here who brought your son's ring back."

Seeing the "1966" engraved on the ring, Mrs. Jarrett searched through the names of members of that class and found that Watson's were "the only initials close."

She initially told Mrs. Watson that initials appearing on the ring were "SJW," and the mother said the ring was not her son's because his initials are "SMW" (Stanley Max Watson.) Closer inspection revealed that "the points on the 'M' are real close together and you can't see it too well."

Unfortunately, the "young man" who found the ring has not been identified. The high school office was "full of people" that day, and the individual did not leave his name and address.

"It's in remarkably good shape," Mrs. Watson says of the long-lost ring. "It doesn't look like it had been in water that long (20 or more years)."

Mrs. Jarrett remarked that "with the price of gold what it is today, the ring is worth much more today than when Stanley bought it." The man who returned it could have sold the ring.

'HONEST PERSON'

"There's at least one honest person in the world," Mrs. Watson says.

says of the individual. "I wish we knew who he is."

She believes the man who found the ring probably was not a Lockneyite or Mrs. Jarrett and others in the school office would have known him.

The high school secretary believes that the person "made a special trip" to deliver the ring.

The two women "have no idea" how or where the ring was discovered. "I don't know if it washed ashore or what," says Mrs. Watson, who taught at the former Lakeview School for 2½ years and who was a first grade and special education instructor in the local school system for 24 years. Her husband is a retired mechanic.

"I've never heard of anything being found that long afterward," Mrs. Watson says, adding that "it

doesn't seem possible it's been 20 years."

With a smile, she says, "I don't know whether Stanley can wear this ring, because he's a little larger than he was when he graduated." He resides with his family in Garland and is co-owner of a cabinet and woodworking shop in Balch Springs.

"We're thankful to someone, but we don't know who," says Mrs. Watson, the gratitude ringing through. "I hope whoever found the ring has relatives or friends who read The Beacon so he will know that we appreciate" the good deed.

But she doesn't advise anyone with a lost ring to expect to have it returned 20 years later...especially from a lake!

Following is Davis' introduction of Frizzell as pioneer man of the year:

"Hubert has the distinction of being a lifelong resident of Floyd County. He first saw the light of day in the Ramsey Community, east of Lockney in Floyd County.

"He attended school at Bobbitt, Whitfield, Prairie Chapel and Lockney. "He married Agnes Elizabeth Johnston in the year 1936, and they have one son, Tony Frizzell.

"Hubert has had many diverse interests in his professional and civic activities:

"(1) He owned and operated the Lone Star Oil Co. for 10 years.

"(2) He was associated with Lockney Consumers Fuel Assn. and later a board member.

"(3) His principal business interests have been agriculturally oriented. He continues to be a Floyd County landowner and operates a farming operation at this time. In conjunction with this, he runs a commercial sheep and cattle feeding business.

"His efforts and his interests in behalf of his community and West Texas at large have been monumental:

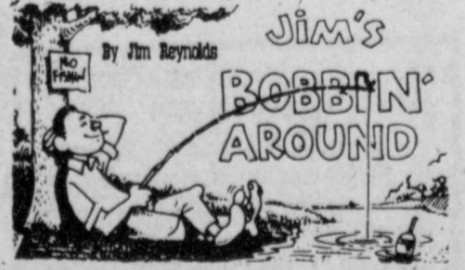
"(1) He helped organize the Lockney General Hospital, as well as the Lockney Care Center.

"(2) He has served as president and director of the Lockney Rotary Club, and he has served in the like capacity for the Floyd County Fair Association and also the same with the Floyd County Old Settlers group.

