Lockney School Board met for a public hearing on the proposed tax rate Thursday, August 11 at the school office at 7:30 p.m. for the purpose of discussing the tax rate and answering any questions taxpayers might have. No citizens came to the hearing to voice their opinion on the rate increase.

The board members will meet August 18 at 8 a.m. at the school office

board room to set the tax rate which is expected to be set at 72 cents per \$100 valuation. The meeting is open to the public; however no opinions will be considered at this meeting. Those opposing the increase were invited to address the board at the scheduled meeting last Thursday night.

Members of the Lockney School Board met Thursday, August 11, for their August meeting and discussed several routine matters which affect the school system.

Janet Marr, Jontha Mercer, Peggy Hallmark and Linda Terrell were approved as career ladder III personnel. To qualify for the career ladder, level three teachers must have a masters degree, outstanding evaluation scores for three years, or a bachelors degree and outstanding evaluation scores for five years.

New personnel hired were Amy Brice, junior high social studies; Bert Vandiver, coach and business; and Vicki Vandiver, junior high reading. Brice is a recent graduate of Texas Tech and the Vandivers have moved here from Livingston, Texas, where they

Lunchroom prices were set for the coming year. These will be the same price as they were last year, 60 cents for elementary school lunches, 30 cents for elementary breakfast, 65 cents for junior high and high school lunches, 35 cents for reduced lunches and 25 cents for reduced breakfast, \$1.00 for adult lunches and \$1.50 for visitor lunches.

Discussion was held on the school insurance. This item was tabled until the September meeting.

Updating of teacher and student handbooks was discussed. An effort is

being made to make the books more usable. Approval will be taken up at the next meeting.

A decision was made to table the bids on the sale of the lots owned by the school until a legal determination can be made.

The board accepted the bid from City Auto to purchase a 1989 GMC pickup for the ag department. City Auto's bid was \$14,787. Other bids opened included Jack Morris Ford, Plainview, \$15,925, and Floydada Ford-Mercury, \$16,095.

A resignation was accepted from

Christy Meriwether and a partial listing of substitute teachers was approved for 1988-89.

In other action the board approved changing the date for the September board meeting from September 8 to September 15. Board members also approved August 18 at 8 a.m. as the date to set the 1988-89 tax rate and approve the 1988-89 budget. August 29 at 12:00 noon at Strickland's was the time and place set to amend the 1987-88 budget.

Board members present were Lisa Mosley, D.K. Jackson, Paul Glasson, Eddie Teeter and Gary Mangold.

Briscoe attorney begins write-in DA candidacy

Tom West, currently serving as county attorney in Briscoe County has announced he will be a candidate for district attorney of the 110th Judicial District in the November 8 general election.

West, who is involved in farming and ranching interests in Briscoe County, will run as a write-in candidate because there will be no names from either party on the ballot this fall.

The district is comprised of Floyd, Motley, Dickens and Briscoe counties.

"I'm running for this highly important position because I'm sick and tired of criminals running loose in our area who should be behind bars," West said.

"When a person is convicted of a crime I want them behind bars for the length of their sentence and not to be let loose on some technicality or fancy plea bargain deal.

"If elected district attorney, the saying 'law and order' won't be an empty slogan; because if they do the crime, and are convicted, I'll see they do the time in jail," West said.

He pledged to pinpoint the drug traffic saying, "as district attorney, the four counties I represent will be cleansed of drugs. Whether it be manufacturing, selling, or abusing any controlled illegal substance," he added.

West, who is a Democrat, pointed out the voters will have to take a few seconds longer to write-in his name, adding "but for a job this important I'm confident they will take that time to select the right person, someone like myself who will slam the jail door on the criminals."

A native of Lubbock, West is a 1967 graduate of Texas Tech University and received his law degree from Baylor University in 1969. He has been in pri-

vate practice of law in Lubbock and Silverton since that time. He became Briscoe County Attorney in 1987.

He has two children, a son, Greg, 17, and a daughter, Catharin, 13.

