

Lockney ends county residents use of landfill

The continuing struggle between Floyd County and the City of Lockney over the maintenance of the city landfill came to an end on Wednesday when the county commissioners voted not to accept the new contract proposed by the city of Lockney. City officials are now notifying county residents that effective February 13, the city landfill can only be used by city of Lockney residents and businesses.

According to Mayor Dan Smith, "Beginning February 13 any city of Lockney taxpayer can bring his trash to the city landfill. Those people who live in the city but have land outside the city that collects trash may also use the landfill. (For example: the landfill may also be used by farmers who live in town but wish to dispose of their farm trash.)"

In continuing discussion between city and county officials over the past several months, the city of Lockney cancelled a contract, signed Oct. 28, with the county on Dec. 16th. In the contract, the county had agreed to pay \$2,000 each year to the city for the use of the landfill. The county agreed to dig pits as necessary. The city in return agreed to pay the farm contract and the additional salary of operators to pack and bury the trash. However, in the short time the contract was in effect, the city

never called upon the county to pack and bury trash.

Because the city now contracts trash pickup which is taken to a private landfill in Crosbyton, the city councilmen cancelled the old contract on December 16 to renegotiate terms with the county.

In the new contract offered to the county, the city of Lockney offered the use of the landfill to the county if the county agreed to continue digging and covering the pits as needed, but also pack and cover the trash once a month or pay for the cost of a private contractor to do so. The city would in turn not charge the county the \$2,000 per year for county resident's use of the landfill.

The county rejected that offer on Wednesday, February 1, and offered to

renew the old contract. The city of Lockney rejected these terms.

When questioned about the reasons for rejecting the new conditions set forth by the Lockney City Council, Judge Bill Hardin had no comment. Judge Hardin also had no comment when asked if the county has any plans at this time for county resident's trash disposal.

"The city council regrets this action," said Mayor Smith. "However, we feel we were left with no choice in the matter. Presently the city's trash is taken to a private landfill in Crosby County. Surveys at the city landfill show approximately more than two-thirds of the trash brought in is from outside the city limits. The city is responsible for maintaining the landfill, paying a man to oversee it, permit fees, and all the responsibility that goes with the landfill.

Since most of the trash is from outside the city limits we do not feel it is asking too much of the county to pack and bury once a month or whenever the Health Department deems it necessary. The county owns the equipment capable to do the job and surely some of that equipment was bought with money from county taxpayers in the city as well as outside the city.

