Books chosen for the art program for grades 1 - 6 were "The Spectra Program Grades 1 - 6". They were published by Dale Seymour. "Holt Music Systems 1 - 6" were the books chosen for the vocal music classes. They were published by Holt, Reinhart Publishers.

"Literature Bronze 7" was chosen for the seventh grade literature class and "Literature Silver 8" for the eighth grade literature class. "Literature Gold 9" will be taught in Literature I, "Literature Platinum 10" in Literature II, "The American Experience" in Literature III, and "The English Tradition" in Literature IV. The books chosen for the literature classes were published by Prentice Hall.

The board voted to purchase a 47 passenger school bus for the 1989-90 school year.

Superintendent W.H. Hallmark gave a review of the 1988-89 and 1989-90 budget. Discussion was held but no action was taken. Also discussed was the Gifted and Talented Program that is scheduled for this summer.

Other action taken by the board was the reading and approval of the minutes of the last meeting and the reviewing and paying of current bills. A tax and investment report was also heard.

Delton Stone of Lockney is currently the businessman director. He has one more year to serve on his term.

They attend Plains Cotton Growers meetings in Lubbock and also attend the National Cotton Council meeting held yearly.

Smith, McLendon to vie for city mayoral position

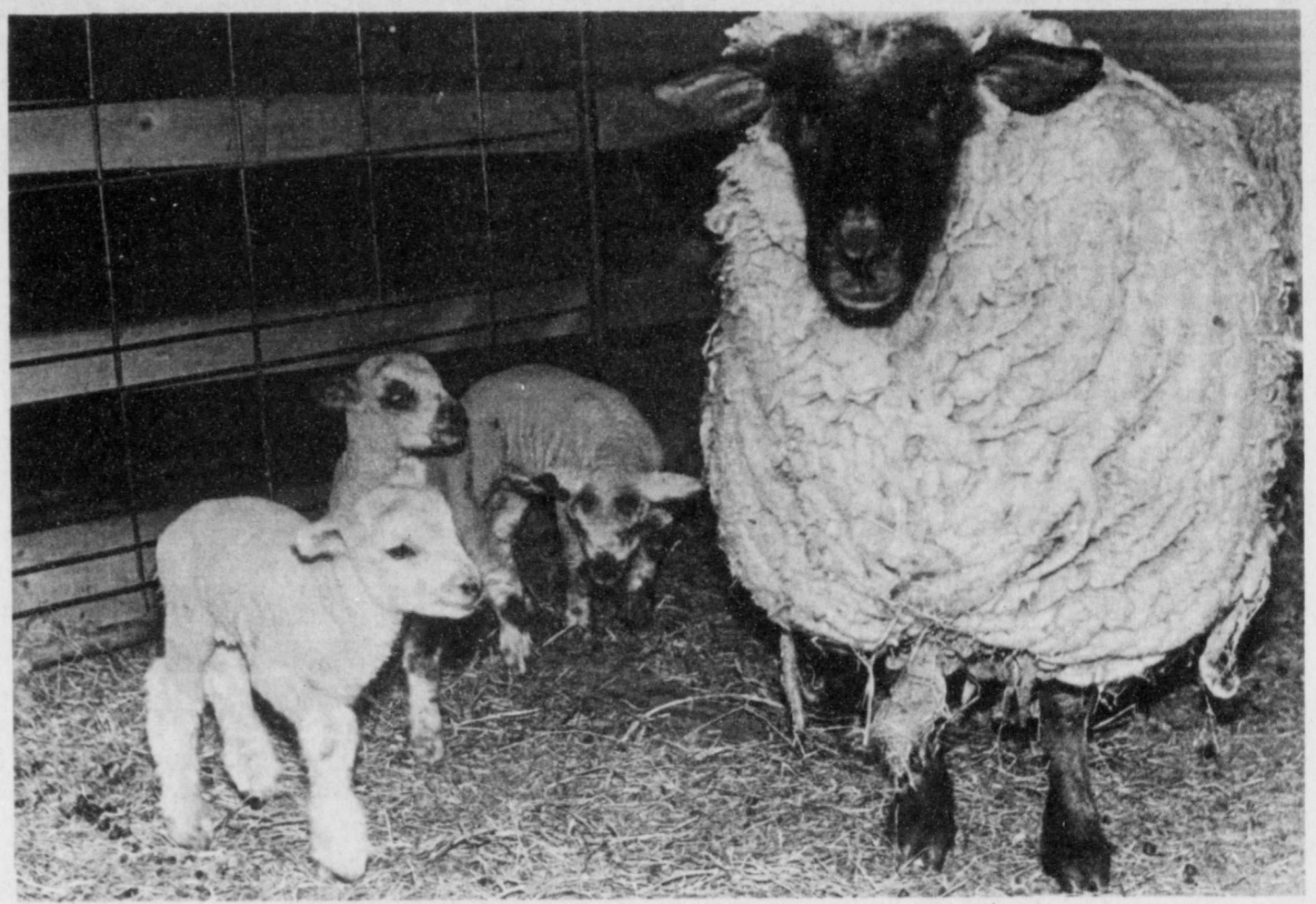
At press time there were two candidates for mayor, one for city council and three for school board who had announced their intentions of running for these positions.

