The corn was hauled to South Western Grain in Plainview and Jerry and Mike Harder supplied several trucks of their own.

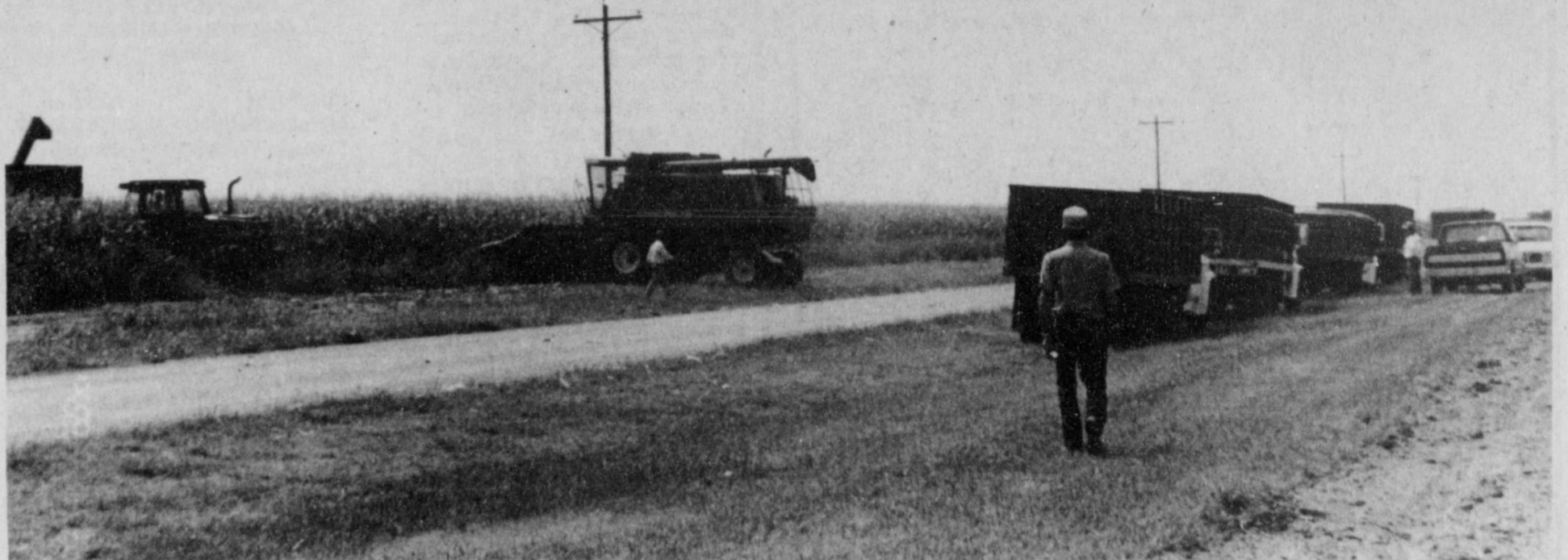
According to Bradley's father, Melvin, "There were enough trucks that none of the combines ever had to wait until a truck got back from the elevator to be able to dump."

Lockney City Council discusses dumpground

The Lockney City Council met in regular session Thursday, September 8, at city hall.

Discussion was held on the possible purchase of land for the dumpground, which would be used to put the concrete and metal that has been piled up at the dump for years. Mayor Smith told the

council that Bill Sherman had agreed to sell approximately 1 1/2 acres of land adjacent to the dumpground for \$500 per acre.

Concern was voiced as to whether the district health department would agree with this idea. Mayor Smith called Linda Wyatt in Lubbock and she told

him that there would be no problem in buying the land for the emergency use of concrete and metal.

The motion was made by alderman Dee Copeland to purchase the land. The motion was seconded by alderman Jerry Johnson. The vote was unanimous.

A proposal was presented to the council on the insurance for the employees. It was voted to keep the health insurance with Texas Municipal League if the employees would pay the cost of the raise in monthly payments of \$38.72. Alderman Aston made the motion and alderman Wofford seconded it.

Discussion on applying for a Community Block Grant was held. It was agreed that if the city got the grant that

the city would pay 10 percent of the total cost of paving in the southeast part of town. Alderman Johnson made the motion and all voted for the proposal.

The council voted to not rent the community center during the fair in order that the fair board could use the chairs for the fair.