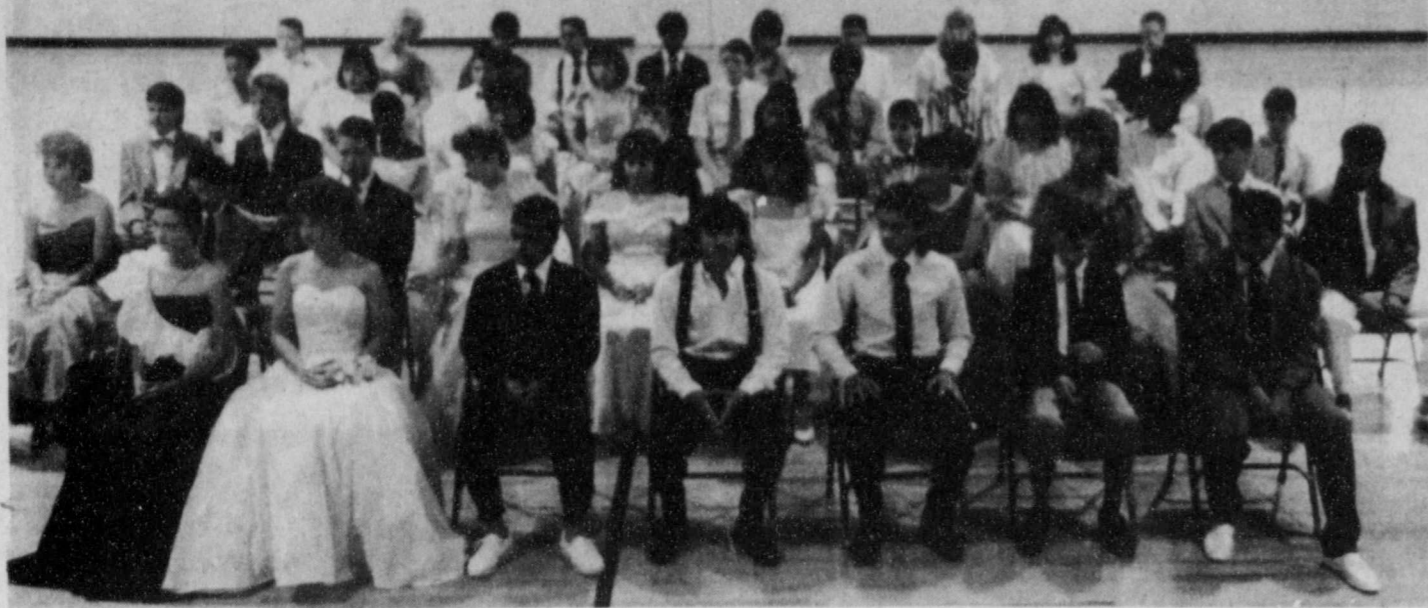
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Aguilar love fund established here

TRIBUTE TO FRANK BROWN

Frank Brown, a longtime Floyd County resident prior to his recent death, was paid tribute to Frank Brown by Frizzell.

His widow, Ora Brown, and other family members were recognized.

Following are Frizzell's comments: Frank Brown was born in 1909, in Clay County, Texas. He came to Floyd County in 1911, by train with mother Alice, and brother Arthur. His father, Charlie Brown, drove a team and wagon in their journey to Floyd County which took two weeks.

His grandfather, S.P. Brown, gave each of his seven children a 1/2 section of land and Charlie's 320 was 12 miles north of Floydada and 5 miles east of Lockney.

Charlie died of pneumonia when Frank was six years old. Leaving Alice to raise Frank, Arthur, Ruth and Carol. The children attended Roseland School which is 1/4 of a mile from their house and Alice taught in the school for seventeen years.

Frank started farming at an early age. In 1935, he married Ora Calahan and they had two children, Charlyne who is now Mrs. Dorsey Lynn Baker of West Chicago, Illinois, and Dale, who is married to Nancy Forbes and lives in Arlington, Texas. Frank and Ora had three granddaughters. Stacey and Kari Baker, and Nanette Brown.

Frank enjoyed his granddaughters and other young people in the community. He kept horses for them to ride and wanted them to appreciate the western life that he loved so much.

He often made puzzles and games which he shared - not only with the children but with older friends and took them to the nursing homes for others to enjoy.

After he retired from farming he started oil painting and especially liked to paint western scenes with subjects typical of this area.