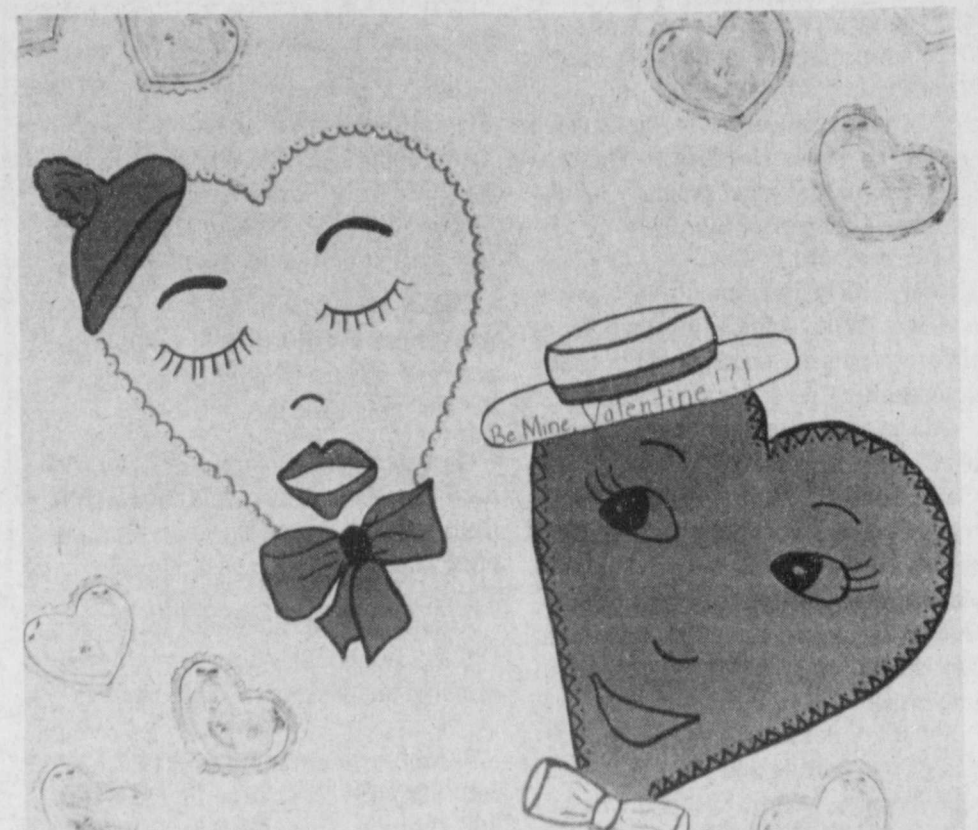
"When the stringent EPA standards go into effect in two years it is doubtful that the city landfill will be kept open at any price. A city the size of Lockney cannot afford to buy equipment to maintain a landfill. For a short time before the new rules from EPA become effective, the landfill could have been kept open to everyone with the county's help."

According to Mayor Smith, the city council also offered to give the landfill

to the county free of charge if they would take over the operation. "They wouldn't have to dig another pit," said Smith. "As of yet, I have not received an answer from the county on this option."

"In the city council meeting on Thurs-

day, January 9, three options for the landfill will be discussed: (1) Call for bids for a private contractor to pack and bury (2) Discuss buying equipment to do the job at a cost of \$40,000-\$100,000 (3) Completely close down landfill."

Minister aids in capture of felon

A prime example of good triumphing over evil would be the case of the new Floydada First Baptist's Youth Minister, Jay Yeakley, starting a chain of events that led to the capture and arrest of an escaped felon.

On Sunday, February 2, a man stopped in at the First Baptist Church in Floydada asking for money to buy gas. Jay Yeakley, the church's brand new youth minister, came to talk to the man. During the conversation Yeakley told the man that he was an ex D.P.S. officer. It was obvious the information made the stranger nervous as he left quickly without obtaining the money for gas.

Yeakley's suspicion's were aroused so he followed the man outside and obtained the license number. Yeakley called in the tag number to the sheriff's office and they discovered that the vehicle had been stolen from Amarillo.

All officers in the area were alerted and the vehicle was located on Hwy. 70 by Lockney Police and D.P.S. troopers.

The vehicle was stopped and the passenger and driver were arrested and booked into the Floyd County jail for unauthorized use of a motor vehicle.

The sheriff's office later found that

the driver of the vehicle was also wanted for escape from a county jail in California.

"We all want to thank Jay Yeakley," said Police Chief Leonard Gilroy. "Without the help of concerned citizens getting involved and reporting suspicious activity, we would be unable to do our job. We are fortunate in Floyd County to have people like Jay to help us out."

Lockney Police also report a vandalism at the Lockney Community Center, Friday night. During a wedding reception, six tires were cut on four different cars. Police suspect two Plainview men in the criminal mischief that resulted in approximately \$460.00 in damage to the tires. No arrests have been made at this time.

Also on February 3 a 1978 GMC pickup was burglarized on East Guest Street. Taken in the burglary was an AM-FM stereo with cassette player valued at \$75.00.

Nutrition program offers food funds to area child care givers

Child care providers who care for children in their own homes may receive payments for food costs through a program offered by Children's Enterprises, Inc. Ms. Chancellor has previous experience with the U.S.D.A. programs. Ms. Chancellor is available to visit with child care providers concerning the nutrition program and other programs offered by Children's Enterprises. Those interested in becoming family day care providers may also receive assistance in becoming registered or licensed.

