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25th Jubilee, a new arm for Baby Jesus

People came to a Lubbock church last week looking for miracles when all year long miracles have been happening right here in Lockney.

The members of San Jose Catholic Church with Sister Margarita Jimenez, Sister Marilyn Rose Dietz and under the guidance of the pastor, Father Jack Gist, have transformed this small church inside and outside.

Plans began February 21, 1988 for the Jubilee celebrated Sunday August 21, 1988, marking the 25th anniversary of San Jose Catholic Church. Joining them in the ceremony were past pastors of the church and Bishop Michael Sheehan.

"The interior of the church was remodeled in six to eight weeks," said Sister Margarita. "The men would come at night after working all day and work

in the church until midnight. The women cleaned, painted, stained, varnished and scrubbed and did all kinds of odd jobs."

"First, we unbolted all the pews and turned them around to face the altar which was placed in the middle of the church," said the sisters. Under the guidance of Joe Cavazos and along with many men a Spanish wall with niche was built where the sanctuary had been. This created a beautiful sacristy for the pastor, Father Jack Gist.

One of our teenagers, Michael DeLeon, designed the choir platform, this platform, the altar platform and the lectern were built by Frank Salcedo, Johnny Renaga, Pete Gonzales, Efrén Perez and his sons, and other men. Manuel DeLeon painted the church walls a soft white-rose and a beautiful new rose and burgundy carpet was laid. The windows now glow with a new burst of color stained glass, donated by many families.

After their arrival in Lockney August 21, 1987, Sister Margarita and Sister Marilyn Rose were asked by Father Jack Gist, Pastor of St. Alice in Plainview, to help him with his mission church, San Jose.

Sister Margarita Jimenez is from California and Sister Marilyn Rose Dietz is from Ohio. These sisters were invited to Texas by Bishop Michael Sheehan to help in the evangelization of the Lubbock Diocese.

"Our goal was set in February to have 'The Lord's House,' San Jose ready for this Jubilee. The miracle is — it is all paid for," said the Sisters. "We moved from one project to another when we had the money. The Lord kept providing for us at each step. Hard work of the people in the church and donations made this possible. Many businesses here in Lockney gave us money and helped in all kinds of ways. The people of San Jose are grateful to all the businesses that gave so willingly to help."

The list goes on in the donated items and handcrafted work done at the church. Mrs. Pat Gonzales and family donated a new altar. The two new inner doors were donated by the Castro fam-

ily. These doors contain windows designed by Sister Marilyn Rose and etched in California.

New lights were inset into the ceiling with the electrical work by Efrén Perez, helped by Margarito Arellano.

The new altar is now covered with hand crocheted cloths by Lupe Solis. Various flower bouquets in the church were also donated by many families.

Perhaps one of the most touching changes was the work of Irene Garza. "Irene antiqued and restored the Stations of the Cross, the Baptistry Font and a 1911 Statue of Mary holding the Baby Jesus," said Sister Marilyn Rose. "This statue was donated to the church 25 years ago. The right arm of the Baby Jesus was missing. The priest told the members then, that they were to be the arm of Jesus and they should leave the statue that way to remind themselves to work for Jesus. No one tried to redo it after that until now. Mrs. Garza scraped all the paint, fixed the chips and found an arm for the Baby Jesus. A doll's arm was placed on the statue and you can't even tell the difference. The most wonderful thing about the arm is that the fingers are shaped in the sign language form that says, 'I Love You.'"

Another memory that will be around for a long time will be that of Joe Ochoa (who died December 25, 1987). He built the brick planter sign in front of the church with light brick donated by Mr. Sylvester Garcia.

"Mr. Ochoa's dream was, for the church to be restored," said Sister Margarita. "He felt God's house should be beautiful. He also helped Manuel DeLeon and Toribio Rodriguez paint the outside of the church before he died. A plaque has been placed on the sign in memory of Ochoa."

The parish hall and offices were next on the list. Deacon Joe's office became his conference room after it was painted and fixed up with a little furniture.

A rainbow was painted on the hall wall by Sister Margarita and a border of Spanish flowres was painted all around the hall. Many women came late at night to help her. "You just want to dance when you come into the hall," said Sister

Margarita. "It is very joyful."

The classrooms and whatever else needed it were painted by Fela Castro and Maggie Gonzales.

"Even the bathrooms jump with delightful balloons and flowers on the wall," said the Sisters.

"Today (Thursday, August 18) we are getting our bushes, trees and flowers put in. The yard's sprinkling system was under the direction of Frank Salcedo along with men and young teenagers who came many evenings to dig and lay pipes. It looks wonderful now. A brand new parking lot gives the church a new look."

