Lockney faces Ralls in fall season opener

The Lockney Longhorns will meet the Ralls Jackrabbits in the 1988 football season opener, here Friday. The Longhorns are entering the season with a renewed confidence, coming off a 1-1 tie with a tough New Deal team.

"Zero mistakes and consistency will be the key to defeating Ralls," says Jim Clark, head coach. "The offense must

be consistent with no mental errors and the defense must be strong and hold their ground."

The Horns will utilize their quickness to offset the Jackrabbits size with simple but effective strategies. Coach Clark says, "The Longhorns have made a lot of progress since the first scrimmage and continue to improve every week. The Longhorns are looking forward to a winning season."

Steve Carriker sworn in as new senator for Texas 30th District

The 30th District's new State Senator was administered the oath of office in a Capitol ceremony last week by Lt. Governor Bill Hobby. Steve Carriker, who won election to the Senate in the August 13 special election with 62% of the vote, now moves to the Senate from the House of Representatives, where he served almost 6 years.

Lt. Governor Hobby described Senator Carriker as "ideally suited" to serve one of the largest districts in the state.

In brief remarks following his swearing-in, Senator Carriker recognized former Senator Ray Farabee who was present for the ceremony as a great legislator whose departure from the Senate

"leaves a great void in the leadership of this body which I can only promise to do my best to help fill."

Carriker also praised Representative Charles Finnell, who had also sought the Democratic nomination for the 30th District seat, as "a strong competitor, and an even better supporter in helping me be elected to this office." Representative Finnell and his wife Kay were also present among the 200 constituents and supporters from across the district who had travelled to Austin to attend the swearing-in ceremonies.

Senator Carriker, whose wife Kathy and their three children stood with him on the President's dais for the ceremony, will be up for re-election in November.

LISD adopts tax rate of 72 cents

Lockney school board met on Thursday, Aug. 17, for the purpose of setting the tax rate and adopting the 1988-89 school budget.

Board members voted to raise the tax rate from 70 cents to 72 cents for the 1988-89 school year. The 72 cent tax rate will generate \$521,295 for the school system. Last year's rate brought in \$482,923.

Even with this increase taxes are still lower than they were from 1983 to 1985. Tax rates for the past five years include 78 cents for 1983-84, 77 cents for 1984-85, 67 cents for both 1985-86 and 1986-87 and 70 cents for 1987-88. This is the second time since the 1982-83 school year that taxes have been raised. Part of the reason for the increase is the decrease in the tax base.

Expected expenditures for the 1988-89 school year are \$2,689,664.

Expenditures for the 1988-89 school year are up .0997 percent over those in 1987-88.

A breakdown of expenditures for 1988-89 include \$1,227,455 for instruction which includes teachers salaries,

\$50,554 for library service, book purchases and repairs, \$178,376 for principals administration, \$9,850 for curriculum development, \$28,190 for guidance and counseling services, \$25,870 for health services, \$127,957 for transportation, \$124,795 in co-curricular activities, \$134,763 for food services (lunchroom), \$216,803 for general administration, \$244,149 for building maintenance and operation, and \$45,869 in facility acquisition and construction. The total operating budget for 1988-89 is \$2,698,664 and total revenue expected is \$2,564,395 which will leave an expense over revenue of \$134,269 at the end of the year.

In other business discussed it was decided to sell excess furniture and fixtures in the Rotary sale. Two transfers from Plainview were accepted and an outside appraiser is to be hired for the career ladder evaluation.

VA News

EDITOR'S NOTE: Following are representative questions answered daily by VA counselors. Full information is available at any VA office.

Q— I understand that there have been some changes in the Veterans Administration's Home Loan Guaranty Program. Did the amount of the maximum VA-guaranty on a conventional home loan change?

A— The Veterans' Home Loan Program Improvements and Property Rehabilitation Act revised calculations for determining the percentage of the loan guaranteed by the VA. Previously, the maximum VA-guaranty on a conventional home loan was \$27,500. Under the new law, for loans of \$45,000 or less, 50 percent of the loan is guaranteed. For loans above \$45,000, 40 percent of the loan is guaranteed, up to a maximum of \$36,000, but not less than \$22,500.

Q— Why is it necessary to have a property appraised under the VA home loan guaranty program?

A— The law requires that the amount of a VA guaranteed loan may not exceed the reasonable value of the property, construction, alterations, improvements, or repairs, as determined by the VA. In order to make this determination, the VA requires an appraisal of the property by a designated appraiser.

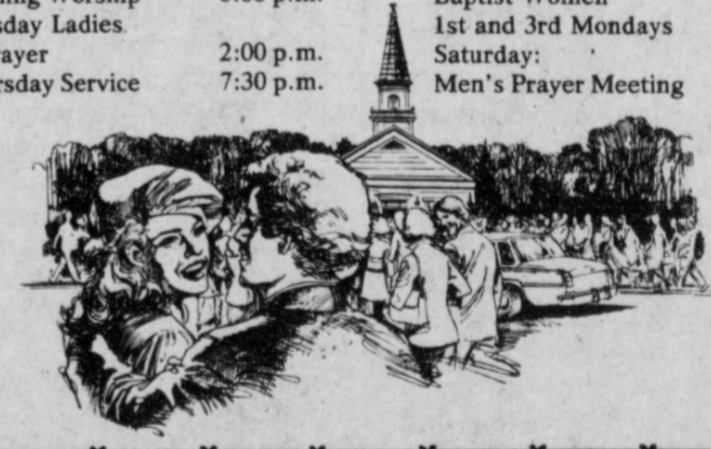
