Seven county 9-1-1 advisory committees in the SPAG region are in the final stages of completing an interim 9-1-1 plan to be submitted to the Advisory Commission on State Emergency Communications (ACSEC) at its July meet-

ing. The counties to be included in the plan are: Bailey, Cochran, Yoakum, Lamb, Hockley, Lynn, and Hale.

The South Plains 9-1-1 Advisory Committee will meet at SPAG on April 19 to review and approve the interim 9-

1-1 plan prior to its being submitted to the participating city and county governing bodies.

The membership of the South Plains 9-1-1 Advisory Committee consists of one representative from each county advisory committee, one representative from the Lubbock Emergency Communications District (LECD), one representative from GTE and one representative from Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

Jerry Johnson, City Councilman from Lockney, is the current Floyd County representative to the committee.

Local candidates in contested municipal races are profiled

DAN SMITH

Mayor incumbent Dan Smith, is again seeking the position as Lockney mayor. He is 34 years old and a farmer. He is a life-long resident of Lockney.

He is married to Reeda Cay Lawson Smith and has two daughters. They are members of the Main Street Church of Christ.

Smith is a 1972 graduate of Lockney High School. He graduated from Texas Tech in 1976 with a BS degree in Agriculture Economics with an emphasis on management.

He was elected to the current position as mayor in 1987. Before that he served as councilman from 1986-87. He is past president and vice-president of the Lockney Rotary Club.

He has been a member of the Board of Directors on the Floyd County Farm Bureau for 11 years, and served as the organization's secretary-treasurer, vice-president, and three terms as president.

He was voted as the State chairman of Young Farmers and Ranchers by the Texas Farm Bureau in 1985, and as the Outstanding Young Farmer of Texas in 1987.

In 1988 he also became a member of the South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) Board of Directors.

WANDA J. MCLENDON

Wanda J. McLendon is running for mayor of Lockney.

She is the granddaughter of Jess Boswell and daughter of Barbara Timmons of Lubbock.

McLendon and her husband Joe have five children, Ernie, Tamie, Jeanie Jo, Gary and Mike.

She is a 1973 graduate of Frenship High School. She is a carrier for the Plainview Daily Herald, Floydada route, and her husband is employed at Excel Company in Plainview.

According to McLendon her platform is based on the fact that she supports Lockney. "Lockney has always supported me. It's home. I am interested in the handicapped, elderly, and youth of Lockney. I believe in taking care of home first, then you can help others, but you take care of your hometown and its people first."

With the help of God, the people of Lockney, and a sense of humor, the city council, and the county we can resurrect Lockney. I truly believe this.

I have chosen Carmaleta Hooten as my campaign treasurer.

RAY SISSNEY

Ray Sissney is a candidate for mayor of Lockney. He was born in Dexter, Texas (Cook County) on July 7, 1921.

He moved to Grayson County when he was four years old and then moved to the plains in 1941. In June of 1942 he moved to the Lockney community and except for time spent in the service, he has lived in Lockney since then. A veteran of WWII, he was drafted in September of 1942 and came back to Lockney in 1944.

After returning from the war he worked on farms and ranches as a farm laborer until 1959 when he started farming for himself. He retired from farming in 1985.

He married his wife, Virginia, in 1971. She is originally from Cleburne. He has three children; 2 boys, one girl and four grandchildren.

"I have never had an elective office," said Sissney, "however I have served on the board of directors at the Senior Citizens Center, and I was president of the Floyd County Farmers Union at one time."

C.L. HENDERSON

C.L. Henderson is a candidate for the office of Lockney mayor. He is 66 years

old and a farmer. He is a veteran of WWII and has lived in Lockney for 43 years.

"I have spent my lifetime in Briscoe and Floyd County," said Henderson.

He is a Methodist and has three children and three grandchildren.

"My life's work is invested in this community," said Henderson, "and I have two sons and a grandson coming behind me in this community. Maybe some of my time will be a benefit to them down the line."

