Roy Eaton, president of the Texas Press Assn. in the TPS Messenger:

Over the years, the business founded on that pair of pants has generated more wealth than any prospector ever took out of the gold fields.

The misery of hungry children prompted Gail Borden to invent a process to keep milk sweet.

Herbert Steinway was the head of the family that created the modern American concert piano.

Gustavus Franklin Swift had his own butcher shop by the time he was 10, but really became famous when he made the refrigerated railway car a commer-

Assault charges filed following Sunday morning disturbance

Charges of "Class A assault with bodily injury" were filed Monday against a Plainview man as the result of an early Sunday morning disturbance on Northeast Third Street in Lockney.

The suspect, Roel Gurrero, 27, of Plainview, remained in Floyd County Jail at press time under \$5,000 bond.

Gurrero reportedly turned himself in to officers about noon Monday.

The disturbance, which reportedly occurred about 1 a.m. Sunday, allegedly resulted in injury to a local woman. She was taken to Lockney General Hospital and was transferred by air ambulance to a Lubbock hospital due to complications.

Although the preliminary charge was assault, "the charge should be upgraded," The Beacon was informed.

The investigation was continuing at press time Tuesday morning.

Harleen Workman McAda selected Santa Barbara's 'Woman of Year

Assistant Vice Chancellor of Student and Community Affair Harleen W. McAda has been named Santa Barbara's Woman of the Year, an annual award given by the Santa Barbara County Commission for Women.

Ms. McAda, who serves as coordinator for the Education Program to Increase Racial Awareness, the university (University of California-Santa Barbara) grievance officer for sexual harassment, a board member of the Santa Barbara Hispanic Achievement Council and a chairperson at the Vista del Monte facility for retired teachers, was chosen from a "highly competitive" group of 80 women from the five Santa Barbara districts. She most adequately demonstrated this year's competition theme, "Women Make A Difference," according to commission member. Lily Maestras.

REARED IN LOCKNEY

Locally, she is better known as the former Harlene Workman, daughter of Harley and Edna Workman. She was graduated from Lockney High School in 1954, earned a bachelor's degree from Texas Women's University in Denton, received a master's degree in biology/ education from Texas Tech University and was the first female recipient of a doctorate in science education degree from the University of Texas at Austin.

Nominees for the award were chosen on their "consistency to show their ability to make a difference to a large number of people," Maestras said.

A 22-year faculty member of the Graduate School of Education, Dr. McAda was chosen for her role in promoting racial and sexual awareness on campus and in the community, as expressed to the commission through letters of recommendation from both university and community representa-

McAda describes herself as a person who has always been in the "helping professions," beginning with her undergraduate studies at Texas Women's University. Citing the high percentage of Latino women who attended the

school, McAda believes her interest in sexual and racial discrimination stems from this "Southern state" atmosphere in which she was raised.

"Coming from a place like Texas — a very discriminatory place - the only people treated worse than women were the racial minority," she says. "You begin to see how certain people are perceived by the world and treated by others. This is unacceptable to my personal value system.'

Dr. McAda's experience in dealing with sexual and racial issues on campus comes from working for a number of years in the chancellor's office where students with cases of discrimination and sexual harassment were sent.

"I still don't know if our institutions - the university -- are changing anything to meet the needs of these people," she says.

The Lockney native currently oversees the Educational Program to Increase Racial Awareness, a recently established university program that has

Tornado overturns house in 1908

No serious injuries suffered by Kennedy family

(Editor's note: The following article was written from information from Ruth Kennedy Gautier, a longtime Lubbock art instructor who now resides in Washington state. The data was supplied to the Beacon by Mary Lou Bollman.)

Tornados are not new to the South Plains. In fact, they have been around West Texas longer than civilization.

"An ominous cloud" was visible in the southwest while James Hiram and Josephine Aiken (Pheona) McGehee were visiting from Lamesa with a daughter, Logan and Ethel McGehee Kennedy and their offspring, Joe 6 1/2, Laura, 2 1/2, and Ruth, four months. Their house was located 1 1/2 miles south of Lockney.

The McGehees had made their "headquarters" for the local visit with their oldest daughter, Margaret and Lloyd Nichols, about three-quarters of a mile "across the pasture" from the Kennedy community residence. The McGehees' also had two sons living in the Lockney community.