Children's Enterprises offers additional programs to promote quality care for children. Other services include workshops training, and resources for child care providers, child care referrals for parents searching for child care arrangements which best meet their needs, and consultations with child care facilities.

Judges selected breed champions and then returned to name the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion in the four exhibit categories.

Mathis took the award with a 237 pound Hampshire in her first appearance in a county show. The fourth grader is the daughter of Mike and Ginger Mathis. She is a member of the Lockney 4-H Club.

Four Lockney exhibitors earned the title of Breed Champion during the weekend. Carson Johnson of South Plains was named best of breed in the Southdown lamb division. Tim Mitchell took the honors in the Fine Wool

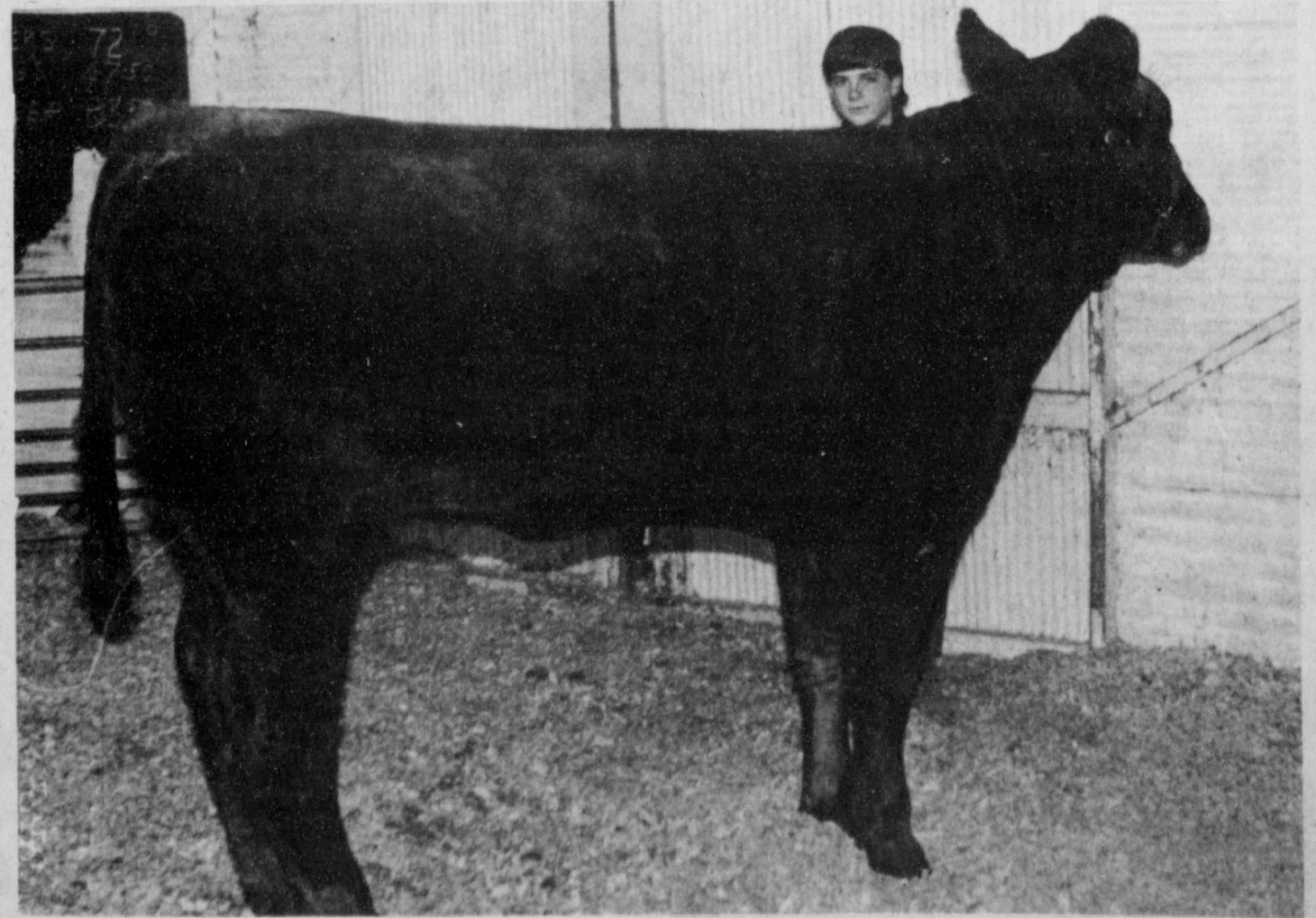
division and Jeffrey Sutterfield in the Other Breeds classification.