County deaths increase, births and marriages decrease in 1988

Summer remains the favorite time for weddings. At least that was the trend in Floyd County in 1988 as it had been in 1987.

Twenty-two of the 60 marriage ceremonies were performed in the summer months of June, July and August. May tied with July as the third most popular wedding month.

There were 16 less marriages

in the county in 1988 than there were in 1987.

Births were down in the county this year - 197 compared with 245 in 1987. No longer having a doctor in Floydada who delivers babies is one of the reasons for the decline of births in the county.

According to records in the county clerks office there were 60 marriage licenses issued in 1988.

A decrease of 15 from the previous year.

Sixty-six deaths were recorded in 1988, compared with 54 in 1987. There were three times as many babies born as there were deaths.

In 1986 records show 218 births, 74 deaths and 128 marriages.

Schacht named dean at South Plains

Otto Schacht, associate professor of agri-business and chairman of the science department, has been named dean of arts and sciences at South Plains College.

The appointment was announced this week by Marvin L. Baker, president of South Plains College, and became effective March 1.

"Dr. Schacht has brought a lot of leadership and administrative skills with him from his previous educational experiences," said Baker. "In the past six years he has been at South Plains College, he has shown himself to be very much concerned with teaching excellence and effectiveness. We think he will do an excellent job in his new assignment, and we look forward to working with him in this new capacity."

Schacht takes over the dean's office from Orlo Sundre, who retained his responsibilities as arts and sciences dean when he was named vice president for academic affairs in July, 1988. Schacht will tentatively retain his responsibilities as chair of the science department's administrative needs can be made. Schacht will also complete his current teaching assignment for the spring semester in the agriculture department.

In his new position, Schacht will sit as a member of SPC's administrative council and will be responsible for supervising the administration of the departments of fine arts, English and communications, social sciences, sciences, business administration and

health, physical education and recreation.

"It is a pleasure and privilege to be able to accept additional responsibilities in relationship to South Plains College," said Schacht. "Hopefully during this dynamic period for SPC, I might be able to influence the continued excellence of the college and its programs. I certainly look forward to my new role."

Joining the South Plains College faculty in August, 1983, as assistant professor of agri-business, Schacht was appointed science department chairman in August, 1986. He has chaired the department during one of its most rapid growth periods.