West, has been admitted to practice law in U.S. District Court in the Northern District of Texas and is a member of the State Bar of Texas, the American College of Legal Medicine, the Texas Trial Lawyers Association as well as the Texas Criminal Lawyers Association, and the National Sheriff's Association.

West has served as a deacon in the First Presbyterian Church and is a member of the Texas District and County Attorneys Association's legislative committee.

He also is a member of the Texas Tech Red Raider Club and the Texas Tech Century Club and of the Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association as well as an exporter of hybrid grain sorghum.

City council awards tractor bid

In a special called meeting of the city council on August 11 at 8:00 a.m., the issue of what tractor bid to accept was settled.

After numerous phone calls and discussions with implement dealers the council voted to accept the bid of the James Brothers 67 HP Massey Ferguson. Even though it was more expensive than some other models bid, the \$8,400 tractor has more horsepower than the other tractors offered. It will also be available to the city quickly.

"This is a current model," Mayor Smith explained to the council. "It is made in Bolivia and because of the exchange rates it's cheaper than other tractors this size."

After a discussion the council members voted to buy the Massey because of quick delivery of the tractor, availability of parts and the best value per hp. The vote was unanimous for the Massey.

The city dumpground and the recent Health Department's inspection was next on the agenda. The city has been

told by the Health Department that trash on the north side has to be buried. Before the decision was made on how to handle the problem, the council members decided to talk to different cities and see how they are disposing of their wastes.

The council members decided to break up into teams to view different dumps, and talk to officials in cities such as: Floydada, Tulia, Ralls, Lorenzo and Olton. Mayor Smith stated, "I will contact the Health Department and advise them of what we will be doing."

The mayor then explained to the council members that the recent painting of the water tower caused a problem to many cars parked nearby. "We have had numerous complaints of paint on the cars. We have turned the matter over to the insurance agencies involved."

Present for the special meeting were Mayor Smith, councilmen Ronnie Aston, Kenneth Wofford, Jerry Johnson, J.D. Copeland, Gary Mack, City Secretary Erma Lee Duckworth, Dickie McCarty and the Beacon reporter.