Editor's Note: Following are representative questions answered daily by VA counselors. Full information is available at any VA office:

Q—I receive a small VA pension check twice a year. I would like to receive the amount that I am due monthly. Is this possible?

A—Yes. As of March 14, 1988, recipients of improved pension who receive periodic payment (quarterly, semiannually or annually) may elect to receive payment on a monthly basis.

Q—Are VA educational benefits payable for repeating a course even though I received a passing grade?

A—Yes, in certain situations. For example, if a particular subject requires that at least a "C" be given for credit toward graduation and it is so stated in the official catalog. Subjects cannot be repeated solely to raise a grade point average.

USDA issues new canning publications

For today's creative cook, new or experienced with home canning, The U.S. Department of Agriculture has issued a new publication titled "Complete Guide to Home Canning."

With information on new varieties of fruits and vegetables, dozens of new home canning recipes and new diets, the guide will aid would-be culinary experts in preparing delicious, home-canned foods for family and friends, the county fair or city farmers' market.

The new 172-page canning guide, produced by USDA's Extension Service, is the 23rd home canning publication (AIB-539) released by USDA since 1904, according to current records. Over 20 million USDA home canning publications have been distributed over the years.

Dr. Wells Willis, food safety specialist with the Extension Service, said, "The new publication required intensive research and updating of old information to deal with current thinking in food microbiology, the causes of food poisoning, new canning equipment on the market, new varieties of fruits and vegetables, and the diet preferences of today's public."

"Complete Guide to Home Canning" gives up-to-date information on the principles behind safe home canning, describes the proper use of jars and lids, plus basic canning ingredients and procedures. The guide will help consumers decide what to can and how much. The guide also lists detailed instructions for specific foods and special directions for high altitude canning.

Where appropriate, color-coded charts show the differences in recommended processing time using a boiling water canner, dial-gauge pressure canner, or weighted-gauge pressure canner. And, all of this is based on new, updated research.

The publication also contains 25 or more new home canning recipes, representing different regions of the country

and the nation's increased interest in healthful eating, including special diet needs.

A companion, "Principles of Home Canning," (AIB-539-1), 40 pages, contains the first section of the "Complete Guide to Home Canning" and is designed primarily for teachers who need only the basic theories and principles of home canning, not detailed how-to instruction or information.

The increased interest in home gardening and canning in the last decade signaled a need for update research in food processing by USDA. An increase in the cases of botulism caused by home-canned foods in the mid-1970's also was a factor in this decision.

In 1984, the Extension Service provided a grant to Penn State University to establish a "Center of Excellence" in food technology. Dr. Gerald Kuhn, Penn State food science professor at the center, led the efforts to develop the new

USDA publication, along with now retired Extension food safety specialist Dr. Milton Baldauf.

As part of the four-year process to develop the new publication, sections were shared with Extension Service and related government agency and industry personnel. Recipe ideas were contributed and extension food safety and nutrition specialists in all states reviewed the material.