"We have been helped in so many ways. There are so many people to thank. The ladies of the Guadalupanas helped in many ways by physical work and donations to keep this project going.

Also many of Sister Margarita's friends in California helped with donations," said both Sisters.

"Hopefully we will be staying here in Lockney as long as possible, but we don't want to build anymore," laughed the Sisters. "Now we want to start visiting homes, greeting people and praying with them. We hope our presence will make a difference."

Miracles were around every corner for San Jose Church and the people. It is impossible to pin down just one wonderful occurrence, but one thing is for sure; not only has the building been revitalized, but so have many of the members and the lives of those who contributed.

"All are invited to visit this small but beautiful church here in Lockney," said the Sisters. "God bless everyone with His peace."

Tax rebates for Lockney still on the increase

Lockney received a tax rebate check for the one percent city sales tax levied on sales during the month of June. The August check totaled \$5,637.13, a 5.78% increase from the \$5,329.13 rebate for the same period in 1987.

Total rebates to date in 1988 amount to \$32,866.11 an 0.81% increase over the \$32,601.24 amount collected at this time in 1987.

Floydada's rebate for the period was \$13,068.11 for a decrease of 19.82% from the \$16,298.37 collected at this time in 1987. Floydada has shown a 7.98% decrease in total rebates for this year, \$70,449 to date in 1988. Payments at this time in 1987 were \$76,556.65.