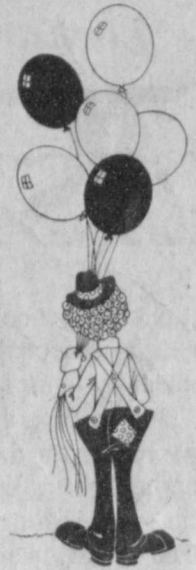

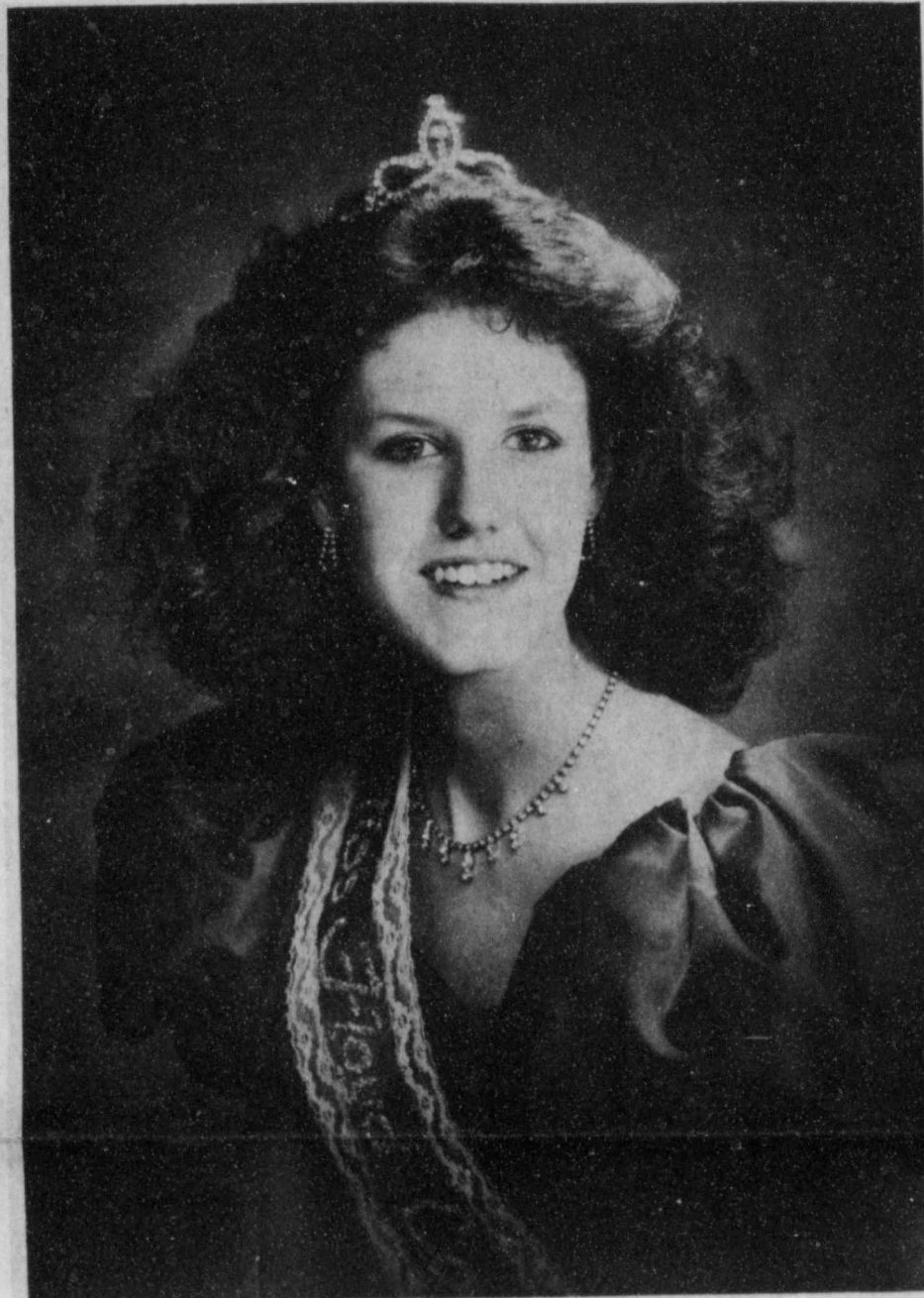

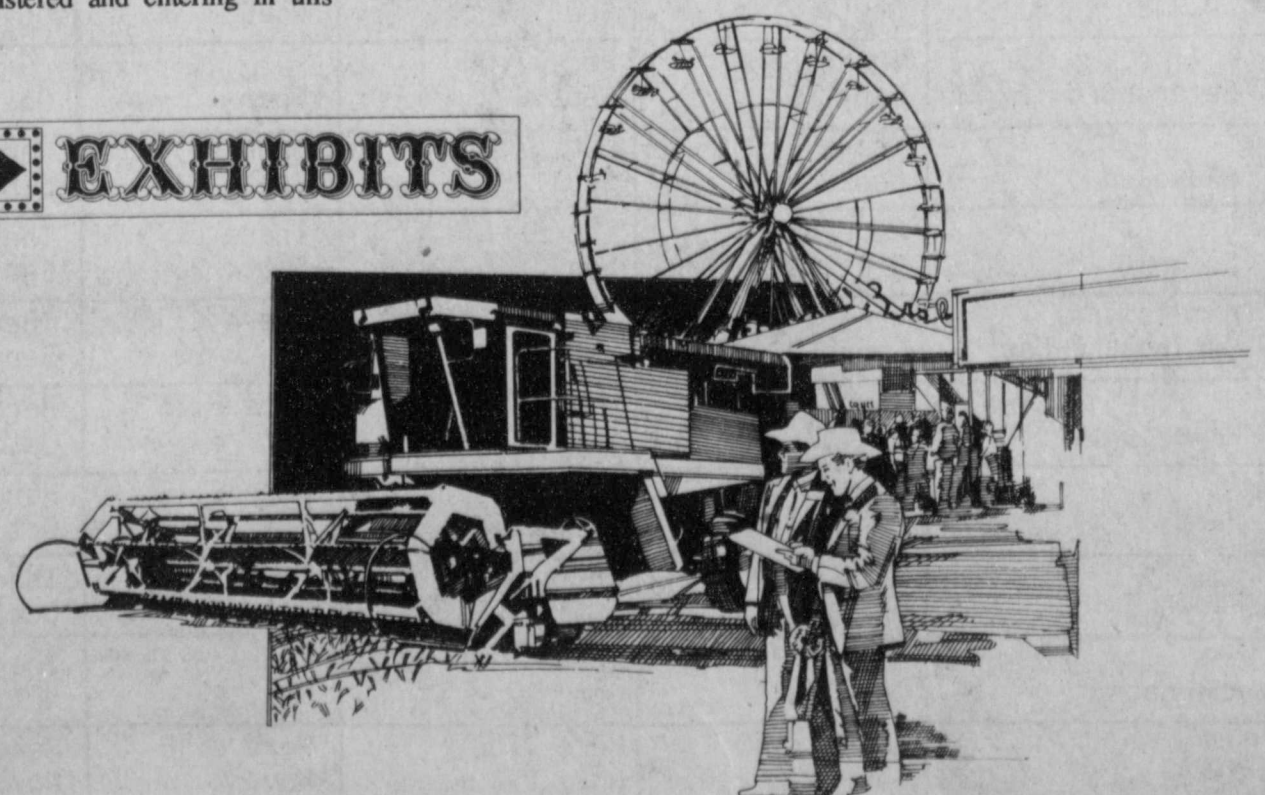

Early preparation for school eases trauma

A child's first day of school will be less traumatic if preparation begins a few years early, a Baylor College of Medicine child psychiatrist says.

"Entering school represents the first big step outside the protective environment of the family," said Dr. Robert McKelvey, assistant professor of psychiatry at Baylor. "It is usually the first time a child will have to compete, not only for the attention of adults, but also for academics or athletics. This naturally creates anxiety for the child."

This anxiety can be overcome, he said, by preparing children before they reach the age of five for their first day of school.

During the pre-school years, McKelvey suggests setting constraints on children, making them obey rules and teaching them that it is fun to learn.

"Children can sense whether or not a parent values education by their interaction with the parent during day-to-day activities," McKelvey said. "During these activities, parents should encour-

age their children to be creative within boundaries and should praise or reward positive behavior."

A few months before school starts, parents should take the child to the school to meet the teacher and explain what will happen in day-to-day classroom activities.

"Letting a child know that the teacher is a friend and is there to help them learn will make a child feel more at ease," McKelvey said.

Most children follow a cycle when beginning school for the first time, he said. They will initially focus on the teacher and seek the teacher's attention, because they are used to relating to a caretaking adult.

As the teacher encourages the students to work on various projects, such as artwork, they will begin to focus on their peers. Gradually, the children begin to play together and the traditional teacher/student role evolves.

"Preparation for school is a long-term process and is important in getting a child ready for life as an independent

adult," McKelvey said. "School is just part of the groundwork that prepares

them for relationships during the rest of their life."

