Two candidates filed for a position on the Lockney City Council and another for mayor before the last day of filing was over on Wednesday, March 22 bringing the total number of candidates to six.

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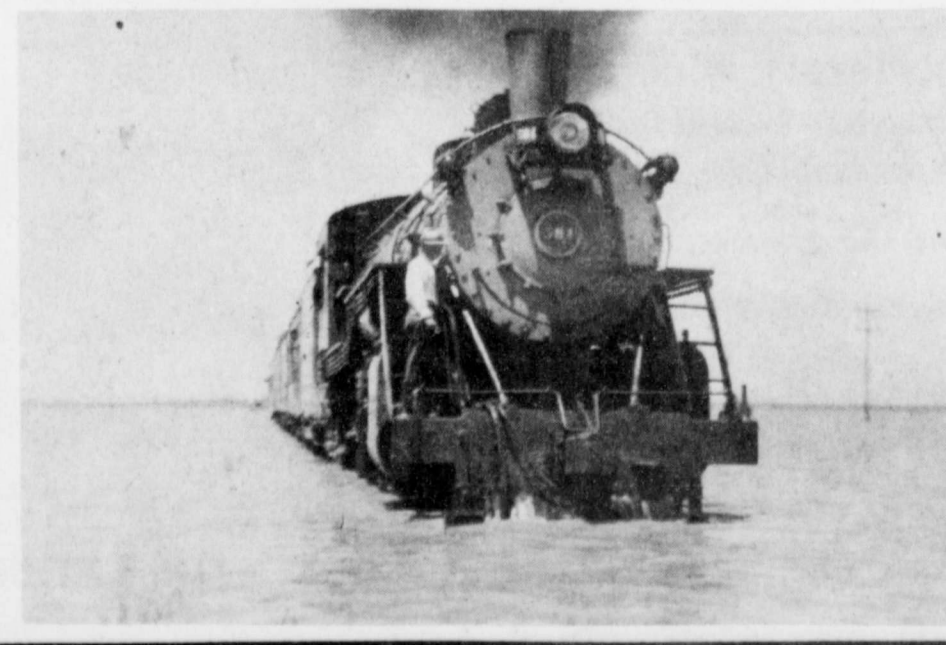
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According to Butler it was quiet in the county until the last six weeks and since that time they have been kept busy with burglaries and thefts.

J. D. Copeland has been appointed presiding judge for the Hospital Board election. The election will be held May 6 at the Lockney High School east entrance.



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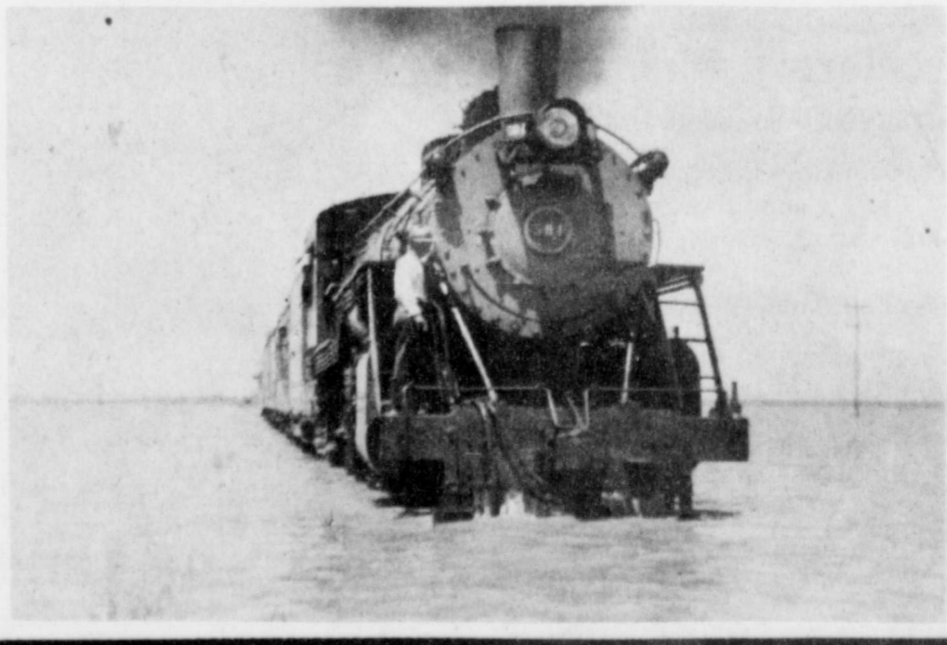
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## Local ACS offers a wide range of services

The American Cancer Society in Lockney has announced that it has a variety of services available to cancer patients without charge.