KENNETH WOFFORD

Kenneth Wofford is running as one of the incumbents in the City Council race. He has served in this position for eight years.

Wofford was born east of Lockney and has lived in town for 29 years. He graduated from Lockney High School.

He and his wife Retha have two girls, one boy and nine grandchildren.

He served on the school board for six years in the 1960's, five of those years as chairman.

Wofford is semi-retired and is proud to be from Lockney. He has the time to spend serving on the council. He is interested in the city of Lockney and feels that he has the experience to make

him an asset to the council.

According to Wofford, "During my terms we have not wasted money. We have tried to keep the equipment in good repair and replaced items as they were needed. The backhoe that we just purchased replaced one that was fifteen years old. I am happy to say that the city is in the black as we go into this new year."

ARVIE NEWTON

Arvie Newton is running as a write-in candidate for the city council.

He was born in Bridgeport, Texas. His father had rented a farm from R. C. Bennett and Newton rode a horse to Floyd County in 1933.

He attended Lockney schools and is also a graduate of Watson Business School in Plainview.

Newton served in World War II from 1940 to 1944. He participated in the invasion of France and received a battlefield commission of Second Lieutenant. Six weeks later he received a promotion to 1st Lieutenant. He was near Pilsen, Czechoslovakia when the war ended.

He came back to Floyd County and started A.L. Newton Trucking. He married his wife Gene in 1962.

Newton is a member of the First Baptist Church of Lockney and a member of the board of directors at the Senior Citizen Center.

When asked why he was running for the city council he stated, "I felt that I needed to do what I could for my community. I need to help in whatever capacity I can."

SAM FORTENBERRY

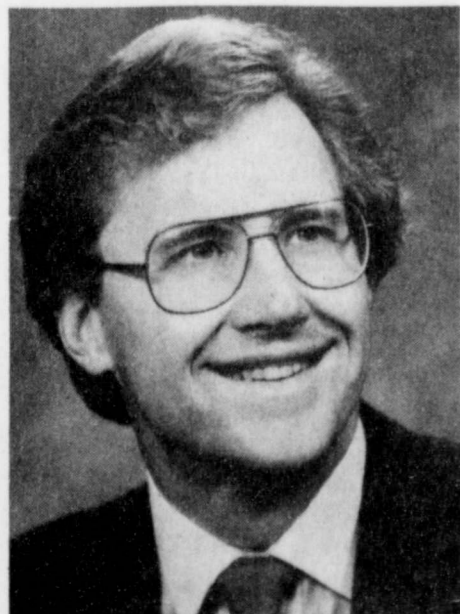
Sam Fortenberry is running for a seat on the city council.

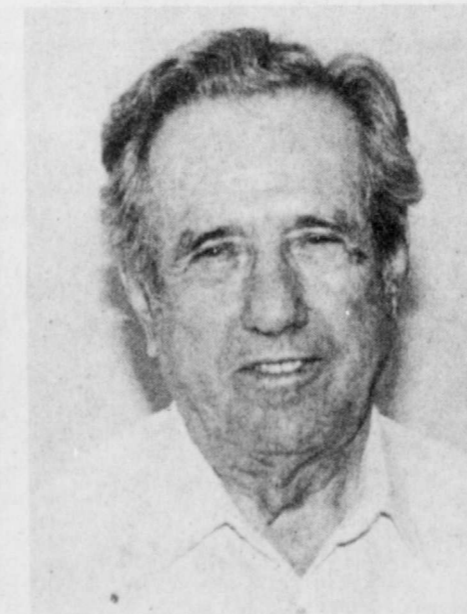

After the interim plan has been approved by the regional committee, each

city and county included in the plan will be required to pass a resolution supporting the establishment of an enhanced 9-1-1 emergency communications system and the assessment of the 9-1-1 service fee and equalization surcharge, in accordance with the interim plan.