The early history of Floyd County, Texas, was of special interest to Frank. In 1987, he completed research on a history of the Lazy F Ranch. He enjoyed talking with early settlers in compiling his information. The Brown home place was at one time a part of the Lazy F Ranch.

Frank served on many different committees for the County. He was President of the Floyd County Pioneer Association. He served on the board of the Floyd County Historical Museum. He was a member of the Lockney First Baptist Church. Frank was also a Mason and a member of the Eastern Star.

Frank became ill on Christmas Day, 1987, and died twenty-five days later on January 19, 1988, of viral pneumonia.

On behalf of Floyd County and surrounding areas, we deeply regret the passing of such a great man and pioneer who will long be remembered for many years.

Frizzell retires as hospital director

Hubert Frizzell has retired from his position as director of Lockney General Hospital District following the expiration of his term of office. His place on the board was filled by Les Ferguson, who was elected in the April 7 election.

Frizzell has served the Governing Board of Lockney General Hospital in various capacities for many years. He has observed the transition which has occurred from the days when being a hospital board member was simply a civic honor requiring more or less regular attendance at board meetings and participation in fundraising campaigns to current times when board members are legally accountable for both the quality of patient care and for the financial health of the hospital itself.

He began his commitment to health care in Lockney back in 1947, serving on the first board of directors when Lockney General Hospital was formed as the Floyd County Cooperative Hospital. The following year Hubert was instrumental in funding and procuring the original buildings, which now make up a portion of the current facility, from Camp Bowie in Brownwood.

He served on that board until 1954 when ownership of the hospital changed. Remaining true to his mission, Hubert returned in 1973 to coordinate meetings with concerned citizens which lead to the formation of Lockney General Hospital District.

Due to his leadership abilities and strong desire to see Lockney Hospital survive, Hubert was elected president of the first Board of Directors of Lockney General Hospital District by his peers. He served for six years in that capacity along with other positions such as chairman of the Executive Committee, and chairman of the Liaison Committee.

Because the district charter mandates that a board member can only serve three consecutive two-year terms, Hubert retired from his position on the board in 1979; however, in 1982, he was again elected by the public to serve on the governing board.

During the interim period in which he was not on the board, Hubert was instrumental in the planning, funding and construction of the Cogdell Clinic which was built as a result of gifts from

the Martha Ann Cogdell Trust Fund in 1980. From April of 1982 until May of 1988, Hubert served the governing board as chairman of the Finance committee and, for a time, chairman of the Building and Grounds Committee.

Words cannot describe the contribution this Floyd County Pioneer has made to Lockney General Hospital. For its inception in 1947 to the present day, Hubert has remained steadfast in the responsibility of serving the community

in the fulfillment of a mission of ensuring that the citizens of Lockney General Hospital District have local access to quality health care.

The Board of Directors, physicians and staff of Lockney General Hospital wish to express their appreciation for the many hours of time that Hubert has given in service to the hospital. He will long be remembered for the outstanding contribution he has made to the community and hospital.

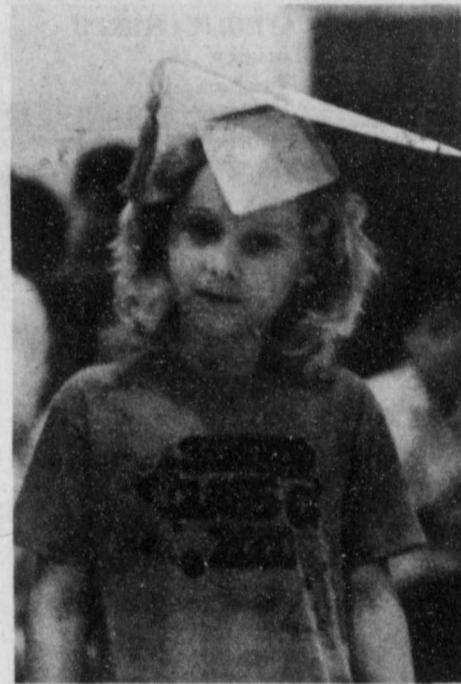
A special occasion was made for these students as they left their first year of school because they will be the seniors

"As all of you know, I am the youngest daughter of the Rev. James Allen Weathers; a Baptist minister. I am ninety years old, and have had a real good life. We came to Floyd Co. in 1904. I was in the church at Meteor (now Aiken) until I married and moved here to Lockney. I joined the church here in 1921 (67 years ago), what a long time ago!