"A lot of people don't know about what we can do for cancer patients right here in Lockney," said Pastor Robert Kirk. "And all we need in most cases is permission from the patient's doctor."

Loan equipment such as hospital beds, wheel chairs, walkers, and commode chairs are available as well as gift items including eggcrate mattresses, sheepskins, bed pans, pillows and other comfort items.

"We also try to help patients and their

families with literature and information on other agencies," said Kirk. "Sometimes they want to know more about cancer or they need to know what assistance might be available here."

Kirk said that when most people think of the American Cancer Society, they think of cancer research. "It's true that the American Cancer Society puts millions of dollars into cancer research, but we also feel it's important to work with local people and help cancer patients."

## All about cataracts, you and your eyes

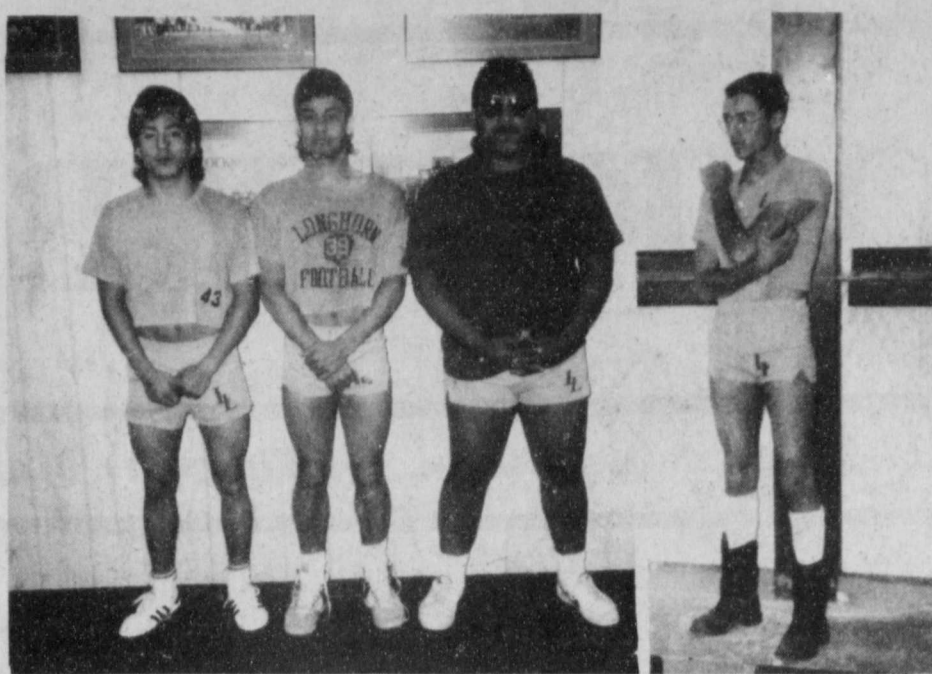
The human eye is a unique miniature camera with a shutter, a lens system and a recording film.

The iris, or colored part of the eye, is the automatic shutter controlling the size of the pupil, the opening through which the light enters. The cornea, the clear window in the front of the eye and the lens, located immediately behind the iris, together form the lens system. The film of the camera on which everything we see is focused is the retina. The retina lines the entire inside of the back of the eye. For good vision to be maintained, the path of light entering the eye must be unobstructed as it travels from the cornea to the retina.

Joseph W. Gray, M. D., F.A.C.S., an ophthalmologist on Methodist Hospital's staff, noted in a recent article, some of the medical signs and symptoms of cataracts.

According to Dr. Gray, a cloudiness of the lens inside the eye is a cataract. The cataract may be any size from a tiny fleck to a complete cloudiness of the lens, that is, a mature or "ripe" cataract. The denser a cataract becomes, the more interference there is with vision, because it is keeping more light from reaching the retina.

A cataract is not a growth, a tumor, or an inflammation. It is a degeneration of the lens fibers which make up the lens.

Congenital cataracts are present at birth and usually hereditary, or they may be caused by the mother contracting German measles during the first trimester of her pregnancy.

Dr. Gray also adds that cataracts can be the result of an injury to the eye, excessive X-ray radiation, or the ingestion of certain drugs.

The most common cataract, predominantly found in the older population is the senile cataract. The cause of senile

cataract is unknown despite continuing research. Dr. Gray noted that since our life span is increasing, the number of cataracts is also growing.