The financial statement for the month of August was reviewed. Bills were gone over and Aston made the motion to pay them.

Members present were Mayor Dan Smith, aldermen, Gary Marr, Ronnie Aston, Kenneth Wofford, Dee Copeland, Jerry Johnson, attorney Paul Lyle and city secretary Erma Lee Duckworth.

School enrollment tops 700

Seven hundred and sixteen students enrolled for classes on the first day of school after the Labor Day holiday. This is 14 more than enrolled on the opening day in September, 1987.

Superintendent W.H. Hallmark said that this was the second year that enrollment has increased and he predicts that it will do so again next year.

Lockney elementary counted 393 students enrolled in 1987 on September 8 and in 1988 there were 403 for an increase of 10 on September 6.

155 were enrolled in 1987 on the same date and 165 this year on September 6 for an increase of 10.

High school showed a decrease of six

students. In 1987 there were 154 and this year there are 148.

In 1987 there were a total of 702 enrolled on September 8. This year's total on September 6 was 716.

Two weeks after the opening of school there is a total of 730 students enrolled, 28 more than last year at this same time.

There are 404 in elementary, 176 in junior high and 150 in high school.

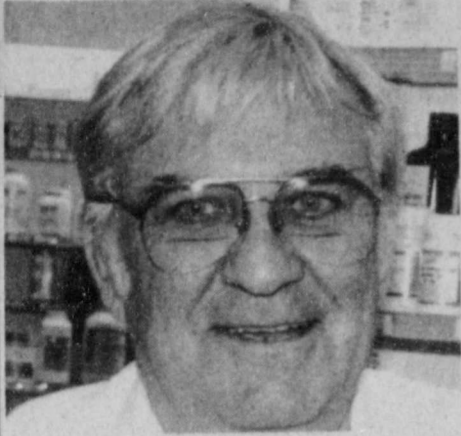

The Lookeba, Oklahoma, native has been in business since 1952, and a member of the Lockney Chamber of Commerce since 1956.

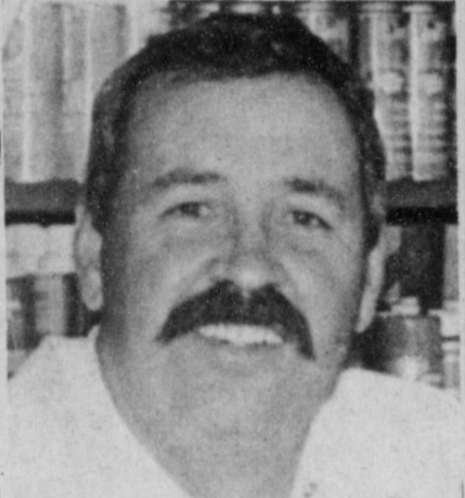

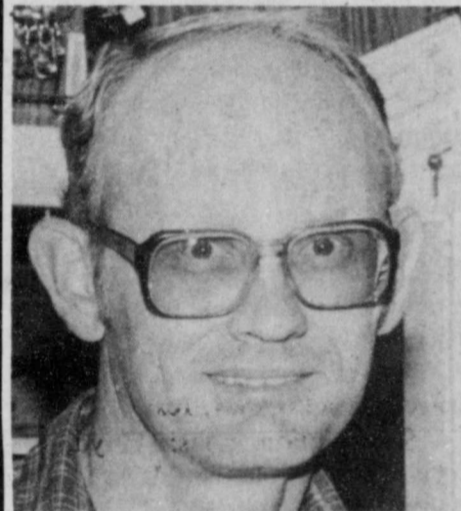
The service retail and wholesale offers farm fuel, tires, batteries, sprayer equipment, and accessories "just to keep your car going."

Lockney Police Report

A high speed chase ensued for Lockney Police Officer Jerry Edwards and Floyd County Deputy Raymond Hamilton, Saturday, September 3, after Officer Jerry Edwards attempted to stop a car in Lockney on a traffic stop.

After a lengthy chase through the Northwest part of the county the suspect baled out of the car approximately one-half mile north of the Sterley Gin. The suspect ran into a cotton field and Officer Edwards and Deputy Hamilton were unable to locate him due to darkness.

It was later found that the vehicle had been reported stolen out of Plainview. The vehicle was recovered and towed to City Auto. No charges have been filed at this time.

