Travis County Judge John Dietz has come and gone and school is still in session. In September, 2004, Dietz said the way schools are funded is unconstitutional and ordered that the Legislature fix it or stop funding schools by Oct. 1, 2005.

"The word from the TEA is we re staying open," said Dimmitt ISD superintendent Les Miller. "We re operating on last years money. Really whatever ruling that comes from the appellate court probably wont affect the schools. We re just carrying on business as usual."

The reason no one seems worried over the missed deadline is that the Dietz ruling was appealed to the Texas Supreme Court in July - which most observers believe stays the ruling until the state s Supreme Court acts.

"I believe the Oct. 1 deadline is stayed, so we re not getting excited about Oct. 1 passing," said NISD superintendent Marshall Harrison. "They re not going to allow the schools to shut down. My prediction is they (the Texas Supreme Court) will come out with some kind of ruling, put a stay in there until the Continued on Page 2

New vets specialize in dairy medicine

The burgeoning dairy business in Castro and surrounding counties has attracted a pair of vets - they re married, but as Dr. Jennifer Trout says, "My name is easier to pronounce, so I still use my maiden name." Her husband is Dr. Adam Jackanicz. They met as vets in California, but had to cross the country to meet one another.

Trout is from Forest Hill, Maryland. Her undergraduate degree is from Penn State and her DVM was earned at the University of Florida.

Jackanicz is from Illinois. He earned his undergraduate degree at Murray State in Kentucky and his DVM at the University of Illinois.

They ll have been married two years in December.

They ve been open for business as Diary Veterinary Management Services since Sept. 15. But after leaving California, where they both practicing, they moved to Stephenville for a while.

"I did a brief stint with the Texas Department of Health Services as a regular vet," Jackanicz said.

They couple worked with Lori Vincent of the High Ground of Texas Development Corp. and she suggested Dimmitt as a likely place to settle.

"We decided to come up here from Stephenville because





Legislature goes back into session in 2007. They ve appropriated the money to fund the schools for the next two years.

"And they ve got their hands full with the aftermath of the last two hurricanes. They ve got schools in East Texas with no power, no sewage."

Hart ISD superintendent Digger Elam agrees that the hurricane damage to the schools has the state s mind elsewhere - for now.

However, he said, if the 300 schools that filed the original lawsuit were to push Dietz, he might close the schools.

"The plaintiffs have to push it to close the schools down and I don t foresee that happening," he said. "But I believe something s going to happen in the immediate future. Remember, Judge Dietz can t write a finance plan. He can shut the schools. He can order funding stopped, but he hasn t because the plaintiffs haven t pushed it. He ll wait until someone goes to him."

As for the Texas Supreme Court, that ruling could come any day - well before the plaintiffs try to get Dietz to move to close the schools. They ve been studying the plan since July and observers say the decision is imminent.

However, even should the state s high court rule in favor of the plaintiffs, that doesn't mean they ll present a blueprint for school funding. From January to August, 2005, the Texas Legislature, through one regular and two special sessions, grappled with the issue and failed to devise a plan that would get through both houses. this is where the diaries are now coming," Jackanicz said. "We knew there weren t a lot of dairy vets here."

Trout said the pair looked at both Plainview and Dimmitt as possible locations, but Dimmitt won hands down.

"We re excited to be here," she said. "We like living in a smaller town. We re going out and meeting all the dairy owners. But everyone here has been really friendly. It s been great."

Their work will be done at the dairies - and although they ll be on call constantly, they ll still spend some time educating workers at the dairies to catch problems early.

"Employee training is part of what we do," Trout said. "We ll put the protocols in place for employees so they can work as our hands, eyes and ears. A dairy cow is costly. So we help the dairyman keep his herd healthy."

They ll also do pregnancy exams, obstetrics, sick cow visits and surgeries. They do have an office - 101 Front Street. Their phone is 647-4091.

Luckily for Mary, prompt treatment was able to save her vision.

Although rare, a detached retina is a sign that something has interfered with the adhesion between the back of the eye, or retina, and its base. Often, the cause is not known. High nearsightedness, eye trauma, eye disease, or severe eye infection, can place you at a greater risk.

A retinal detachment is serious and will usually get worse. Treatment is normally surgical; the goal is to reattach the retina. This is sometimes done by burning the tear or even by freezing it. A laser is sometimes used, along with other techniques.



winter months when we re not spraying," he said. "Depending on what kind of summer we have next year, we may have to raise the price then."