Floyd, Motley, Dickens, King, and Crosby counties will be included in the regional 9-1-1 plan to be submitted to the ACSEC prior to September 1, 1989. The Terry County Interim 9-1-1 Plan was approved in December, 1988 by the Commission.

- * Finish projects. Set aside blocks of time for meetings and phone calls. If you must stop work on a project, don't begin another when you return.
- * Exercise. Stretch or take a brisk walk. Chances are you'll return feeling refreshed, and you might even come up with new solutions to your problems.
- * Sleep. Don't let job-related stress follow into your dreams. Try to unwind before you go to bed. Read or work on a hobby. Changing activities each night can help ease you into sleep.

Persons who regularly eat a well-balanced breakfast can perform more efficiently, concentrate on the day's schedule and are less tired after a busy day.

Other benefits include:
* Breakfast participants have more nutritionally balanced diets than breakfast skippers.
* Kids who eat breakfast are better nourished than students who skip breakfast.
* Breakfast participants have higher

intakes of calcium that is derived from milk, as well as phosphorus and riboflavin, all nutrients essential for strong bones and teeth.

* Breakfast participants tend to maintain normal weight levels and are less likely to be overweight or underweight.

* Breakfast participants are energetic and can concentrate on school-related tasks, while breakfast skippers often tend to be irritable, restless and listless.

* Breakfast eaters have a better late-morning problem-solving ability.

* People who eat breakfast regularly have more energy at the mid-part of the day than breakfast skippers.

* The habit of eating breakfast on a regular basis often is associated with a vigorous older age.

