

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
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### Children's choir perform at First Baptist Church



Dear Lockney Beacon, I would like to submit this article for

possible print. I think the latter part will reflect the feelings of a growing number of citizens in Lockney. If it accomplishes nothing else, I hope it will cause people of every age, sex, color, religion and national origin to begin thinking about solutions to an increasing problem that exists in our community.

For the first time in a number of years I laid in bed awake far into the early hours of the morning listening to every sound that came from outside the house. My senses quickened by a recent burglary that left my two vehicles with shattered windows, I got up several times just to pace the floor, wondering if the night would bring another crime that would touch the lives of innocent people. Not since my last night in Can Tho South Vietnam had I experienced the paranoia that comes from knowing that darkness is a shield to the enemy. I recalled the stories told by Vietnamese peasants living in rural areas of South Vietnam, of how they lived in constant fear of their property being destroyed and their lives being taken by the hands of communist aggressors determined to enlist loyalty to the National Liberation Front. I remembered staying awake in a mosquito infested bunker listening for the smallest sound that could be the only warning of an approaching Vietcong bent on destruction and murder

A movement in one of the children's rooms brought my thoughts back to reality. Suddenly I thought to myself, "What am I thinking?" "This is Lockney, Texas, rural America not Vietnam." "Rural towns are where people choose to live to experience a quality of life that is far removed from fears associated with communist aggression." "As rural Americans we are supppose to be able to rest at night without the worry of someone destroying, stealing or threatening our property." Convincing myself I was making too much out of recent events, I returned to my bedroom and went to sleep.

The following day, the Lockney Beacon revealed I was not the only person in our small town to be the victim of crime during the past week. Not only had other property been vandalized, burglarized and damaged but also, two very special people in our community returned home to be confronted with a burglar armed with a butcher knife. Suddenly I realized my thoughts had not been as irrational as I had concluded. That article in the paper and the previous vandalism at my home lead me to believe there certainly was a valid reason to fear for our property and lives, even in Lockney.

It is not that I felt I was immune to crime and suddenly found myself vulnerable, nor have I been so naive to think that crime has not been a part of rural life. The difference for me is that crime in our town appears to be getting worse and I am angry! I am sick and tired of seeing peoples lives torn by the cruel actions of thugs who have no regard for the value of human lives and property. I am appalled to watch the face of our