"Complete Guide to Home Canning" (AIB-539) sells for \$11. "Principles of Home Canning" (AIB-539-1) sells for \$2.75. Send checks, along with the title and publication number, to the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402. After bulk quantities of the publication are made available, ordered, and distributed, copies also will be available through county or city Cooperative Extension Service offices in the Spring.

Red Cross sets fourth annual Mass CPR Day

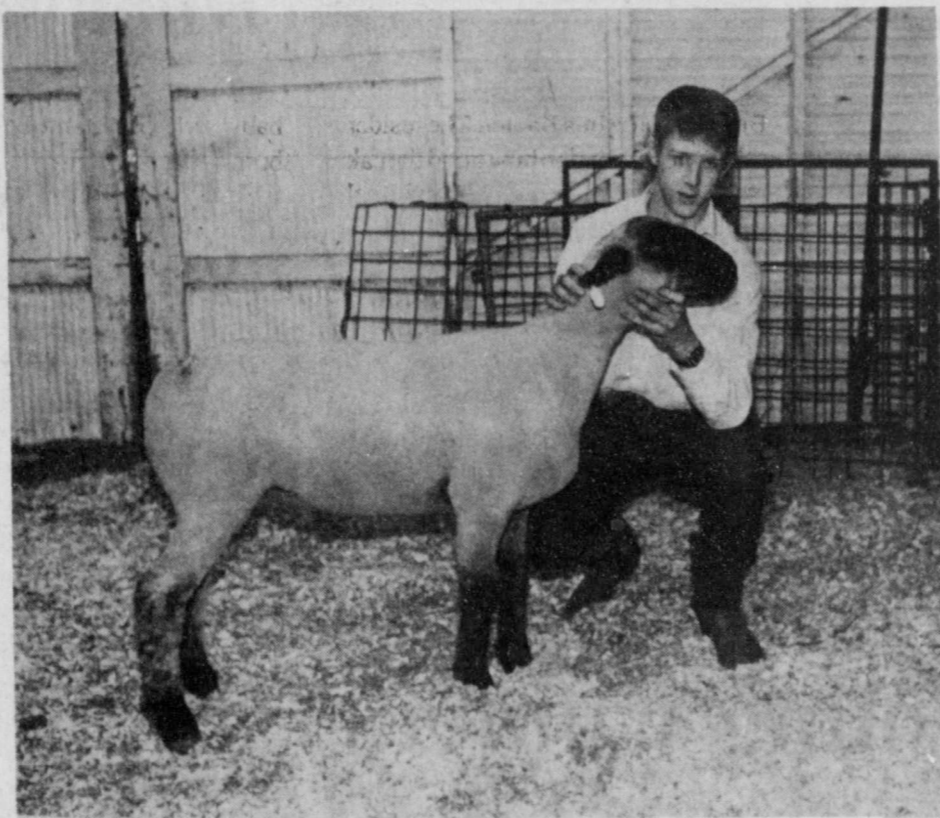

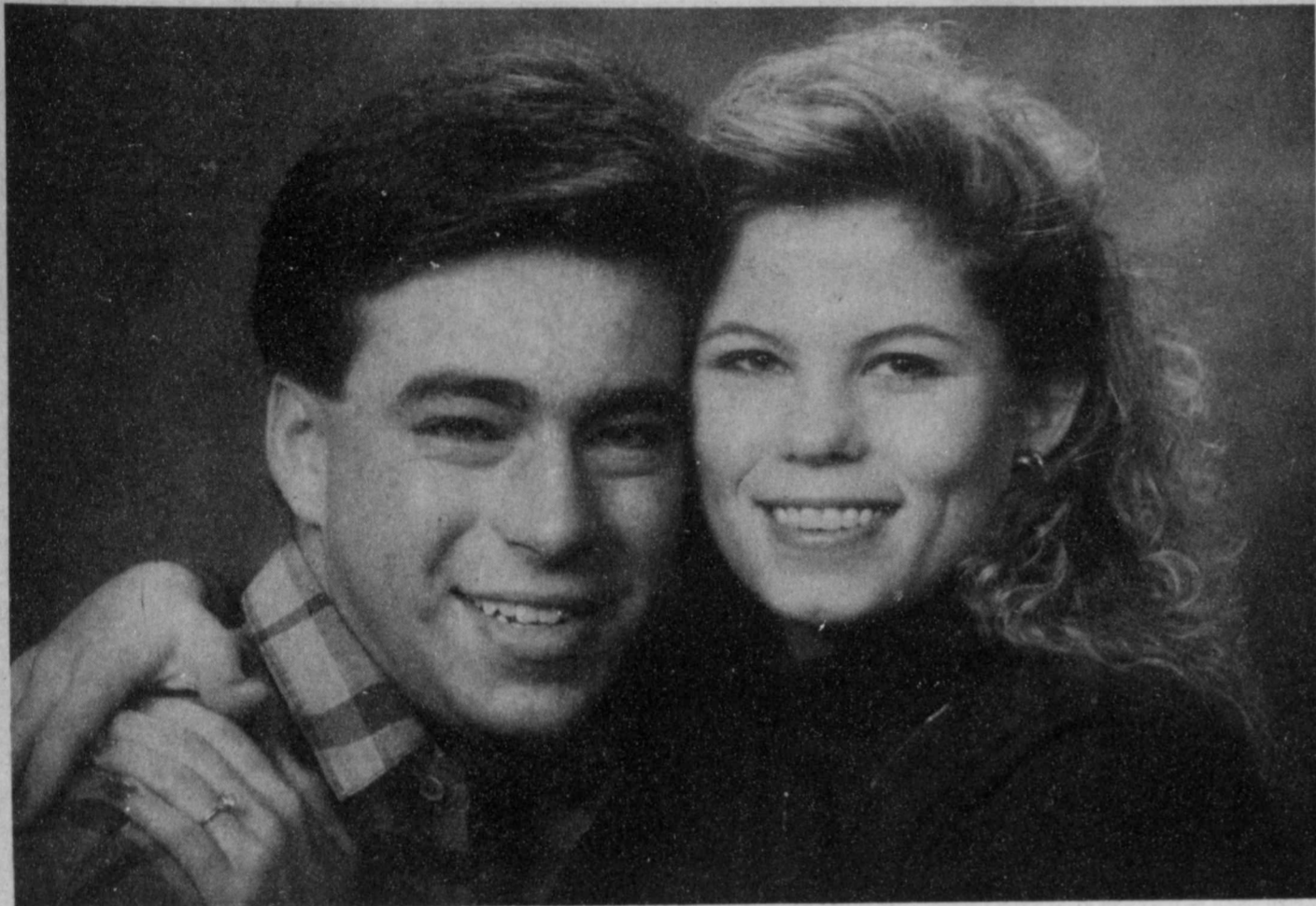
The couple departed on a wedding trip, with the destination being a surprise to the bride from the groom.