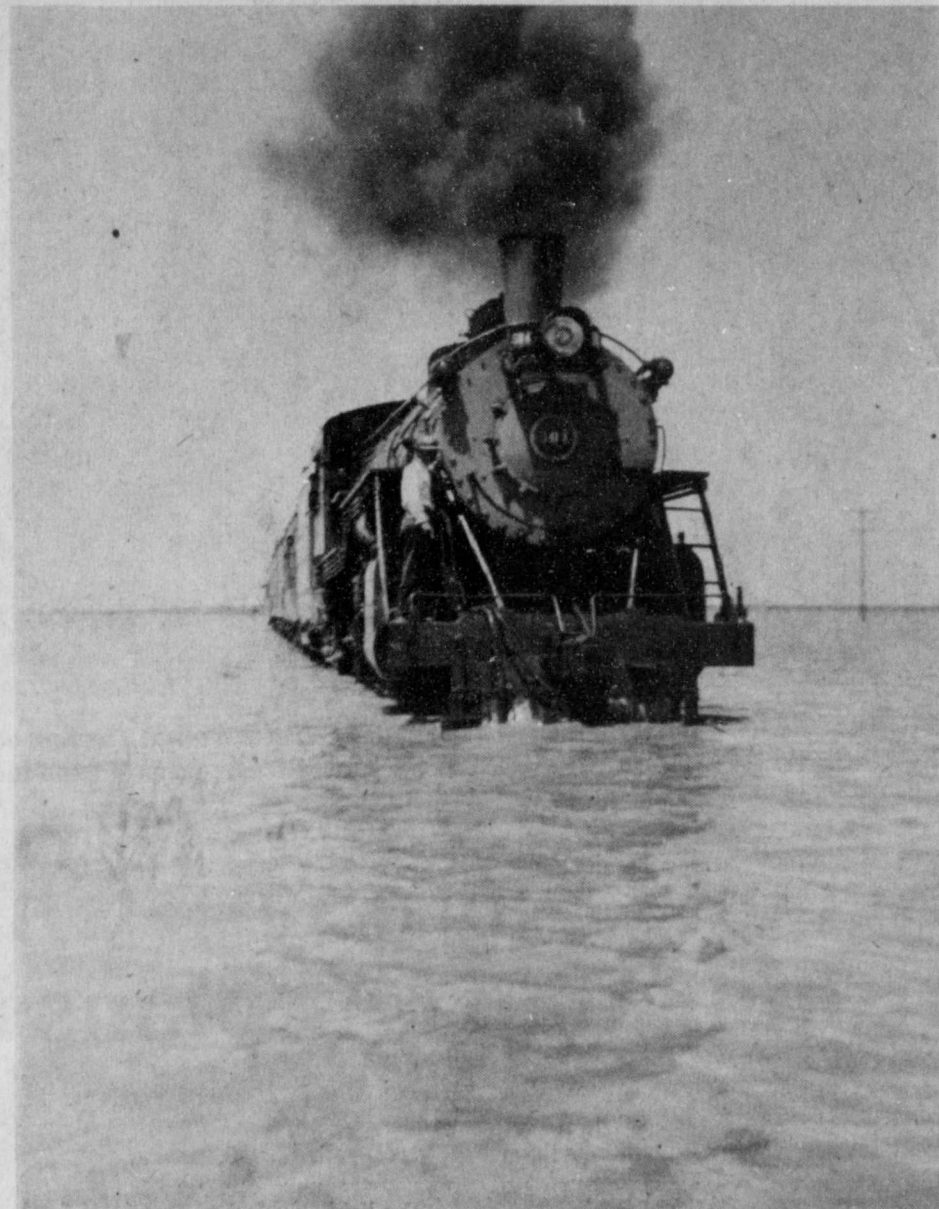
Prior to coming to SPC, Schacht was an assistant professor in the agriculture engineering and technology department for five years at Texas Tech University.

He holds his master of science degree in agricultural technology from Central Missouri State University and his doctor of philosophy degree in agricultural engineering from Texas A&M University.

Police continued the investigation and the suspects were apprehended within 24 hours. There was no property taken.

