## American Academy of Family Physicians honors Dr. Mangold

Dr. Gary Bedford Mangold of Lockney has been named a Fellow of the American Academy of Family Physicians.

The Degree of Fellow may be attained in either of two ways: Successful completion of 600 or more hours of accredited continuing medical study, or achievement of diplomatic status in the specialty of family practice as a result of passing a certifying examination administered by the American Board of Family Practice. Plus, the doctor must be a member of the AAFP for at least six years.

Fellowship entitles the conferee to use the title, "Fellow of the American Academy of Family Physicians", or "FAAFP." The degree was conferred October 4 upon more than 700 members of the Academy in conjunction with AAFP's Annual Convention and Scientific Assembly in New Orleans, Louisiana. Dr. Gary was one of 51 Texas doctors to receive the degree.

Fellowship candidates wore academic robes and mortarboard caps. They were recognized according to state chapter, and oath of the Fellowship was recited en masse.

The oath reads as follows: "As a physician of the American Academy of Family Physicians, I shall pursue these goals: ...to provide comprehensive and

continuing health care to my patients, placing their welfare above all else; ...to exemplify and substantiate the highest tradition of my profession, through an informed and scientific practice of family medicine...and to strive for professional enrichment through rigorous program of continuing education. I pledge my full participation and talents to the fulfillment of these objectives because they are the principals upon which the Academy was founded and because by so doing I can better serve my profession, myself and mankind."

Dr. Gary also attended the conventions scientific seminars for four days to obtain updates on many phases of family medicine.

The 60,000 member AAFP, headquartered in Kansas City, Missouri, was instrumental in establishing the medical specialty of family practice in 1969. It was also a pioneer in continuing medical education (CME), requiring its members to maintain 150 hours of approved CME credit every three years.

## Board approves bid for selling school property

Board members of the Lockney Independent School District met in regular session Thursday, October 13, at 7:30.

Bids were opened on the sale of school property located between Southwest Second and Fourth Street on Shubert. It is the location of the old little league baseball field. Two bids were received. The bid of \$3,520.00 from D&J Gin was accepted. The other bid was in the amount of \$3,150.00.

Mike Atcheson of the architect firm of Atcheson and Associates from Lubbock gave a report to the board on the asbestos findings required by the state. He did samplings and will do a written plan to be reported to the governor. The Lockney schools have no problems with asbestos, there were pipes in the boiler room that were wrapped in asbestos but that has been removed and there is no other asbestos. A full report will be presented later when the asbestos plan has been sent to Governor Clements for his approval as required by federal law, which states that governors have to approve all asbestos plans made by school systems.

Discussion was held by the members on the district campus goals for each of the campuses in Lockney. They approved the continuation of the long

range plans made previously for each school as set forth by the state mandates.

Board members, Dr. Gary Mangold, Lisa Mosley and Dr. Paul Glasson gave an overview of the state school board meeting that they attended in San Antonio. W.H. Hallmark, superintendent, attended sessions on the different kinds of formulas that are being studied for the funding of the schools in Texas. Both Lockney and Floydada are considered to be poor schools and they will benefit from the changes in funding.

Principals, James Poole, high school; Terry Ellison, junior high; and Joyce Evans, elementary, gave their enrollment reports and a run down on activities coming up. Enrollment has remained stable since the last school board meeting, Thursday, October 13, was the end of the first six weeks of school. There was a marching contest in Lubbock for the Longhorn Band on Tuesday, October 18 and TEAMS testing for Exit Level Math will be given on October 25 and Exit Level English Language Arts on October 26.

Board members Jim Bob Martin, Eddie Teeter, Dr. Paul Glasson, Dr. Gary Mangold, Lisa Mosley and D.K. Jackson were present.

## Tye named farm and equipment chairman

He has taken an active role in the Farm and Industrial Equipment Institute, serving on the board of directors and as the 1987 president of the Farm Equipment Division. He also served as chairman of the FIEI Tillage and Crop Production Equipment Council.

Currently he serves on the board of directors of the American Forage and Grassland Council, Farm Equipment Manufacturers Association, and the First National Bank.

## Lockney VFD hosts Fire Hall open house

An open house for Fire Prevention Week was held Saturday afternoon, October 16 at the Fire Hall in Lockney. Member of the volunteer fire department were on hand to give demonstrations and pass out pamphlets. An unplanned event of the afternoon was a grass fire called in from South of Lockney.

Berry Hooten stated that "Grass fires are the fires that we are called out for most often in Lockney, and that kitchen or grease fires are the number one cause of fires in the nation".

The volunteers gave a demonstration on their equipment and on the city fire truck. The main hose on the truck has the capability of 600 pounds of pressure. If shot straight out without being diffused it has enough pressure to cut a hole in a door with a straight shot or to take the shingles off of a house. Berry stated that it was not used often without being diffused as this much pressure is rarely needed.

The Lockney Volunteer Fire Department has 24 members. They come from all over town and work at many jobs. They are employers, employees, and farmers. Each gives of time and effort and each one of them does some of everything to be done for the department.

Lonnie Hooten is the fire marshal and drill captains are Kenny Hooten, Zach Zachary, and Craig Ellison. Members are Robert Delgado, Johnny Dorman, Craig Ellison, Richard Ellison, Kevin Evans, Rene Guerrero, Rick Hayter, James Hill, Berry Hooten, Kenny Hooten, Lonnie Hooten, Archie Jones, Jimmy Kemp, Arcenio Martinez, Marlon McDonald, Donnie McLaughlin, Andy Peralez, Milt Schaeffer, Robert Webb, Steven Wright, Zach Zachary, Barney Bill

Richard Ellison has been with the department for thirty years. James Hill, secretary for the department has been a member for 29 years. The newest member joined in April.