Currently there is no effective means of preventing or curing cataracts. Some curative approaches have included special diets, eye drops, eye exercises, radiation treatment or medication taken by mouth. But, the only known scientifically proven treatment for cataracts is to remove the lens surgically from the eye.

**DIABETES — IN A NUTSHELL**  
It is estimated that five million Americans who have diabetes don't know they have it. To help everyone know what to look for, the following information along with symptoms to look for is presented.

**TYPE I DIABETES (Insulin-Dependent Diabetes)**

Type I Diabetes generally appears suddenly in children and young adults, and progresses rapidly. Because the pancreas produces little or no insulin, people with Type I Diabetes must take daily injections of insulin and strictly

monitor their diets and exercise.

The exact cause of Type I Diabetes is not known but it afflicts one million Americans.

The symptoms associated with Type I Diabetes include:

- \* Frequent urination/bedwetting in children who have been trained
- \* Excessive thirst
- \* Extreme hunger
- \* Sudden weight loss
- \* Weakness and fatigue
- \* Irritability
- \* Nausea, vomiting

**TYPE II DIABETES (Non-Insulin Dependent Diabetes)**

Type II Diabetes, which usually occurs in overweight adults over 40, develops over several years and often goes undetected. Meal planning and exercise, and sometimes oral medications and insulin injections, are used to control this type of diabetes.

Many cases of Type II Diabetes can be prevented by maintaining an ideal weight, and getting regular aerobic exercise (e.g. brisk walking, jogging, swimming, cycling).

The symptoms associated with Type II Diabetes include:

- \* Any of the Type I Diabetes symptoms
- \* Blurred vision, or any change in sight
- \* Tingling or numbness in legs, feet, or fingers
- \* Slow healing of cuts, especially on the feet
- \* Frequent skin infections, or itchy skin
- \* Drowsiness

### IOLA VIVIAN GRANT

She was a member of the Ninth and Columbia Church of Christ.

Survivors include a brother, Jack D. Billington of Plainview; and several nieces and nephews.

### REV. TEMPLE LEWIS

Born March 22, 1909 in Sweetwater, Texas, he was the eldest son of Tryon E. and Myrtle Johnson Lewis. Two pioneer ranching families rich in Texas heritage from cattle ranching to law making in the early 1800's.

Rev. James Temple Lewis departed this life March 23, 1989 at his home in Tye, Texas.

Services were held at 3:00 p.m. Saturday at Pioneer Drive Baptist Church with Jack Riddlehoover officiating. Burial was in Tye Cemetery, directed by Elliott-Hamil Funeral Home, 542 Hickory.

While pastoring at Tye Baptist in the early 1950's, he was instrumental in getting city water into Tye and incorporating the city. He also helped form the City Council on which he served for many years.

Not only was Temple a minister, he was a pastor in all facets of his community life, assisting in the building programs of many churches.

After retirement from the ministry and with a lifelong interest in farming and ranching, as a descendent of a long line of registered Hereford breeders, Mr. Lewis began his own herd in the late 1960's with descendents from the original Lewis herd. His grandfather, John R. Lewis, brought the first registered Hereford herd into Nolan County in 1888. This line was fortified by the Anxiety IV line in 1897 by his uncle Charles Lewis of Sweetwater.

Survivors include his wife, Murrel Lewis of Tye; three daughters, LaDell (Mrs. Maurice) Lemmons of San Angelo, Mertie (Mrs. Dale) Wood of San Antonio and Diema Carpenter of Tye; two sons, Tryon Temple Lewis of Arlington and John Ryan Lewis of Hawley; three brothers, Tryon E. Lewis of Fort Stockton, Ted M. Lewis of Sunrise Beach and Bill Lewis of San Angelo; a sister, Mrs. Herbert Fields of Sonora; 14 grandchildren; and nine great-grandchildren.

Being reared in Fort Stockton, Texas, Temple had the advantage of living history. Home was the now Texas Historical Landmark, The Annie Riggs Memorial Museum, owned and operated by his maternal grandmother, Annie Frazier Riggs. This adobe hotel, built in 1899, was a popular stop on the Butterfield Stage Route.

While he was still in High School, his family moved to McCamey, Texas, where Temple was a member of the first graduating class of McCamey High School and was responsible for writing the school anthem which is still being used.

He continues his education at John Tarleton College in Stephenville, Texas, and the University of Texas at Austin, Texas. He then returned to McCamey to enter his father's business where he met and married Murrel Stokes, June 26, 1933. She remained his loving and devoted wife for 55 years.