Lockney WSA elects new officers

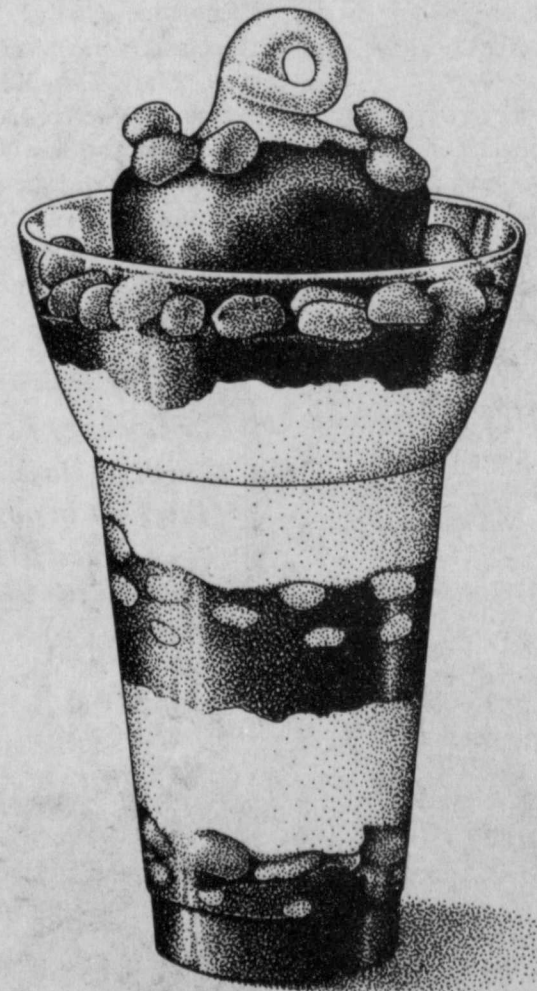

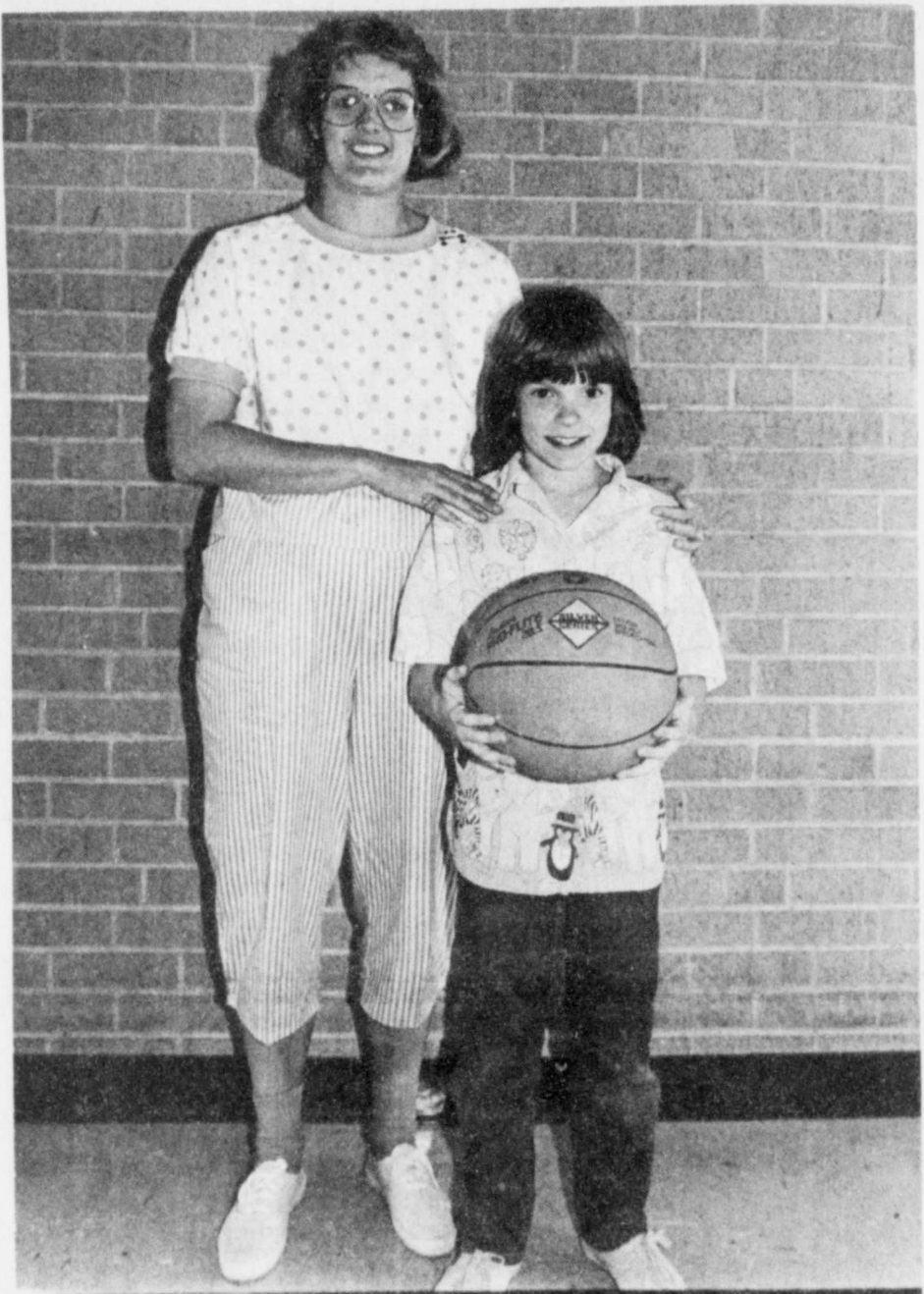

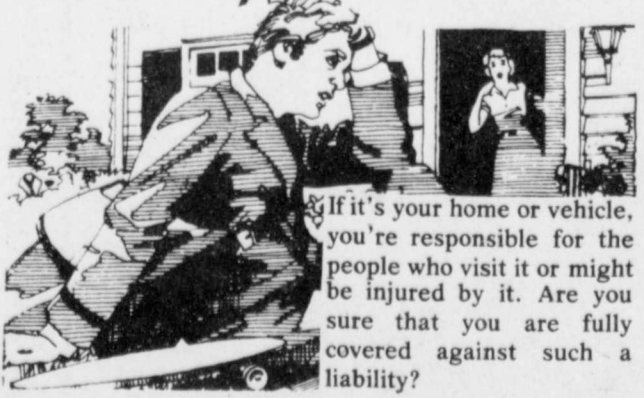