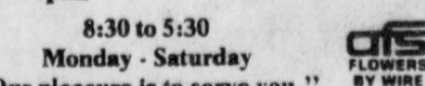

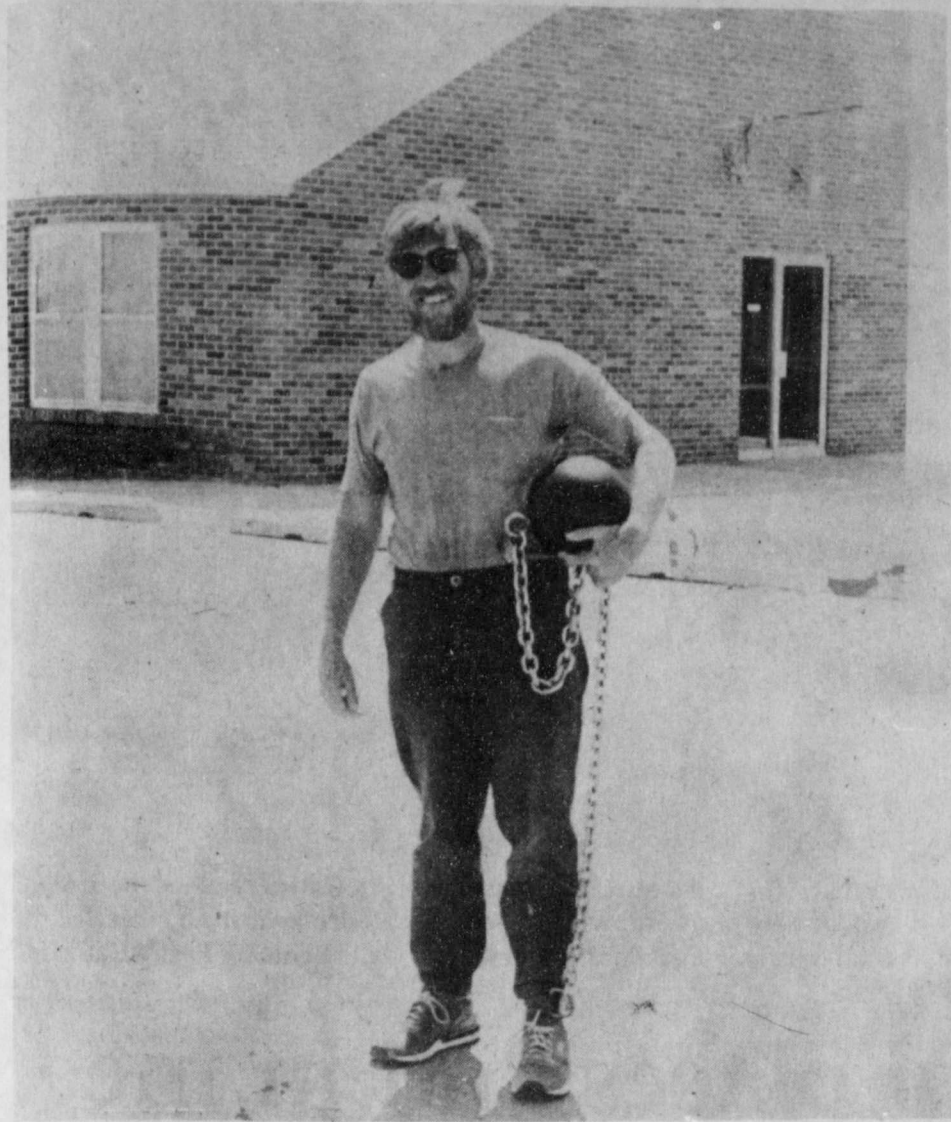

Post office will hold mail for vacationing residents

"If work or vacation should ever take you away from home, the Postal Service would like to remind you that there are several options available when determining what to do with your mail," says Lockney Postmaster Doug Meriwether. "If you'll be away just a few days and don't have time to notify the Post Office, ask a friend or neighbor to pick up any mail from your box," Meriwether says. "Accumulated mail in a box is an advertisement that the house is vacant. "We will be glad to hold your mail at the Post Office for up to 30 days," says Postmaster Meriwether. "Either stop by the office here, or ask your carrier for a hold mail card. Be sure to specify the dates which you would like your mail held, fill out the card, sign it and hand it to a clerk or your carrier a day or two before you leave. "When you return, you can either pick

up the accumulated mail at the office, or call and ask that it be delivered the next day. Since there may be more mail than will fit in the box, someone should be available to receive it. "If you expect to be away for more than 30 days, you should consider a temporary address change," says Meriwether. "Simply pick up a change of address order form from the Post Office or your carrier and fill it out completely, including the effective date and the date you wish to terminate the order. "This service is commonly used when families travel to vacation homes. It allows them to stay current with bills and correspondence. Again, it's a good idea to call when you return so that normal delivery will resume. "We want to work with you to ensure uninterrupted mail service," says Postmaster Meriwether.

Carelink celebrates one year milestone in regional service

Providing care to West Texas and Eastern New Mexico, CareLink has had an impressive 600 transports in its first eleven months of operation - virtually tripling its initial goal. "We are committed to the philosophy that teamwork makes the critical difference in the saving of lives," said William D. Poteet, FACHE, president/CEO, Methodist Hospital. "Our strong ties with outlying hospitals are vital," continued Jim Courtney, president/CEO, Lubbock General Hospital. "Our goal is always the safe and rapid transportation of patients. With the initial attention provided by the referring hospital or EMS crew, it is our responsibility to resume the care as well as transport the patient." Certified as a mobile intensive care unit, CareLink is configured with extensive life support equipment essential to providing the comprehensive patient care needed during the flight. A professional team of nurses, paramedics and other medical support staff is on board all flights. "Initiated during the Korean War and more extensively during the Viet Nam conflict, the use of helicopters in aeromedical transports has mushroomed," said Bryant. "With its birth at Denver's St. Anthony's Hospital in 1972, air ambulance use has grown to more than 170 programs operating over 200 air-

craft throughout the country." Rapid transportation by helicopter of critically ill or injured patients has become the standard of care throughout the nation. In the United States, over 116,000 patients were transported by helicopter in 1988 alone. According to two studies published by William Baxt et al., from the University of California at San Diego, a decrease in mortality of up to 52% was noted among patients being transported by helicopter.