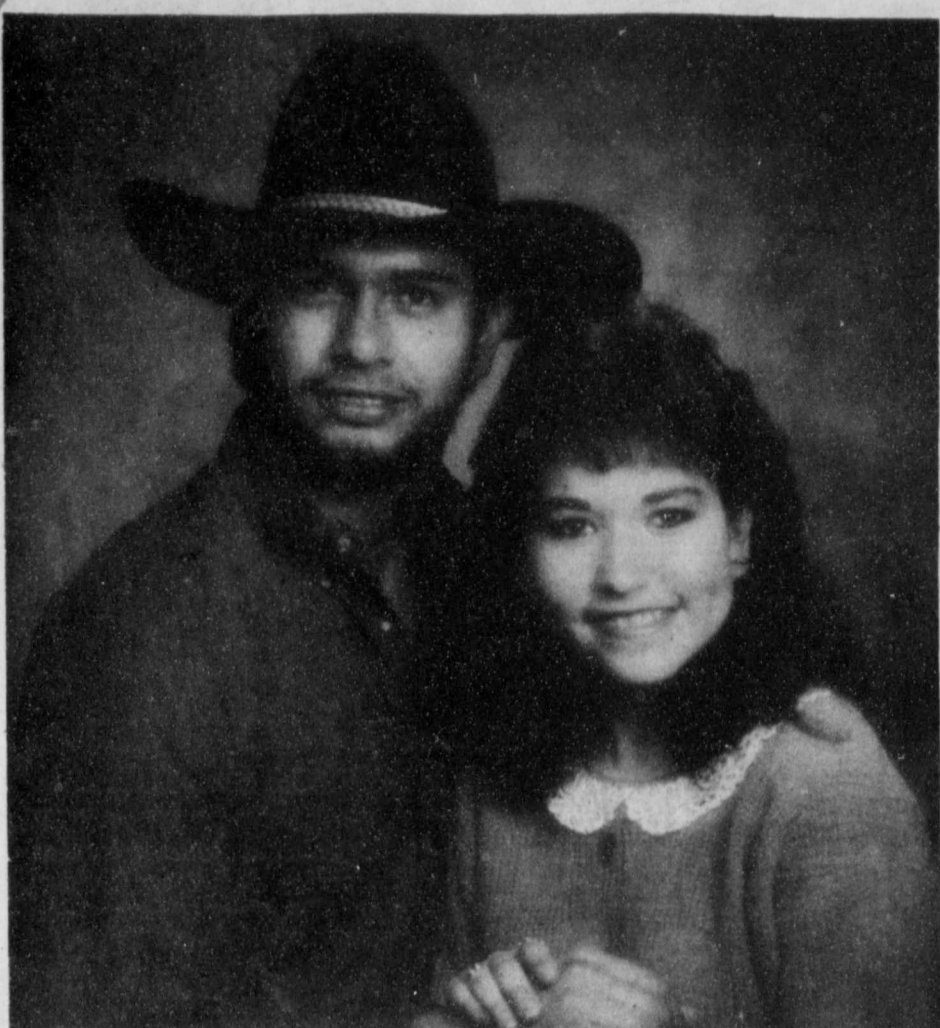
We are now missing Mr. G.A. McAda and Mrs. Betha Cunyus, who are both in the hospital across the street. We wish them speedy recovery.

Old Fashioned Peanut Brittle
1 c. raw peanuts
1/2 c. white corn syrup
1 T. baking soda
1 T. butter
1 c. sugar
1/8 t. salt
1 T. vanilla

In a 1-1/2 quart casserole (with a lid) stir together peanuts, sugar, syrup and salt.

Cook 8 minutes at high (on your microwave) stirring well after four minutes.

Add butter and vanilla. Cook 1 minute longer (on high). Add baking soda and quickly stir until light and foamy.

Immediately pour onto lightly buttered baking sheet. Spread out thin. When cool, break into pieces. Store in air tight container.

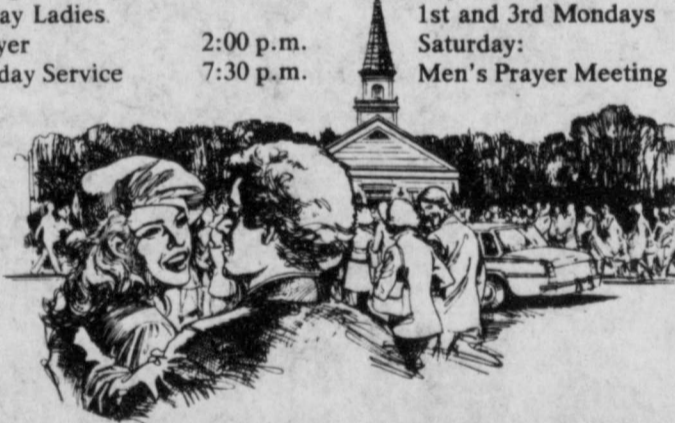
