Tax rebates for Lockney still on the increase
Lockney received a tax rebate check for the one percent city sales tax levied
on sales during the month of June. The August check totaled $\$ 5,637.13$, a $5.78 \%$ increase from the $\$ 5,329.13$ r bate for the same period in 1987. Total rebates to date in 1988 amount to $\$ 32,866.11$ an $0.81 \%$ increase over the $\$ 32,601.24$ amount collected at this time in 1987. $\$ 13,068.11$ for a decrease of $19.82 \%$ from the $\$ 16,298.37$ collected at this time in 1987.