It costs the city \$3,800 for each spraying.

The council also tabled a motion to reduce the police force by one man. Although the force has been a man short for a time, council members wanted to talk with Police Chief Ray Aleman before eliminating the job permanently.

The council also decided to charge contractors \$5 per 1,000 gallons of water used. Before the change, contractors were getting the same rate as people who lived outside the city limits get.

City Manager David Denman told the council that with the money it takes to keep the city's wells and infrastructure repaired and functional, outside contractors were getting water extremely cheaply. Now, the city will buy a meter for \$775 and will monitor all the water that contractors use in construction projects. The city will also require a deposit of \$500 from each contractor and bill them monthly for the water used.

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


Dimmitt Wildcats defeat Abernathy, 44-6

The neighbor did pay for the removal, but she told me that the tree removal service told her it was really my responsibility. Can you tell me who is right?

A. This is an interesting question, but in my opinion the neighbor is responsible for getting the tree out of your yard. A FIRM BEL



That is because it was an act of God, not your neighbor s fault that the tree blew over.

However, it is your neighbors tree and it is trespassing on your property.

The fact that it blew over in a storm does not change who owns it. As far as I am concerned, your neighbor did the right thing, and what the law would require.





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


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DARCY FISHER, RIGHT, flips the ball over the net and past the block of a Denver City player.



APPLICATION Hyman Farm Service, LLC, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for the renewal of Air Quality Permit Nos. 29769 and 29771 which would authorize continued operation of the Anhydrous Ammonia Operations Plant located at the intersection of 8th Street and Etter Street and 505 East Halsell Street, Dimmitt, Castro County, Texas. The facility will emit the following air contaminants: anhydrous ammonia and particulate matter less than 10 microns in diameter.

These applications were submitted to the TCEQ on September 26, 2005. The application is available for viewing and copying at the TCEQ central office, the TCEQ Amarillo regional office, and the Rhoads Memorial Library, 103 S.W. 2nd St., Dimmitt, Castro County, Texas. The facilities compliance file, if any exists, are available for public review in the Amarillo regional office of the TCEQ.

The TCEQ executive director has determined the applications are administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application. Information in the applications indicate that this permit renewal would not result in an increase in allowable emissions and would not result in the emission of an air contaminant not previously emitted. The TCEQ may act on these applications without seeking further public comment or providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.

<u>PUBLIC COMMENT.</u> You may submit public comments, or a request for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below. The TCEQ will consider all public comments in developing a final decision on the application. The deadline to submit public comments is 15 days after newspaper notice is published. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the TCEQ s jurisdiction to address in the permit process.

After the technical review is complete the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. If only comments are received, the response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will then be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who is on the mailing list for this application, unless the application is directly referred to a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING You may request a contested case hearing. The applicant or the executive director may also request that the application be directly referred to a contested case hearing after technical review of the application. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court. Unless a written request for a contested case hearing is filed within 15 days from this notice, the executive director may act on the application. If no hearing request is received within this 15-day period, no further opportunity for hearing will be provided. According to the Texas Clean Air Act § 382.056(o) a contested case hearing may only be granted if the applicant s compliance history is in the lowest classification under applicable compliance history requirements and if the hearing request is based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission s decision on the application. Further, the Commission may only grant a hearing on those issues raised during the public comment period and not withdrawn.

A person who may be affected by emissions of air contaminants from the facility is entitled to request a hearing. If requesting a contested case hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number, and fax number, if any; (2) applicant s name and permit number; (3) the statement "(I/we) request a contested case hearing;" (4) a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the application and air emissions from the facility in a way not common to the general public; (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the facility; and (6) a description of how you use the property which may be impacted by the facility. If the request is made by a group or association, the one or more members who have standing to request a hearing and the interests the group or association seeks to protect must also be identified. You may also submit your proposed adjustments to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns. Requests for a contested case hearing must be submitted in writing within 15 days following this notice to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below.

If any requests for a contested case hearing are timely filed, the executive director will forward the application and any requests for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting. Unless the application is directly referred to a contested case hearing, the executive director will mail the response to comments along with notification of Commission meeting to everyone who submitted comments or is on the mailing list for this application. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact relating to relevant and material air quality concerns raised during the comment period. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the Commission s jurisdiction to address in this proceeding.

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
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Nazareth Students Give to Katrina Victims