Temple surrendered to the ministry in 1943 in Monohans, Texas. He and Murrel brought their family to Abilene, Texas, where he enrolled in Hardin Simmons University School of Theology. He was a strong supporter of Hardin Simmons and friend of early Simmons leaders.

In later years, he was to be honored as an outstanding parent having all five of his children attend Hardin Simmons University.

One of this areas most beloved ministers, he has served his Lord at the churches of Payne Chapel, Atwell, Royston, Avoca, Weinert, Tye, Lone

Star, Plainview, Stamford, Broadview Baptist of Abilene, and Wilmet, Texas.

### JAY EDD PARSONS

Graveside services for Jay Edd Parsons, 79, of Weatherford, former Lockney resident, were at 2:30 p.m. Friday in Lockney Cemetery with the Rev. Robert Kirk, pastor of First United Methodist Church, officiating. Burial arrangements are by Galbreath-Pickard Funeral Home of Fort Worth and Moore-Rose-White Funeral Home.

Mr. Parsons died Wednesday, March 22, 1989, in a Fort Worth hospital after a brief illness.

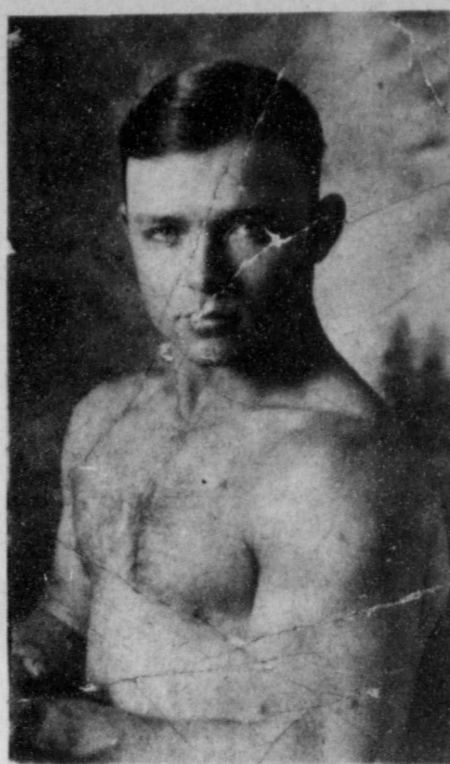

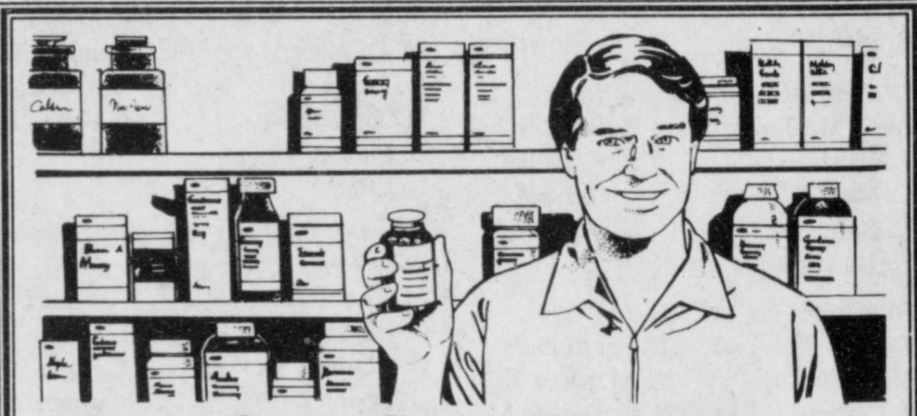

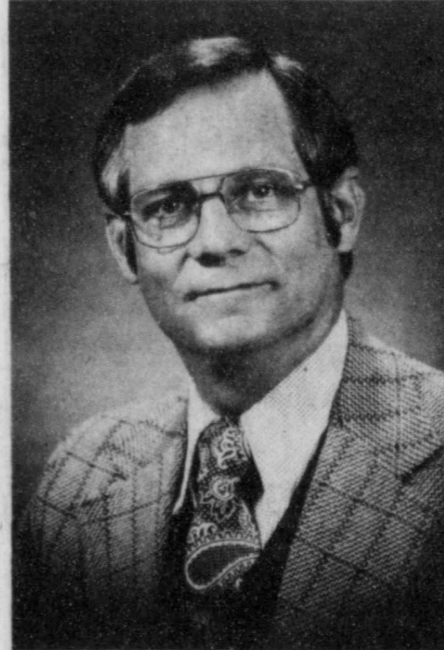