September 9 at approximately 1:00 a.m., Lockney police received a call of someone trying to get into a home on West Spruce. When police arrived they found a 25 year old intoxicated male outside the home. He was arrested for

public intoxication. He pled guilty to the charge and was assessed a \$100.00 fine.

Feliciano Mondragon was arrested last week on a warrant charging him with assault with bodily injury occurring during a fight that took place in July.

Police arrested a 17 year old man, September 12, who they believed to be responsible for the Aug. 23 burglary of the Cleatis Hayes home in Lockney. He was arrested on a warrant charging him with Burglary of a Habitation.

Chief Gilroy said, "The person arrested has been a suspect ever since the day of the burglary. We have been working very hard hoping to get a break in the case and were finally able to obtain enough information to secure a warrant."

A warrant has also been issued for Gracie Langoria, 20, for possession and delivery of a controlled volatile chemical to a child under 18 years of age. At press time she had not been picked up.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 8, 1988

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. The Texas

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

The first score came in the opening quarter. A series of runs down the field by Petersburg set up a 2 yard T.D. run. The extra point attempt failed.

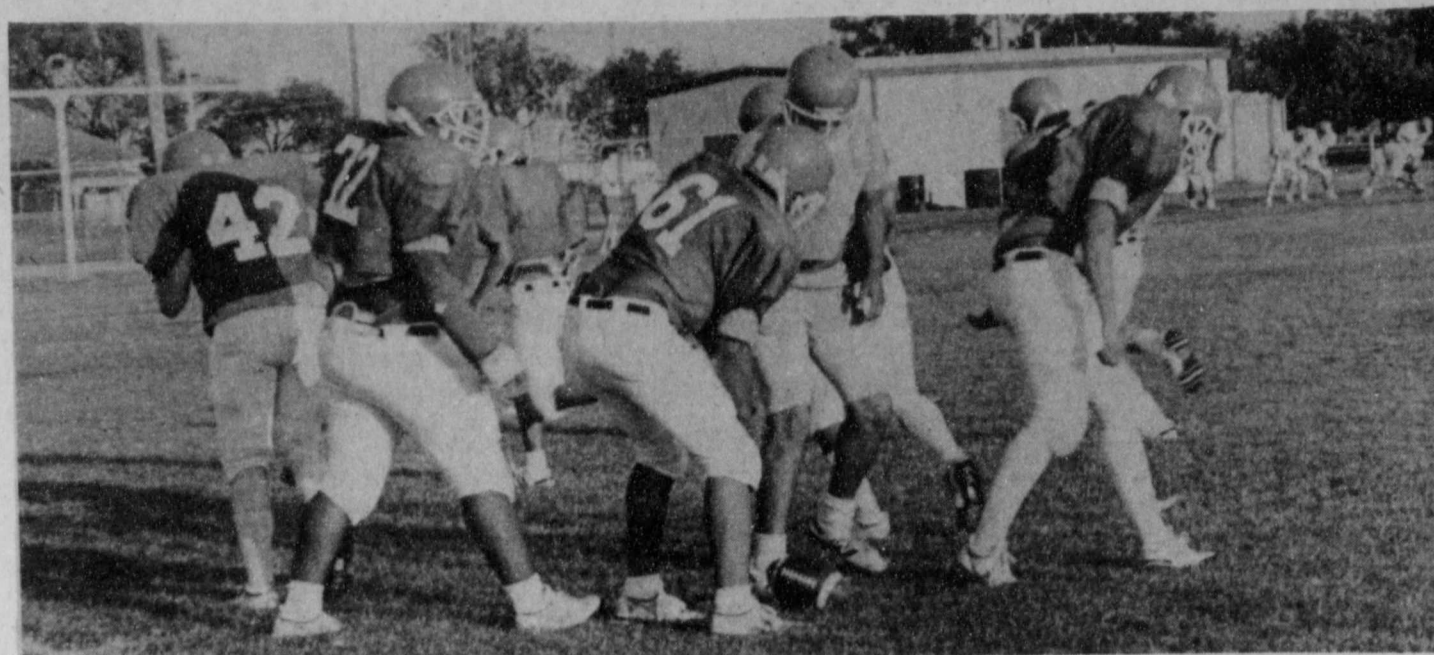