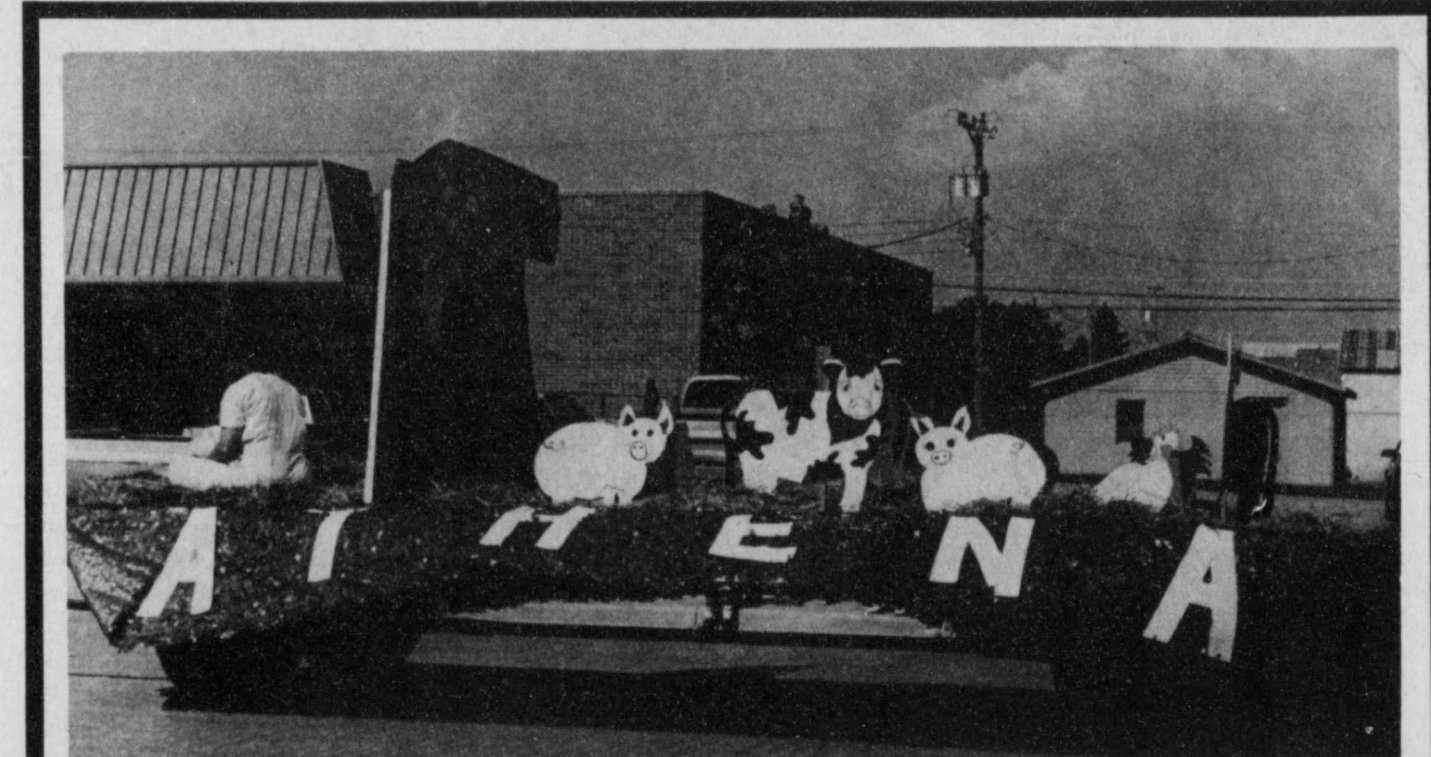

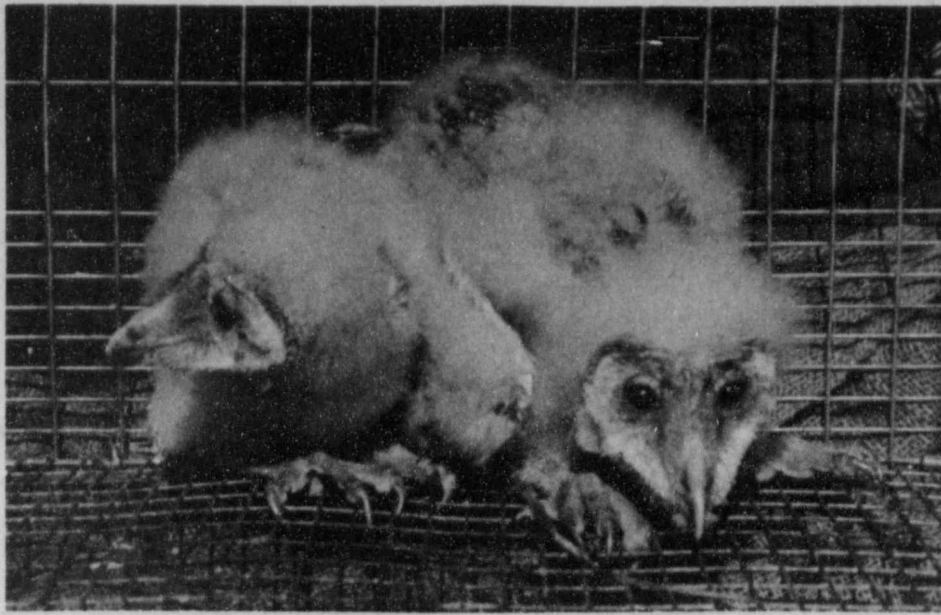

School meal guidelines outlined

The Lockney Independent School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 60 cents and breakfast for 30 cents. Children from households that meet Federal Income guidelines are eligible for free meals or reduced-price meals at 35 cents for lunch and 25 cents for breakfast. To apply for free or reduced-price meals, complete the enclosed application, sign it and return it to the school.

Food Stamp/AFDC Households:

If you currently receive Food Stamps or "Aid to Families with Dependent Children" for your child, you only have to list your child's name and food stamp or AFDC case number, print your name, and sign the application. Since you have already given income information to the welfare office, the school can confirm your eligibility.

All Other Households:

If your household income is at or below the level shown on the enclosed scale, your child is eligible for either free or reduced-price meals. To apply for meal benefits, you must provide the following information and sign the application: (1) list the names of everyone who lives in your household. Include parents, grandparents, all children, other relatives and unrelated people who live in your household, (2) list the social security number of each adult age 21 or older. If an adult does not have a social

security number print "None", (3) list total monthly income and amount of income (BEFORE deductions for taxes, social security, etc.) each person received last month and where it is from, such as wages, retirement, or welfare. If you have a household member for whom last month's income was higher or lower than usual, list the person's expected average monthly income.

Verification:

The information on the application may be checked by school officials at any time during the school year.

Reporting Changes:

If you list income information and your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by \$50 or more per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases. If you list a food stamp case number or AFDC number you must tell the school when you no longer receive food stamps or AFDC for your child.

Foster Child:

Your foster child may be eligible for meal benefits. If you wish to apply for meal benefits for a foster child, contact the school for help with the application.

Nondiscrimination:

Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of

Q—My husband is buried in a VA National Cemetery. Am I entitled to burial in the same cemetery?

A—Yes. Burial in a National Cemetery is available to a veteran's widow, minor children, unmarried children under the age of 23 attending school and under certain conditions, to unmarried adult children.

Q—I am a 100 percent service-connected disabled veteran. My wife and I are getting a divorce. Will she be entitled to a portion of my compensation after the divorce becomes final?

A—No. Her entitlement to all benefits ceases when the divorce is final.

Q—My husband was cremated and his ashes were scattered. Is it possible to

have a memorial marker placed in a VA National Cemetery?

