nedy house which was struck by the tornado is the "front part" of a house which is still
located about $11 / 2$ miles south f town. "There is a difference (except terminology) between cyclone and a tornado." Mrs.
Gautier explains. "Early in the century, and even before that, they were called cyclones, but now we call them tornados." Now 80 years old, she considers herself fortunate to have
survived that "first Sunday in survived that "first Sunday i
June, 1908" tornado and to have recorded this historic event.
She concludes that, "My parents had a deep faith in God, which they imparted to their children. So with His help. they rebuilt their lives, bol physically and spiritually.