"Grandpa and Grandma intended to spend the night with us (Kennedys) on Saturday night; but due to the ominous cloud in the southwest, "they decided to go back to Aunt Mag and Uncle Lloyd's"

Ruth Kenndy Gautierre remembers that "At 2:30 a.m., the storm struck our house, turning it over 2 1/2 times and leaving the windows over over heads." That was the "first Sunday in June," 80 years ago.

The former Ruth Kennedy continues that, "Father piled up anything he could find to stand on and swung himself up and finished breaking a window so he could get out.

"He walked barefooted and in his underclothes to Uncle Lloyd's to get help. (He always slept in his underclothes)

He was forced to wait until daylight to walk across the pasture.

FOREHEAD GASH

"Mother was not hurt, but had toothpicks and molasses in her hair. I was caught between the mattress and the springs, with coal oil (now called Kerosene) pouring over me. Joe had a gash in his forehead and it was bleeding profusely.

"All that Mother could do in the dark was to try to hold the sides of the wound together. She could not find Laura so she called to her and Laura said, 'Here I am.' She was sitting on a pile of glass, unhurt."

The family was "situated after about a week. They were

so thankful that no lives had been lost."

Grandma McGehee "didn't want to leave until we all had our picture made together." Logan Kennedy hadn't shaved since the storm and insisted that he not be in the picture.

However, he relented after his mother-in-law insisted.

"All of the McGehee children lived in the area, so they were in the picture, too. Myrtle wasn't married so she had no children. She was the youngest. All of the others and their families were: Uncle Lloyd Nichols and Aunt Mag and their two children, Edgar and Josephine; Uncle Will and Aunt Kate Nichols McGehee (she was the sister of Lloyd Nichols) and their three children, Helen, Wallace and Lucy; J.H. McGehee Jr. (we called him Ti) and his wife, Maggie, and their one-yearold daughter, Marie."

UNBELIEVABLE

Mrs. Gautier states that "Some unbelievable things can happen in a tornado. There was a tubful of rainwater in the yard and not a drop of it had been spilled!"

She says, "I don't remember hearing what happened in that week from the time of the storm until the picture was

taken.We needed a place to live, food to eat and clothes to wear. It helped to have our relatives near, and people in the area exhibited that spirit of caring and giving that is still practiced today."


Men and boys of the community manually uprighted the house (see accompanying photo).

Mrs. Bollman says the Kennedy house which was struck by the tornado is the "front part" of a house which is still located about 1 1/2 miles south of town.

"There is a difference (except terminology) between a cyclone and a tornado." Mrs. Gautier explains. "Early in the century, and even before that, they were called cyclones, but now we call them tornados."

Now 80 years old, she considers herself fortunate to have survived that "first Sunday in June, 1908" tornado and to have recorded this historic event.

She concludes that, "My parents had a deep faith in God, which they imparted to their children. So with His help, they rebuilt their lives, both physically and spiritually. With a faith like that, it would take more than a cyclone to destroy it."

Anastasia Smith, a member of UCSB's Concerned Students Against Racism, expressed dismay at the amount of attention the video is receiving. PROGRAM CREATED The Education Program to Increase Racial Awareness (EPIRA) program was created last year partially in response to a student movement to increase racial awareness on campus, the same movement out of which

Concerned Students Against Racism was formed, Smith explains. "I don't think she (McAda) should get all of the credit for the program," Smith says.

"I think the Commission for Women were commending the campus effort (in addressing the racism issue), and I was just a visible person to name, but I am very honored," McAda responds. "In fact, I think it is the most exciting thing that has happened to me in my career.'

One woman from each of the county's five districts is selected for the annual awards presented by the commission as part of women's history month. Dr. McAda was presented with her award in the Board of Supervisors' chambers and was honored with the other nominees at a banquet at which Chancellor Uehling was the keynote speaker.

The Santa Barbara News-Press says Dr. McAda "has definitely made a difference — as a role model for young women aspiring to careers in higher and science education, a catalyst in easing racial tensions at UCSB and a volunteer in the community."

Trained as a scientist, she has been the science instructor for future teachers in the UCSB graduate school of education for 22 years.

Dr. McAda lives in Goleta with her 20-year-old daughter, Eden, a student at Santa Barbara City College.

She believes that "The world in which all power has been held by whites is changing. More former minorities will be part of the power structure. They're going to be most of our voters in California, most of our students in schools and colleges. We have to help society be ready for this change."