I joined the W.M.U. soon after I joined the church. Mrs. Evie Wilson was instrumental in the organization of the local W.M.U. back in 1911. The president, when I joined, was Mrs. J.D. Stapleton; a very gracious, energetic, and well educated woman. In 1928, Mrs. Pauline Sams came into our church from Roeland (another country church). She and I immediately became very close friends and have worked together in W.M.U. until now. We have served as president and in the various other offices of this mission organization.

I have known about missions almost all my life. As a child in Sunday school I put pennies, or nickels, in the offering to be sent to the Children's Home. Then I began to study in W.M.U. about the wonderful women we still read about in ROYAL SERVICE magazine: Lottie Moon, Annie Armstrong, Mary Hill Davis, and many more. Some that we knew later, like Alma Hunt, whom I lived near at one time in South Texas.

Then, my mind goes back to women in our own church who could have been recognized right along with these mentioned above for their dedication and service in mission work. These include: Mrs. Stapleton, whom I men-

tioned earlier; Mrs. W.D. Biggers, a pastor's wife, Mrs. C.J. McCarty; Mrs. E.E. Dyer, Mrs. Della Cox, Mrs. Maggard, Mrs. Ford and Mrs. Addie Mitchell. All of these have gone to a better home. And, of course, I must mention one of our later presidents, Doris Casey, who left us a little over a year ago to go to her eternal home. Also, Essie Mae Vernon (Don's mother) who did so much for so many. For Essie Mae, missions (service to others) were a way of life.

I lovingly remember many interesting things about some of our more recent leaders also: Frankie Cobb, one of my special friends, is still as active in mission work as much as possible in her church in Arizona. Louise Hawkins and Juanita Jenkins, now serving in Lubbock, have known W.M.U. work from its beginning. Emma Thomas, Jeanette Marr, Faye Ferguson, Bobbie Kellison, Ann Handley, Melba Atkins, Ruth Mitchell, Elvira Stewart and Cornelia Johnson, who is currently serving as our president.

I am sure that I have left someone out as I have no records and this is just coming from my memory...so please forgive me for that I cannot recall.

It has been a blessing and a joy to be a part of mission work throughout the world through participation in W.M.U. At one district program I was honored to have the privilege of portraying the part of Lottie Moon."