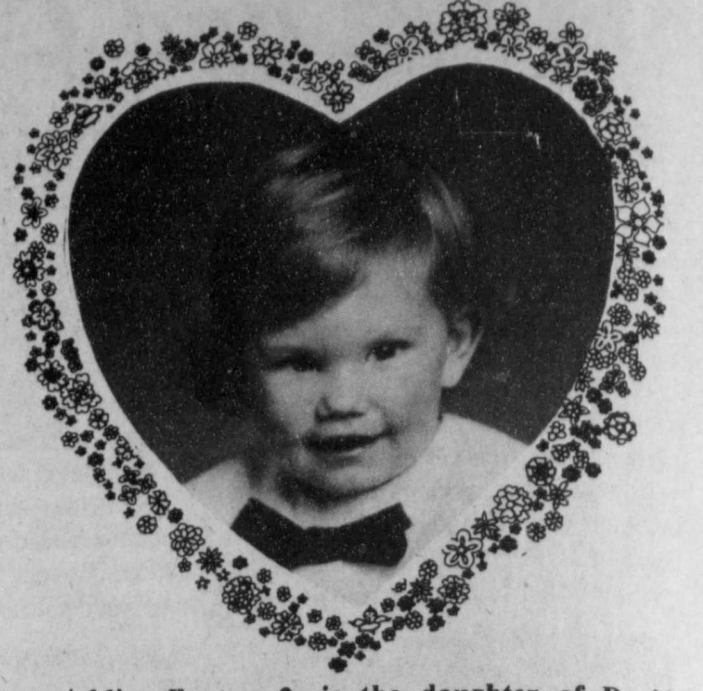

Social Security News

Many young workers are still wondering if Social Security will be around when they retire. And their concern is understandable because 7 or 10 years ago, all we heard and read about in the media was the imminent bankruptcy of the Social Security program. For various reasons, the trust funds were in danger of being exhausted.

To solve the funding problem, a bipartisan commission was formed to recommend solutions. It came out with some measures to raise the trust fund reserves. These measures included delay in the cost-of-living adjustment; moving up of tax increases already scheduled for the coming years; and extension of coverage to Federal employees and nonprofit organizations.

But, the important news is that the most recent report of the Trustees of the Social Security trust funds shows that the changes in the law in 1983 worked, and the program is solidly financed. The reserves will continue to grow well into the next century.

We have emphasized the fact that the program will pay retirement benefits to the young workers of today, because this has been a cause of concern to them. However, it is very important for them to be aware of the Social Security protection they can have today.

This protection is based on disability that nobody knows when it can happen. It is reassuring to know that Social Security will be there to help.

A young worker may get Social Security benefits if a severe mental or physical impairment prevents him or her from working for 1 year or more or is expected to result in death. If disabled before age 24, a worker needs only 6 quarters of work out of the preceding 12 to qualify for benefits. If the disability happens between 24 and 31, the number of quarters required increases gradually. After 31, a disabled worker needs at least 20 quarters of work, out of the preceding 40 quarters to qualify for benefits. In addition to disability benefits paid to the workers, members of their families may also receive benefits.

After receiving disability benefits for 24 months, a worker can count on Medicare to help with hospital and doctors' bills. People with permanent kidney failure who need dialysis or kidney transplant can have Medicare

with no waiting period.

Young workers can be assured that in case of disability, they and their families will get Social Security, and in the event of their death, their families will also be eligible.

In return, we must have a more flexible "range" of permissible earnings — 11 to 13% on investment — that will allow us to take the risks described above — and be rewarded for those risks if they pay off.

Currently, the PUC places a ceiling on earnings. This means if you're getting close to that ceiling level, the incentive isn't there to further invest in technology that could trim costs or provide new revenue sources for the company for fear of bumping over the "allowed" level. In that scenario, there is little reason to take investment risks that could bring "information age" services to the "have-nots" of the world.

We have proposed a "share-the-success" formula that would return half of our earnings above the 13% level directly to our customers in the form of credits, with the remaining earnings retained by Southwestern Bell that could be plowed back into the business to provide new products and new services. "Texas First" does not contain any "share of the loss" — the risk is ours.

In future "Let's Talk" commentaries, we will further examine the need for regulatory change and its relationship on our ability to carry out our "Texas First" plan, and to provide high-quality, multi-optional telecommunications services you and all Texans want and deserve.

In short, with "Texas First," Southwestern Bell Telephone is willing to incur great financial risks, if given the chance to reap some rewards. We're betting that we can improve the Texas economy, improve the quality of telephone service statewide, freeze basic rates, lower toll rates, and still improve our earnings by marketing new products and services. We're betting that the economy in Texas will grow — thanks in some part to "Texas First" — and that we will grow with it.