The volunteers meet on the second and fourth Tuesday night of the month at the Fire Hall. They go over their equipment and study new techniques. Forty hours of classroom work every four years is required to become an Emergency Care Attendant.

Classes are given four hours a night two nights a week until the required hours are met and then a test is given at one of the major hospitals in Lubbock. Paramedics from Lubbock come and teach the classes.

Seven members of the department have fire phones in their homes and businesses. When a call comes in they are on their way. If extra help is needed then the siren is blown.

The Jaws of Life, purchased in the middle 1970's, goes on every trip. It has

been used innumerable times. In extreme emergencies Flight For Life and Care Life helicopters can be summoned from the emergency vehicle.

The volunteer firemen are a Emergency Medical Services team, weather watchers, and in charge of civil defense. Everytime they go out to a fire or accident they are putting their lives on the line for their friends, neighbors and community.

One thing that they ask from each of you is that you obey the law and do not follow the emergency vehicle.

So today we are launching the 1988 "Save Our Ship" campaign. If every Texan donated only one aluminum can to help the Battleship we could raise \$350,000!

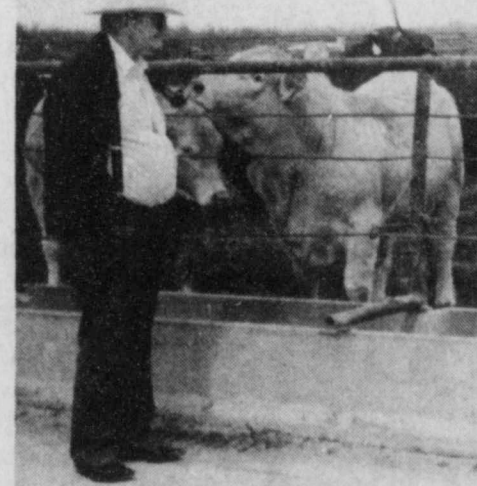

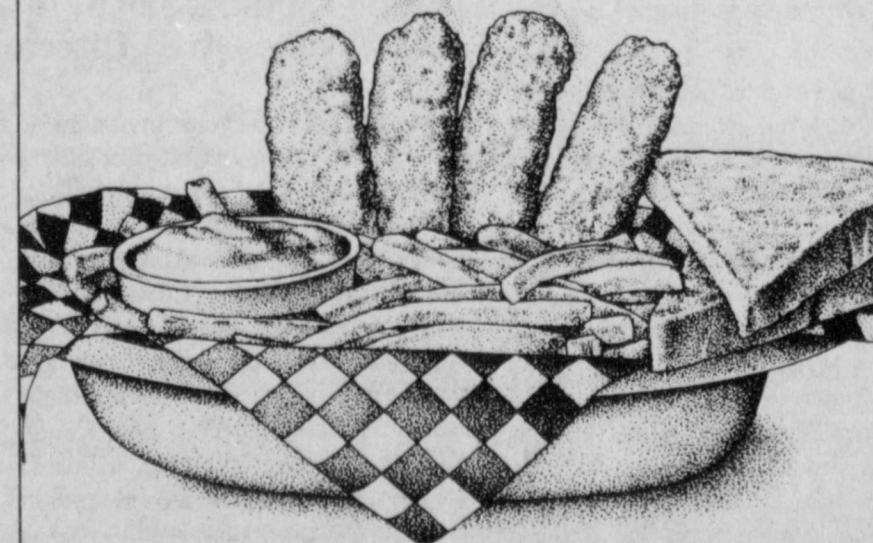

The Lockney Police Department has been experiencing a rash of home and vehicle burglaries in the last few weeks. "November and December are usually big months for burglars so please secure your home and vehicle when you are away from them," said Lockney Police Chief Leonard Gilroy.

To help police recover stolen property it is important that citizens engrave their Texas drivers license number on items like bikes, appliances, tools and lawn tools. Serial numbers should also be engraved on your guns, which are popular items to steal for burglars. "Many items are recovered by law enforcement officers but can not be returned because they are not engraved or serial numbers recorded," said Gilroy.

Between the evening of October 12 and the morning of October 13 a home on east Shurbet was burglarized. Taken in the burglary was a Singer Sewing machine, a portable car stereo with cassette player, a microwave oven and two CB radios. The value of the items stolen is \$1,213.00.

Sometime between the morning of October 15 and the evening of October 16, a home on S.E. 6th Street was burglarized. Taken in the burglary were two Jig Saws, one drill and one sander. Total value of these items was placed at \$177.00.

A home on East Houston Street was burglarized sometime between the evening of October 16 and the morning of October 17. Taken in this burglary was an Emerson VCR valued at \$200.00.

On October 17, the Lockney Police arrested a northeast Lockney man for possession of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia.

## Lockney receives tax rebates

Lockney received a rebate check for the one percent city sales tax levied on sales during the month of August. The October check totaled \$4,320.44 a 37.03% decrease from the \$6,861.22 rebate for the same period in 1987.

Total rebates to date in 1988 amount to \$40,460.60 a 7.28% decrease from the \$43,637.00 amount collected at this time in 1987.

Floydada's rebate for the period was \$8,182.56 for an increase of 28.09% from the \$6,387.89 collected at this time

in 1987. Floydada has shown a 1.53 decrease in total rebates for this year \$86,973.11 to date in 1988. Payments at this time in 1987 were \$88,328.23.

Rebates returned to the surrounding counties include Crosbyton (Crosby County) whose rebate was \$3,430.61 Matador (Motley County) with a rebate of \$774.90 Silvertown (Briscoe) with a rebate of \$1,137.14 Tulia (Swisher) \$11,359.23 and Plainview (Hale) with a rebate of \$137,790.79.