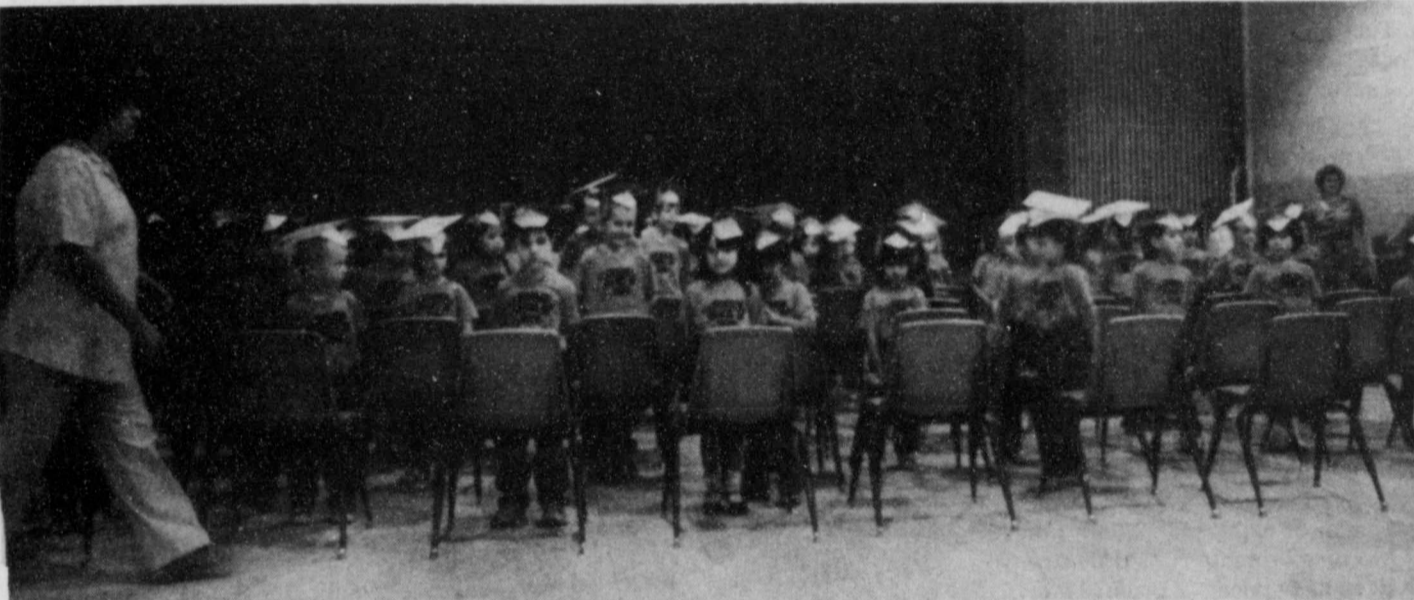
students.

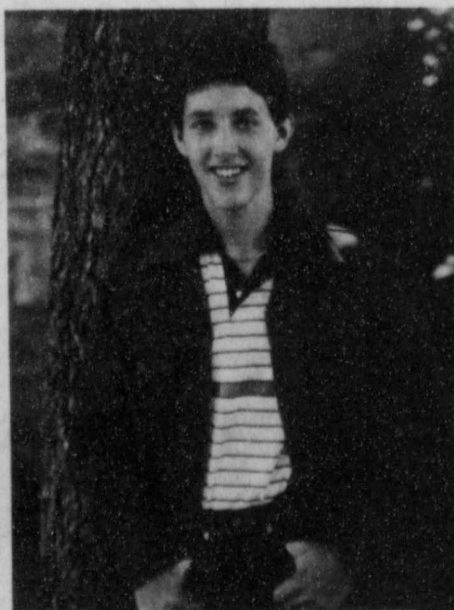
Kropp grandson receives scholarship in Lubbock

A retired farmer, he resided for many years at Aiken and later Lockney before moving in 1984 to Plainview.

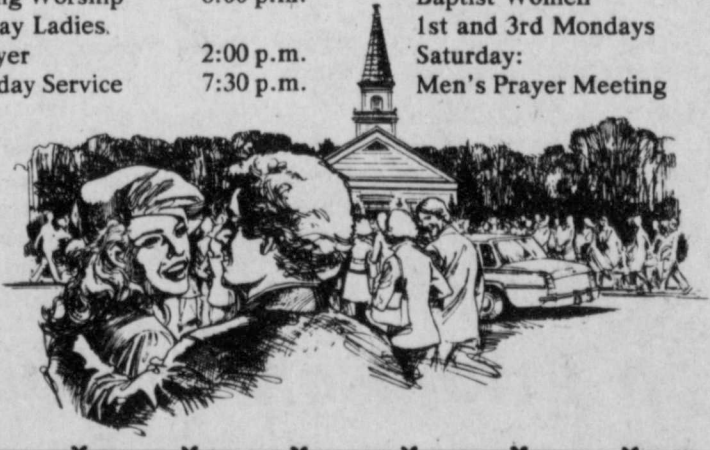
He and the former Mary Cassandra (Cassie) Whitfill were married on Dec. 5, 1915, in Lockney.