A—Yes. The memorial may be erected in a private cemetery or memorial section of a national cemetery.

Social Security in Floyd County

Medicare hospital insurance can help pay for hospice care if a doctor certifies that a person is terminally ill. In addition, a person must sign a statement choosing hospice care instead of standard Medicare benefits for the terminal illness.

Hospice care is a special program of care designed to provide pain relief, symptom management, and supportive services to terminally ill people and their families.

Medicare can pay for two 90-day periods of care, one 30-day period and one extension period if patient is still terminally ill.

During a hospice period, Medicare pays the full cost of all covered services for terminal illness. There are no deductibles or co-payments except for part of the cost of outpatient drugs and inpatient respite care. Respite care is a short-term inpatient stay which may be necessary for the patient in order to give temporary relief to the person who regularly assists with home care. Inpatient respite care is limited each time to stays of no more than 5 days in a row.

For respite care, the patient is responsible for 5 percent of the cost or about \$3.25 per day up to a maximum of \$520 during a period that begins when a hospice plan is first chosen and ends 14 days after such care is cancelled.

The Health Care Financing Administration publishes a pamphlet, Hospice Benefits Under Medicare, which is available at any Social Security office.

Taxpayer Bill of Rights available now

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday unveiled a taxpayer bill of rights that guarantees Texas taxpayers are treated with fairness, courtesy and common sense.

"This is a pledge from me and from my employees to honor and respect the rights of all state taxpayers. I won't accept anything less," Bullock said.

The 24-point document covers a wide variety of tax and administrative policies, ranging from prompt and accurate responses to protection from unreasonable notices.

Bullock released copies of the taxpayer bill of rights at the first annual regional meeting of the National Federation of Independent Business.

Bullock said taxpayers also have a right to depend on accurate written instructions and information issued by his agency. If a taxpayer relies on incorrect written information from the Comptroller's office, then any resulting penalties will be waived.

"Texas taxpayers have many rights. Some are the result of laws passed by the Legislature and some are the result of good common sense," Bullock said.

The taxpayer bill of rights is the result of many months of hard work and research by the Comptroller's staff, since the agency's taxpayer rights rules have never before been compiled into one document, according to Bullock.

"Texas has taken the lead by setting written standards for taxpayer rights and making them easy to read and understand," Bullock said.

Bullock said the Texas taxpayer bill of rights is the first of its kind in the nation. The Internal Revenue Service and several states are preparing similar guidelines.

The document will be distributed in late August to other state tax officials at the Western States Association of Tax Administrators conference in Vail, Colo., Bullock said.

Statewide distribution of the bill to state taxpayers will begin in September, according to Bullock.

Reorganize for nutrition needs

Many Americans are risking their health every day when they eat improperly. To eat more nutritionally-balanced meals, individuals need to organize their kitchen, plan their menus and reevaluate their pantry, refrigerator and freezer. Janet Vaughn, R.D., at Methodist Hospital, offered a solution to improve improper eating habits.

What to keep in the pantry (and what not).

Toss Out: white rice, potato chips, corn chips, all-purpose flour, wheat bread and rolls, sweetened, refined cereals and junk foods.

Replace With: brown rice, pop corn, whole grain crackers, whole wheat flour, whole wheat breads and rolls and whole grains cereals.

What to keep in the refrigerator (and what not).

Toss Out: whole milk, cheddar, swiss and cream cheeses, sour cream, heavy cream, mayonnaise, sausage, bacon and luncheon meats.

Replace With: skim or low fat milk, cottage, mozzarella, ricotta and special fat-modified cheeses, low fat yogurt, lite mayonnaise and sliced turkey breast or turkey ham.

What to keep in the freezer (and what not).

Toss Out: high fat cuts of meat, ice cream and junk snacks.

Replace With: lean cuts of meats, ice milk and frozen yogurt.

Correctly preparing dishes plays a big part in improving eating habits. The Food and Nutrition Department of Methodist Hospital offers the following tips when preparing a meal.

* Use only lean cuts of meat. Cut off all visible fat.

* Bake, broil or roast meats rather than frying them.

* Make cream sauces and gravies with vegetable oil instead of butter.

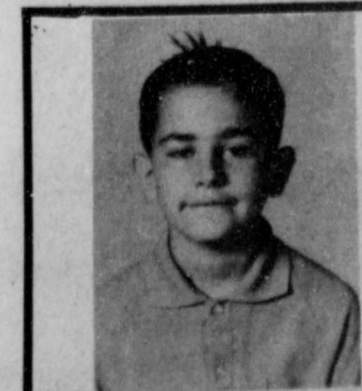
